EBC Celebrates Grand Opening in Little Valley

Craft Beer Production / Distribution Facility Expands to Include Dining and Event Center

EBC officially cut the ribbon on the newest addition to their craft beer empire on Friday, Feb. 17, as the company's founder, Peter Kreinheder hosted a Who's Who of local elected officials, as well as the general public, for the Grand Opening of EBC's Little Valley Brew Pub, Pizzeria and Event Center.

In a craft beer landscape crowded with an uncountable number of small craft breweries, the Ellicottville Brewing Company continues to stand out among all the others as a leader and innovator in the industry, and with the expansion of its production, packaging and distribution capabilities, EBC is poised to stay at the top well into the foreseeable future.

In 2015, Kreinheder finalized the purchase of the building in Little Valley that has in the past been home to a dairy processing facility, a window factory and a beverage distribution center. He then immediately began the long, involved process of reclaiming the sprawling, long-vacant industrial site in favor of a new, cutting-edge production and distribution hub for some of the best craft beer to be found anywhere.



Randolph Teacher Publishes Children's Book That Celebrates All Abilities





Inspired by the late Julie Mendell, Amy Bedell is planning to share her cousin's story with students of Ellicottville Elementary School next month.

Wednesday, March 8th is a special day for Randolph teacher Amy Bedell, for not only is this the day she's sharing her brand new book with Ellicottville Elementary School students, but it is also the day she would be celebrating the 50th birthday of the book's inspiration, Julie Ann Mendell, Bedell's cousin. Julie, an individual with special needs, passed away in 2021 due to complications from Covid-19. A lifelong advocate of inclusion and acceptance, Mendell inspired everyone she met, and now her memory lives on through "She Will," Bedell's book that celebrates children of all abilities.

While technically cousins, Bedell and Julie grew up more like siblings. "We were all so close," said Bedell of her cousins Julie, Chris, and Laura. "It's so hard to put into words what that relationship meant. I didn't even sit down and write this as a book. It actually started as notes on my phone. I wrote the whole thing the night Julie passed away. I was just devastated. Having to explain to your children that the most kindhearted person you ever met isn't going to be here anymore was unimaginable.'

Initially, Bedell wrote the book for her and her family. "I didn't know if I was going to publish it or just write it for my kids so they could have Julie forever. I showed it to my husband (Craig), and he really pushed me to pursue this."

Bedell took the next step and put her story on paper. At the time, her twins were in kindergarten, so she read it to them and had them try to read it themselves. "It's geared towards emerging readers; I wanted to write something simple that kids could understand and begin to read independently." A year later, after raising the funds to self-publish, Bedell researched several different companies and found a publisher based in the United Kingdom that was a great fit. "I could do it all on my phone through an app," said Bedell. "I found an illustrator that I liked and worked well with remotely."

The book launched on Amazon.com in December and immediately rose to the top of the best seller list for special education literature.


The children's book features many differently abled children and shares a message of inclusion and acceptance. "When you're reading with your child or a child is reading, that moment of 'That looks like me!' or 'I know a kid in a wheelchair! I need to wear headphones sometimes,' is really important," said Bedell, who has been a special education teacher at Randolph Central School for 15 years. "I wanted every child to be able to see themselves in print. I wanted my students and my own children to see that everyone should be able to look in a book and see themselves represented."


Although Julie is not a character specifically named in the book, Bedell explained that the book is meant to open

the discussion about inclusion, which was very important to Julie. "We are moving toward inclusion, but we're not quite there yet," said Bedell. "Julie went through that in her own education, where she was included and then she wasn't. If everyone takes part in that discussion about inclusion, maybe one day we can all have a world where everyone

Bedell is excited to share this book with Ellicottville students next week and looks forward to events scheduled at libraries in Ellington and Little Valley in the coming months. The book, which is available to order from Amazon.com, is drawing attention nationally, as she has been contacted by teachers and administrators from school districts in Florida and Massachusetts who want to buy the book for their schools.

"My hope is for the children who hear this story to always show kindness to others and compassion, whenever someone needs it," said Bedell, whose book dedication honors Julie. To her readers, Bedell writes, "I encourage you to do at least one kind thing a day and when you do, please think of our Julie."

The Rotary Has Big Plans... and You Could Be a Part of Them!

Things look a little different now. Many of us found ourselves in new places following the pandemic, and many changes have taken place. But change isn't always a bad thing; sometimes it's a chance to move forward and focus more on the important things. The Rotary Club of Ellicottville plans to do just that, deciding to shift their focus on activities that will better serve the local community.

The Rotary has always done a great deal of work for our town - from funding the Library's summer intern and reading programs and offering funding to the Alley Katz's beautification committee, Ellicottville Historical Society and other cherished local organizations, to providing school supplies to kids at the start of each school year, giving out holiday dinners to those less fortunate... and the list goes on.

I attended a special meet-and-greet that the Rotary Club hosted at Villaggio last week and had the opportunity to speak with a few of the members about their plans. Last year, the Rotary Club went through some major changes that brought their mission into perspective; changes that helped them decide how they wanted to proceed heading into 2023. Their mission is simple: to better the community and help fix the world's problems.

WHAT'S NEW FOR 2023

Current head of the Rotary, John Weismantel was very excited to talk about why they are doing things a little differently now. "The Rotary Club is part of a worldwide organization and we've been doing things the same way for over 20 years," he told me. "We're living in a new age now and we'd really like to put more effort into our community service and local events.

"We're starting from scratch this year," he continued. "We are looking for new members and new ways to raise funds for all of the projects that we are involved in. Our goal is to work more closely with local establishments, like the food pantry and the Ellicottville Chamber of Commerce."

The Rotary has always had very specific goals in mind. Outside of our own community, the organization has always supported world peace initiatives and clean drinking water for the world. At its core, the club is an all-volunteer organization, a 5014c non-profit and any funds they bring in go directly into local projects, such as their yearly scholarships for ECS students.

"We're working towards bringing back some favorite events for 2023," John declared. "We are going to bring back the Rotary Halloween Party and we are teaming up with St. Paul's Church who typically runs trunk-or-treat at the same time to combine everything into one big celebration. Then there's Tuscan Moon. The Moon may have set but we've got ideas for a new event that's in the same vein."

JOIN THE ROTARY

The main purpose of the meeting was for potential new recruits to meet the current Rotary members in a relaxed, open setting. I asked the members I spoke with why they joined. Members Anne Rothrock and David Rothrock joined back in July 2022 and are the "youngest members" of the group. (The oldest member being Jack Luzier, who actually began before John.) The Rothrocks joined because "we wanted to help give back to the community who welcomed us into it and to be a part of something that helps a lot of people." Judy Brown, member and retired ECS teacher was all smiles. She explained, "This is a fantastic group of people, and we want to continue to contribute to our community."

Currently there are only 12 people who are actively involved with the Rotary Club of Ellicottville. "We can always use new members," John said. "We could use new ideas, new points of view and more helping hands. Membership is only \$150 for the year (some of the lowest dues in the organization) and they are typically due on July 1st. We get together two times a month, usually on Wednesdays. We share food, drinks and ideas at various local restaurants in town, though the Gin Mill has become one of our favorite spots."







PENGUIN PADDLE

Show Your Support for the Lounsubry Adaptve Ski Program at Holiday Valley

What do you get when you head up a ski slope in a giant black trash bag and then slide back down on your belly? You've got Holiday Valley Resort's annual Penguin Paddle event, back for another exciting day of fundraising Saturday, February 25 form 11:00am-2:00pm.

This event sponsors the Lounsbury Adaptive Ski Program (LASP). For those not familiar with LASP, ellicottvilleNOW had the opportunity to speak with Assistant Director/Adaptive Ski Instructor, Sue Whistler about the program and the Penguin Paddle event.

eNOW: How did the Penguin Paddle come to be?

SUE: It began in 1987, when Bill Lounsbury, a ski patroller at Holiday Valley, lost his leg to cancer, but continued to ski using hand-held skis, inspiring all who knew him. After his death, many donations were made in his honor, and the money was used to start the Lounsbury Adaptive Ski Program, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization and chapter of Disabled Sports USA. The Penguin Paddle is now the program's largest yearly fundraiser. It invites the young and old to don large garbage bags and slide down the bottom of Yodeler on their bellies like penguins.

eNOW: What goes on during the day?

SUE: In addition to the Penguin Paddle races, the day's festivities include a buffet cookout lunch, silent auction, and a raffle. The silent auction features over 150 items including beautiful gift baskets, ski and outdoor gear, home decor and gift cards from many of Ellicottville's local restaurants and businesses. This year LASP is raffling off a 2023/24 Holiday Valley season pass, a pair of skis from The City Garage and a \$400 gift certificate from Villaggio in Ellicottville.

eNOW: How does the event sponsor the Lounsbury Adaptive Ski Program?

SUE: Most of the students who participate in LASP require specially designed adaptive ski equipment which is very expensive. The proceeds from the Penguin Paddle help to purchase and maintain this equipment and to fund ongoing adaptive training programs for the 40 volunteer instructors as well as a scholarship program to support any skier regardless of their ability to pay. LASP is a 501C nonprofit organization.

eNOW: Can you indulge on the mission and principals of the program?

SUE: LASP is an all-volunteer program that offers lessons to persons with virtually all disabilities, both physical and cognitive. The LASP motto is "de-EMPHASIZE the dis-ABILITY". If someone wants to ski, the enthusiastic Lounsbury instructors will find a way to get them out on the slopes. The focus is always on what a student can do, not on what they can't. A single lesson usually involves two instructors and sometimes three depending on the severity of the student's disability and the type of adaptive ski equipment required. Results vary but many students become skiers and virtually all of them experience a sense of achievement, excitement and freedom that helps them to gain new confidence to tackle other activities."

eNOW: Do you have any other events upcoming?

SUE: We are currently working to set up a race day for our students at the end of the season in late March, snow conditions permitting.

eNOW: How can someone interested in helping out get involved?

SUE: The dedication of LASP's volunteer instructors is essential to the continuing success of this program and new recruits are always welcome. Please visit the LASP website at www.lounsburyadaptive.org for more general information about volunteering, donating, scheduling adaptive ski lessons and of course, the Penguin Paddle. Hope to see you all on February 25!"

Snowboarders across the western New York region are pulling out the fresh wax as they prepare for the 5th annual Boardroom Banked Slalom at Holiday Valley, Sunday, March 5. It's not just a day to go fast, but a day to celebrate the sport of snowboarding and how far it's come since its unsocially acceptable beginnings. The rebels of years past are now middle-aged men and women who have instilled in their own children the freedom and stoke of carving on edge, and you'll see many of them - moms, dads, kids - anxious to enter the gate at the top of HV's Champagne slope come race day.

Riders of all ages will compete for bragging rights and some of the most unique, handmade trophies you'll come across in the local competition scene, on a custom built banked slalom course in four separate categories: Groms (15 and under), Women's Open, Men's Open, and the OGs (Original Gangstas, for those not up on their shrediquette. These are the guys 35 and older.)

"While the Banked is a day to celebrate western NY snowboarding, we also use it as a tool to raise money for a great cause," said Spencer Timkey, owner of The Boardroom Snowboard Shop which organizes the event. "For the second year in a row, we're proud to partner with P.U.N.T. Pediatric Cancer Collaborative, a Buffalo-based non-profit that assists families dealing with the difficulties of pediatric cancer." Last year, the event collectively raised \$4,500 for the organization and the goal this year is even higher.

"This is one of my favorite days of the year," said Timkey. "We've got all ages out there absolutely ripping, and all coming together for the love of standing sideways. It's unbelievable to see the support we get from people, especially since this isn't a banked slalom in the traditional sense. But our feeling - and it has been since Day 1 - is that it's less about who wins and more about celebrating snowboarding. The bonus? Working with an organization like P.U.N.T. that's out there doing God's work. It's just such a great day all around. The scene... tons of high 5s, a couple cold ones, music blasting. And we're in the process of building the trophies and they are going to be so good!"

Snow conditions may change day to day, week to week (welcome to WNY), but the one thing that will never change, is the fact that snowboarding is, at its core, about community. Cultivating that sense of community is something that The Boardroom Banked Slalom was created on. Each year, the event has grown in participation and fundraising levels, and has become a staple in ensuring that the western New York snowboard community stays in touch with one another. People of all ages, having fun, doing what they love, and showing their support not only for each other, but for others in need.

Along with the registration proceeds heading to P.U.N.T., the event committee has rallied up some pretty cool raffle items, including a framed photo from Lisa Bobwicz (@l_b_photo), a signed Dawson Knox jersey, custom prints from legendary Lib Tech team photographer Tim Zimmerman, and a few other surprises along the way. Raffle tickets can be purchased during the Boardroom Banked, with winning tickets drawn at the day's conclusion.

Let's talk about this year's course. "We've been dealt a pretty tough hand when it comes to weather this season, but the snowmakers at Holiday Valley are the MVPs and we've got a substantial base to work with on Champagne," explained Timkey. "The course may not look like it has in the past, and depending on how the next week shakes out, we're going to do our best to build a course that's fun and fast. It may be our finest hour."

Finest hour indeed. No matter the end product, you can count on a course filled with high-octane turns, where competitors will no doubt test their skills in a timed format to see who the fastest riders on the course are. Judges will take your best two of three runs, and all riders will receive a Boardroom Banked 5 Phunkshun mask that doubles as a bib, lunch on-site from West Rose, and the opportunity to win tons of great swag from the industry's best brands

"Even if you're not riding, we want you to come and enjoy the day," said Timkey. "Beer tasting from EBC, music, and non-competitors will have their fair share of chances to take home some pretty sweet prizes. Moosevision will be set up on-site offering hot waxes for a donation, and P.U.N.T. has invited a special family along to come tell their story. It's expected to be an emotional day for sure."

Registration is \$45 and should be completed in advance online; find the link at boardsand-powder.com. "Last year we were turning riders down the day of the event so don't delay in signing up," said Timkey. Discounted lift tickets are available for registrants. "The Banked has proven that the western New York snowboarding scene can go pound for pound with anybody in the game. So we'll see you Sunday, March 5 for the running of the 5th annual Boardroom Banked. Let's celebrate snowboarding, and let's make a difference!"

EBC LV GRAND OPENING

Craft Beer Production/Distribution Facility Expands; Includes Dining & Event Center

They officially cut the ribbon on the newest addition to the Ellicottville Brewing Company's craft beer empire on Friday, Feb. 17, as the company's founder, Peter Kreinheder hosted a Who's Who of local elected officials, as well as the general public, for the Grand Opening of EBC's Little Valley Brew Pub, Pizzeria and Event Center.

In a craft beer landscape crowded with an uncountable number of small craft breweries, the Ellicottville Brewing Company continues to stand out among all the others as a leader and innovator in the industry, and with the expansion of its production, packaging and distribution capabilities, EBC is poised to stay at the top well into the foreseeable future.

In 2015, Kreinheder finalized the purchase of the building in Little Valley that has in the past been home to a dairy processing facility, a window factory and a beverage distribution center. He then immediately began the long, involved process of reclaiming the sprawling, long-vacant industrial site in favor of a new, cutting-edge production and distribution hub for some of the best craft beer to be found anywhere.

"Re-using this building was great for the village (of Little Valley) and great for us," Kreinheder mentioned at the start of the Grand Opening ceremony. He went on to explain, "Because we didn't have to go spend millions and millions of dollars on brick and mortar to build a building, we could actually just renovate this facility and then put our investment capital into equipment - making us the 'state-of-the-art' brewery in New York."

In the years since his acquisition of the property, that capital investment has proven to have been quite a substantial commitment, as Kreinheder estimates expenditures on the entire project to currently be in the \$9 million range. Brewing operations began at the Little Valley location on July 4, 2018 and the brew pub made its debut nearly five years later, with a "soft opening" the day after Christmas, 2022.

Reminding guests of the short drive just over the hill between Ellicottville and the Cattaraugus County Seat of Little Valley, Kreinheder explained that the focus for the Little Valley brew pub location would not necessarily be in drawing people from Ellicottville.

"We want to raise the whole tide of Little Valley up by attracting the people who live around here - those people who maybe don't want to go to Ellicottville - and we're excited that right here, we can now deliver a service and an experience just like you'll find in our Ellicottville locations."

Kreinheder's opening remarks were followed by those of State Senator George Borello, who was on-hand to help with the official ribbon cutting, and also to recognize the challenges that Kreinheder and EBC had faced, both in transforming a derelict property into a showplace, as well as opening a restaurant and obtaining a liquor license in an overly-regulated New York State. Acknowledging his own background in the hospitality business, Borello praised the effort it took to complete the project.

"This is an amazing accomplishment," Borello said. "And as someone who knows full-well what blood, sweat and tears it takes to do this, thank you! And thank you so much for your investment in this area."

Following the opening statements, the assembled crowd bundled up against the first shot of cold winter weather the area had experienced in days for the official ribbon-cutting ceremony in the outdoor courtyard in front of the events center. Elected officials from state and local offices joined EBC's top brass and other dignitaries on the ribbon line with a giant pair of scissors for the official unveiling of the final transformation of the property. And with the ribbon cut and everyone back inside the pub, it was time for guests to sample some of the pizzas that will no doubt become legendary in the annals of Little Valley cuisine.

"Pizza is the most awesome, universal food thing you can do," Kreinheder admitted. "So when we decided to go in the direction of Neapolitan-style pizza, we went on a 'pizza knowledge tour' for two years; we went to pizza classes, we went to the big show out in Las Vegas. We had Brad from West Rose (restaurant in Ellicottville) come and help us develop all of our dough."

EBC Little Valley boasts seven different specialty pizzas - each baked to perfection in the new electric pizza oven. There is also the option to build your own Neapolitan masterpiece from a thoughtful listing of pizza toppings. As if all this were not enough, EBC's head chef, Josh McDowell, offers two different dessert pizzas, as well as a tempting selection of burgers



Core Performance: Weight Loss and Skin Elasticity

Recently, one of my clients who had lost a lot of weight wondered if she would ever regain elasticity of her skin to match her weight loss. As much as I wanted to tell her that strength training alone will be the answer to all of her prayers, I know better. I've been in this business long enough to see the reality verses the myth of sagging skin after excessive weight loss.

The elasticity of your skin depends on how long you were obese. The longer it was stretched out, the less likely it is to bounce back. "It's like a balloon," says Marie Jhin, MD, a dermatologist in San Francisco. "When you first blow up a balloon, it's really small and tight." You have to stretch it first, she says. But when it's deflated, it doesn't return to its original shape.

Be aware that a lot of it has to do with age and genetics. "Everyone starts to lose [elastic tissue] as they get older. It's frustrating to patients who have put all this hard work and commitment into their weight loss journey and new bodies to be left with extra skin that doesn't reflect that effort," says Jason B. Lichten, MD, a plastic surgeon in Columbus, OH. "Often, they feel that their extra skin hangs on them the same way their old clothes from before their weight loss would, only they can't take it off."

However, there are ways to save your skin's elasticity. Start by enlisting a certified personal trainer/nutritionist to create a safe and effective plan that allows pounds to come off slow and steady - one or two pounds a week is the ideal rate at which to lose. The more quickly you lose your weight, the more likely you are to have a problem with excess skin. In addition to slow and steady weight loss, you can also build muscle to shape the tissue underneath the

skin. Maintaining or increasing muscle tissue is the key to minimizing loose skin. Remember, the phenomenon occurs when the underlying layers of tissue shrink under a much large surface area. If muscle mass is lost in addition to fat, it creates an even larger void under your skin's surface. On the other hand, increasing lean tissue fills the area underneath the skin, keeping it taut.

Lastly, make sure to keep protein intake high. During caloric deficit this will not only prevent the loss of lean mass, but also ensure that you have the optimum amount for building muscle

So what's the bottom line? Worrying about the likelihood of having loose skin is no reason to put off losing weight. Losing weight will leave you healthier and will most likely lead to a longer, fuller life. If you have loose skin after weight loss, talk to your doctor about skin tightening surgeries and methods that can approve both the function and the look of your body

and salads that round out the menu.

"We've been anticipating this opening since they first announced the expansion and I just happened to be lucky enough to be home for it," explained former Ellicottville native Kate Kohler, who now resides in Golden, CO. Attending the event with her mother, Patty Wolf of Ellicottville, Kohler went on to say, "I can see summers and fall being slammed here - It should really help the local economy."

The dining area of the brew pub features walls covered in a timeless clear maple while darkly-stained structural timbers add an air of massiveness and permanence to the former industrial space. Looking around, you can't help but notice that the entire back wall of the building is comprised either of windows or evenly-spaced, 14-foot tall garage doors, which will open onto the massive outdoor event space at the back of the property and give guests and others the easiest possible access to everything inside - and out. Kreinheder credited the garage door concept at EBC's Bemus Point location for "giving patrons the open-air, 'California Feel' that really makes the whole place."

"Open the space up!" exclaimed EBC's CEO, Beth Harvey. "We don't mind the fresh air - besides, Western New Yorkers like to summer hard and it keeps things clean and simple for us as an event center."

Certainly, one of the highlights of the decor at the EBC Little Valley Brew Pub has to be the brainchild of EBC's own resident artist and graphic designer, Sara Staley. The original artwork Staley created on her iPad became the warm and whimsical mural which spans the entire length of the room, from the baseboards to the ceiling, and depicts the flowing, creative thought process of a brewer - all the way from an original concept to a pint glass of beer.

"I have a ten-year-plan for this place," Kreinheder admitted. "We're going to get to the point where we have a whole live entertainment program going on outside."

And with all the enthusiasm of someone looking forward to using the features himself, Kreinheder went on to explain, "I have a ferris wheel to put out back and I envision us having what's called a "pump track," which is a paved area where you can use bikes, skateboards, inline skates - whatever you want - and it's all designed to use g-forces to power you along!"

Having spent the past three decades building his craft beer empire to this stage, EBC's founder expressed his simple desire for the Little Valley brew pub, saying, "I want this to be a fun, family-friendly destination, where people can come hang out with their kids and have a pizza and a beer."

In addition to previously mentioned plans for the Little Valley location, Kreinheder is proud to point out a future project to build a teaching kitchen for French cuisine, where local high school and college students could learn the basics of the profession without taking on the challenges of traveling the longer distances sometimes required of them.

Ellicottville Brewing Company's Dan Minner has been the Head Brewer for the company since 2003 and as you can imagine, he leads an incredibly informative walking tour of the facility. When passing through the doors from the restaurant to the brewery and then into the heart of EBC's 75,000 sq. ft. production and distribution facility, it is like entering into another world. In the brewery, rows of massive stainless steel brewing tanks stand from floor-to-ceiling, with each one of the sparkling and impossibly clean vats ready to produce and hold as many as 360 kegs of beer!

Because they package beer in bottles and cans, Minner's operation must have two separate packaging lines - each capable of delivering stunningly prolific levels of output with mind-numbing speed and accuracy.

"These systems are capable of producing 140 12-oz. units every minute!" Minner proudly exclaimed during the walking tour. "When we were packaging in Ellicottville, it would take us literally 12 hours to do 11 palettes of beer and now we get here and get going in the morning and we bust out 11 palettes of beer before ten o'clock!"

Along with a multitude of other fascinating tidbits of information, EBC's Brewmeister talked about the coded labeling system they use in the brewery, whereby each bottle and can is marked in such a way that allows for an individual beer to be traced all the way back to the specific bags of grain that were used to produce it. Minner also pointed out that the entire brewing process, with all its complexities and variables could be controlled remotely, by way of iPads, as well as by using the old school method of a desktop computer. And if a problem should arise that even the Head Brewer himself cannot remedy, EBC's "ace in the hole" lies in a German fellow named Franz, who can diagnose and help resolve issues from across the ocean.

EBC Little Valley's Brew Pub/Pizzeria is located at 202 Second St. and is open Thursday through Sunday, noon-9:00pm.
