

\$9 MILLION IN UPGRADES

Holiday Valley Announces Capital Improvement Projects to be Completed for the 2023-24 Ski Season, Including New Chairlift, Inn Renovations and More



ELLICOTTVILLE - Holiday Valley is preparing for a busy summer of upgrades, highlighted by the installation of a new, state-of-the-art High Speed 6 Pack Chairlift that will replace the Mardi Gras High Speed Quad, thus allowing for two extra people to load each chair during peak operating times. Holiday Valley will purchase the lift from Doppelmayr USA out of Salt Lake City, UT, with whom the resort has a long standing relationship

Additional investments include: a three-year renovation project on The Inn at Holiday Valley, the purchase of a new PistenBully 600 snow groomer, continued investments into the snowmaking system, and renovations to John Harvard's at the Tamarack Club. In total, Holiday Valley plans to invest upwards of \$9 million back into the resort as it prepares for the 2023-24 winter season.

"It's wonderful and exciting to continue to grow Holiday Valley and offer more to our guests," said Holiday Valley President and General Manager, Dennis Eshbaugh. "Our mission is to create fun for every visitor and our mantra is quality first.'

The Holiday Valley Mountain Operations team will do the majority of the 6 Pack build, as they have done with all of the chairlift projects at the resort.

Approximately 35 rooms per year will be renovated at The Inn for the next three years until all 102 rooms are complete. A small convenience store will also be built into the lobby area, which will allow guests easier access to snacks and drinks. The Inn at Holiday Valley first opened in the 1994-95 winter season.

A new PistenBully 600 snow groomer will be added to the Holiday Valley grooming fleet. This groomer is not only perfect for maintaining the slopes of the resort in terms of its efficiency and operation but it is also lighter than any groomer in its class and more environmentally friendly.

This past winter has showcased just how important a strong snowmaking system is to the success of Holiday Valley. More automation will be added to the system, allowing the Snowmaking Team to maximize its efficiency. Additionally, aging water and air pipelines will be extracted from the ground and replaced with new lines in order to create an even more effective snowmaking infrastructure throughout the resort.

This fall, John Harvard's, the restaurant at the Tamarack Club, will be undergoing a redesign that will open the space up more and see a new design to the bar area, thus providing guests with fantastic views of the slopes while they dine.

CHANGES ARE ON THE HORIZON

HoliMont Partners with World-Renowned Mountain Resort Planner

It's not by chance that the world's most well-known destination ski resorts are so successful - in fact, it's by design! By developing a master plan, resorts become well positioned to meet the needs of their members and attract more, improve their services and facilities, and ensure future sustainability and continued growth. HoliMont recently invited world-renowned mountain resort planners Ecosign (ECOlogical De-SIGN) to the resort to begin the process of developing a master plan, and Snowsports Director Travis Widger is enthusiastic about the positive changes on the horizon.

According to Widger, this is HoliMont's first formal master plan, and Ecosign was the ideal choice for a consulting firm. "Ecosign has completed over 450 resort development projects in 47 countries spanning six continents, including six Olympic Winter Games and several Alpine World Ski Championships," he explained. "The decision to choose Ecosign was a collaboration between our Leadership Team and Board of Directors to help HoliMont stay true to our 'Keep Building' Core Value."

Ecosign was founded by Paul Mathews in Whistler, British Columbia, Canada in 1975 and has focused its mission around designing "the most efficient, humanly pleasing mountain resorts in the world." Toward that end, the consulting firm has been providing services such as resort and ski area master plans, resort village design, four season recreational planning, competitive snow facilities design, and more for nearly 50 years.

Widger noted that HoliMont's big picture-goal is to be a four-season resort with offerings for members and guests 12 months of the year. The next two to three years will comprise the planning and growth stages for the resort, with continued improvements and enhancements to the summer and winter venues. During Ecosign's visit, the team hosted a Stakeholders Address during which they shared their background and experience in resort planning, as well as their goals for HoliMont, which directly address the resort's big-picture goal of becoming a four-season destination. The consulting firm shared project examples from all over the world including Whistler Blackcomb and Sun Peaks Ski Resort in British Columbia, Canada; Changbaishan International Ski Resort in Jilin, China; Le Massif de Charlevoix in Quebec, Canada; and Ruka in Kuusamo, Finland.

For HoliMont, the largest private ski club in the U.S., Ecosign's plans include recommendations to increase membership and limit membership attrition and assess the resort's financial health to identify areas that can be improved to ensure long-term sustainability. Other goals include assessing summer recreation offerings and recommending ways to improve or create new amenities and analyzing existing guest services to identify inefficiencies and develop concepts for improvements. With growth in mind, Ecosign also plans to analyze HoliMont's capacity and consider terrain expansions or other ways to optimize the resort area.

Widger said the address, which was followed by an open comment and questions section, was well received by members who were "positive, curious, and hopeful" about Ecosign's vision for HoliMont. "I feel they will be a great fit for HoliMont and had lots of great questions and insight during their first site visit," he said. "They were impressed with the family atmosphere and number of young families and children skiing and riding."



AUNT DEB STEIN'S MUSTARD

Local Mustard Maker Announces New Products for Spring

By day, she's Debbie Stein, Human Resources manager at HoliMont Ski Resort. By night (and weekend), she's Aunt Deb, maker of the local hot mustard brand that is so popular, people buy it by the case. This spring, Stein is looking forward to sharing some new spicy condiments with her customers who aren't afraid of a little heat!

Stein has been making her hot mustard recipe for many years for her family and close friends, but last year, she went "pro" at the urging of her husband and children.

"My husband and I used to go to a bowling alley in Randolph, and the woman who owned it used to serve it but would never give her recipe out," she explained. Before Twilight Lanes closed permanently, the owner gave Stein the recipe, much to her surprise! Ever since then, Stein has enjoyed making it, with some minor changes to meet state requirements.



For Stein to become a small-scale food processor, she had to obtain a Processing License through the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets. After many online courses, tests, and trips to Cornell University in Ithaca, Stein obtained this license, which is required for the sale of any food item that is altered by baking, canning, preserving, freezing, dehydrating, pickling, brining, bottling, and more. Requirements vary based on the type of product being made and sold.

"Because mustard is considered an 'acidified food,' I had to send the recipe to Cornell to get it approved," Stein explained. "They have to test all the ingredients and each batch to make sure nobody can get sick from it. This approval makes it 'legal' to sell."

Once Stein received her processing kitchen license and had her recipe approved, she set up shop in the former Brooks Market in Little Valley. "My husband and I remodeled the kitchen in the back, and that's where I make it. The kitchen had to be approved through the Department of Ag and Markets, and I get tested every few months," she explained. "It's been great! Right now, I can't make enough mustard!"

So what is it about Aunt Deb Stein's Hot Mustard that makes it so appealing? "I use either Hungarian or hot wax peppers or inferno peppers," Stein said. "We try to grow most ourselves, but some we do buy. That's the major ingredient. I make a milder version every now and again, but it's the hot mustard people really seem to like. I had both the mild and hot recipes approved by Cornell."

Speaking of recipe approval, Stein is excited to share the news that her recipe for hot pepper jelly has recently been approved. "I'm just waiting on approval for my mango hot pepper jelly," she added. "I check my email ten times a day! I also have my hot salsa recipe approved. I think it tastes best on pork. My husband is a hunter, and on game meat, he says it tastes really good. The mustard makes a great dip - I bring it to work with pretzels. With cream cheese and crackers, it's really good!"

Word is spreading about Aunt Deb Stein's Hot Mustard. Over the past year, Stein has been selling large quantities at small craft shows, and her mustard is also available at local businesses including HoliMont, the Jenny Lee Feed Mill in Cattaraugus, and Sixt Lumber in Little Valley.

Due to the cost of shipping heavy jars, Stein doesn't do a lot of mail orders; however, customers can contact her through Facebook or email and make a plan for local pickup at one of the businesses that carry her products.

"The folks at HoliMont have been great about letting me put it in the office," she said. "We get a lot of walk-ins at HoliMont and boy, do they buy mustard! Sometimes they ski, too."



How a Woman from Salamanca Made National News with a Soup Can and a Gun

This is an old story. Perhaps one local old-timers from Salamanca will remember all too well, but one worth retelling for the chuckle factor.

My knowledge of these events all started when I called Swan Street Florists to order some flowers to be delivered. The transaction eventually took several phone conversations because there was a delivery delay due to a storm. I don't know about you, but for me, these many conversations mean I have a new BFF and before long, we were sharing stories. One thing led to another, and my new BFF James said, "You really ought to call our previous owner, Carol, who is now retired. She has a funny story about some things that went on here years ago." (Her daughter, Amy Rivera, now owns the shop.)

AN EASY TARGET

Carol Ellis is the daughter of Leonard and Shirley Weatherly who raised four kids on Swan Street running what was then Leonard's Grocery as a second-generation owner. Apparently, the store was an easy mark. It was burglarized many times. Leonard was likely an easy target because he was handicapped with cerebral palsy, limiting use of one of his arms. Born above the store, he spent his whole life there, running it with his wife for forty years. When he turned 60, his daughter, Carol, concerned for his physical limitations, suggested he sell the store to her.

And so it happened that he did. On the very day he sold her the store (September 1984), after it was closed for the evening, Carol's sister, Elizabeth, had come in from Florida for the festivities. There was a TV in the store, so she stopped in to hang around and watch.

No sooner was Carol setting down the punch bowl for the community celebration they were having the next day when the door flew open and in walked a man in a trench coat with a stocking over his face and a gun in his hand, announcing a robbery. Now, Carol, being an old hand at facing off would-be burglars (it happened several times before) knew she had to not only subdue him somehow, but also keep him there for the police or she could not press charges if he got away. She learned this from previous robberies when the bad guys got away, were found later, but were not apprehended on the property or with goods so nothing happened.

She wasn't letting that happen again.

As for the gun, she had toy guns waved at her before. She was fearless as she grabbed the stocking off his face (thinking he would be someone she knew – he was not). She yelled to her sister to lock the door and call 911 which must have made him rethink things as he tried to get out of there. But by then, Carol had grabbed a tomato soup can and clocked him on the head with it, got him down, grabbed the gun and smacked him with that and got on top of him to hold him down. When he tried to get up, she yelled to her sister to help come sit on him. When he struggled, she told her sister to kick him in his most vulnerable spot to which her sister said, "I can't, you are sitting on..."

Which is how the police found them - sitting on the bad guy.

Apparently, this story, retold to the grand jury had the ladies on the jury positively tittering, and supporting Carol completely. Incidentally, the wanna-be thief was not a local kid, as Carol had assumed, pre-unveiling. He was a vagrant from Lackawanna. He headed to Salamanca because he heard about the one-armed store owner who was a pushover.

And, oh yes, the gun was real and had one shot loaded in the chamber. Carol Ellis recalls the fact that it did not discharge a "God wink." Undeterred, they had the community celebration the next day as planned.

FROM GROCERIES TO GARDENIAS

Finally, after two years of jumping every time the door closed in the grocery store at night, Carol decided to switch gears and started selling flowers. After all, what better thing is there to do with a four-door beer cooler???

This story made local news, then Buffalo news and then, somehow found its way to the news desk of American radio broadcaster for ABC News, Paul Harvey. His programs reached as many as 24 million people per week. If you were glued to your radio back in September of 1984 you might have heard mention of this story about the fearless Weatherly sisters in Salamanca, NY. Some stories are just worth re-telling.

Area Organizations Share Nearly \$275,000 in Grant Funding in Early 2023

OLEAN - Four donor designated funds at the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation have together supported \$274,753 in grants to organizations designated by their donors so far this year. The Mildred Milliman Fund, established by Mildred Milliman, made possible grants to 34 organizations, together totaling \$234,735.

The largest grant, \$196,021 to the Olean General Hospital Foundation, will support the purchase of a new phacoemulsification machine, which breaks up and removes lenses of the eyes that are affected by cataracts, according to Steve Jackson, Olean General Hospital Foundation president. According to Jackson, the machine allows for a procedure that utilizes ultrasonic technology to break up cataracts into smaller pieces that can then be easily extracted.

The second largest grant from the fund provided \$5,514 in fiscal support to the SPCA in Cattaraugus County. Other grants from the fund this year include:




