

Rotary Club of Ellicottville assists local food pantry with facility storage improvements

ELLICOTTVILLE - Over the past number of years, the Rotary Club of Ellicottville has been providing equipment and monetary support for many local organizations. Working with the Ellicottville Food Bank for over 10 years, the Club has provided quarterly financial support and various donation drives, and this year took a further step to help this great local organization. The community has seen the Food Bank grow and recent events made it imperative to improve the facility storage and efficiency, housed inside the United Church of Ellicottville.

The Rotary Club of Ellicottville, working with Val Germaine, Nancy Rogan and Reverend John Woodring of the United Church of Ellicottville and Ellicottville Food Bank, developed a list of equipment needed to accomplish this improvement. The Rotary Club of Ellicottville submitted and received a matching grant from Rotary District 7090. (The Rotary District Grant has been used in the past to support numerous projects at the Ellicottville Memorial Library, Ellicottville Central School, the Village Park and the Rotary Auditorium at the Ellicottville Town Center, to name a few).

This particular grant provided new shelving, storage containers, prep tables and freezer containers, greatly improving the Food Pantry facility. The chrome shelving, rolling carts and stainless steel tables were assembled by a group of Rotarians and friends of the Rotary including Kathleen Moriarty, Tony Trost, Kathy Trost, Jim Salamone, John Weismantel, Doug Anderson and Greg Cappelli. Nancy Rogan, Bob Germaine and Reverend John pitched in to make the assembly go smoothly. The grant also provided storage totes and freezer totes to help with storage issues.

The Rotary District 7090 provides a matching grant of up to \$2,000 to Clubs that meet the criteria annually. The Rotary Club of Ellicottville contributed \$2,500 for a total of \$4,500 to provide the new equipment for the Food Pantry which also improves the space that the Church uses for community dinners and other community functions.

"The Food Bank greatly appreciates the generosity of the Rotary Club of Ellicottville and Rotary District 709," said Val Germaine. "We have a strong relationship with the local Rotary Club that we value and hope will continue for many years.'

The Ellicottville Food Bank is located inside the United Church of Ellicottville, 53 Elizabeth Street, and services the Ellicottville community with a totally volunteer staff. The Food Bank is open Monday 1:00-3:00pm, Wednesday 4:00-6:00pm and Saturday 10:00am-noon every week. #### RAIL RIDER JAMBOREE

Producer of Borderland Music Festival bringing new event to Holiday Valley

Mark your calendars for what is sure to be a fun-filled packed winter weekend in Ellicott-ville March 18-20 when Holiday Valley plays host to the Rail Rider Jamboree.

This is the first year for the outdoor winter music fest, in the hopes that it becomes an annual "music meets the mountains" festival with skiing, snowboarding competitions, vendors selling their wares like jewelry, t-shirts and much more, food trucks, yoga and of course a full weekend of music.

An idea that has been in the forefront of Jennifer Brazill's mind for a couple years has finally come to fruition. Brazill, who is producing the festival, owns Ginger Root Productions and Borderland Festival. She has had tremendous success with these festivals on the west coast and ski resorts in Colorado on a much larger scale, but has always wanted to have one in Ellicottville, which incidentally is pretty much in her backyard as she grew up in East Aurora.

I got a chance to chat with Brazill recently about the festival, some of the bands/artists on the ticket, and her passion for bringing music and the outdoors together for fans.

Mostly centered on the west coast, the producer came back home to East Aurora and her parents' home when the pandemic hit. Asking her if the Jamboree Music Fest was already planned and had to be put on hold, she replied, "It was in the idea stages when Covid hit, so it wasn't scheduled to cancel, but it put everything on hold of course."

"The ski niche has always been part of my brand," Brazill told me. "I love working with ski resorts to create a niche that's a little bit on the shoulder of their season, so as not to interfere with their really big winter weekends, but still have enough winter so there's snow and people can get up on the mountain," she added.

The weekend festivities start Friday evening on the 18th with a Rail Jam in the Rail Fun Park at the base of Mardi Gras lift at Holiday Valley. The Jamboree part of the festival will be Saturday the 19th with five acts performing on two stages from 2:00-10:30pm, and Sunday the 20th will end the festival with Bluegrass and Bloody Marys at the Cabana Bar at Holiday Valley.

Local, regional and national bands/acts will perform Saturday at the Jamboree, including A Girl Named Genny from Rochester, Drift Wood from Binghamton, a New Orleans style Brass Band from Buffalo, and headliners Keller Williams and Dark Star Orchestra.

"It's a great fit to have these two headliners on the same bill," stated Brazill. "Keller Williams I usually have as a full band, but he's coming solo to this event. He brings a looping machine with him and he's so super creative and quirky ... a really good guy. Dark Star Orchestra is Grateful Dead oriented," continued Brazill, "and I'm a big Grateful Dead fan and I just love them. They've been around a long time and have a great draw. They sell out in Buffalo when they play there, so I know they'll be a big hit."

Come out and embrace our winter season and celebrate getting back to festivals, music, shopping, food and more. All with the backdrop of one of the most beautiful villages in western New York! #### PENGUIN PADDLE

Fundraiser for the Lounsbury Adaptive Ski Program returns to in-person format

Get your garbage bag and get ready: the Penguin Paddle is returning for a full day of in-person fun to Yodeler hill at Holiday Valley on Saturday, February 26th! Maureen Sigeti, chairperson for the Penguin Paddle, is thrilled to chair this exciting fundraiser for the Lounsbury Adaptive Ski Program, which helps people of all abilities learn to ski.

In 1987, Bill Lounsbury, a ski patroller at Holiday Valley, lost his leg to cancer, but continued to ski using hand-held skis, inspiring all who knew him. When he passed away, many donations were made in his honor, and the money was used to start the LASP, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization and chapter of Disabled Sports USA. The program's mission is to "deEMPHASIZE the disABILITY" and serves individuals between the ages of 5 and 75 of all physical and mental abilities, ranging from paralysis, muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis to autism, Down's syndrome, cerebral palsy and spina bifida, as well as veterans. The program consists of volunteer instructors who work with students in affordable, private lessons at Holiday Valley.

The annual Penguin Paddle is the program's biggest fundraiser each year and involves participants purchasing a garbage bag and wearing it as they stomach-slide down the lower part of Yodeler slope. The annual event also includes a much-anticipated silent auction, raffle and food tent. "It's this annual fundraiser that makes the LASP possible," said Sigeti. "We buy all of our own equipment, award scholarships and pay for instructors' training opportunities through this event. This entire program wouldn't be possible without the support of the Ellicottville community and Holiday Valley!"

LASP Director Bill Bredenberg is now in his fourth year of leading the program and is looking forward to another successful Penguin Paddle. "We're so grateful to Holiday Valley for their support, not only of this fundraiser, but the entire program," he said. "From donating prizes for the Paddle to providing a beautiful place for this program, we could not do this without their support."

Sigeti knows first-hand what a life-changing experience the LASP is for both the students and the volunteers. She first became acquainted with adaptive ski programs through her mother, who is a volunteer with an adaptive ski program in the Syracuse area. "My mom put me in touch with Mary Ellen Racich, who was the director of the LASP for about 20 years," Sigeti explained. "I've always been involved with volunteering through the Special Olympics (mom was a coach for that!), and I fell in love with the work that the Lounsbury program was doing."

For Sigeti, as well as other volunteers, the program is rewarding and fun! In her words, "You can really bring what you love to your volunteer work. This is a great example of it: people who love to ski helping other people learn. It's a wonderful program!"

For the past six years, Sigeti and her husband have been volunteering with the Penguin Paddle, and she is excited to chair this year's event. Despite the pandemic, last year's Penguin Paddle still took place but through a virtual format in which participants did a belly slide wherever they happened to be and participated in the raffle and silent auction online. Speaking of last year, Sigeti said, "It was very, very successful, but it's just nothing compared to an in-person event with a DJ, the penguin slide, and the energy!"

She is pleased to share that this year, "We are going to be running, to an extent, as usual. We'll have the food tent set up, penguin slide races, raffle, and silent auction, and scav-



#### VILLAGE OF ALLEGANY RECEIVES SKATEPARK GRANT

Allegany River Skatepark receives \$300,000 Built to Play grant from The Skatepark Project

VILLAGE OF ALLEGANY, NY - The Allegany River Skatepark group, in partnership with the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation (CRCF) and the Village of Allegany, have been awarded a grant of \$300,000 from The Skatepark Project for the construction of a permanent skatepark in the Village of Allegany. A grant-signing ceremony took place on Wednesday, January 26 at the Allegany Village Building, 106 E. Main St., Allegany, NY 14706.

The Built to Play Skatepark Grant provides \$250,000 for the skatepark construction, and an additional \$50,000 for environmental features to be incorporated into the design of the skatepark.

Since 2018, community members in the Village of Allegany have been pursuing a Built to Play Skatepark Grant from The Skatepark Project (formerly known as The Tony Hawk Foundation). Through hard work, communication, and rallying skateboarders and BMX-ers throughout the region, the Allegany River Skatepark group has raised funds, and built partnerships with local and regional organizations.

"On behalf of all of us at CRCF, we want to congratulate the Allegany River Skatepark on receiving this grant," said Karen Niemic Buchheit, CRCF executive director. "This grant will have a remarkable footprint and will provide a first-class space for recreation for youth and adults in the area to enjoy skateboarding, bmx and more."

Village of Allegany Mayor Gregory Pearl was one of the first supporters of the skatepark effort. "A skatepark will build community and be a positive asset to ensure that our area youth can thrive," Mayor Pearl remarked.

Jennifer DeLong, lead community advocate for the Allegany River Skatepark, has shown that all it takes is a small group of individuals with a vision to keep a dream alive. She shares that "it was a long road with a lot of hours of hard work in our spare time outside of work and family, but it will all be worth it to see this free recreational facility that our young people will be able to use for decades to come."

Trevor Staples, Built to Play Project Manager for The Skatepark Project says, "For over three years, we at The Skatepark Project have been working alongside the Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Foundation to help communities like the Village of Allegany get their kids active

and outdoors. The Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Foundation has seen the need for public skateparks in the region, and provides funding for those communities that wish to work to develop them."

#### DISC GOLF FOR ALL AGES

#### Fundraising efforts gearing up for Franchot Park children's disc golf course

OLEAN - The Twin Tiers Disc Golf Association [TTDGA], inspired by the idea and efforts of group member Dave Haynes, is gearing up fundraising efforts for a 9-hole disc golf course that is designed with youth and novice players in mind. The course, being installed near Franchot's Children's Memorial Garden this summer, will also extend the garden's mission by including trees and landscape stones that memorialize children in the layout.

"Remembering children that have passed away while providing something positive for today's youth seems fitting," Haynes said.

The youth course – the first of its kind in Cattaraugus County – hopes to feature two tees for each hole. One tee location will make each hole more challenging and is designed for youth between the ages of nine and thirteen; while a second tee location will make the holes more manageable for kids between the ages of four and eight.

TTDGA is a volunteer-based nonprofit group responsible for the installation of the county's first full-sized 18-hole disc golf course last year in Olean's Gargoyle Park. A new youth-oriented course ties directly into their stated mission of growing disc golf in the Twin Tiers with a focus on youth development, healthy living and social responsibility.

"This course will be easily accessible on bike or by foot to so many of Olean's residents. The course is free to play and – with a disc that costs between \$10 and \$15 – can easily be played by people of any ability level," said TTDGA President Rich Longer. "Only a toss across the border, Bradford is bringing disc golf to residents at Callahan Park and our hope is that these initiatives provide an opportunity for outdoor recreation and socialization for families and generations to come, while introducing Twin Tiers Youth to a sport they can grow to love for a lifetime."

The Council approved the Franchot proposal in November, pledging to match donor fundraising for the project. "This would be great for families to walk over with their kids," said Council President John Crawford. "One thing we want to see is if our tax money goes into taking care of a park, for that park to get used. This group has put blood, sweat and tears into this, and they have done a great job."



#### VANDYKE AGENCY OPENS OLEAN LOCATION

Husband & wife team of Great Valley acquire Chamberlain Home Realty/On Point Property Management

Timing is everything; it's an adage that's been applied to everything from landing a joke to a business deal. For Todd and Ciji VanDyke, perfect timing is what transformed a seemingly impossible pre-pandemic dream for their real estate agency into a reality just a couple of weeks ago.

Since 2015, the VanDyke Agency has been making a name for itself as a trusted real estate agency throughout the Southern Tier. "We started with a very small office in Salamanca," Ciji explained. "In 2017, we purchased the Great Valley office; we had more agents who were joining us and we needed more space."

Shortly after opening, the VanDyke Agency grew their business to include property management and long-term rentals, in addition to real estate sales. "We have about 85 units that we manage in and around Salamanca," she said. "We also began doing vacation rentals in Ellicottville, and in 2018 we had the opportunity to do some rentals in Chautauqua."

The VanDykes always wanted to expand into the Olean area, and in 2020, they were about to make this dream a reality. Ciji recalled, "We were all set up with an office location in Olean - we had signs and everything. It was January of 2020; we were ready to hit the ground running, and then COVID hit. That halted that plan!"

2020 and 2021 were such unpredictable years for the VanDykes and their three children, who were involved in remote learning for much of that time. "We just couldn't commit to being in Olean in 2021," Ciji explained. "Todd or I - one of us - always had to stay with the kids, and I can't tell you how many times we did remote learning in the office because of no high-speed internet at home!"

As if the challenges of educating three children at home during a pandemic weren't enough, the real estate industry faced several restrictions in the spring of 2020. For the VanDykes, March 20, 2020 will forever be an unforgettable day. "The government said real estate is now considered non-essential as of March 22," Ciji recalled. "From that point on, we had absolutely no idea what the future held. It was a really scary time to not know when our business could operate moving forward. Fortunately, that only lasted for 10 days before we were considered essential and could offer limited services."

Over the next several months of 2020, the VanDykes worked through a variety of limitations that gradually eased. "First it was no in-person showings allowed, but we could Facetime a client. This is one of the reasons why we invested so heavily in virtual tours!" Over time, restrictions were lifted to include two people on a tour for a certain length of time, and gradually expanded to relatively normal practices.

Despite the changing COVID regulations, the VanDykes were thrilled to see that the real estate market not only survived the pandemic, but actually grew. "Real estate is just abso-

lutely phenomenal," said Ciji. "I've been in so many multiple offers in the last 18 months - it's great if you're a seller!" She added that those who are in the market to buy a house are competing with many more people than pre-pandemic times due to supply and demand. "Right now in the Great Valley area, there are nine houses on the market, and normally we'd have over 30."

All over the country, the real estate market has been hot, Ciji pointed out, and the reasons are varied but mainly pandemic-related. Since March of 2020, "People's criteria have changed," she explained. Not only has she seen people looking to get out of densely populated cities, but she's also noticed people in rural areas looking to move closer to town. "Some people want to be in the country, but their home has to have high-speed internet access and cell service because they're working remotely or their kids are learning at home. Other people need bigger spaces or different layouts because they now need a home office."

While initially, the pandemic put the brakes on the VanDyke's dream of opening an Olean office, it also gave them the capital to invest in an exciting opportunity. On Feb. 1, the VanDykes acquired Olean-based Chamberlain Home Realty and On Point Property Man-

#### ELLICOTTVILLE TOWN PLANNING BOARD NOTES

New owners seek to reopen Ashford Junction Restaurant

The Ellicottville Town Planning Board has scheduled a Feb. 28th public hearing on a special use permit application to reopen a restaurant, ice cream parlor and retail store at Ashford Junction.

The Board met in person Jan. 24th in the Town Center for the first 2022 session. Village Attorney Richard Stanton attended the meeting as interim staff planner.

Owners Melanie and Michael Korzeniewski under the business name of Winkorz LLC, of East Otto, hope to operate Ashford Junction Depot from Thursday through Sunday. Food will be served in a rural setting at the intersection of State Routes 242 and 240, east of Ellicottville.

The location also overlooks an operating rail line, was run as an eatery and antique shop in the past and, according to local lore, housed a motorcycle repair business around World War II.

Application documents state there will be no changes to the water, sewer and parking, or to the structures, which include small outbuildings and two parking lots to accommodate about 24 cars

The main two-story building is handicap accessible from either parking lot and has been

shuttered for about two years.

In another matter of new business, the Board asked for more information and tabled a special use permit application for an accessory apartment at 5 Sundance Road.

Ellicottville property owner Dean Groff, and his representative Jim Uhrinek of Little Valley requested a permit to convert an existing 23x23-foot garage into a two-bedroom guest suite.

Code Enforcement Officer Kelly Fredrickson said the Board reviewed the application and found it lacking in information on the size and adequacy of the water and septic systems for expanded occupancy.

A 2022 annual meeting schedule, for regular business meetings on the fourth Monday of each month, was adopted by the board as follows: Feb. 28, March 28, Apr. 25, May 23 June 27, July 25, Aug. 22, Oct. 24, Nov. 28 and Dec. 26.



When 'The Weather Channel' wants to show the country what a genuine lake effect snow-storm looks like, they're often found broadcasting live from the heart of the WNY snow belt in Springville, NY. It's a farm community of some size and equally distant from the area's two largest ski resorts - Kissing Bridge to the north and Holiday Valley to the south.

As far back as anyone can remember, though, Springville has never had its own ski shop to service the needs of the many snowsports enthusiasts who live in the community - that is until a couple seasons ago, when Cattaraugus native Sam Johnston opened the doors of the Springville Ski & Snowboard Shop.

If you own your own equipment and it is showing signs of wear and tear, Springville Ski & Snowboard can repair dents and dings to ski and snowboard bases and melt in a fresh coat of wax that'll have you sliding effortlessly down the hills in no time! Johnston's tuning room is equipped with a state-of-the-art Wintersteiger tuning machine, capable of completely refreshing the bases of your skis or snowboard to the way they were when you first bought them.

For those in the mood to try one of the newest modes of winter downhill transport, Spring-ville Ski & Snowboard has partnered with a company called The Daily Adventure Box, which allows renters access to a ski-bike (instead of wheels, there are skis) through a solar-powered, outdoor drop-box that's operated by cell phone.

After reserving the ski-bike through the shop and downloading the app, Johnston says renters can access the box at will; thereby eliminating the need for any other assistance when checking out or returning the rental. He reviews safe operating procedures and best practices with ski-bike renters before sending them on their way.

"I like the technology of the self-sufficient Daily Adventure Box," Johnston said. "It's totally self-contained, solar powered and connected through the app for easy, no nonsense use."

For shop owner Sam Johnston, now 44 years of age, the journey into the ski and snowboard world began in the seventh grade, when he joined the ski club at school and made the weekly bus ride from Cattaraugus to the local slopes of Holiday Valley.

"My neighbors got me into it," Johnston said. "My parents didn't know anything about it but when friends of mine suggested I try it, I loved it and we were out there as much as possible after that!"

When Johnston was 16 years old, he got hired to work the "dream job," as a Holiday Valley ski instructor and now fondly recalls the sum total of all his paychecks from that season - it was \$91.00.

"At the end of that year, I decided I definitely loved being part of the scene, but I was going to have to make a little more money than that," he quipped.

Scholarship will continue to support Olean Dresser-Rand employees' children



OLEAN, - For some 60 years, the Dresser-Rand Employees Scholarship has provided scholarship awards for the children of Olean-based Dresser-Rand employees to pursue a post-secondary education.

Recently, the Dresser-Rand Employee Trust Association decided to move the scholarship fund under management of the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation, which manages some 70 scholarship funds and makes possible over 100 annual scholarship awards for area students.

The fund has since provided more than \$1.5 million in scholarship aid to the children of Dresser employees.

"CRCF management of the fund will not only allow for the impact for Dresser employees' families, but it is also about preserving a scholarship fund that was built and maintained entirely by Dresser-Rand employees," said Craig Maguire, Dresser-Rand Employees Trust Association official. "The trust was established by the employees to provide a payment for education and death benefits (flowers and memorials) to its Olean members and their dependents. The trust was funded entirely by the employees and managed by a committee of Dresser-Rand employees."

The employees trust fund was diligently managed by Community Bank for a number of years, said Maguire. "With the impending closure of the factories at the Olean campus and reduction in workforce, the board of trustees wanted to protect and grow the assets of the Trust," he added. "CRCF's experience and professional approach will be a perfect match to continue the mission of our scholarship program. It was very important to see the [fund's] tradition continue and keep the legacy of the hardworking employees of Dresser-Rand alive for many more generations."

For CRCF, the opportunity to manage the scholarship fund is just as meaningful, said CRCF Executive Director Karen Niemic Buchheit. "The employees of Dresser-Rand have given so much to our community for over 100 years," she said "It is an honor for CRCF to be able to continue the legacy of those employees and support the members of their family."





#### CORE PERFORMANCE: HYDRATION DURING THE WINTER

Why is it important, the best way to stay hydrated, and what to avoid

I could write countless articles on why hydration/water is so important to our bodies. It helps flush out waste, regulates body temperature and aids in brain function. Becoming dehydrated can cause headaches, fatigue and severe cramping.

Typically, we know to hydrate when we exercise and when it's hot outside. But did you know that hydration is just as important during the winter months? This is partly because the level of humidity in the air during the winter months tends to be much lower, resulting in much drier air as compared to other times of the year. In addition, the air in our homes is also drier due to home heating. These differences in air quality both inside and outside can increase our chances of becoming dehydrated.

Other factors that can lead to dehydration in the winter include:

- Cold-induced diuresis (frequent urination)
- Drinking less water because we tend to feel less thirsty
- Wearing heavier clothing which can cause us to perspire more
- Increased respiratory rates which leads to greater water loss

It is important that we stay hydrated in winter because doing so helps keep our body temperature at a constant and normal level. When there isn't enough fluid in the body, this can cause the core temperature to drop to dangerous levels. Hypothermia can set in quicker if the body is dehydrated. Staying hydrated also helps our immune system fight off colds and the flu, which are more common in the winter.

Things to avoid in cold weather to prevent dehydration include drinking too many caffeinated beverages and alcoholic beverages. Both of these are diuretics which causes your body to remove fluids from your blood at a much quicker rate than other liquids. If you're experiencing extreme thirst, reduced/dark urine for a long period of time, dizziness, a rapid heart rate or muscle cramps - then you are already symptomatic of dehydration.

Water is the cheapest and best way to stay hydrated. Unlike any other beverage, water contains no added sugar or calories. However, if you are a salty sweater, be sure to replace both sodium and fluid you lose through sweat.

Drinking moderate amounts of coffee and tea - especially herbal - can keep you hydrated. Fruits and veggies like berries, melon, oranges, grapes, carrots, celery and lettuce are also excellent choices to stay hydrated or rehydrate.

Oral hydration solutions are specialized formulas used to prevent and treat dehydration



caused by diarrhea or vomiting. These solutions are water based and commonly contain electrolytes like sodium, chloride, and potassium as well as sugar in the form of dextrose. These can be expensive and high in calories.

The bottom line: dehydration can sneak up on you quickly, especially during the colder months. Always keep a water bottle with you even during something as uneventful as driving. If you have any signs of dehydration during the winter months, it is important to seek medical attention immediately.

By the following season, Johnston was working at The Ski Depot for the legendary 'Moose' (a.k.a. Chris Brown). Moose's shop was big in the industry at the time and he had two locations operating in Ellicottville. The Ski Depot was also an exclusive dealer for the Salomon brand and Johnston's exposure to the Salomon marketing team as a teenager eventually put him in a position to be chosen for a regional sales position a few years down the road.

Working in a high-volume retail/rental atmosphere, Johnston learned to quickly and accurately process a ski rental form, as well as how to mount and test ski bindings. He waxed many, many skis and boards and soon excelled at the art of the ski/snowboard tune.

Around that time, the Function Snowboard factory moved from their humble beginnings in someone's West Falls, NY barn to the epicenter of snowsports in western New York - Ellicottville. They produced their own line of snowboards and also built and labeled boards for other brands. Johnston's sister went to work for Function, as did other kids he knew, so it was just a matter of time before he ended up working there as well. It turned out to be one of the major turning points in his young life.

Johnston points to the experience of prototyping, building and testing boards with the guys who started the Function company as one of his life's great learning experiences. When Function's founders sold the company a few years later, he was hired by the new ownership group in Hood River, OR, to help them produce a new line, called Heelside Snowboards, which was focused on taking a share of the rental industry.

Johnston says he had another life-changing experience, which also came while he was living in Oregon, when he applied to be a motorcycle mechanic but was turned down for not having enough experience.

"So the first thing I did was to enroll in the Motorcycle Mechanic's Institute, where I was exposed to all kinds of technical knowledge," he said. "It was a whole new world for me - it turns out I had to learn how to accurately measure things, for starters."

In 2000, after a few more years in Oregon, Johnston moved back to WNY and started a family. He has three sons of his own who also enjoy sliding on the snow. They are Henry, age 17, Roland, 12, and Arthur, 10. Johnston currently balances a nine-to-five career in hydraulic equipment sales and repairs against keeping alive the dream of operating his own ski and snowboard shop.

Reflecting on the considerable depth of his ski/snowboard experience, Johnston quipped, "People use that line, 'A jack of all trades.' Well, this is one trade I've definitely got covered."

After spending a significant portion of his life building snowboards with his own hands, Johnston is probably the most qualified ski technician you will ever meet. He will be able to repair almost any damage to your ski or snowboard bases; he can certainly make everything you own slide on the snow much easier and he will be able to mount and test ski bindings, depending on your individual needs.

Johnston's current business philosophy was shaped in large part by his experiences growing up on a dairy farm and having to make do with the pieces of ski equipment he was fortunate enough to come by. "I was just a farm kid growing up in Cattaraugus, who loved to ski and got his first pair of skis given to him - and they were old!" he added. "I want to provide good equipment for my customers and it's going to be well-maintained and reasonably priced."

Of the many and varied positions Johnston has held over the years, however, he is especially proud of the fact that he began his journey in the industry as a ski instructor and that he still spends time once in awhile teaching children how to ski.

"I know this great family from Arcade who are customers and they asked me to take their young daughter out last season and teach her how to ski!" Johnston proudly proclaimed. "And we went out there and had a great time and I think we're going to get to do it again soon!"




