HANDCRAFTED IN ELLICOTTVILLE

Top Flight Early American Cutlery Launches Historical Family Line of Knives

Known by most as the mayor of Ellicottville, John Burrell is the last living knife maker of the Case family, whose members started, owned, or ran 32 different cutlery companies in the greater Ellicottville area over the decades. Last year, Burrell founded his own company, Top Flight Early American Cutlery, through which he has sold knives and razors from his extensive collection and for other knife collectors and enthusiasts. Now, Burrell is excited to share the newest phase of his business: the launch of his own custom knives, which he has been making in his shop over the past two months.

Burrell's plan is to make a total of eight different patterns honoring the members of his family that were involved in the management of Burrell Cutlery Company. Each of these knives have serial numbers, and Burrell plans to make 40 of each pattern. Beginning next week, the first knife pattern, Addy Case Burrell, will be available!

"Addy Case Burrell, my grandmother, was Jean Case's daughter," Burrell explained. "Jean and his two brothers started the first Case brothers-owned company. As a teenager, Addy worked in and eventually ran the office in Little Valley. In 1926, she joined her brother, husband and father at Kinfolks Cutlery in Little Valley." In 1940, Addy and her husband, Harold Burrell, started Burrell Cutlery Company in Ellicottville, where John Burrell began working in 1967 upon his return home from the army, until international competition forced the company to close in 2006.

"My grandmother was active in those three companies for a total of 67 years," said Burrell. "I've just finished making the 40 knives in her pattern, and now they are going to the engraver. Each will be sold in a cherry wood presentation box with a glass top." Burrell expects to be able to ship these knives by mid-March. While most of the 40 knives have already been preordered by members of the Top Flight Early American Cutlery Facebook group, the ones that are left will be taken to a knife show in Pigeon Forge, Tennessee, where Burrell is looking forward to sharing them with collectors March 17-19th.

By the end of 2023, Burrell hopes to manufacture knives for three more patterns. "The next one will honor my grandfather, Harold Burrell; then my father, Dean Burrell; then my uncle, John Kearn. He was the vice president of Burrell Cutlery and was a captain in World War II. The inspiration for his knife will be a World War II fighting knife."

Using one honing machine from Burrell Cutlery, as well as more recent acquisitions including a multi-purpose grinder and buffer, Burrell crafts each knife entirely by hand. Many of his materials come from Burrell Cutlery, and he also sources raw materials from other places in the United States. The handle of the Addy Case Burrell knife is made from leather, brass, and Rocky Mountain elk antler, one of Burrell's favorite materials. "Many knives use stag in the handle, which usually comes from India," he explained. "All of the materials in Top Flight knives are sourced in the U.S. I bought the antler from a company in Montana that buys all of the antlers the Boy Scouts have collected out there - antlers that have been shed by the elk."

Burrell has enjoyed the process - and the learning curve - of making his own knives by hand. "There's a difference between overseeing many people that are doing 30 different operations on a knife and then actually building that knife myself," he said. "I'm used to doing 40 knives at a time, and now I'm making one knife at a time by hand!'

Some collectors have already spoken for all eight of Top Flight's forthcoming patterns. The primary marketplace is Top Flight Early American Cutlery by John Burrell of the Case family, a private Facebook group he created in June of 2022. Now 800 members strong, the group includes knife enthusiasts, authors, and some of the most well-known knife collectors in the industry. Not only does the Facebook group provide a platform through which to buy and sell knives, but it's also a place where Burrell can share his knowledge and family history with members. "So many of these members know much more about knives, their collectability and their rarity, but they don't know about the people who made them," he pointed out.

"Not only do I have that background with the Case family members, but the fact that I was in the industry for 40 years and made knives for a lot of different companies is something I can offer."

Speaking of history, each of the knives in Top Flight's eight patterns will include a historical note about the person for whom the knife was designed, as well as a personalized letter of authenticity from Burrell. Those who are interested can request to join the Facebook group and send a private message to Burrell to order.

HISTORY OF MARDI GRAS

How Ellicottville's Iconic Parade Came to Be

The most frequent question about Ellicottville's Mardi Gras Parade is that it's in March, weeks after Shrove Tuesday and well into the season of Lent, yet it is called Mardi Gras, which is over. True, true, and true. The parade was so named because the weekend chosen is customarily Winter Carnival weekend on the ski slopes. The launch pad for the parade was in Jane Eshbaugh's office at Holiday Valley. The decision was made to choose the HV Winter Carnival King and Queen in the village after the parade, so it seemed logical that we would name the parade after the hill that the Winter Carnival festivities traditionally were held on. Hence, Mardi Gras Parade!

Why nighttime? Again, there are so many ski-related events for visitors during the day that it only made sense to wait until folks could kick off the skis and head to town for something taking place in the evening. That way, people got the best of both worlds.

According to our Chamber of Commerce, the parade "is perhaps one of the most fun and zany events of the winter!" (Thank you, C of C, for sponsoring and managing this parade every year.) 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

HIGH SCHOOL HOOPS

Huge Third Quarter Comeback Not Enough Against Panama

Looking up from the bottom of the deep, dark hole the Ellicottville boys dug for themselves at the start of their Class D semifinal matchup against #4 seed Panama last Monday evening, it was almost impossible to see a way out for the #1 seed Eagles. And though they mounted a spectacular, fan-pleasing comeback in the third quarter, ultimately the Eagles' bid for a Section VI title fell short by a 47-36 margin on the hardwood floor at neutral site, Jamestown Community College.

With starting center and top-scorer Gavin Dietrich sidelined by an ankle injury, and with Ellicottville shooters battling nervousness, as well as the tough Panama defense to start the game, more than seven minutes ticked off the clock in the first quarter before the Eagles got their first score - a put-back basket from underneath by senior guard Brad John. John's shot made the score 17-2, Panama, and only 56 seconds remained in the opening quarter.

"In the first half, I thought we were rushing things a little too much," explained Eagles Coach David McCann. "One of the things we talked about at halftime was just to settle down and play at our own pace."

With every basket the Panthers buried in the opening stanza, and with every empty trip up the floor for the Eagles, frustration and a bit of desperation began to mount. Winners of 12 of their last 13 games entering this contest, the Eagles found themselves staring into the void of the end of their season. Shots didn't fall for them. Passes were intercepted and starters began drawing fouls.

"In the first half, we let the other team force us to make bad decisions," admitted senior guard Braylon Wyatt. It was a sentiment echoed by twin brother, Caedon Wyatt, the team's point guard and floor general. "We kept wanting to shoot the three, but as soon as we took

LADY EAGLES FALL TO SHERMAN, 29-17

It's possible that the gremlins who covered the Ellicottville girls' basket with plexiglass at the start of their Class D semifinal playoff game last Wednesday at Jamestown Community College won't ever be caught. In a big-time high school hoops game that featured an unsettling number of missed shots by both teams - think gremlins - the #2 seed Ellicottville Lady Eagles' magical run toward a Section VI title ended March 1 in a low-scoring, 29-17 defensive slog versus the #3 seed Lady Wildcats of Sherman on the neutral site at JCC.

Time and again throughout the entire game, would-be Ellicottville scorers watched help-lessly as their shots bounced inexplicably once, twice, three times off the rim and/or backboard and then dropped harmlessly to the floor. Too often, Ellicottville shots missed everything.

"Our game last year here at JCC was the same thing," admitted Lady Eagles point guard Dalayla Alexander after the game. "We played here and we just couldn't hit anything." Alexander's assessment was echoed by Ellicottville Coach Tracy Rozler, who added, "We had a lot of shots tonight - they just wouldn't drop."

To put the outcome of this game into perspective, the last time the Lady Eagles scored fewer than 20 points in a game was in their season opener on Nov. 29 at Clymer - a 38-18 loss that was avenged on the last night of the regular season by a 21-point Ellicottville victory over the visiting Lady Pirates.

In the 20 games that followed that season-opening loss at Clymer, Ellicottville never scored fewer than 20 points in a game and only scored less than 30 points on just two occasions - both of those games took place on the road and both games were played versus Class B competition. Defensively, the Lady Eagles did just about everything that could have been expected of them in a game of this magnitude.

While there was no reasonable expectation that they'd stop everything the #3 seeded Lady Wildcats threw at them, the Ellicottville defenders tenaciously repelled the vast majority of Sherman scoring attempts and stood toe-to-toe with their adversary until the final horn sounded. "We played perfect defense tonight really - we held them to just 29 points," Rozler reflected after her team's heart-breaking loss. "They played hard, they played with their hearts and they never gave up - I can't ask for a better team."

THE CAST

Other students who have been cast include Katie Krotz who plays two parts - Grandma Tzeitel and Rifka; Samantha Stock playing the role of Bielke (one of Tevye's five daughters); Aaliyah Winslow who will be handling stage crew responsibilities, and Bryce Wood who will be handling the sound board. All are seniors at ECS.

ECS juniors involved include Abby Chudy as Tzeitel (Tevye and Golde's oldest daughter); Shelby Colburn as Nachum; Gwendolyn DeChane as the Rabbi; Cameron Kaleta as Mendel; Morgan Krotz as the matchmaker Yente; Emma Lafferty as Mordecai; and Gaby Spross as Sasha.

Sophomores playing a role include Alarice Krause as the constable; Liam McGuire as Fyedka; Grace Priviera as Shprintze (another of Tevye's daughters); Siyung Sun as Yussel; Sophia Sundeen as Chava (another of Tevye's daughters) and also as Fruma Sarah; Colton Taylor as Perchik; Adelaide Weber as Hodel (another of Tevye's daughters); and Henry Frank who will be handling the light board.

Acting freshmen include Keira Baldwin as the fiddler and also as Avram; Talyn Wyatt as Lazar Wolf, and Sky Wood as Motel. Shawne Hunt is the play's producer, and Jamie Edwards is the rehearsal accompanist.

Many parents became involved in helping their children participate in Fiddler. The two teachers co-directing the musical are Wendy Burch, who is also the vocal director, and Elizabeth Weber, who is also the choreographer and teaches 7th and 8th Grade English.

"I used to be the choreographer for the High School and Middle School musicals until I had to step away due to family reasons," said Mrs. Weber. "It was an extremely difficult decision for me to choose to be involved this year, but I wanted to make sure that we had a musical for all of our talented students. That is one of the main reasons we chose Fiddler on the Roof. We knew there were many parts that could highlight everyone's talents. The students overall seemed very excited about the choice of musical even though not all of them were familiar with it. This has been a learning experience for all of us."

THE STORY

When the musical begins, the first song, "Tradition" spells out the social responsibilities required of each person in town: fathers must work hard, but their word is traditionally law at home, and the mothers keep their households running smoothly. The sons learn a trade at an early age, and both sons and daughters must wait to marry until they are matched by the village matchmaker. However, life is beginning to change for everyone. The plot includes a wedding with wonderful dancing and a hilarious dream sequence. One of the songs, "Sunrise, Sunset" is frequently played at weddings because it beautifully describes the feelings of parents watching their child get married. Another song, "If I Were a Rich Man", humorously details Tevye's daydreams about having an easier life. Serious challenges arise and the villagers face them together.

Throughout Fiddler, you are entertainingly reminded about what keeps the villagers going: their families, their faith, and their sense of humor. Tevye is an Everyman, torn between the old ways he's always known, and the modern world on the horizon, with new freedom and unknown dangers.

The musical will be performed in The Ward at the Ellicottville High School at 7:00pm both evenings and welcomes the community to attend. ECS is located at 5873 Route 219, Ellicottville, NY. Tickets are \$7 apiece and will be available at the door.

TimberHut Cabin Company Explodes Into a Nationwide Market

Marble counters with waterfall edges, hardwood flooring, and acoustic panels for noise control... If you think these features can't be found in accommodations at a remote campsite, then you don't know TimberHut Cabin Company. Founder and CEO Brooks Anderson is excited to share his three-year-old company's newest hospitality-bound cabin models, which are currently being installed at properties throughout the United States.

"We've now been credited as a producer of park-model RVs, which allows us to put our product on anything from a campground to a destination resort to any place that requires a certain standard for guest accommodations," said Anderson. "Our design and production of these hospitality-bound cabins that we're building has sort of exploded, and we're not seeing an end to it right now!"

TimberHut Cabin Company began with just a handful of employees making designer glamping units of approximately 144 square feet suitable for everything from a day on the slopes to a day at the beach. The response to these artisan-quality units was immediate, and TimberHut quickly outgrew its original Buffalo location and moved to a much larger site on Route 219 in Great Valley in 2021. At that time, Anderson hoped to hire five people and eventually have around 10 employees. Now, TimberHut is a team of more than a dozen employees, including eight builders led by Randy Wiser, AIA (American Institute of Architects) Architect Ken Klapper, Director of Commercial Projects Jim Dailey, Business and Purchasing Manager Mychelle McNeil-Wedvik, and Tom Kiddoo, southwest representative, builder, and site consultant.

Since receiving their accreditation to manufacture park-model RVs, TimberHut has been able to standardize building methods and expand into a new market. "Because the RV Industry Association (RVIA) is a much bigger governing body, this opens us up to building for a KOA all the way to a five-star destination," Anderson explained. "That whole industry, which we used to think of as just glamping, has now really taken on a new meaning. There are many different players who are either building or acquiring new properties at a quick clip. Our goal is to find a number of those who we want to grow with us."

TimberHut's newest models include the Journey Model, a park model RV sized at 300 to 400 square feet and built on a trailer chassis, as well as the DayTrip Model, an accessory dwelling unit (ADU) sized at 80 to 200 square feet that sits directly on the ground. All cabins are built to last with 35-year weatherproof siding, top-quality windows and doors, and a standing seam metal roof. The possibilities are truly endless, for not only are these suitable for the glamping experience, but also for studios, cabanas, vendor kiosks, festival rentals, and so much more.

"Because we're building in volume, we're able to dedicate our design services for that customer," said Anderson. "We design for their aesthetic, as well as the place where it's going. A unit bound for Maine will be entirely different than one for a resort down in Florida or a location in the desert. Whether or not it's up on a trailer chassis or on a shed platform all depends on the property. The properties we sell to have different requirements based on their local codes and zoning laws, which we make it our priority to know and understand."

Anderson's goal for TimberHut is to build anywhere from five to 20 to 50 units at a time for any particular property to develop a dedicated customer base that knows their product, like their product, and appreciates their process. "Our first big order came from a resort out in Utah," said Anderson. "We have 10 units being built right now. Two are on the way, and the rest will be going out in the next six weeks." The order has been an important learning experience for Anderson and his team, who have been working out the logistics of transporting these units to remote locations on the other side of the country. To that end, Anderson works with Kiddoo in Colorado, who helps coordinate the west coast orders and installations.

While the west coast orders are keeping TimberHut busy, Anderson's focus is also on producing out of the Great Valley facility for a radius of about 400 miles. This radius includes Maine, Michigan, and North Carolina, which are big markets, Anderson noted. "We are also beginning to fine tune our focus in the seasonal housing or institutional market," he added. "A place like Ellicottville has limited options for housing seasonal employees or hospitality employees. We're working to develop a program where we can put 10 or 20 units together that focus on low cost, very nice housing for these employees. This is a need that's all across these hospitality-driven, destination resort towns."

Skyler is very proud of what he and his team have built. "It's hard to believe we've been here for seven years," he told us. 
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
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

Hot Wing Designs: Facing Adversity, Springville Man Turns Doodling Into an Iconic Buffalo Staple

Like most people during the early days of the Covid-19 pandemic, Springville resident Greg Culver found himself at home with lots of time on his hands. Unlike most people; however, the 53-year-old husband and father had been diagnosed with kidney cancer in the months leading up to the great lockdown. To top it all off, Culver was let go from his job around the same time. It was as if fate was trying to pile on enough overwhelming adversity to break the man, but what happened instead makes for an inspiring story of perseverance and hope.

"So here I am fighting stage four kidney cancer and I lost my job in the middle of a pandemic," Culver said, summing up his situation in a single sentence. He found himself awake late at night because of the steroids he had to take after the first round of radiation, and admitted, "So what am I doing? I'm doing like everyone else is doing and I'm binging Netflix stuff."

With a background in creative arts, graphic design and marketing, Culver's late night TV habit started to include doodling electronically on his iPad. "My iPad had a drawing program on it and I sometimes used a pencil with it to take notes at meetings," he explained. "But this was the first time I started to use it creatively."

Inspired by a real-life character on one of the shows he was binging, Culver sketched the first of what would become a small army of original cartoon characters (Joe Exotic from the true crime documentary, The Tiger King) and the seeds were planted for his fledgling graphic arts and design company, Hot Wing Designs.

Culver remembered fondly the creative session where he discovered another use for his old iPad, saying, "By the time I was finished drawing the Tiger King, I thought, boy this drawing with the iPad is pretty cool because you don't burn up sheets of paper and there's no eraser shavings all over." Noting how clean and portable the new technology was, he says he started taking the iPad to his appointments at Roswell Park Cancer Institute and creating while he waited. About the same time, Culver took inspiration from the classic movie, "A League of Their Own," and imagined a "league" for proud Buffalonians and the people of Western New York to belong to - The Buffalo League.

"I feel like people in Buffalo are in a league of their own," Culver explained. "We have crappy weather, the sports teams don't win - it's definitely a challenge just living here!" he joked. "Seriously, there's so much more than just sports here. I hear people say a lot that they're Buffalo fans - not necessarily football fans - but they love Buffalo and love being from here." Culver explained that the Buffalo League emblem was made to look like a major league sports logo with the way it was colored; but instead of a sports figure at the center of the design, it has a white Buffalo.

BUFFALO LEAGUE IS BORN

After a televised zoom interview with Channel 2 News' Kate Welshofer aired in February of 2021, Culver's story and artwork caught the eye of Bill Herman from Identity Ink, a large screenprinting/embroidery operation in North Buffalo and the two collaborated on the idea for a design that was Buffalo-themed and could be marketed and sold - and so it was that Culver's league for Buffalonians came to life.

"I thought it was really cool that a guy I never met before had seen my story and said, 'Hey I'm going to give this guy a go'," Culver admitted. And with Herman's guidance, they opened an online store for a trial period of 30 days and offered a limited selection of Buffalo League logo'd apparel for sale, including hats, sweatshirts and stickers. Their startup enterprise took in a modest number of orders but after that first month, it was on to the next endeavor for both men. "Working in the retail business for as long as I have, I realized that 30 days was just not a long enough amount of time to get a new brand to stick," Culver said. "So I thought I'd stay with it for a little while longer and I went and got some Buffalo League stickers made and that was the start of the whole sticker business," he reflected.

EXPANDING INTO THE MUSIC SCENE

Culver admits that his love for classic rock music is set deep in his DNA, thanks to the music his parents listened to while he was growing up in Hamburg, NY. "My parents' collection was filled with everything from Santana to the Moody Blues," he reflected. "They listened to all the good stuff."

Considering the way his favorite music had been a treasured part of his childhood and adolescence, it made perfect sense that the next cartoon-style character to come to life under the tip of Culver's drawing wand would be legendary Grateful Dead frontman, Jerry Garcia. "I've always been a Grateful Dead fan," Culver confided. "I've seen way too many of their shows in my day and it was just natural for Jerry to be the next one I'd draw."

And with a bright smile that seemed to involve his whole face, he added, "And then I went to Sticker Mule and had 20 of those stickers made and then there were three stickers in my collection!"

Without ever really lamenting the medical challenges he faces on a daily basis, Culver went on to explain how his young business began expanding and branching out with every new personality he added to his colorful tribe of soulful characters. With the enthusiasm of a 10-year-old painted all over his face, Culver explained the next logical evolution in his work, saying, "After I drew Jerry, I started going off on this jag of drawing guitar players - and then it branched off onto all kinds of musicians, not just guitar players."

Culver's guitar gunslingers collection includes names like Dave Grohl, Eric Clapton, Derek Trucks, Susan Tedeschi, Duane Allman and many, many more. His collection of "not just guitar players" includes notables such as Mick Jagger, Gord Downie (Tragically Hip) and Michael Jackson.

Culver explained how during the pandemic, he fell in love with the southern rock band, Blackberry Smoke, and especially loved watching the on-stage performance of their lead guitarist, Charlie Starr. "I was watching a Youtube video of the band and I paused it with (Starr) jumping around on stage and I grabbed my iPad and drew him with his cherry-red Gibson guitar and that's how there came to be a Charlie Starr sticker."

After posting his newest cartoon creation to the band's fan page, Culver says his Starr drawing brought down the house with the dedicated followers of Blackberry Smoke. "People went bonkers!" he explained. "They were all asking where can I buy this? Their fans are just as emphatic as Deadheads - they love everything they can get with these guys on it!"

By this time, Culver's stable of musician-themed drawings numbered around a dozen and with them, he created a hand-signed, limited-edition printing of all his existing characters. He then bundled the collector's edition print together with a sticker and a t-shirt for one low price.

He admits this marketing strategy was working well - until the day the band's manager gave him a call. Culver says the two shared a pleasant conversation about the limits of his marketing endeavors involving the performers in Blackberry Smoke, after which, he ended up drawing the entire band by request!

His artist's catalog currently includes more than 100 characters and designs on sticky paper, with about 50 more designs that are nearing completion. He attributes a breakthrough in the success of his sticker business to the online store he set up on the e-commerce platform, Etsy.

"Once I set up the shop on Etsy, not only was I shipping stickers all over the country - I was sending them out to countries all over the world - to places like the Netherlands and Japan!"

Culver's designs are also available at various locations throughout the region, including the Mountain Shop at Holiday Valley and The City Garage ski shop in downtown Ellicottville (the first bricks and mortar location to offer Buffalo League hats and stickers).

"We have customers come into this shop from all over the world," explained Patra Lowes, who owns and operates The City Garage with her brother, Sean. "Don't be surprised if you're traveling internationally and you come across one of Greg Culver's hats - they're very popular!"

EVERYONE'S FAVORITE FOOTBALL PLAYERS

Aside from his series of music-themed characters and designs, Culver also created a wildly successful collection of football-playing cartoon stickers based on the professional team in Buffalo. In fact, his Bills-themed stickers are fan favorites in all the places in the world where the Bills have fans.

He drew the Josh Allen figure first and says it has been very popular - so popular in fact, that the Josh Allen sticker turned up stuck to the side of a collapsable beer funnel in a random TikTok video that Culver just happened to see!

Hot Wing's designs have also made it onto enameled pins created in limited amounts for the highly-sought-after collectibles market. Culver recently pre-sold 48 pins out of a pro-

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

I have been in the fitness industry for exactly 40 years. (God that makes me feel old.) And as I have written numerous articles about fitness trends that have come and gone, one thing that has been tremendously important throughout the years and is literally a fundamental training principle at Core Performance Fitness is core strength.

Core strength training may be the most important term in the fitness world, but to really appreciate core strength you have to fully understand what it means and where the term comes from.

Joseph Hubertus Pilates (December 9, 1883 - October 9, 1967) was a German-born physical trainer credited with inventing and promoting the Pilates method of physical fitness. Pilates was actually a sickly child who suffered from asthma, rickets and rheumatic fever. Because of this, he dedicated his entire life to his physical strength. He was introduced by his father to gymnastics, body-building and martial arts. By the age of 14, he was fit enough to pose for anatomical charts. Pilates came to believe that the "modern" lifestyle, bad posture and inefficient breathing lay at the roots of poor health. He ultimately devised a series of exercises and training techniques, and engineered all the equipment, specifications and tuning required to teach his methods properly.

During WWI, the British authorities interned Joseph Pilates along with other German citizens to concentration camps. During this imprisonment, Pilates studied yoga and the movements of animals and trained fellow inmates in fitness and exercise. He later said that the intuitive movements of cats, in particular, inspired many aspects of his fitness regime. It was while he was imprisoned that Joseph Pilates began refining his minimal equipment system of mat exercises that later became "Contrology". This term is still one of the strongest features of Pilates and one I try to instill with every single person I work with. Contrology is related to encouraging the use of the mind to control the muscles and focusing attention on the core postural muscles that help keep the body balanced and provide support for the spine. In particular, Pilates exercises teach awareness of breath and the alignment of the spine and strengthen the deep torso and abdominal muscles.

After WWI, Joseph Pilates moved to the United States. He and his wife Clara founded a studio in New York City which developed a devoted following from dancers and performing artists alike. The Pilates regimen built flexibility, strength and stamina.

Since Joseph Pilates, there have been many other experts and enthusiasts who can all agree that "core stiffness" is mandatory and essential to carry heavy loads, run fast and change direction quickly. It determines the rate of speed for movement of the arms and legs making it very clear: Training the core is non-negotiable.



Core stiffness is also universal, meaning that you do not need to be an athlete to find the value in it - everyday movements like lifting a child/grocery, cleaning your home, playing an instrument (as one of my clients describes their flute playing is better than ever by engaging core strength while playing).

Coming from a marketing and business development background, Anderson is used to potential customers hanging up the phone or not even taking the call. However, that's not been his experience at all with TimberHut!

"What we're finding in this is that if we target the right customers directly, they always pick up the phone. Everyone seems to be interested in our products and our novel approach to design and fabrication," he noted. "Our products speak for themselves. Getting that initial call to action is a lot more efficient than in other industries. With our trajectory right now, we stand to be a nationally-recognized brand name in the next

few years." Anderson is looking forward to "big things" that are coming very soon.

"We are considering a major production relationship with a national commercial contractor to produce units regionally," he said. "We'd still do most of the research, development and prototyping locally but production likely will occur at a number of geographies next year."

TimberHut's production capacity will grow from 50 to 75 units in 2023 to over 250 in 2024. He added, "There are a couple of high-profile projects in Chautauqua County that we, if all goes well, will be able to announce soon!" duction run of 50 of the collectibles on the first day they were available to the public, despite the fact that the pins hadn't even been produced yet.

HOT WING DESIGNS IS GOING PLACES

Over the past year, the production capabilities at Hot Wing Designs have increased exponentially, as Culver added pieces of equipment to his basement workshop that eliminate costly steps, bypass a few 'middlemen' and give him the flexibility to output as little as one hat or one sticker at a time. He admits he learned a great deal about how to outfit his workshop with the machines necessary to expand his business from long-time business acquaintance, Jim Sessanna, of Quality Imprints in Colden, NY.

"Jim's been in the screenprinting and embroidery business for decades," Culver explained. He added his sincere appreciation for Sessanna, saying, "We've been doing business together for a long time now and he was sympathetic to my situation, so he opened his back door and showed me all the equipment I would need to get on my feet and produce hats myself."

Now equipped with his own heat press for hats, Culver is able to order embroidered patches in bulk and create his own finished product on-site.

The lion's share of the Hot Wing Designs marketing campaign comes by word of mouth, as well as through personal contact with band members, band management and fans. In fact, Culver is not shy about walking right up to the stage and putting his cartoon creations directly into the hands of the musicians themselves. He says the performers have always accepted his artwork with child-like enthusiasm and heartfelt appreciation.

The Hot Wing Designs pop-up tent has been a staple at various outdoor events where Culver mostly sells hats and stickers, but also offers custom t-shirts created on the spot with his mobile production facility. Last year, he teamed with 42 North Brewery for their entire "Tap Trekker" Series of events, which featured live music, craft beer and lifestyle vendors and was held at various locations throughout Western New York.

As winter's weak grip loosens altogether and temps climb even higher this spring, Culver's artwork will be front and center at a number of warm-weather venues and fun events.

"I'm really looking forward to setting up at the East Aurora holiday market the day before

Easter," Culver said. "I'm already registered for a bunch of other events this summer, but the biggest one for me will probably be the Cobblestone Live music festival at the Buffalo Iron Works in July."

The former owner of Slider's snowboard and bike shop just down the road from the Kissing Bridge ski area in Colden, snow sports have been a part of Culver's life since he rode the ski school bus to KB with his high school sweetheart (and now wife, Jen). Few people know this, but back in the late '90's, Culver was actually one of the very first people in all of Western New York who understood the process for learning how to ride a snowboard, and as manager of KB's first staff of snowboard instructors, he actually helped "write the book" on how to teach the newest way to slide down a hill.

Because of his long-standing affiliation with the ski industry, Culver also took advantage of opportunities for the Hot Wing Designs tent to "pop-up" at various locations this past winter such as at Swain ski area's recent winter carnival, held last weekend.

Without setting limits for himself, Culver's upcoming projects include creating a star-studded coloring book that features all his favorite big-name characters - think the Rolling Stones, Prince and Michael Jackson! At the moment, he's also working on illustrations for a children's book, which was authored by a friend in the mountain biking community.

"I'm really trying to stay creative and keep working for other people as a freelance graphic designer and illustrator," he said. "I'm also focused on trying to grow the sticker business into something that's sustainable down the road."

Toward the end of our long conversation, my friend of 25 years sat back in his chair, sighed and explained his situation in this way:

"I wouldn't have picked this direction. I was the marketing director of the largest private ski area in North America and I was home there - so I didn't see myself changing directions - but it's been a good thing in a way... People think I'm crazy when I say that stage 4 cancer has had some positive effects, but it has. I've slowed down quite a bit. I'm not in such a hurry to do things and I definitely put a value on spending more time with friends and family."

Grateful to have been able to hear his story, I still couldn't resist asking one last question. If you have the talent to recreate the likeness of almost anything you see, how did you decide on a smiling, hot chicken wing as the face of your new enterprise?

Reflective of his deeply-felt connection to his roots, Culver explained, "I wanted the image of my services to reflect where I was from."

it back inside, it helped us a lot and we were able to get to the foul line and shoot a lot of free throws."

Out of the locker room to start the second half, the Eagles used a "Win one for the Gipper" speech by Coach McCann as the driving force behind a huge, third quarter comeback that all-but erased the 27-11 deficit Ellicottville found itself in at the half.

"We came out firing on all cylinders," recalled senior guard Gian Nuzzo, who scored seven of his team-high eight points in the epic, third quarter comeback alone. "At halftime, coach gave us a good game plan to change our mindsets and we really came out firing!"

Nuzzo nailed a three-point shot that fired up the Ellicottville crowd and pulled the Eagles to within three points with just under two minutes to play in the third quarter, then Panama called the quick timeout to stop the bleeding; however, the Eagles' suddenly stingy defense ended up with the ball immediately out of the stoppage in play and Nuzzo found the ball in his hot hands once more. With a strong move to the basket, he drove the lane and convinced a finger-roll layup to drop; and with 50 seconds left in the quarter, the Panthers' 16-point halftime advantage had blown away, like dust in the wind.

Unfortunately for the Eagles and their fans, however, that's as good as it ever got. "Once we started playing our game in the third quarter, we were fine," McCann explained of his team's big rally. "But in coming back from that 16-point deficit, we kind of started to run out of gas."

Out of the timeout between the third and fourth quarters, the Panthers extended their lead, then came up with a quick defensive stop, which led to another quick bucket and in the blink of an eye, Panama's lead was back in the double digits once more and the dream of a Class D championship was over in EVL.

Post-game, Eagles players pointed with pride to the great season they ended up having especially after beginning the year with losses in six of their first eight games. "We faced a lot of adversity this year," Nuzzo explained. "We had injuries and foul troubles and it took us awhile to get everyone in the right mindset, but we figured out our true identity, turned it around, went on our (8-game) winning streak and won our league. I couldn't be more proud of the things our team did this year."

The Eagles finish the 2022-'23 campaign with a 14-8 record overall, including a dominant run from Christmas break until the end of the season, in which Ellicottville prevailed in an impressive 12 of its final 14 games.

Once again reinforcing her coach's evaluation, Alexander talked about the almost surreal feeling of the way neither team could score points, saying, "Keeping them to just 29 points tonight is crazy - and then us scoring just 17 points without hitting a single (three-point shot) in the whole game is pretty crazy, too!"

And just to prove it was not all gloom and doom for the Lady Eagles in this one, it should be noted that Ellicottville actually led this game with about four minutes to go in the first half, as center Ryah Quinn hit on a six-foot jump shot to make the score 8-7, Ellicottville. Later on in the fourth quarter, Ellicottville battled back and cut the Lady Wildcats' double-digit lead to just a two-score margin, 22-17, with under five minutes left in the game.

So it was that close midway through the final quarter, that a three and a layup would've tied the thing for Ellicottville, despite the fact that they trailed for all but about 30 seconds in the game. Unfortunately for Ellicottville, Sherman was the team which scored next - and they scored next after that and then that was all she wrote.

While you could say that the Lady Eagles' offense completely abandoned them in the biggest game of the year, that would only partially explain the team's smallest point total in any of the 22 games it played this year. In fact, the Sherman defense proved to be every bit as tenacious and unyielding as Coach Rozler's girls - plus a little bit more.

Speaking on how effectively the Lady Wildcats played defense, Rozler explained, "We had to rely on outside shots (when we could get them) and they just weren't falling. When we passed it on the inside, we couldn't hang on to the ball. They would strip it from us, or we either couldn't catch it or it'd go off of our leg."

Leading up to their semifinal appearance at JCC last week, the Lady Eagles had been on fire, winning 14 of their final 15 contests, including a complete beat-down of league competition in the Cattaraugus-Chautauqua Athletic Association's East 2 division. In 10 CCAA East 2 league games this season, the Ellicottville ladies were a perfect 10-0 and racked up nearly twice as many points per game as their competitors. On average, the Lady Eagles offense dropped 52.3 points per game on opponents, while their stingy, smothering defense allowed only a measly 26.4 points per game against.

For those watching from the stands this season, many of the Lady Eagles' league games were effectively 'over' by halftime, and in some of those games, the contest had all but been decided before the opposing coach could call their first timeout of the game.

The Lady Eagles' success in 2022-'23 was powered in large part by senior forward Allison Rowland and the junior floor general, Alexander. Rowland was equally a threat on both sides of the ball and was at the heart of her team's ball-hawking defense this season. Rowland's scoring mark of 174 points trailed only Alexander for the team lead this season and ranked her #17 in all of Class D for scoring in 2022-'23. The senior forward was the team's leading rebounder this season, and with 166 boards pulled down, she owned the 6th best tally for all Class D rebounders.

The junior point-scorer Alexander led all Lady Eagles in 2022-'23 with 224 points - almost half of which came on a whopping, 36 three-point shots! Her points total was the 12th highest in all of Class D this year, but more impressively, her tally of 102 steals qualified Alexander as the second-best ball thief in the conference this year.

Center Ryah Quinn was the end of the line for many opponents' scoring chances in 2022-'23, as the defensive-minded senior in the middle of the paint hauled in 146 rebounds and blocked 12 shots. Those totals put her in 11th place among all players in Class D for rebounds and 12th place for blocks, respectively.

Forward Natalee Leiper had a strong sophomore campaign, scoring 140 points and hauling in 86 rebounds. Leiper also added 41 steals to her impressive stats totals on the season.

Guards Addison John and Ande Northrup tied for fourth place on the team in scoring with 98 points. A rock-solid, all-around contributor in every game she appeared in, John filled out the stat sheets on her line with 44 rebounds, 34 steals and 32 assists.

Just a freshman in 2022-'23, Northrup served notice to the entire CCAA that she will be a long-range scoring threat and front-line defender for years to come, as the young guard knocked down 19 three-point shots. That total was the 16th most three's scored by any shooter in Class D this year.


