The average mature cat can have 3 litters with a total of 12 kittens per year. Out of those litters of kittens, about 4.7 of them are females, which in turn means they will most likely have litters of their own. In 7 years, that can amount to 420,000 kittens!

Enter CLAWS. CLAWS is an acronym created by Calla Lee Wagner for Cats Lives Are Worth Saving. Before CLAWS there was Betsy Peyser (Betsy's Consignments) who, with help from Calla Lee and her mom, Teresa Mercer (Rover Makeovers) were the go-to folks when stray cats were a problem in the community. Melanie Pritchard (ERA Team VP Real Estate) added her hands to the challenge of keeping strays fed and ultimately trapped, immunized, and spade/neutered.

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

TITANS TRACK STAR DOMINATES AT STATES

Franklinville-Ellicottville Junior Sprinter Tyvetta Herman Sweeps Division II Speed Events; Sets Track Record in 400m Dash

Before Franklinville's Tyyetta Herman could get ready for her prom last Saturday night, she had some business to take care of on the track at the Section VI State Qualifier meet at West Seneca West High School.

Having completely dominated her competition with first-place finishes in all three of her events (the 100, 200 and 400 meter dash races) in the blazing heat of the preliminary rounds on Friday afternoon, the incredibly speedy runner found herself the favorite to once again sweep the so-called speed events in the finals on Saturday.

After a second straight day of overwhelming strength and flat-out speed, Herman proved herself to be the undisputed "Queen of Speeds" in Western New York for 2023, as the junior sprinter left all the other girls looking at her back as she crossed the finish line as the Section VI Champion and State Meet qualifier in all three events - and with only a few hours to spare before the big dance!

'It's really rewarding to see that the work that I put in actually gave me the results that I desired from the start of the season," Herman said of her big day. It was a sentiment that was echoed strongly by her mother (also named Tyyetta), a former high school track standout herself, and also the Titans' girls team coach. "Not only does she spend the time working hard in practice," Coach Herman explained, "She spends the extra time in the weight room working out and puts in the work after school to get better in academics.'

For the state qualifier meet, athletes were divided into two divisions (large school, small school), where the winner of each event moved on to the NY State Championships, to be held June 9-10 at Middletown High School in southeastern New York.

Herman's dominant performance in the finals began with a razor-slim victory in the 100m dash, as she broke the tape with a time of 12.45 seconds, edging out Cheektowaga's Amiya Verse by just five hundredths of a second (12.50) with a strong lean at the finish line.

In her next finals appearance of the day, the 400m dash, Herman made the most of her opportunity to repeat in the event she had won in 2022. The greatest distance of any of the "speed" events in track, the 400m dash requires athletes to sprint out of the blocks at the starter's pistol and continue full-out the entire way around the 1/4-mile oval to the

Her decisive victory in last season's 400m dash, also at West Senior High, propelled her into her first outdoor State Meet, where she ultimately finished with the 6th-best time.

Immediately after she had crossed the finish line with a blistering-fast mark of 57.43 sec. onds in this year's qualifiers, many observers knew that Herman had posted an impressive time, but her second win of the day became a little sweeter when news spread through the crowd that she had broken the nine-year-old track record by six tenths of a second!

When asked which of her three State Qualifying events might be her favorite, Herman explained her affinity toward the 200m dash - the last event of her day. "I like the 200 because I'm always the most nervous for the 400 - it's a big event - it's also a hard event," she admitted. "And then the (200m dash) just feels like a reward at the end of the meet to finish off with what I have left."

Herman completed the speed runner's trifecta about an hour after winning the 400m dash; as she 'rewarded' herself with another first-place finish - claiming victory in the 200m dash with a time of 25.17 seconds.

With her starting blocks in hand and having mowed down the competition one event at a time, Herman walked off the track and admitted with a smile, "Now all I've got to do is get ready for the prom!'

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



ELISA HUGHEY RUN FOR THE ARTS

Virtual Run Honors Special Woman and Supports Local Art Scholarships

It may be virtual, but that doesn't mean it is less impactful. Elisa's Run for the Arts is celebrating its 7th anniversary since the passing of its namesake, Elisa B. Hughey, who lost her valiant battle with colon cancer in June 2016 at the age of 48.

Elisa, wife of Inigo de Orbe and mother of two sons, Adrian and Ignacio, loved the arts. She received a Master's in Art Education from Buffalo State University and a Master's in Fine Arts from the University of Buffalo. After diagnosis, Elisa found that her love of art was not enough to take her mind off of her battle, so she began running for health and for sanity. Amazingly, in 2013, post diagnosis, Elisa won her first ever marathon for her age group at the Buffalo Marathon. In 2014, she again thumbed her nose at cancer, continued running and finished the Boston Marathon in just under four hours.

How Run for the Arts began: The weekend following her death, friends gathered for an impromptu 5K run to toast Elisa and honor her. It was here where her friends, Gwen Bush and Elizabeth Lowes, suggested a run be held annually as a fundraising event for art scholarships for a local student, in Elisa's memory. And thus, was born The Elisa B. Hughey Scholarship for the Arts, under the guidance of her sister, Brenda Hughey. As with so many events like this, since COVID, the "run" has been virtual.

Here's how it works, as posted on Brenda Hughey's FB page: "How to participate VIR-TUALLY: Plan a 5k run, walk or other activity of your choice for Saturday, June 17th. Take a photo of yourself doing the activity, your route or whatever you'd like. Pets are encouraged to participate. Post your photo to Elisa B. Hughey Scholarship for the Arts on Facebook or email Brenda Hughey at hugheybl@gmail.com. Thanks for your participation and honoring our beloved Elisa together."

So, bottom line: Gather up some friends, do fun things and remember Elisa as you do it!

Over the years, the fund has raised over \$30,000 – and will continue to sustain the annual art scholarship. This year, the foundation is distributing two \$1,000 scholarships, one each for Visual arts students from Ellicottville and West Valley, Elisa's two "hometowns." It will also support a summer arts program at the local library and ongoing community arts projects, some of which are "in the works, but not finalized." Contributions are always appreciated. EAST AURORA TO ELLICOTTVILLE

3rd Annual EA2EVL Bicycle Ride to Benefit the Erie Cattaraugus Rail Trail

EAST AURORA - Following two sold out years, the Erie Cattaraugus Rail Trail (ECRT) is once again hosting a 42-mile charity bike ride from East Aurora to Ellicott-ville this fall. The EA2EVL Fondo - or non-competitive bike ride - will take place Saturday, September 30th followed by a finish line party at Holiday Valley. Registration is open at www.ea2evlfondo.com for an early bird discount rate of \$69 until August 15th.

The 2021 and 2022 EA2EVL events raised over \$100,000 in donations for the 27-mile ECRT rail trail that runs along a former rail line from Orchard Park to Ashford, NY. According to Mary Brummer, ECRT Board President, the team has made incredible progress with those funds.

"Thanks to the generosity of our EA2EVL sponsors, riders and donors, we've cleared and improved the first 1.5 miles of the ECRT trail, starting at the Orchard Park Village Depot, and will welcome the public on it by mid-June," Brummer shared. "With the funds raised from this year's event, we'll continue to push the trail south, opening and improving sections in the town of Aurora into West Falls."

The bike event starts in East Aurora at 42 North Brewery and travels south down scenic Route 240, riding on the road parallel to the ECRT trail from West Falls into Concord. The course continues through the fall foliage and rolling hills to Route 242 into the

Donations Requested to Help Care For and Control Stray Cat Population

Allow me to introduce you to CLAWS. CLAWS is an acronym created by Calla Lee Wagner for Cats Lives Are Worth Saving. Before CLAWS there was Betsy Peyser (Betsy's Consignments) who, with help from Calla Lee and her mom, Teresa Mercer (Rover Makeovers) were the go-to folks when stray cats were a problem in the community.

Since about ten years ago, Melanie Pritchard (ERA Team VP Real Estate) joined the group and together they founded CLAWS and added her hands to the challenge of keeping stray cats and kittens fed and ultimately trapped, taken to a vet to be checked over, immunized - including against feline leukemia and LIV (the feline equivalent of human HIV), neutered or spayed. With luck, homes are found, or they are released knowing they won't multiply.

Betsy tells us that presently there are two feeding stations set up in the village for the strays, but they are losing one in the center of town. The house has been sold and renovations will begin, removing the station. More than one feeding station is needed, so Betsy has asked that we put out the call for anyone who might have a shop or under porch area in the village where strays could come to be fed. She suggested anywhere around Monroe Street or EBC so the displaced cats will be able to find it. A feeding box/shelter is provided, the cats are fed every evening and winter snow is cleared around them. They are well tended.

As I heard the story, I began to wonder why anyone would do this, uncompensated, for such a long time. As Betsy tells it, when she returned from Colorado some thirty years ago, she noticed stray cats in a barn across the street and decided to do something to care for them. Perhaps caring for strays is like eating potato chips where you just can't stop with one. That, and she said she couldn't stand by and not do anything for those homeless creatures. Next thing she knew she was feeding and rescuing cats and finding homes for kittens. She acquired a live trap and started trapping those that looked in need of help and took them to the vet to get whatever else they needed. And yes, she footed the bills. About ten years ago, Melanie Prichard came onboard. Being involved in animal rescue most of her life, she also leads with her heart and an open checkbook.

The team acknowledged that they needed a fundraiser to support their feeding stations, their trapping, and their vet bills. The Rotary offered them the hall for the event, the village of Ellicottville bought them four Have-A-Heart traps, and many of our local businesses and restaurants donated food and prizes for the affair. The community was supportive of the cause, and they were able to bank money to keep their cat charity going. But that was several years ago, and the stray cats keep having kittens in a continual cycle.

No one wants unhealthy stray cats in the neighborhood. There will always be stray cats because unneutered and unspayed strays multiply. This community owes a debt of gratitude to these women who have carved out large portions of their lives to rescue and care for community strays, any time, any season. And, oh yes, when asked the cost of care per cat, it ranges between \$200 and \$500, not including food. Throughout the years they have rescued 50 to 60 cats, not to mention the ones that they have kept. Add that up, why don't you?

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

In speaking with Melanie, she had a few suggestions for our readers. She strongly urges people who have pet cats (even if indoor cats) to have them immunized, chipped, and spayed or neutered. "If you have one cat at home, please consider making room for a second," said Melanie. "Older cats need homes and love, too. It is honorable to open your home." She also recommends Catios and full cat enclosures or cat fencing made by purrfectfence.com which makes it impossible for cats to scale and get over.

When a hunting accident forced Dana to take a leave from work, he visited his hometown and began thinking about relocating. "Dana said he always wanted to move back home," Misty noted. The Ukolowiczs are also open to working with students in vocational programs. "If anyone is looking into getting a bit of experience, we'd be willing to work with them," said Misty.

While the business name includes "heating and plumbing," Dana's work includes so much more. Misty explained, "We do heating, air-conditioning, electrical, plumbing, installations of full furnaces, air conditioners, mini splits, baseboard heaters, boilers, and septic tanks. We also do all of your water fixtures, drains, repairing and installing toilets and new lines." Currently, many of the calls Misty receives are for air conditioning checks due to the recent heat wave. "Right now, we're doing lots of air-conditioning checks, just to make sure everything is up and running and there's enough refrigeration to cool the air," she explained. "We always encourage people to call as early as possible when the weather changes so that we can get them on the schedule and allow time to order any parts that might be needed."

For the Ukolowiczs, the best part of owning their own business is the flexibility and ability to make their own schedules, as well as the sense of community with their customers. "It's nice meeting other people and talking and getting to know our customers," said Misty.

Community Fund Grant Supports Olean Police Department Drone Purchase

OLEAN - Thanks to support from the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation's Community Fund and the Bill & Cathy Fraser grant program at the United Way of Cattaraugus County, the Olean Police Department recently acquired a new drone that will serve as a tool to enhance the public safety of those in the greater Olean area.

The CRCF board of directors approved a grant of \$1,500 to the Olean Police Department for the drone purchase in 2022, but due to the need for additional funding and supply chain-related delays, the drone was acquired this month. For the Olean Police Department, the drone will serve as a tool that helps further the public safety of the community it serves to protect

According to Dylan Ensell, a department patrolman, the drone will particularly help in search efforts for missing persons and serves as an important tool in incidents like hostage situations and gun threats and helps keep both responding officers and members of the community safe.

"The City of Olean Police Department has assisted other agencies in the county with missing persons cases within the past few years. During these incidents, time is of the essence to ensure the safety of the missing person along with the first responders," said Ensell. "Technology, such as drones, enables police departments to address situations quicker and with more effective response times to various calls."

Drone use has provided other area departments and first responder agencies in the surrounding areas with valuable support in recent years, added Ensell.

"In 2021, the Cattaraugus County Sheriff's Office responded to a domestic dispute where

Olean Gallery Currently Featuring Seneca-Iroquois Art













OLEAN - The current Tri-County Arts Council exhibit, "Haudenosaunee, Art of the Now" "Survive, Alive, Thrive," features the works from culminating show for Seneca-Iroquois National Museum's artist in residency program funded by the Appalachian Regional Commission's Area Development fund. Artists in the residency program include Samantha Jacobs, Lorinda John, Penelope S. Minner, Alicia Sanford, Antoinette Scott, Bernadette Scott, Kristina Tome, and Leeora White

In late summer of 2021, Appalachian Regional Commission Area Development with Southern Tier West grant funding came through for the Pathways to Success: Artist in Residency (AiR) Program at Seneca Iroquois National Museum. A call out for indigenous artists to apply went out in October 2021. Eight artists heeded the call from both Cattaraugus and Allegany territories. Their talents ranged from making corn husk dolls and weaving to painting and sewing. Each AiRs received a modest stipend to participate in a variety of activities that would inspire them to create a piece of art that they would donate to the museum. This show at Tri-County Arts is an acknowledgement of the challenges met during this time, but more importantly a celebration of the successes of overcoming obstacles and the creativity that arose as a result.

All the activities took place during the Covid 19 Pandemic, which everyone met with resilience. Participants made the best of a tough situation and each AiR took part in virtual, live, and hybrid professional development workshops with partners in the program. John Sheehan from the Seneca Salamanca Chamber of Commerce presented the first workshop on how to be the best salesperson. He also gave the artists his secret FORM (Family, Occupation, Recreation, Money) equation for building successful sales relationships. Fred Frigthner, Director of Marketing Communications at W.R. Case & Sons Cutlery did two separate workshops on telling stories about products along with a writing workshop. Picking up from there, Tom Cullen led the AiRs in a discussion on "recognizing and identifying your audience in order to attract your dream customer." Tri County Arts Council Director Emeritus Mikel Wintermantle and Artist Educator Allison Braun did a hands-on workshop focused on displaying and photographing art. Artists got to play with light boxes and learn all about the power of their cellphones to make their work pop! Hayden Hanes brought the previous topics together and presented on photographing your work and how to tell your story. Brian Kelly hosted a 'Creating and Editing Websites' Workshop at The Hub in Olean. Sharon Louden, the former director for Chautauqua Visual Arts, presented a virtual talk on making a living as a working artist, which covered grants, fellowships, arts markets, and commissions. The artists also participated in several arts markets arranged at the museum and they took a trip to K-Art in Buffalo and participated in a Q&A about fine arts galleries with the gallery managers.

In addition to forming new relationships between Seneca Iroquois National Museum and organizations in Olean and Allegany Village, and supporting the creative economies, the final piece to the Pathways to Success program is the mini-gallery boxes. This was an idea inspired by the mini-libraries that have been popping up in communities and neighborhoods across the United States. The idea behind the mini-galleries was to place art and the institution within the communities to make the exhibits accessible and give people a taste of what they will find in the museum. Seneca Nation Arts and Cultural Placed Based Tourism Initiative is an example of a cost-effective foundation for a continued partnership and project to create permanent resources that will benefit all partners.

Funds were used to create these permanent place-based displays, which encourages cultural exploration of the region. These Mini Galleries capitalized on partnerships and lessons learned from the workshops. Additionally, the hope is that the Mini Galleries will be a replicable model that other museums and cultural institutions can use, helping to further promote SINM. The Seneca Nation's Training and Employment Resource Center's construction training program led by Jim Ray, created the Mini Galleries using their students and instructors. This program provided hands-on "trades/construction" training to displaced, underemployed, and/or disabled Indigenous peoples. The SINM, because of their integral role in fostering cultural programming as a practice of maintaining cultural continuation, has served and continues to serve as an excellent hub for all community partners to work through. Since participating in the Pathways to Success program, half of the AiRs received funding through Creatives Rebuild New York fellowship and are fully employed as working artists with tools and skills to carry them through the end of the program in 2024.

The opening reception was catered by Chef Lorinda John from LoMade Meals and beverages provided by an anonymous donor.

an individual inside a residence advised 911 operators that he would harm his children if the police tried to enter the residence," said Ensell. "They leveraged their drone to be able to get a look inside of the residence, without putting any of their officers in danger. They had observed via the drone that the individual was highly intoxicated and had fallen asleep, at which point they were able to safely evacuate the children."

The new drone will also allow the Olean Police Department to assist agencies in surrounding cities, towns and counties when handling dangerous calls or missing persons cases

Additionally, the drone's thermal capabilities can be used to assist local fire departments when responding to fires by locating hot spots, heightening the safety of both firemen and police officers responding to calls.

Together, grants from CRCF's Community Fund and the United Way of Cattaraugus County's Bill & Cathy Fraser grant program covered 25% of the funding for the \$9,000 grant. Grants from the Stitt Foundation and Cutco Foundation made up the remaining \$6,500 for the drone.

"The purpose of the Foundation's Community Fund is to respond the changing needs of our community. We have seen how important a drone can be in cases of missing persons and other situations we have seen in our area in recent years," said CRCF Executive Director Karen Niemic Buchheit. "This piece of equipment will be a huge help to our local first responders in times of need, and our board of directors is excited to have supported the Olean Police Department in acquiring it."

a dominant team showing at Randolph one week later.

As a team, the girls took sixth place in the small schools division at the state qualifiers last weekend at West Senior High.

Other standout performances from last weekend's State Qualifiers include the throwing tandem of sophomore Elizabeth Price and senior Megan Jackson. The girls finished one behind the other in the discus, where Price's fifth-place throw of 101-11" was two short inches further out than Jackson's sixth-place toss of 101-9". The following day in the shot put, Jackson took home fifth place with a toss of 33-3 1/2", while Price's throw of 31-2" was good enough for 11th place.

In one of the more demanding events in the sport, senior hurdler Anna Slavinski finished seventh in the 400m hurdles with a time of 1:12.30 and also brought home a top-15 time in the 100m high hurdles. In her first season competing in the pentathlon, junior Abby Chudy finished in 4th place in the discipline that includes the high jump, long jump, shot put, 100m hurdles and 800m run.

Senior distance specialist Alysa Williams finished in 8th place in the 2,000m steeple-chase and took home a top-15 finish in the 800m run with a time of 2:35.73.

TITANS BOYS BRING HOME SOLID RESULTS

Hot on the heels of a fifth-place team finish at the Class D Championships at Randolph on Friday, May 25, the Titans Boys Track team was paced at the State Qualifiers by freshman distance runner Grant Cornell, who scored a top-five finish in the 3,000m steeplechase with a time of 10:32.28. Cornell pushed through the 90-plus degree heat during the final event of a very long day on Friday in West Seneca to earn a top-12 finish in the 3,200m run with a time 11:06.64

Sophomore pentathlete Ben Edwards took fourth place overall in the five-event competition, his score was helped by a second-place finish in the 110m high hurdles (17.27 seconds). One of the best all-around athletes on the boys squad, Edwards also finished fourth in the 1,500m run (4:45.03) and claimed two more top-five finishes in the jumping events (high jump 1.6m and long jump, 5.36m).

During the preliminary heats on Friday, sophomore hurdler Maddox Johnson finished the 400m hurdle event in 1:03.23, just a touch over one second behind the time that would have gotten him into the finals on Saturday.

Senior discus thrower Dominic Breton brought home a top-15 finish from the State Qualifiers with a toss of 110'-5".




