

HillTap Festival Returns to Holiday Valley

The One-Of-A-Kind Music Festival is Back for its 3rd Year; Includes Three Bands and a Full Day of Adventure



42 North Brewing Company and Holiday Valley Resort are again teaming up for the 3rd Annual HillTap FestivalTM at Holiday Valley. This one-of-a-kind festival merges music, craft beer and outdoor adventure at one of the most scenic venues in the region, atop the mountain at Spruce Lake.

Festival attendees will take a chair lift ride to the top of the mountain where they will experience a full day of music and adventure. Activities include mountain biking, stand up paddle boarding (SUP), and axe throwing. A full lineup of outdoor vendors will also be on-site at the festival. This year's music lineup has also been expanded to include three bands.

The HillTap Festival begins at 12pm and runs until 9pm. Attendees will park at the Tannenbaum Lodge and take the chair lift up to the festival. This year's vendors and experiences include SUP demos by SUP Erie Adventures, bike demos by Freewheel, Henna Art by Buffalo Henna, Axe throwing by Hatchets & Hops, Holiday Valley e-bike demos, and Mud, Sweat, n' Gears. Additionally, food will be available from Fat Bob's BBQ and Villaggio.



FATHERHOOD & FAMILIES INITIATIVE

Connecting Communities in Action Helping to Better Family Relationships

We've all heard of Connecting Communities in Action in Salamanca, NY, but do we know exactly what they are or what they do? Here's a little history... Connecting Communities in Action, Inc. (CCA) is a non-profit organization whose goals are to build resilient communities through emotional, physical and economic security. The Salamanca location is one of hundreds of Community Action Agencies throughout the U.S.

They try to help those in need meet their most basic needs and they work with many public and private partners to help those marginalized individuals have hope and opportunities. They serve the elderly, the disabled, the disadvantaged, families and solo individuals alike.

When most of us think of families or custodial issues, innately we think of the mother and the children. But what about the single fathers or the fathers who have issues relating to their family life? The CCA has partnered up with the National Fatherhood Initiative for their "Responsible Fatherhood Initiative". The National Fatherhood Initiative is the nation's leading provider of research on father presence and involvement.

This initiative is designed to help fathers and those in a father-like role improve their economic stability, develop and maintain healthy relationships, and develop/improve responsible parenting skills. The focus of the group is to promote fatherhood and the importance of being a positive role model for children. The group is open to any male who plays a role in a child's life - father, step-father, grandfather, uncle, friend.

EllicottvilleNOW asked Bridget Sanford, Director of Planning & Resources at the CCA, how they came up with the initiative and she said, "Fourteen years ago, CCA partnered with DSS in implementing The Fatherhood Connection (founded by Reggie Cox). It was an initiative to locate and engage fathers, uncles, grandfathers, and other male mentors with the vision of combating fatherless America and the multifaceted areas impacted by this systemic issue. Over time, CCA has had the opportunity to partner with COI (Chautauqua County) with another Fatherhood program called 24/7 DADS. So now both "programs" work in tandem under the umbrella of The Fatherhood Initiative – where we encourage men to think steps, NOT PROGRAMS. The initiative is about inviting men into a movement rather than just a class. The idea is that combining information plus application will yield transformation – which in turn will strengthen the relationship fathers have with their children and overall strengthen the family unit and thus strengthening the surrounding communities."

We thought that sounded like a very important plan. Bridget agreed, "It is important. It empowers fathers to learn to become better men for their children and those around them. The movement is intended to capture the heart of a man/father in order to strengthen the inner character for the betterment of the children, family, workplace and community the men reside in and work in. When fatherlessness is addressed as a byproduct, crime and teen pregnancies go down while educational prowess, school attendance, and child support increases."



"The movement and Fatherhood Initiative treats dads as people to be encouraged rather than "projects to be fixed!", Bridget continued. "The common dad has many areas of his life where people tell him where he gets it wrong and then often negative feedback on what he must do in order to succeed. The problem with that approach is that it is short-sighted and doesn't produce long-term results. The understanding of boyhood, manhood, and fatherhood as well as the brotherhood that is formed in this setting, gives dads the encouragement for when they get it right. The values we work hard to instill are Affirmation, Approval and Celebration."

We also asked Bridget how she thinks the initiative will impact families. Bridget stated, "While there is no silver bullet for success, what the program has shown is men rising to the challenge of doing more than paying their child support and 'buying milk and diapers' every now and then. The topics that are covered (Emotional Intelligence, Anger Management, Anger Eradication, Healthy Communication, Healthy Relationships, Personality Profiles, Love Languages, Smart Money and more workshops) guide and help men discuss, apply and report back the next week (accountability) for the personal and family growth that takes place. Fathers initially take the 12 or 13-week journey, but then are invited to continue to attend as much as possible to keep the support and account-





PUMPKIN HOLLOW FURNITURE

Bringing New Life to Old Pieces Through Repair and Reupholstery

Single-use, disposable, easily replaceable products make it so much more tempting to just "buy a new one," rather than repair the thing that isn't quite working or is showing signs of age. But to Mark Bukowiecki, "Anything can be fixed," and it's this philosophy that inspired his business, Pumpkin Hollow Furniture. In fact, "The worse it comes to me, the better it looks to me in the end."

Located at his home on Pumpkin Hollow Road in Humphrey, Bukowiecki's business is the result of many years of experience in carpentry and furniture repair. "In 2006, we moved here from Buffalo," he explained. "My wife was teaching, and I started getting into carpentry. I became a carpenter with a couple of local contractors in Ellicottville." In 2008 when the recession slowed down the economy, Bukowiecki responded to Raymour & Flanigan's newspaper ad for a furniture repairman. "I said, 'I think my skills will transfer over,' and I ended up working there for 10 years," he said.

Although he worked primarily out of the Olean Raymour & Flanigan, Bukowiecki did service work throughout western New York and northwestern Pennsylvania. "It was a lot of driving, but I really got to know the area and gained a lot of experience repairing furniture," he noted. Although primarily self-taught, he received a significant amount of training at Raymour & Flanigan and has been mentored for many years by an upholsterer in Olean, Tim Spiller. Now, Bukowiecki is the furniture repairman for Bear Mountain Furniture in Great Valley.

While there are fewer repair people now than there used to be, "There are definitely people still doing it, but I think it's directly reflective of the throw-away mentality," he explained. "Every industry across the board is making the life of the product less and less so that we come back more and more to replace it; we've become conditioned."

After several years on the road driving to repair jobs, Bukowiecki is happy that much of his work allows him to spend time around the people whom he loves most. "While the heart of my purpose is to be around my family, perhaps the spark that started my path to creating my own business was designing and building my own sectional sofa," he said. "After years of seeing some common and repeat issues with modern furniture design, I knew I could add my touch to bypass as much as possible."

Even those products with a "limited lifetime warranty," which is the expected life of the product, are only built to sit in someone's home for approximately seven years, said Bukowiecki. Furniture made with mass-produced upholstery materials and particle board framing assembled with glue and two-inch framing staples "can be made better than originally designed with the right kind of repairs," he explained. "If that piece finds the wrong action, it will pop apart," said Bukowiecki. "But if I can put it together with an angle bracket and screws, the hold is better by some magnitude. Even reupholstering something with higher quality fabric makes such a difference."

CHANGING GEARS

New Mountain Bike Consulting Company Opens the Door to Outdoor Adventure

While working as the facilities manager for a large local business in the summer of 2020, Great Valley's Burt Little saw the world change as the covid pandemic pushed people out of their houses and into all forms of outdoor recreation.

Sporting goods stores and manufacturers quickly sold out of equipment meant to be used and enjoyed outside; from inline skates to kayaks to bicycles - even puppies were in short supply!

A self-proclaimed adrenalin junkie and lifelong cyclist, Little realized that for all those new mountain bike owners, pedaling a new bike around the parking lot at the local bike shop isn't quite the same as heading out onto a trail at the local state park.

It was with the idea of bridging the gap from the store to the trail that his new business, Changing Gears Mountain Bike Consulting was born.

"During the pandemic, the industry grew so much in terms of bike sales, but there was a void in the actual riding and the skillset of new riders," Little explained. "People were buying these really nice mountain bikes thinking they could just go out and ride, but they were getting discouraged and not using the bikes."

As an active member of the Western New York Mountain Bike Association (WNYMBA), Little recognized the opportunity to help all those new mountain bike riders learn how to ride safely and build the skills necessary for enjoying the sport over the course of a lifetime.

Together with his partner Christie Milanowski, a bicycle rider new to the sport of mountain biking, Little created an 'Introduction To Mountain Biking' program, where people of all ages could learn the most important aspects of the sport in a free, friendly and unintimidating setting.

Little designed an instructional course where everyone from kids to seniors could learn helmet safety and how to properly fit other safety equipment. He also included instruction on the basic components of a bike and its proper setup, along with how to make sure everything is ready before a ride.

His day-long programs are staffed with respected mountain bike instructors who conduct 'balance clinics,' where new riders discover how to correctly maneuver over small obstacles like rocks and logs and are educated on the various types of trails to ride.

"We had our first big event last June in Ellicottville and it was really exciting," Little said. "We had families there with lots of kids and we grilled hot dogs and it was the first time that we set up a whole riding arena."

Little credited a strong partnership with the Loud Performance bike shop (in Benus Point and Ellicottville) for having an entire fleet of demo bikes on-hand for people to ride during

In fact, repairs and reupholstery are the most common jobs Pumpkin Hollow Furniture does. One of Bukowiecki's favorite projects involved a chair given to him by a friend several years before. "I had it outside, kicking around in the weather for a couple of years before I even touched it," he recalled. "I call it the 'nightmare chair,' because it was a bane for me—for awhile!" Now the chair, which could have been destined for the dump, is a beautiful furnishing in Bukowiecki's home. "The fact that it's comfortable—that's the cherry right on top," he said.

Even the most challenging projects are rewarding for Bukowiecki, for that's where he's learned the most. "Pulling staples is probably the least fun part of it, but you learn so much," he noted. "You learn how to apply your body, the physics of it—even when you jab yourself, you learn so much about technique!"

While Bukowiecki has involved all three of his children in his work, his daughter Nola is the one who seems most drawn to it. "I have two boys and one girl, and she (Nola) is the one that comes with me more often than not," he said. "She's really artistic, very good with drawing, and definitely got the eye."

In designing his own intro to mountain biking seminar, Little realized he had developed a viable business plan for helping others conduct their own programs. "We've grown so much with this concept that we decided to transition from a nonprofit business to an LLC with it," he explained. The change has provided him with the flexibility to offer his services to other organizations - mainly for mountain biking clubs in the region - whom he helps create and support venues for these unique educational events.

"We partner with these groups to create their own 'Introduction To Mountain Biking' skills clinics," Little said. "We help event organizers determine their needs and then we help with the staffing and logistics to carry out fun, safe, events."

He also explained that a common focus for his skills clinics is to get people past the mindset of needing to be a heavily-skilled, big-jumping rider to enjoy mountain biking. "We're trying to show people that you can go out and ride trails like Art Roscoe (cross-country ski trail at Allegany State Park) where there aren't any mountain bike features (berms, rollers, etc.) and you can get the same concept as if you're riding a single track mountain bike trail."

Little and Milanowski are Trail Stewards for the trail system at the Golden Hill State Forest outside of Great Valley - a trail system which Little says is adaptable to all skill levels of riding and especially beneficial for being non-threatening to new riders.

WNY MAPLE FESTIVAL

Experience Two Days of Maple Bliss in Franklinville

One of the longest-running festivals in the area, Franklinville's annual Western New York Maple Festival is taking place during the weekend of April 29-30th and this year's event is bigger than ever! In 1963, the Franklinville Jaycees (junior chamber of commerce) founded the festival to celebrate the many maple syrup producers in the region, while highlighting all that Franklinville has to offer. "This year, what we've done is expanded the festival into the Park Square Historic District, because we wanted to make it walkable, highlight our downtown, and introduce people to new businesses and business owners," said Ashley Schumaker, festival chair. "There really is something for all ages to enjoy all weekend!"

2023 marks the 59th year of the festival, as the festival was not held in 2020 or 2021 due to Covid-19. Despite the brief hiatus, the festival is just as popular as ever. In fact, this year, vendor registration has exceeded Schumaker's expectations.

"Last year, we had 81 vendors, and so far, we have 158 now registered," she said. This number does not include those maple syrup producers who have their own designated maple tent, which is spearheaded by Wright Farms. "The tent usually features six or more maple producers whose products are sold unlabeled to highlight everyone equally." Non-maple vendor booths include crafts, paintings, jewelry, hand-made toys, and so much more. "There are some really unique items this year," said Schumaker. "Our vendors come from all over the area. Most are from an hour to an hour and a half away, but we also have vendors who travel from Rochester and northern Pennsylvania."

NEW ADDITIONS

In addition to an expanded festival area, other new offerings for 2023 include participation of local wineries, breweries, and distilleries. "We're starting small with just a few, but hoping to grow this in the future," Schumaker noted. Other downtown highlights for 2023 will include mechanical bull rides, food vendors, and Sugar Goat Baking and Grazing Co., who will also be bringing their goats!

It's not the WNY Maple Festival without the "All-U-Can Eat Pancake & Sausage Breakfast," which will be in the elementary school cafeteria from 7:30am to 2pm on Saturday and Sunday. "We'll be serving buckwheat pancakes and sausage links, and Wright Farms is providing the syrup. We've made some changes to ensure even higher quality and consistency," said Schumaker, who also owns her own restaurant. "Last year, I took over the chair position, but this is my first full year in this role," she explained. "I've volunteered for many years, and even when I wasn't officially part of the committee, I've always made a point to be involved in some way." Even as a high school student, Schumaker enjoyed being part of the festival, as she was crowned Maple Queen in 2008.

ROCK CITY PARK OPENS

Olean Attraction Offers Hiking, Climbing and Family Fun for All

Head out to Rock City Park, located at 505 Route 16 S. in Olean, NY when they officially open on May 1st and enjoy everything this long-beloved natural attraction has to offer.

Rock City Park is family friendly, open to all ages (children under 16 should be supervised by an adult) and offers many spots just perfect for an impromptu photo op, like the balancing rock or dining hall pass. They have the RCP gift shop open daily from 9:00am-5:00pm that carries great souvenirs, refreshments and snacks, an extensive museum, florescent rock room, and numerous picnic areas. But that's not all the park has to offer. They also host special occasions and events - weddings, reunions, school field trips, business gatherings and more. Weddings are often held on the scenic vista that overlooks Allegany's Enchanted Mountains. The park pavilion can hold up to 50 guests. This year's parade will feature a float contest with separate divisions for school groups and local non-school businesses and organizations with monetary prizes and trophies!

Both the historical society and fire department host their own basket raffles throughout the weekend. Schumaker is pleased to announce the return of the fire department's car show on Sunday, which is also the day of their annual chicken barbecue (noon until sold out at the fire hall on Main Street). Dogs are allowed as long as they remain on a leash and their waste is collected in a plastic baggie. The 45-minute long hiking trail is not handicap accessible but they do offer a 20-minute virtual tour of the park. There are bathrooms on-site and those are handicap accessible and parking is typically free, unless there is a special event taking place.




