

LOUD PERFORMANCE

Woven into the Fabric of the WNY MTB Scene; Fat Bike Race Sunday at HoliMont

Earlier this week, ellicottvilleNOW caught up with Dee Dippel, owner/operator of Loud Performance, to talk about all things outdoors. The mountain bike/snowboard shop offers two locations - Bemus Point and Ellicottville - and has become a staple in the local MTB

eNOW: Loud Performance is one of the premier mountain bike and snowboard shops in all of Western New York. That's not exactly how it all began for you in Bemus Point. DEE: Snowmobiling is what first brought us up here from West Virginia. We opened up as a powersports/snowmobile shop and obviously, winters had been pretty decent, but the year we first opened in 2015-'16 the snowmobile trails were only open seven days. At that point, we just knew we had to do something else. That July, we got our first shipment of mountain bikes in and I had them all sold by September. I had mountain bike mechanic school in my background and I raced downhill mountain bikes for years, so I figured that would our niche up here - we would be a snowmobile/mountain bike shop - but the winters just didn't support the snowmobiling anymore, and we kept moving more and more into the mountain bikes and fat bikes. As winters went on, we did less with snowmobiles and more with bikes and now it's probably been five years since we actually wrenched on a snowmobile here - maybe 2017-18 - and since then we haven't done any mechanical work for powersports and have been fully a bicycle shop. We added snowboards last year.

eNOW: You built your own mountain bike trails right outside your back door and in the woods surrounding Loud Performance.

DEE: We're basically a mountain bike/fat bike/snowboard shop and as for having the trails out back, I just feel like we're asking people to spend money on bikes. Well you can't ride a bike around a parking lot and say, "Hey this bike is great." Out back, we have plenty of riding for all levels of ability - especially beginners - and plenty of places to test bikes and ride them. You can ride anything in the store anytime. Having worked in bike shops before, that was how I wanted to be different. Take something out back and try it. We'll set up the suspension for you. We want to make sure you leave here with a smile on your face and you're happy and that you get exactly what you want.

eNOW: A mountain bike enthusiast walking through the front doors at Loud Performance will feel like a kid in a candy store.

DEE: We get it a lot that our store is not like a lot of other bike shops you see. Most stores have that corporate look but we wanted to be different and unique ourselves. We're all diehard riders, so we wanted to sell the stuff we believe in - not just the stuff we had to carry. We offer eight lines of bikes. We have 4 to 5 lines of apparel. We try to carry all the cool stuff and not so much the bland and vanilla stuff. We do have brands we're partial to like Rocky Mountain and Kona Bikes and Troylee Designs for apparel. I think what makes us unique is that we're out in the middle of nowhere, so to speak, but that also allows us to have our own trail system right behind the shop. We're not a big city kind of shop. We have bike customers from Pittsburgh into Ohio and in the Buffalo area and Rochester - so they travel to get here, which is cool.

eNOW: Tell us more about your trail system. **DEE:** We call it "The Trails At Loud." If you ride everything here it's a little over seven miles of trails but we have wooden features and progressive features here, and stuff you can't get on public land because it can't be built like you can do it on private land. Another bonus is we're just under nine-tenths of a mile from Long Point State Park and there's another 12 miles of mountain bike trails over there. When you ride them both, you can get a heck of a ride just staying right here by the lake. We do a shop ride every Thursday night, year-round, that anyone can come to and we do fat bikes in the winter with groomed trails and then we do regular mountain bikes in the summertime. Of course, anyone can come here to ride our trails anytime they want. We just ask that they go online and sign a waiver on our website. Our trails are free to ride.

eNOW: For those who aren't familiar, let's talk about being able to ride your bike on snow. **DEE:** Being in WNY, if a person wanted to ride a bike here all year long, and could only have one bicycle, it would be a hard argument not to own a fat bike. The fat bike is a bigger-tired bicycle that allows for lower ground pressure. If you think of yourself on a skinny-tired road bike and all your body weight is on top of X-amount of the tire on the ground at any one time, then compare that with a fat bike, where all your body weight is spread out across a tire that's easily two or three times wider than the road bike, so it allows you to run really low air pressure and flatten the tire out a little bit more. Wintertime fat biking is not about how fast you can go down a trail. It's about being able to maintain momentum and a smooth cadence and not be trenching or sinking into the snow, so it's a lot different.



BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Learn About the Contributions of African Americans in the Southern Tier

Carter G. Woodson is a name which has long been associated with the concept of Black History month. Woodson, the second African American to graduate from Harvard, lobbied extensively to make Black History month a nationwide institution. In 1926, he succeeded when the study of Negro Life and History announced the second week of February as Negro History Month to coincide with Abraham Lincoln's February 12th birthday and Frederick Douglass's February 14th birthday.

In modern times, after a period of slow acceptance and a name change, Black History Month has received official recognition from governments in the U.S., Canada, Ireland, and the U.K. to remember important people and events in the history of the African movement

Black educators and Black United Students at Kent State University proposed Black History Month in February 1969, with the first modern celebration taking place at Kent State a year later, from January 2-February 28, 1970. Within six years, it had moved across the country and became officially recognized when President Gerald Ford recognized Black History Month in 1976 during the U.S. Bicentennial Celebration. He urged Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history".

Each year, the ASALH (Study of African American Life and History) chooses a different theme for Black History Month. This year, the theme is "Black Resistance." According to NPR.org, "African Americans have resisted historic and ongoing oppression, in all forms, especially the racial terrorism of lynching, racial pogroms, and police killings since our arrival upon these shores," the ASALH says of this year's theme. "These efforts have been to advocate for a dignified self-determined life in a just democratic society in the United States and beyond the United States' political jurisdiction." The theme was chosen, in part, because of the current politically charged environment around race.

BLACK HISTORY FACTS

According to Smithsonian Magazine, one in four cowboys in the great wild west was Black.

Long before Barack Obama became the first Black president of the United States, George Edwin Taylor ran for president as a member of the National Negro Liberty Party in 1904.

You think you know the history of rock 'n' roll? Have you ever heard of Sister Rosetta Tharpe? "Listen to the wonderful late Sister Rosetta Tharpe performing her world-famous gospel song 'This Train' from the year 1964. Sister Rosetta Tharpe was an American singer and guitarist. She attained popularity in the 1930s and 1940s with her gospel recordings, characterized by a unique mixture of spiritual lyrics and electric guitar that was extremely important to the origins of rock and roll." Enjoy more of Sister Rosetta Tharpe by searching her name on YouTube. Oh, yes, and check out the members of the audience. Greats like Chuck Berry, Elvis Presley, Bob Dylan, and Johnny Cash have credited her influence on their music.

Speaking of musical greats, Quincy Jones hits the history books as the most nominated artist in Grammy history. Go to rd.com for more facts about black history.

George and Marcia Pancio Scholarship Fund Established at CRCF





OLEAN - George Pancio is maybe most remembered for his famous portrayals of Santa Claus both locally and nationally, but outside of the red suit, he dedicated himself wholly to Olean schools and the community.

Pancio, born and raised in Olean and a 1952 graduate of Olean High School, served as principal in several Olean schools and served many years as assistant superintendent. He was inducted into the Olean High School Wall of Fame in 2005. His dedication to the district ran so deep that he even demonstrated it through his car's license plate, which for decades read "OHS ONE."

To honor and continue Pancio's impact on the school district, the Pancio family recently established the George and Marcia Pancio Scholarship at the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation. The scholarship will be for a graduating senior of Olean High School planning to study in the education or medical field. The student will also need to complete an essay question about patriotism as part of their application. The first scholarship award will be made in 2024. The scholarship is also a way to honor Pancio's contributions to the community through service. Pancio served on a number of community and national boards including the Boy Scouts of America, YMCA, United Way, American Red Cross, Hospital Hall of Roses, Miss America Pageant, Soap Box Derby and the Jaycees.

Perhaps, most importantly though, Pancio was a family man. Pancio and his wife, Marcia Ives Pancio, had six children, 14 grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. Marcia, for whom the scholarship is also named, shared many of the same passions as her husband, her family, her community, her country – and even her love of Christmas. Marcia served on the Olean school board following her husband's retirement from the district and shared many nights with him as Mr. and Mrs. Claus on the roof of their Main Street home for the cherished Olean event, Santa on the Roof.

One of the more memorable pieces to Pancio's legacy is of course his many years as Santa Claus. Pancio portrayed Santa Claus locally in the Santa Claus Lane period and numerous events and famously acted as Macy's official spokes-Santa for 11 years, even portraying Santa in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. He appeared as Santa on television programs "Good Morning America," the "Tonight Show with Johnny Carson" and more. He was also the final Santa to visit Virginia O'Hanlon Douglas, author of the famous, "Yes, Virginia, There is a Santa Claus," editorial.

"It is truly an honor to play a role in preserving the storied legacy of George Pancio," said CRCF Executive Director Karen Niemic Buchheit. "This scholarship will be there for Olean School students years to come, just as George always was as principal and assistant superintendent —and of course as Santa, too."



February is National Cancer Prevention Awareness Month... How Aware Are You Really?

The good news about cancer is that the risk of dying from cancer in the United States has decreased over the past 28 years, according to annual statistics reported by the American Cancer Society (ACS). The cancer death rate for men and women combined fell 32% from its peak in 1991 to 2019, the most recent year for which data is available. Some of this drop appears to be related to an increase in the percentage of people with lung cancer who are living longer after diagnosis (like President Jimmy Carter whose tumors shrank in 2016 while in a trial for a drug now available on the market) partly because more people are being diagnosed at an early stage of the disease.

However, cancer continues to be the second most common cause of death in the U.S., after heart disease. A total of 1.9 million new cancer cases and 609,360 deaths from cancer were expected to occur in the U.S. in 2022 (final numbers unavailable), which is about 1,670 deaths a day. Think about that number -1,670 EVERY SINGLE DAY!

Along with the lightness and sweetness of Valentine's Day and the treats we shower on those we love, February still has a heavy lift as we are reminded every year at this time to live healthier lives and to be diligent with self-care, quickly responding to any signs of early detection. Sadly, dawdling or denial will not make it go away. Fact: In 2020 cancer caused nearly 10 million deaths worldwide. Those aren't just numbers - they are moms, dads, siblings, grandparents, relatives, friends, neighbors... all loved ones, some of whom each of us could name and remember. Look around you. Everywhere you look, you will also find people who have defeated cancer or are fighting it right now.

Throughout the history of mankind, cancer has been in existence. From nationaltoday, com we learn that although not much was known about the human body, the earliest evidence of cancer was found in fossilized bone tumors in mummies. Tumors on the breast were recorded "via papyri that can be traced back to ancient Egypt in 1500 B.C." Perhaps these ancients did not know how to avoid cancer. Today, we are aware.


Here is one of the biggest: avoid tobacco. Lung cancer is still the leading cause of cancer deaths. In the U.S. smoking is linked to about 80%-90% of cancer deaths. The CDC tells us that people who smoke are 15-30% more likely to get or die from lung cancer. Did you know that tobacco can cause cancer almost anywhere in your body? Woefully, smoke from other people's cigarettes, pipes, or cigars (secondhand smoke) also causes lung cancer, COPD and lung diseases.

When a person breathes in secondhand smoke, it is like he or she is smoking. Next time you light up around babies, kids, or compromised elderly, think twice and go outdoors. Better still, do the good work of stopping for yourself and those around you.



As for other causes, here's a startling fact according to the Skin Cancer Foundation: one indoor tanning session increases your risk of developing melanoma before age 35 by 75%. According to a study conducted by the American Cancer Society, at least 42% of newly diagnosed cancers in the U.S., which translates to about 750,000 cases in 2020, are potentially avoidable. This includes the 19% of all cancers that are caused by smoking and the 18% caused by a combination of excess body weight, alcohol consumption, poor nutrition, and physical inactivity. Please, also keep in mind that folks doing all the right things all their lives can inconceivably get cancer despite their best efforts to do the best for their bodies. Please, don't ever judge.

Amid the hustle and bustle, National Cancer Prevention Month reminds us that health is wealth. We do need to take our health seriously to stay alive. eNOW: You've got quite the involvement in the local mountain bike community. **DEE:** I'm the vice president of the Western New York Mountain Biking Association (WNYMBA) and I'm on the board of the Chautauqua County Rails To Trails and the board of the Chautauqua County Friends Of Greenway group. In the WNYMBA, we really feel like we have a pretty good niche for wintertime single-track groomed fat bike riding. For example, we have our own fat bike groomer at Loud, Long Point State Park has their own fat bike groomer, so does Whalen State Forest in Panama and others going all the way to McCarty Hill by Holiday Valley/HoliMont. It's all so new for us. Snowmobiling has been around seventy years but groomed fat biking has really just blown up in the last five or six years. We realize a lot of our members really love being on bicycles year-round. Being able to give them the avenue to do that is really awesome and so the members of the WNYMBA are all behind this and willing to put in the work and effort. It's all volunteer basically.

eNOW: Any events coming up that you're a part of?

DEE: This Sunday, February 19 there is a Fat Bike Downhill Mountain Bike Race at Holi-Mont, which will be the first time we've ever done anything like that in WNY. We're running fat bikes first and regular mountain bikes next, for those who are up for it. We also have Ditch Days coming up on March 25 - a big freestyle-jam kind of event for snowboarders. And then on April 8 we're having a fat bike dual slalom race right on the ski slopes at HoliMont. And it's funny, because if you would've told me five or ten years ago that we'd be doing this kind of stuff at HoliMont, I would've thought you were crazy. The same way as when we were sitting out under the stars with a campfire going this summer at the base of the hill at HoliMont for the WNYMBA campout weekend. I never would've thought we'd be doing something like that. Speaking of the WNYMBA campout, it will be back at HoliMont for its second year in August and the Roots, Rocks and Ridges festival will return with X-C and downhill races in the Fall. Loud Performance also hosts the Rooted women's mountain bike festival in July right here at the store. It's an all-women's mountain biking weekend with instruction, demo bikes and vendors... it's a really big event.

eNOW: Can you indulge on the emergence of the HoliMont Ski Club on the mountain bike scene?

DEE: It's great for the folks at HoliMont to be so onboard with everything they're doing with their bike park. We've been supporting them the whole way and will continue to do so. Personally, as an avid mountain biker, I love it! My wife and my son and I are over there every Sunday riding. They love it as much as I do. My son is seven-years-old and he and my wife both raced downhill races at HoliMont last summer. And my daughter, who is nine-years-old, goes up by the lake and paddleboards all day. They made a great move hiring Chris Perks. With his background in building snow parks and MTB trails, and with the creative freedom he has, the parks are just going to get better and better over the years.
