





Slip-Sliding Event Returns to Holiday Valley to Benefit Adaptive Ski Program

For over 35 years, the Bill Lounsbury Adaptive Ski Program has been providing adaptive skiing lessons to individuals of all ages, and Program Director Sue Whistler invites everyone to be a part of this great mission through the 2024 Penguin Paddle! On Saturday, February 24th, all are invited to the slope side of the Yodeler lodge at Holiday Valley Ski Resort for a fun day of sliding, food, music, prizes, and more! This event is the program's main fundraising event of the year, and it's easy to see why it's become an annual tradition for the hundreds of people who participate every year.



Whistler explained that the program was named after Bill Lounsbury, who was a ski patroller at Holiday Valley in the 1970s and early 1980s. "He lost a leg to cancer," she explained. "He taught himself to ski on one ski and continued to ski. He eventually passed away from cancer, and the program was started in his memory. It's supported by Holiday Valley and the ski patrol, who started donating equipment to the program, and it just evolved!"

During 1988, the founding year of the program, there were four instructors, 14 students, and 32 lessons taught. Now, there are more than 40 volunteer instructors, many of whom are certified by the Professional Ski

Instructors of America, who teach over 250 lessons over the course of a ski season. The Penguin Paddle raises money to purchase and maintain specially designed adaptive ski equipment and to fund the ongoing adaptive training programs for the volunteer instructors.

The Penguin Paddle kicks off at 10:00am on Saturday, when registration opens for the Penguin Races at the base of Yodeler. For a \$1 donation, participants will receive their garbage bag, which they wear (along with a helmet) for the races that begin at 1:00pm. Races are divided into age groups, starting with ages four to six through adults 21 and over. Whistler said, "We start serving lunch at 11:30am for \$8. It's an outdoor cookout with hot dogs and sausages, plus there is a beer and wine tent."

Raffle tickets are on sale now from any LASP instructor and can also be purchased on the day of the event at Yodeler until the drawing at 3:00pm. Tickets are \$5 each or five for \$20. Prizes include a season pass from Holiday Valley, a \$400 gift card to Villaggio restaurant, and a pair of skis from The City Garage (winners need not be present to win). From 10:00am-2:00pm participants can take part in the silent auction and Wine Wall. Speaking of the silent auction, Whistler said, "The gift baskets are really nice! Local merchants contributed all sorts of things. For the Wine Wall, our staff donates two bottles of nice wine each and that gets packaged up, so people can buy it and it's kind of a surprise as to what's inside!"



ELLICOTTVILLE'S POSTMAN

Bidding Farewell to Tim Woodin, Making his Final Delivery on Leap Day

"Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds."

But, then we have this from aboutusps.com: The words above, thought to be the USPS motto, are chiseled in gray granite over the entrance to the New York City Post Office on 8th Avenue and come from Book 8, Paragraph 98, of The Persian Wars by Herodotus. During the wars between the Greeks and Persians (500-449 B.C.), the Persians operated a system of mounted postal couriers who served with great fidelity.

Another less well-known inscription can be found on the building that formerly was the Washington, D.C. Post Office and now is the home of the Smithsonian Institution's National Postal Museum. This, given to us by the historian of the United States Postal Service, October 1999: Messenger of Sympathy and Love, Servant of Parted Friends, Consoler of the Lonely, Bond of the Scattered Family, Enlarger of the Common Life, Carrier of News and Knowledge, Instrument of Trade and Industry, Promoter of Mutual Acquaintance, Of Peace and of Goodwill Among Men and Nations.

The original of this inscription was called "The Letter" and was written by Dr. Charles W. Eliot, former president of Harvard University. President Woodrow Wilson changed the text slightly before the inscription was carved in the white granite of the Post Office. If you re-read those words, you will realize how true they are.

In fact, in the last five years, he recalls two different times when mail did not arrive for Ellicottville distribution. He said, back in the old days, that rarely happened.

Old timers may very well remember young Tim, the local high school kid who mowed everyone's lawns. After graduation, he launched a fifteen-year career as the produce department manager at the old Quality Market. As fate would have it, he had a conversation with then Ellicottville postmaster, Ann Vogtli (who doesn't remember Ann with fondness?), who suggested he apply for a position at the postal service. An ambitious and industrious young man, he was hired with a promise of only ten hours. Vogtli encouraged this young lad to accept, knowing he would eventually be given more. And so, his new career with the USPS began twenty-nine years ago, first in Delevan and then, one year later, in Ellicottville. Home at last.

We talked about unusual items that have been shipped. It was interesting to hear that a rifle could be sent via USPS but not a handgun. (Federal, not state-ruling.) Baby chicks can be mailed but not kittens or puppies. Shelly's hot dogs, scorpions, geckos, lizards, bees, and adult birds are also on the USPS "go" list. However, if you have a frog or dead animal to mail, you will have to go through UPS, which has fewer restrictions on live (or dead) creatures.

"BUCK UP BUTTERCUP"

Southern Tier Biennial Art Exhibition Supported by F. Donald Kenney Fund

ECLIPSE VIEWING CELEBRATIONS

Local Gatherings Planned; FREE Viewing Glasses Available

The Enchanted Mountains will be a part of the upcoming total solar eclipse on April 8th, 2024. Within the county, the time of the eclipse will range from 2:00-4:45pm. The path of totality, which is the locations where the moon's shadow completely covers the sun or the on average, will begin at 3:18pm in the Enchanted Mountains.

It is essential to **NOT STARE AT THE SUN** without the proper safety lenses. With that in mind, members of our local communities are welcome to visit enchantedmountains. com and request FREE solar viewing glasses from them. You can request them for pick up in Olean, Little Valley or even ask that they be delivered. You can order them for just yourself or your whole family. Max amount is 100 per request unless you are a local business organization.

There will be many great opportunities to enjoy viewing the Total Solar Eclipse. Some great places to view it would be Allegany State Park, Griffis Sculpture Park (Rohr Hill Side), along the Amish Trail and Onoville Marina Park.

If you're looking for a great way to celebrate locally, stop in at one of the Eclipse Viewing Celebrations. HoliMont is hosting a Total Eclipse Party from 12:00-4:00pm on the day of the event. There will be a cookout style lunch where you can purchase hot dogs, hamburgers and more from Dina's at the Mont out on the patio, as well as stay entertained by playing corn hole or trivia before viewing the event at 3:15pm. The event is free to attend. (Food/beverages sold separately.)

Not to be left out, Holiday Valley is inviting guests to book their Eclipse Totality Bash Package ahead of the event. The package includes access to a VIP viewing area, commemorative souvenir arrival gift, drink tickets, souvenir eclipse viewing glasses and (weather permitting) a chairlift ride to the top of Mardi Gras for optimal viewing. The schedule for the bash begins a day ahead of the eclipse on Sunday, where there will be educational talks, live music, food and drink specials, beer/liquor sampling and door prizes. Then on April 8th, the actual viewing party runs from 1:00-6:00pm at the Holiday Valley Lodge & Base Area.

And these aren't the only places to be celebrating this natural phenomenon. The Ellicottville Chamber hosted a meeting at the Wingate last week to discuss putting together a town wide event that is in the early stages of planning. (Be on the lookout on evINOW's and the Ellicottville Chamber's social media pages for more details as they become available.) Madigan's Bar and Grill will be having an eclipse viewing party for everyone to join in as well and viewing the eclipse from the outdoor bar area should be a treat. You can also hop over to the Seneca Allegany Resort and Casino in Salamanca and indulge in some eclipse fun at their event. There will be food trucks, balloon artists, games, live music, face-painting and more.

During all of this rambunctious fun, there are a few things to keep in mind. First, the weather in April in Western New York is, for lack of a better term, changeable. The ground may be a mix of snow/mud or it could be raining or even still snowing. (You never know around here honestly.) Cloud coverage could obscure viewing areas. Or we could have the most clear skies and amazing viewing conditions (fingers crossed).

MASTER FOOD PRESERVER COURSE

If you want to learn how to become a Cornell Cooperative Extension certified Master Food Preserver, now is your chance. The 3-day training course is the first step to achieving that goal. This 3-day intensive course includes a comprehensive food preservation notebook. Nightly study is suggested for the post-test. A score of 85 is required, as well as experience with all food preservation methods and teaching others to become a Cornell Cooperative Extension certified Master Food Preserver. No prior experience in food preservation is required. You will learn the safest, most updated information available on the science of food preservation and food safety and have hands on experience with boiling water bath canning, pressure canning, jelled products and quick pickling. There will also be demonstrations on food freezing, drying and fermentation.

The course takes place at the Seneca Allegany Community Center at 3677 Administration Drive in Salamanca, NY, 14779. The cost is \$350 a person and includes lunch each day. The class size is limited to 20 people, so you must register soon to server a space. You can contact tsb48@cornell.edu or call 716-699-2377 ext. 100.

Second, keep in mind that this is a huge deal so there will be a lot of folks coming from all over for their chance to see the eclipse. Be aware of heavy traffic conditions, such as cars stopping on the road or pulling off to the side to park, and many people walking through.

Lastly, the eclipse is an amazing occurrence and a force of nature. Animals and people can be affected by its arrival. The sky will darken quickly and stay dark for an average of around 3 minutes. The temperature could drop over 20 degrees in less than 2 minutes, which may cause issues for those sensitive to that type of thing and both animals and people can become disorientated due to environmental changes.

With everything in mind, you should be able to view the eclipse safely and enjoy this once-in-a-lifetime (or twice depending on how long you live) opportunity. The last total solar eclipse to pass over our state was on January 24th, 1925 and the next one won't be until August 23rd, 2044.

So book your stay, pick up your free viewing glasses and party with your favorite people when the world goes dark on April 8th. If you want to find out what the eclipse will look like in an area you plan to visit ahead of time, visit eclipse2024.org and scope out their interactive path of totality map.

Core Performance: Exercise and Diet Create the Body You Desire

All too often, I have clients who believe that working out equals weight loss, and they become frustrated when the pounds do not "melt" off as they had expected by adding exercise to their routine. This is when the real work begins for both myself and my client as we navigate their diet.

First of all, I never promote diet "fads or trends". Atkins/Keto and intermittent fasting all work until you stop doing them... and you stop because they are unsustainable.

What I DO promote is eating large quantities of high-nutrient foods to be the secret to optimal health and permanent weight control. This is crucial in deciding what to eat. We need to eat foods with adequate nutrients, so we won't need to consume excess "empty" calories to reach our nutritional requirements.

Appetite is not controlled by the weight of the food but by the fiber, nutrient density, and caloric density. Since the stomach can hold about one liter of food, let's look at what types of food are the most nutrient dense - it will come as no surprise to many of you that the foods that will let you feel fuller with the least amount of calories are fruits and vegetables. Green vegetables are so incredibly low in calories and rich in nutrients and fiber that the more of them you eat, the more weight you will lose.

Dark green leafy vegetables such as kale, spinach and arugula have a nutrient-density of 100 points. Romaine, bok choy, cabbage, brussel sprouts, asparagus, broccoli, green beans and peas are also at the top of the nutrient density pyramid. You can also enjoy non-green vegetables such as beets, eggplant, mushrooms and peppers as well as a myriad of fruits, beans, raw nuts, seeds, and whole grains, as well as colorful starchy vegetables such as butternut squash, sweet potatoes, corn and turnips.

So let's get back to the stomach. 400 calories of chicken will fill approximately 1/8 of the volume, but 400 calories of spinach, eggplant and beans will completely fill your stomach's volume.

Let's go a step further. Every day I eat a large salad for lunch. The salad is mostly dark greens like spinach, arugula and romaine. I add beets that I have previously boiled and peeled, leftover cooked veggies like asparagus/brussel sprouts, and grilled chicken. I dress the salad with a homemade dressing of olive oil and red vinegar. This salad fills me up so completely, yet I do not feel stuffed. I feel satisfied and ready to keep moving through my typically very busy day.



Through the years I have learned what works for me. So I never tell my clients or anyone who asks that they have to eat what I eat to achieve their goals. What I will do is look for ways to make their diets healthier and more satisfying. Still, it is not easy to change; eating has emotional and social overtones and it can be especially difficult to break an addiction. But if you give yourself the opportunity to make small changes in your dietary choices that allow you to not only look better but to feel better, then that's really something special to gain.






