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

ELLICOTTVILLE WALKING TOUR

Enjoy a Self-Guided Trek Through our Historic Village; Updated Brochure Available

Visitors and local community members alike will appreciate an updated Walking Tour of significant parts of Ellicottville which introduces people to the varied architectural styles we boast in our beautiful, well-preserved early buildings. Ellicottville has two names: The native name for this location was 'De-as-hen-da-qua,' or 'place for holding court' and 'Ellicottville,' likely since 1818 when the Holland Land Company opened an office here. Our wonderful public buildings were constructed quickly since Ellicottville was designated county seat of Cattaraugus County in 1808. The village became incorporated in 1837 but the county seat was eventually moved over the hill to Little Valley in 1868 due to better railroad access. Today, so many of those buildings and places are listed in the National Register of Historic Places. (The Ellicottville Historic District, Ellicottville Town Hall, and Jefferson Street Cemetery).

Ellen Frank, Town Historian relates that, "Ellicottville was named in honor of Joseph Ellicott who was in charge of the survey of the Holland Land Company lands in Western NY. Ellicott became its General Agent for the sale of these lands. The Holland Land Company opened an office of Ellicottville in 1818. Ellicott laid out the village (lots, streets, and village square) for the future village and to allow for growth, something often lacking in villages that expanded without plans. The public square was divided into quarters. Upon Joseph Ellicott's instruction, the 4 corners were to be used for public spaces: education, religion and two lots for the County buildings (Court House and the Clerk's office)."

As you look around, you will notice that this geographic region is surrounded by incredibly rich forests, with an abundance of hardwoods. With the presence of fast-moving streams, log milling was a natural source of industry. Our first sawmill was built in 1821, two miles east of Ellicottville's village, which marked the beginning of our lumbering industry. Aside from lumber, shoe last manufacturing took hold and, prior to the introduction of plastic, Ellicottville was the world center for shoe last block manufacturing. Our museum has several examples of these shoe lasts (basically a shoe form) which were made to build leather shoes on them. Bowling pins, Louisville Slugger baseball bats, baskets, wooden toys, logs, lumber, and dimension products were produced in this community. Today, the lumber products are sold throughout the United States, Canada, Europe and Pacific Rim countries through Fitzpatrick and Weller (established in 1895), whose offices and plant are located on 12 Mill Street.

Other industries included cheese making, a condensed milk factory (Borden Co.), leather tanning, high-grade hosiery, novelty boxes, playpens, upholstered chairs, and office equipment. In 1905, Ellicottville opened its own Electric Light Company. Burrell Cutlery, in operation since 1940 when they manufactured straight razors and surgical equipment, morphed into household cutlery and knives after WWII. Closed for the past few years, owner and village mayor, John Burrell, has re-invigorated knife making with TopFlight Early American Cutlery. There is just no stopping us.

Of course, then came skiing with the beginnings - a rope tow first on Fish Hill and then Greer Hill. Fish Hill began its new adventure in 1936, with a rope tow which was the second to be established in the state. Greer Hill started two years later. In your tour of houses in Ellicottville, check out #13, 25 Adams Street at the corner of Martha (go straight up to the bend from the Edelweiss Lodge). This magnificent home was first built in 1843 by banker and land agent, Theodore Smith. In 1900, it was owned by Colonel David B. Parker who held a post with the U.S. Postal Service during President Grant's administration. The original horse block and hitching post are still in place, there were two fountains on the property fed by natural springs, and it housed a grand ballroom, the site of many social events in those early years. In later years, it was purchased by Ellicottville's beloved Dr. Leyens and his wife where he saw patients regularly. Before he sold it, he struggled to maintain repairs inside, telling this writer in his broken German accent, "It is a white elephant 'Kaahrol' – the [decorative] plaster ceilings will knock you out when they fall." Thankfully, the building has been restored and is worth the trip to see even from the outside. Back to skiing, there are old photos showing skiers gathered on the side lot to the left of 25 Adams which was 38 Martha (numbers are changed now). An old tow rope went up there, right from the village which took skiers to Greer Hill. The fun of these tips about town is the history and the interweaving of places in the village.

Here's an example, still speaking about skiing, but now Holiday Valley. The roots of ownership of that property go back to Chauncey J. Fox, who was an early pioneer of Ellicottville. In 1855, he purchased a house built in 1835 for his family on 2 Elk Street, #27 on the tour

2024 has already proven to be a big year for Ellicottville's specialty sock destination, but the excitement isn't limited to the 14731 zip code. Later this spring, the Purple Doorknob is opening a second location in the heart of Buffalo's Elmwood Village, and Himes can't wait to get started!

Himes' journey with the Purple Doorknob began in 2017 when a friend who worked at the store one day a week let her know that she was going to be leaving. "I thought, 'That sounds like a fun job,' and she officially introduced Rachel and I, and I took over her position there when she left," Himes recalled. In 2018, she expressed interest in working more hours at the store, and Northrup-McGee began involving her more in the business. "In 2020, Rachel was pregnant with her second child, and she wanted to have the opportunity to be home more once he was born," Himes explained. "She and Scotty came to me and offered me the promotion [of store manager]!"

Since taking on the management position, Himes' role includes ordering inventory (one of her favorite parts of the job), managing employees, handling schedules, and more. "Rachel, Scotty, and I have a lot of complementary strengths," noted Himes. "It's fun being on a team together. One of the things that I excel in is my organizational skills, and that works very well for ordering inventory. I really like that it is a combination of that and creativity, because it's fun trying to find new products, guess what people will be into, and keep everything fresh."

Himes' new role as co-owner aligns perfectly with a long-time goal of Northrup-Mc-Gee and McGee - opening a second location. "My husband and I are planning to move to Buffalo this year," said Himes. "I went to them with a lot of notice and shared our timeline... I said, 'I might have to help you find a new manager before I leave, unless you think you might be interested in doing that second location. We started talking about that and the opportunity just worked out!"

The new store is located at 744 Elmwood Avenue in the former location of Campus WheelWorks across the street from SPoT Coffee. "It's a great location," said Himes. "It's very close to Watson's Chocolates, which is funny because we're very close to Watson's Chocolates in Ellicottville, too!" The Purple Doorknob team has a projected opening date later this spring, and in the meantime the team is hard at work making the space their own. "We have a very specific look," Himes noted. "We've got a lot of painting and designing to do to get the vibe we're looking for established."

While Campus WheelWorks occupied two storefronts, Himes explained that the Purple Doorknob will only occupy one; however, she is thrilled that a popular Buffalo retail shop, Queen City Vintage, is going to be moving their store to the space next to 744 Elmwood. "They sell vintage clothing and accessories, but they specialize in sports-themed merchandise - vintage Bills and Sabres merchandise and clothing." The store is a great complement to the Purple Doorknob, which began carrying Buffalo Bills socks last year - one of the store's most popular items of late.

The new location provides the perfect opportunity to carry their customers' favorites, as well as new brands they have not been able to carry in Ellicottville, due to proximity to other retailers who carry those brands. Pop culture-themed socks, snarky socks, holiday-themed socks, baby socks, kids socks, and more can all be found at the new location. "We'll definitely want to keep what people love," said Himes, speaking of the humorous socks they carry. "We love when people come in and walk around and actually laugh out loud to each other about something that they find!"

The response from the Purple Doorknob's current customers has been overwhelmingly positive, said Himes. "People are excited about us being in Buffalo; that makes us more readily accessible for some of our customers who live there. We have posters hung up in the window saying that we're coming soon, and while we're there doing the work, it's really cool seeing people walk by and take pictures of our sign. It seems like people are excited!"

For online shopping, customers can still visit www.purpledoorknob.com, but Himes noted that the Buffalo location will have its own social media account, as events and some products will differ from the Ellicottville location. 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
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
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

Over \$10,000 Raised at Inaugural Ski Race at Holiday Valley

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


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

Lucky for us he's bringing his "Cab In A Solo Tour" to Seneca Allegany Resort & Casino on Saturday, April 13th.

The Best New Artist winner at the Academy of Country Music Awards in April 2012 debuted his first album, Clear As Day, in October 2011, making history as the first solo album of a country act to debut at #1 on Billboard's 200, as well as the youngest man to open at the top of the chart with his debut release.

The singer/songwriter's road to the top had him paying his dues with parade performances, tree lighting ceremonies and conquering the National Anthem before World Series games... but the biggest test came after the loss of his first record

McCreery could have let that end his career, but instead he picked himself up and moved on, leading him to where he is now with the release of his new album, Rise and Fall, dropping on May 10th. "I feel like we're on the rise now, but I've fallen pretty low as well," said the singer. "I learned from every little part of that, and it helped me to know who I was as a person, let alone an artist. The rises and the falls helped craft these songs from the album... they made this album what it is."

You already know the hits from the album so far such as "Cab In A Solo", "Can't Pass The Bar", "Love Like This" (a song about his son, Avery) and the newly released single, "Slow Dance", which you will hear at his show along with other hits like "It Matters To Her" and "Five More Minutes".

I was very fortunate to be able to catch up with McCreery recently and we talked about American Idol and the impact that it has had on his life. We also talked about a dream come true - one he has had since a child - becoming a member of the Grand Ole Opry. During his performance in December at the Opry, out came one of his idols, Garth Brooks, holding a Christmas present with a big bow on it and offered it up to McCreery and officially invited him to become a member.

His actual induction ceremony will be on April 20th when another idol of his, Josh Turner, will officially welcome him as the newest member. Watching from the audience will be the two people that mean everything in the world to him: his wife, Gabi and his son, Avery, born in October of 2022.

McCreery is looking forward to his stop at Seneca Allegany Resort & Casino and he has a message at the end of the conversation for his fans. Don't miss this one. Get your tickets today!

A Conversation with Scotty

HULICK: We're looking forward to your "Cab In A Solo Tour" making a stop at Seneca Allegany Resort & Casino on April 13th. I know your tour started with back-to-back sold-out shows. How is the tour going?

McCREERY: Thank you. The band and I are excited to come. The "Cab in a Solo Tour" is just a two-month tour, so it officially ends March 15th. But we'll be using the same new set and show that we had on the "Cab" tour throughout the spring. We started off with three sold-out shows, which is a great way to kick off 2024, and have just kept on going!

HULICK: So many artists I have interviewed have a Buffalo/Western New York connection somewhere in their past. Do you have a Buffalo connec-

McCREERY: I do not. We've played at Seneca Allegany Resort & Casino before and had a great time, but I don't have a connection there.

HULICK: Did you always want to have a career in the music industry? What

would you have been if you didn't pursue music?

McCREERY: I knew since I was young that I wanted to be a performer. I would have gone to Nashville to study music business either at Belmonth University or MTSU so that I could learn and pitch myself as a singer for the proported labels if life hadn't revealed a different neth for me. record labels if life hadn't revealed a different path for me. I never wanted to be anything else.

HULICK: Your grandmother gave you a book on Elvis Presley when you were a kid and he is one of your music idols. It's always fun at concerts when the artist does a cover song of someone they love. Have you done any covers of Elvis' music?

McCREERY: She did, as well as a cassette tape that had Elvis on one side and Little Richard on the other. I wore that tape out. Those two artists were amazing. I do some Elvis from time to time, as well as Little Richard. You never know when I might be doing one of their songs.

HULICK: Let's talk American Idol a bit. Whose idea was it for you to audition for the show?

McCREERY: I was a fan of the show and watched it regularly with my family. I thought, "why not try it? Probably won't make the first cut, but it will be a fun experience and a story to share with my friends." And maybe, just maybe, I'd get to meet Jennifer Lopez! Little did I know...

HULICK: Do you think American Idol grounded you and gave you a solid placement to begin your career?

McCREERY: "American Idol" introduced me to the general public, gave me a great education in performing as well as things like media interviews and more. But I never set out to be the "TV guy." I wanted to be a country music singer, so even though I got a record deal as part of winning the show, I had to prove to the fans that I belonged. I had some ups and downs along the way, but I learned a lot and I feel like my team and I have been able to have some success. One of the first things I learned was that you had to surround yourself with good, honest people who believed in you and would work hard with you. I'm fortunate to have a great team. You may just see my face and name, but there's a team of people that stand shoulder to shoulder with me as we accomplish things together.

HULICK: You are a singer/songwriter, mentor and an author. Are there any other facets of the industry that you would like to tackle down the road? McCREERY: I've executive produced a couple of Hallmark movies based on my song, "Five More Minutes." It might be fun to do more of that. As I have learned more in the studio, it might be fun to actually produce my song or album at some point. But we'll see... I love being a singer and a songwriter.

HULICK: 2023 was a huge year for you and your career. You were inducted into the North Carolina Hall of Fame joining Charlie Daniels, Eric Church, Ronnie Milsap, Randy Travis and more, along with being asked to join the Grand Ole Opry by one of your idols, Garth Brooks. WOW! Can you talk a little bit about those two experiences?

McCREERY: I am so proud to be from North Carolina, which is a state that

has a huge musical history. I was very honored when I was told I was going into the North Carolina Hall of Fame. In addition to those great talents you mention, folks like James Taylor, Andy Griffith, Nina Simone, Earl Scruggs, Doc Watson, and Thelonious Monk are also past inductees. It's a night I'll always treasure. As for the Opry, I've wanted to be a member of the Grand Ole Opry since I was young. It's my favorite stage to perform on because all the greats in country music have performed there. To have one of my musical heroes, Garth Brooks, surprise me on stage with the invitation was something I'll never forget. I get to officially join the Opry family in a few months - a family that has included Dolly Parton, Josh Turner, Johnny Cash, Hank Williams Sr., Loretta Lynn, Darius Rucker, Alan Jackson, Bill Anderson, Charley Pride, and so many more. How amazing is that!

HULICK: You married Gabi Dugal in June of 2018 and your son, Avery was born in October of 2022. How much do you enjoy being a husband and a

McCREERY: Gabi is my rock, my best friend, the love of my life. And together we have Avery who is the coolest little man. I love being a father - it's my favorite and most important job. As long as I have the two of them with me, I'm good no matter what happens.

HULICK: Do they tour with you?

McCREERY: As often as they can. Sometimes they stay home to have a bit of a regular life, but they are out on the road with me the majority of the time. I don't want to miss a thing with Avery.

Core Performance: That's a Stretch... Learn How to Stretch Your Body Correctly

Stretching is a kind of generic word we hear all the time from trainers, therapists and even doctors. We are continuously reminded of the many benefits that come along with performing this simple task but typically do not take the time or even have the know-how to complete an effective and efficient stretching routine. As we age, many of us are experiencing stiffness and tightness in our backs, hips and legs. This tightness can be lessened and even prevented by stretching muscles around the knees and hips like the IT band, the adductors, the quads, and hip flexors.

While the tendency is to focus solely on the lower body, it should be stressed that the upper body should not be overlooked. Your upper body is home to your "tower of power". By strengthening and stretching your entire torso, you are creating an injury resistant and stabilized core that acts as the fulcrum for all motion. Your shoulder protocol should focus on stretching the shoulder and its many attachments like the triceps, biceps, pectoral muscles, deltoids, and rotator cuffs - moving them through full range of motion.

There are three kinds of stretching. Combine them strategically (yet simply) and you'll prepare your muscles to expand and contract quickly, upping your flexibility and promoting healing between workouts and daily activities.

- DYNAMIC STRETCHING is moving your arms and legs through a range of motion without stopping to hold any single position. This is a good way to stretch before a work-out or right after a light cardio warmup.
- STATIC STRETCHING is stretching a muscle as far as you can without pain and then holding it there for typically 15-30 seconds. This form of stretching is best completed after a workout or after completing some form of strenuous activity. Static stretching is important because when you stretch a muscle, sensory receptors pick up the info and send it to the central nervous system, which signals your muscles to contract. If you hold steady, your muscle will relax to protect itself.
- MYOFASCIAL STRETCHING applies pressure to different muscles by sliding parts of your body over a foam roller. This form of stretching can be done anytime and actually hits the fascia the membranes that surrounds the muscles. Translation: you are bulldozing knots so muscles can contract without grinding against each other.



If you are interested in learning more about stretching, Core Performance offers a weekly Deep Stretch Class every Tuesday morning at 7:00am. 




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

guide. It is the rambling white house on Elizabeth and Elk, across from the United Church of Ellicottville (#26 – originally built in 1852 with locally produced bricks) with the astonishing original wrought iron fencing surrounding it. You can't miss it. Now, Chauncey Fox Jr. had the house on 52 Jefferson (#20) built in mid-1850s. He died there. His son, George moved further up the road to where you enter Holiday Valley, and built a farm on both sides of the road. The house was on the left where the Ellicottville Depot (itself an historic treasure) stands, and Holiday Valley Road was nothing but a dirt road leading to the pasture where the cattle grazed. Imagine, the hills skiers shush down for fun today are the same ones the Fox kids had to run up every day to go "fetch the cows." Not so much fun.

Unfortunately, the guide doesn't give you these personal insights, but it certainly helps you to discover the amazing architecture and history of this wonderful old village. The brochures can be obtained at the Chamber of Commerce building (where ellicottvilleNOW has its office) and at the Historical Society when it is open during the summer months. Guided walking tours by our Town Historian, Ellen Frank, are available during the summer months. Ellen brings the history of our settlers and community members alive. Enjoy Ellicottville... "Doesn't this place feel great?"
