



WELCOME TO 'THE LINCOLN'

Local Business Partners Are Bringing New Life to Ellicottville's Telemark Motel

For some people, their high school friendships, romances, sports, and jobs end up much like their high school yearbooks - tucked away and forgotten, with little or no connection to their current stage of life. But not for Dawn (Barczak) Hogan, whose life has come full circle since 2004, her senior year of high school. By the time her high school classmates meet for their 20th reunion this summer, Hogan can once again be found at the former Telemark Motel, where she worked during high school. But this time, she won't be bartending, waiting

tables, cleaning rooms, or working in the kitchen. Hogan and her business partners are now the owners of the iconic Ellicottville motel, which will be open this spring as The Lincoln Boutique Motel.

Hogan and her family were good friends with former motel owners James and Janet Tekavec, who are thrilled that the business will be brought back to life by Route Two Nineteen LLC, the investment group comprised of Hogan and her family. "The previous owners have a daughter, Sara, and we were in the same graduating class together," Hogan explained. "Janet was going through some old things to give to Sara during her visit." One of those items was Sara's high school yearbook, which Hogan signed and wrote a surprisingly foretelling message: "...I'll see ya around the good old Cadillac Jack's 'cuz I'll be working there for the rest of my life."



While Hogan has not worked at the motel in many years, her other work experiences and that of her family have prepared her for this next chapter. Over the years, Hogan has owned her own business and she and her family have many combined years of experience in construction, commercial properties, remodeling, and Airbnb operations.

"One of our business partners has renovated a couple of different properties, one of which is in Randolph and another one on Chautauqua Lake, and he kept pulling into the Telemark parking lot with a vision for something fresh and new," she said. "We're recreating the 12 motel rooms to have a really trendy and unique vibe. We also have a couple of short-term rentals on the other side of the restaurant. One is already an Airbnb and the other is going to be up and running in a few weeks. We'll continue to keep those as short-term rentals."



As many who have visited or driven past the motel know, the existing exterior of the building has a copper roof. While the exterior color will get a face lift, the roof will remain a focal point, and its material is connected to the new name. Hogan explained, "We've all lost loved ones where the 'Pennies from Heaven' play a big role in our lives. Thinking about the Lincoln - copper roof tops - felt like the perfect rebrand. There will be lucky penny accents throughout!" Hogan and her family want to help people add

more adventure and fun to their lives by spending time in Ellicottville, a sentiment they feel is captured perfectly by Abraham Lincoln's words: "In the end it is not the years in your life that count; it's the life in your years."

Currently, Route Two Nineteen LLC is actively seeking a restaurant tenant to bring the former motel restaurant, Cadillac Jack's, back to life. The 3,000 sq. ft. restaurant is fully equipped with a clean kitchen. "We want this to be an area where people can feel welcome and enjoy themselves," Hogan explained. "We hope that the next restaurant owner will have that vibe and be in harmony with the motel side of the business. That's what we want to bring to the community. We want to draw locals back to the restaurant and the bar, and we want to offer people from out of town a trendy, cozy spot." Creating a new place for events, hosting guests, providing local jobs, and accommodating wedding parties are just some of the goals Hogan and her family have for the business, and they can't wait to get started!

Their projected opening date is sometime in April or May of this year. ELLICOTTVILLE VILLAGE BOARD

Engineering Dept. Announces New Hire; Village Begins Planning Efforts for This Year's Mardi Gras Parade Celebration

Mayor John Burrell and fellow Board members gathered Tuesday, January 16th at 6:00pm to discuss the current agenda in place for the Village of Ellicottville. Having a rather quick meeting, most of the discussion followed previous topics and resolutions that are still looking to be made.

Jumping right into business, good news was announced that the Town and Village have agreed on a new hire to the Engineering Department. The now-filled role will assist Ben Slotman, the Head of Engineering, and is a welcomed addition for both the Town and Village of Ellicottville.

Speaking of good news, a special event is in the making, and while it is not new to the village, the Mardi Gras Parade was put in motion for the upcoming date of Saturday, March 9, 2024. The high energy event is the perfect send-off for the winter season and offers plenty of fun to be had for all ages throughout the area. The parade will be held the same weekend as Holiday Valley's Winter Carnival. Locals and travelers alike can look forward to the event, while the Village prepares for the necessary organization and means needed to make for a safe and enjoyable time.

Moving on, the Department of Planning submitted their monthly report which involved no current action from the Board beyond its approval. Also approved without objection were the previous Board minutes dated December 19th and December 28th, the Financial report, Audit of Claims, and the Mayor's report.

The Engineering Department had a few minor updates to present within their report, one of which was for the Board to review and sign the EV Make Ready Agreement, as well as the National Grid terms and conditions. These two actions are relevant to the Mill Street parking lot, which remains closed as the Village finalizes the last few details and connections that need to be made. As stated by the official site of the Joint Utilities of New York, "The goal of the Electric Vehicle (EV) Make-Ready Program is to support the development of electric infrastructure and equipment necessary to accommodate an increased deployment of EVs within New York State by reducing the upfront costs of building charging stations for EVs." Once these agreements are made, the parking lot becomes one step closer to completion.

Another project that has seen some headway within the Engineering Department, from the Public Works Division, is the Washington Street Light Project, which recently had their contractor submit the revised pole sheet cuts. The project will continue to be updated as it all comes together. Once complete, the new streetlights will serve for safe walkability



while staying true to the charm of the village.

Wrapping up the Board meeting, Members reviewed the DPW report which included plowing and street clean-up. The Village continues to prepare for any expected winter storms and heavy snowfall with readily available working plows and sidewalk clearing. The report indicates the department's constant upkeep and repairs to equipment to best serve the community. The report was approved without opposition.

Historical Society Approaches Town for Assistance to Find More Space; Impact Study for Crosby's Gas Station Project Updated

Discussions took place at the Ellicottville Town Board Meeting, held January 17th at 6:00pm between Board members and special guest attendees. Once gathered, Town Supervisor Matt McAndrew called the meeting to order and welcomed conversations to begin surrounding the agenda of the Town of Ellicottville.

The first topic from Privilege of the Floor, came from Dawn Westfall of the Ellicottville Historical Society. It seems the Historical Society is facing some challenges with the amount of space that is available. She requested that the Board assist in finding appropriate options to add office and storage space for the needs of the organization. They are looking into fundraising opportunities, but as they gather the necessary requirements, residents can always look to the official website of the Town of Ellicottville and direct themselves to the donation form listed under the Historical Society section at www. ellicottvillegov.com.

An update was made on the progress of establishing local law to apply to short-term rentals. A drafted local law was presented to the Short-term Rental Committee on January 3rd and it was agreed that the draft covered the intentions of the Town and hopes to successfully carry out their goals in this newly charted territory. The draft will now move on to the Planning Board to be reviewed.

With the mention of the Planning Board, there was a recommendation made to fill two open positions within their Board. The positions to be filled included Planning Board Chair and Vice Chair. The Town Board approved the motion for the recommendations and the positions are now filled.

The Planning department then carried on with their report with an update to the traffic

impact study of the Crosby Gas Station Project. It was noted that the project will be updated to include possible future plans proposed by Steelbound Brewery, potentially expanding sidewalks, and the impact of the EVGV Trail as they continue with their mission to build.

The EVGV Trail Committee was mentioned to the Board as a follow-up to some Old Business. The Committee is currently planning a 5K run fundraiser at HoliMont and they hope to pick up some corporate sponsorships. The planning will continue and be brought back to the Town Board for review once completed. Also moving forward from the Old Business would be the Town Hall Front Door Project. The Engineering Department has been given contracted documents that they have reviewed and are in the process of revising. Once the contracts are finalized, the project will be one step closer to completion for a beautiful addition to the historic building.

All reports, including Planning, Engineering, Police, and Highway were accepted without issue from the Board, along with the Supervisor's report, Audit of Claims, and the previous Board Minutes.

Once discussions ran to an end, Town Supervisor Matt McAndrew called the meeting to be adjourned and the Board was dismissed for the evening. The next Town Board meeting will be held on the third Wednesday of February 2024. 

PRESERVING PORTVILLE

Historical Fund Established at Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation

OLEAN - The Portville Historical and Preservation Society (PHPS) recently established an agency endowment at the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation to support the agency's efforts to preserve the long and rich history of the Portville community. Ronda Pollock, the PHSPS founder, encouraged the agency to establish the fund to support the organization's mission and programming and its long-term sustainability.

PHPS was established in 1986 and has focused on collecting, preserving and exhibiting historic materials pertinent to the past of the town and village of Portville and surrounding areas in the years since. "In the future, PHPS plans to extend its reach to a wider audience and become a destination in the study and enjoyment of New York State History," said Pollock.

Over the years, the PHPS has released a number of print publications chronicling important Portville history, including *A History of the Town Portville, Portville Goes to War* and *History of Farming in the Portville Area*. The historical society also publishes a newsletter on an ongoing basis that tells stories of Portville and the surrounding communities' past.

Formerly located on Maple Avenue, the Portville Historical and Preservation Society now holds a location in the historic Bedford Corners on State Route 305. Bedford Corners was officially listed on the State Register of Historic Places in 2003.

PHPS President Cindy Kelley mentioned that the office in the Eshelman House is open every Thursday from 10:00am-4:00pm and other days by appointment. "We welcome visitors and friends to tour our restored buildings, and we will aid them in their historical research and genealogy," she said.

In 2001, Col. Charles O. Eshelman deeded the land at Bedford Corners, including Bedford Corners Schoolhouse, Portville Grange and the home of Jacob Bedford, which was constructed in 1856. The Bedford Corners Schoolhouse was built in 1864 to educate students in Joint School District No. 7 in the Town of Portville and Little Genessee. The schoolhouse continued to serve the district until the centralization of the Portville School District in 1942.

The historical and preservation society has successfully restored and maintained the Bedford house and the Bedford Corners Schoolhouse. The agency hopes to be able to



"More than 35 buildings/areas were submitted as ideas for this year's Santa Claus Lane ornament," reported Meme K. Yanetsko, GOACC COO. Of the 35, six of the submissions were new: Joe's Service Station, Napoli Pizza, Stroehmann's Bakeries, Roxie's, the Halfway and St. Elizabeth Motherhouse.

The top four submissions are Oak Hill Park, Olean Community Theatre, Cutco Cutlery, and HiHo Drive In. Voting began earlier this week on the Chamber's Facebook page (@ oleannychamber), via email (info@oleanny.com) and by phone (716-372-4433). The community is asked to vote for one submission on each post. (You can vote for more than one, but please vote each one separately.) Voting will end at noon this Friday, January 26th.

Every year, a local landmark is chosen to be designed on the 3-1/2 inch circular resin ornament. The artist sketches the layout from photos provided by Chamber officials and a prototype is created. Once the prototype is approved, work begins with the process of pouring and hand-painting each piece. The ornaments arrive in Olean, individually boxed, with a brief description of the ornament. Some years, there are two ornaments. In that case, the overall winner is the first one.

"We've had some companies come to us to have an additional ornament created - making two for that particular year - like Olean Class Cars, First Presbyterian Church, and Henry H. Hill. We ask for only ONE additional ornament and that building submit/pay the design fee," stated Yanetsko.

Past ornaments include the Olean Municipal Building, the Fannie E. Bartlett House, St. Mary of the Angels Church, Olean High School, St. Stephen's Church, St. Bonaventure University, a depiction of Santa Claus Lane, the Olean General Hospital, Olean Post Office, Community Bank, Ivers J. Norton, the Castle Restaurant, St. Francis Hospital, Chuck Wagon Restaurant, Palace Theater, Boardmanville Elementary, Red and Trudys, North Union Street street scape (1st hundred block west side), Olean Class Cars, Cloud 9 Amusement Park, Bradners Stadium, Henry H. Hill, Archbishop Walsh, Beef 'n' Barrel Restaurant, Tasta Pizza, the Olean Public Library, two in 2022 – First Presbyterian Church and Pioneer Park in Portville, and Angee's Restaurant this past year.

The ornaments, in addition to event sponsorships, is a fundraiser for Olean's Santa Claus Lane. Ornaments began in 1999, and have been a great gift idea for local and former residents as well as corporate gifts. Through the fundraisers, the electricity bill (to light all the decorations) and refurbishing items (bulbs, garlands, light strands, etc.) are paid. Excess revenue (if any) from the event/fundraising, is turned over to the Santa Claus Lane fund that sits with the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation. Core Performance: Why We Turn to Medication to Lose Weight

Whenever I look at pictures of by-gone eras I can't help but notice that back in the early and mid-portion of the 20th century, our country did not have the serious obesity problem that it has today. Our intense desire for instant gratification has become our Achilles heel. This brought to mind the article I wrote about processed and ultra-processed food. These 'Frankenstein' versions of food are made up of added sugar, salt, fat and starches extracted from natural occurring foods and then blended with artificial colors, flavors and stabilizers to hold it all together. Soft drinks, hot dogs, cold cuts, packaged cookies and salty snacks like pretzel rods all qualified, as did many frozen dinners.

Fructose, one of the most commonly used sweeteners, is now present in many foods at concentrations unheard of in nature. In recent years, studies have shown that fructose destroys or inactivates several key enzymes needed for the healthy functioning of the mitochondria, the power plants in human cells that convert simple sugars into ATP, the form of energy we use to carry out the functions of the human body and brain. Sugar isn't even the worst problem in the American diet. More damaging still is the consumption of processed grains, used in corn flakes, white bread and many other products. These grains are stripped of their outer shell, known as the "bran," and their inner germ, which contains fiber, fatty acids and nutrients, leaving only the carbohydrates. The human body digests these liberated carbohydrates much faster than when they're locked inside the grains.

Instead of sitting in the stomach and gradually being broken down into glucose, it begins to break down as soon as it gets to your mouth and is almost fully digested by the time it has moved through the stomach, and all absorbed by the time it gets to your small bowel.

This rapid digestion starves the gut bacteria, which we rely on for healthy functioning of the digestive system, leading to increased gut permeability that in turn may allow bacteria and toxins to enter the bloodstream and cause widespread inflammation, a factor in a wide variety of diseases such as celiac disease, diabetes, asthma, Alzheimer's and cancer. In recent years, evidence has emerged linking the pathological brain activation patterns seen in drug addicts to those seen in many obese research subjects and compulsive over-eaters.

This is why it's no wonder that scientists and researchers created drugs like Ozempic, Wegovy and Mounjaro. The history of the anti-obesity drug discovery is part of a bottomless pit that has a long list of failures. However, the new crop of much-hyped weight loss drug seems different. These work with mimicking a hormone called glucagon which regulates blood sugar levels and slows down the rate at which food leaves your stomach, making people fuller for longer.

I have been helping people get in better shape and lose unwanted weight for years. As much as I can give them the tools and information on what to eat, the world of food/drink choices is constantly challenging to them. Some of my clients have decided to use these medications and are having success. They have educated themselves about the side effects and have made exercise an integral part of this journey. I have noticed that these clients are much more mindful about not only how much they eat but also what they eat. Some have



already weaned off the drug and are still doing great by maintaining the weight they feel more comfortable in.

Again, I think what we can take away from this is that many decades ago we did not have an obesity problem. Heart disease and high blood pressure as well as other diseases like type 2 diabetes, gallbladder disease and osteoarthritis were not as common as they are now. We have a big problem with our food system - limited access to healthy food, poverty, and the dominance of big corporations over our diets. Like any addiction, sometimes you need medications to help you break them. This is a complex problem and the answers are not always for everyone. Whatever choice you make, always follow the advice of your health care provider.

continue restoration work on the Grange building that occupies land at Bedford Corners. The building was first a cheese factory that operated until the early 1920s before being conveyed to Portville Grange No. 842, where local farmers and their families held meetings and gatherings.

"We are excited to work with the Portville Historical and Preservation Society for many years to come," said Kirk Windus, CRCF executive director.
