The lifts stopped spinning, but that didn't mean the work did. In the days after Holiday Valley ceased its 2020-'21 winter operations, its Mountain Operations crew began a project that will completely change the dynamic of one of its most iconic lifts. This summer, the fixed-grip Yodeler chairlift will be replaced by a high speed detachable quad - a \$4 million project.

You could call Jim Curtis a Mountain Operations savant. The 45-year resort veteran has overseen a good share of lift replacements, from Snowpine (twice), Mardi Gras (twice), Tannenbaum (twice), Cindy's (twice) and now Yodeler (for the third time). Through it all, one thing remains constant: the pride the crew has in installing and maintaining the lifts themselves.

Automotive group donates transport van, provides peace of mind to local family

For every doctor's visit, Trenton Pierce - a young boy from Great Valley, NY who was diagnosed with Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy (DMD) - had to be helped inside his family's car by his parents and a manual lifting-sling for a two-hour drive to Rochester. Today, Trenton is able to safely travel for his medical needs in a van that accommodates his wheelchair thanks to a donation from Scott Bieler and the West Herr Automotive Group.

After recovering from a fall that left him with a fractured femur late in 2020, Trenton's ability to maneuver his way around places was drastically hindered. His accident, coupled with his continuous battle with DMD which eats away at muscles across the human body, required the use of a wheelchair. Despite successful yet difficult trips to his medical visits, Trenton's parents knew they needed a vehicle that could properly accommodate his needs.

In search of a suitable way to transport Trenton, the Pierce family and their friend Michelle Wasserman launched the "Give Trenton a Lift" fundraiser. Their GoFundMe campaign remained successful, growing in donations to a third of their \$18,000 goal for the purchase of a transport van. As the community around Trenton's story continued to raise funds, an anonymous individual emailed the West Herr Automotive Group asking for help.

"After looking at the GoFundMe page and reading about Trenton's situation, we reached out to Trenton's mother, Jordan Pierce, and invited her to sit down and talk," said Annette Smith, Executive Assistant to Scott Bieler, President & CEO of West Herr. "There is a spot on our website where people can send us messages; we read them everyday. We knew we wanted to help the Pierce family."

As part of the "West Herr Cares" initiative, Scott Bieler and his team spoke to Jordan and her family about donating a 2016 Dodge Caravan equipped with accommodations made for Trenton's wheelchair. On Friday, April 9th, the Pierce Family received that transport van, along with a manual side-entry wheelchair ramp. Every day since, Trenton has been asking for joyrides.

"After hearing Trenton's story and getting to know the family, Scott Bieler, our President, was compelled to help," explained Smith. "When we get presented with these unique opportunities to help someone, we're going to do it. We want to make a difference."

In an effort to maintain their new vehicle, Trenton's parents have used the funds raised from the GoFundMe campaign for a three-year warranty. They have also offered refunds to anyone who wishes to withdraw from the donations pile. Having an all-accessible van donated to them, the Pierce family will now be able to safely transport Trenton back and forth to his appointments in Rochester.

"We are so thankful for everything that everybody has done to help get us this far - everyone in the community, and especially Scott Bieler and West Herr," Jordan said. "Trenton cannot stop smiling every time we get in the van; it brings us joy and relief."

While Trenton continues to fight DMD, the people around him that love him the most including his family, loved ones and members of the community, are thankful that they could help in his battle.

### FOOD BANK DONATION


Rotary Club of Ellicottville continues to help restock shelves during the pandemic

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

### YODELER LIFT DISMANTLED

Holiday Valley project to install new high speed detachable guad on schedule

The lifts stopped spinning, but that didn't mean the work did. In the days after Holiday Valley ceased winter operations for the 2020-'21 winter season, its Mountain Operations crew began a project that will completely change the dynamic of one of its most iconic lifts. This summer, the fixed-grip Yodeler chairlift will be replaced by a high speed detachable quad - a \$4 million project that will continue to enhance the overall experience.

You could call Jim Curtis a Mountain Operations savant. The 45-year resort veteran, now a Mountain Operations manager, has overseen close to "20-ish" lift replacements, from Snowpine (twice), Mardi Gras (twice), Tannenbaum (twice), Cindy's (twice) and now Yodeler (for the third time). Through it all, one thing remains constant: the pride the crew has in installing and maintaining the lifts themselves.

"When we do it ourselves, we know where every bolt is where every piece goes. It allows us to maintain and take care of it so much better," Curtis told ellicottvilleNOW.

The new lift, developed by the Austria-based Doppelmayr, will begin at slightly east of its current location and end where the Champagne Warming Hut currently sits. The Warming Hut will be moved to where the old upper Yodeler lift house was, while that lift house will head to the top of Eagle. In all, it's an immense project with a tight timeframe.

"It's all brand new," Curtis said. "There are a lot of moving pieces to it, and things will fall in line as they happen. But great weather so far this spring has allowed us to get moving on it."

To start, the crew took the chairs off (and before you ask - the entire lift has been sold to another resort, so chairs won't be for sale) before cutting the cable. The top tower and bull wheel were removed to allow crews to begin digging a new foundation for where the Warming Hut will go. Once the building has been moved, Mountain Ops will be able to begin installation on the top terminal.

Since the new lift will follow a different line, none of the existing tower platforms can be used. Instead, Mountain Ops will continue to widen the line and remove trees in preparation for new tower installations. But unlike Mardi Gras and Morning Star - where every tower can be accessed by a truck from the run - Yodeler will require some finesse.

"Between pouring the concrete and tower installation (which will involve an all-wheel drive crane) it won't be as easy as some of the other lift installs we've done," Curtis explained. "But with it being a detachable, two of the towers will be right at the top and a few at the bottom. There will be seven in total, and the middle ones will be a little tricky due to the pitch.

For comparison, the fixed-grip lift had over 80 chairs while the new detachable will use less than 50. While the uphill capacity is pretty similar (2,400 an hour vs. 2,400 an hour), there are two factors at play when speaking on the future benefits.

"To start, this past season we were dealing with a lot of single and double riders due to CO-VID restrictions and distancing," Curtis said. "But the primary revolves around beginners. Both Mardi Gras and Tannenbaum are great for beginners because of their slow loading and unloading speeds. But once these skiers and riders get to Yodeler, it's a fixed-grip chair that needs to be slowed down. So providing the same speed to load/unload will be really beneficial."

The first trees were planted in 1976; the Arboretum is home to approximately 300 trees today. As is customary, a new tree will be planted at the Nannen Arboretum at the Arbor Day celebration.

The mission of the Nannen Arboretum Society, Inc. is to raise awareness among our residents and visitors about the beauty, diversity and ecologic contribution of trees. ### CATT. COUNTY FAIR IS A GO!

4-H youth educators and club members excited to return to live events

It's official: this summer, the fairgrounds in Little Valley will come alive for the Cattaraugus County Fair Aug. 1st-8th! Cattaraugus County 4-H Youth Educators Carrie Busekist and Abigail Luzier are thrilled with the recent announcement, especially given the disappointment of last year's cancellation. Although events and entertainment for this year's fair are still in the planning stages, 4-H members are already hard at work on their fair projects. "Most or all of the market animal projects - like beef, pigs, goats and sheep - have all been purchased or born on the farm," Busekist explained. "We start poultry next, beginning with turkeys next week, and chickens a few weeks after that."

Last year, despite the cancellation of the fair, 4-H youth had the opportunity to raise and sell their animals and even learn a new platform for selling. "Last year, we were able to offer the kids a virtual platform to sell their animals or do private treaties," Busekist said. "Instead of the auction process, if they had a ready buyer, they could draw up a contract with our help. Also, we did a virtual showcase: on our Facebook page and our website, kids submitted pictures and videos of their animals or projects. Each day of what would have been the fair, we posted those videos on our virtual platform."

Over the past year, many 4-H clubs have been meeting virtually. On the Cattaraugus County 4-H group's Facebook page, Busekist has done live demonstrations on everything from maple syrup making to STEAM projects like coding. "Throughout the 4-H year, which begins in October, we've been doing virtual craft days. We even did a pie-baking and muffin baking contest. As things have opened up this spring, and when we did have nice weather, we were able to do socially-distanced and masked activities and a few things this fall."

While 4-H members were appreciative of alternative opportunities to participate, the live, in-person fair was deeply missed by all. Busekist noted, "The disappointment was completely understandable. The fair was one more thing they had to lose, which is tough because it's the social event of the year in the 4-H community!"

This year, she and Luzier are gearing up for a promising fair week and anticipating much greater participation. "This year, we have close to 300 members, county-wide, and with the announcement of the fair, we'll probably have more who will join," Busekist explained. "In addition to the animal projects, we're also planning to display handmade projects in person."

4-H members' projects include artwork, baked goods, collections, crafts, photography, textiles and more. Busekist explained that these projects would be judged in two different sessions on two different days so that members, their projects, and judges are safely distanced.

While the pandemic has certainly affected the organization of this year's fair, in many ways it's still "business as usual" for the county 4-H program. "In the 4-H world, you adapt," said Busekist. "You never know what could happen at the fair, because there's a lot of moving parts!"

Busekist said that 4-H has their safety plan in place per the state's regulations, and they'll be able to implement it even before the fair begins. She said, "We're actually hosting in-person horse shows in May and June, so that will give us the ability to test out the protocols that we've put in place. We're really excited to finally be doing events in person again!"

ROCHESTER, NY - Soon, school districts in the Cattaraugus-Allegany BOCES (CA BOCES) region will see world-class animations gracing their hallways, school buses, gyms, and theaters.

Through a new partnership with Rochester Institute of Technology's MAGIC Spell Studios, the Information Technology Department at CA BOCES is preparing to offer custom animation offerings to component school districts in the region.

CA BOCES Information Technology Director, Michael Graf, said that the new opportunity will be a forward-looking opportunity for school districts. "While we already have a professional animator on our team, our new partnership with MAGIC Spell Studios has allowed us the opportunity to work with a professional-grade studio team in offering animation on a broader scale to our component districts at a reasonable price through existing CoSer structures."

CA BOCES District Superintendent, Scott Payne, said that he believes the partnership will be advantageous to both the BOCES organization and component school districts. "Customized animation options like this will allow our educators, both in BOCES class-rooms and in our component districts, to use even more creativity when working to engage students," he said. "I am excited to see this program offered in our region."

MAGIC Spell Studios, LLC, is the entrepreneurial and commercial heart of MAGIC at RIT. Encompassing a fully functional film sound stage, sound mix and color correction post-production studios, a 4K Dolby Atmos theater, and several working media laboratories, MAGIC Spell Studios, and their student and faculty talent, is ready and available to work on animation and media projects through this new partnership with CA BOCES.

CA BOCES is currently running pilots with two regional school districts to finalize programming and will soon announce program details to all component school districts. Potential projects include animated avatars of administrators and mascots, character education animated story lines, and 2D/3D creations for use in sensory rooms and hallways.

Graf said that he is also excited for what this type of programming can do to boost this career field in the region. "Aside from providing this high-level of affordable programming to our districts to help engage students, we have partnered with a world class university and production team to blend together our current technology offerings and support with animation and whatever new technology is around the corner," he said. "The hope beyond this is to interest students in video, animation, and create a strong presence in our region for this field that might typically land in an urban setting."

Graf also mentioned that he is impressed by the caliber of programming and support at RIT. "The team at MAGIC has been extremely helpful and engaged in creating programming that benefits their students professionally and also creates good learning experiences and engagement for youth in our region – it is a win-win."

David Long, Director of RIT MAGIC Center/MAGIC Spell Studios said, "MAGIC Spell Studios is very excited to contribute the expertise and talents of RIT's animation students to this fun and exciting project with the BOCES team. Putting positive themes into school buildings with living animated characters, school mascots, and even cartoon teachers and administrators is a perfect way to make these messages engaging and exciting for everyone."

Programming is projected to begin in early Fall 2021.

### Core Performance: After Ski Season Has Ended, Do Not Stop Stretching and Conditioning

Many of my clients are skiers/snowboarders who have had a very active season due to our incredible winter. But now, with skiing/snowboarding season over, these same clients are experiencing stiffness and tightness in their backs, hips and legs. The reason for this is because of the complex genetic engineering that goes into the makeup of the lower body. The knee, for example, has an extremely large threshold for impact absorption that allows people to run and jump at unprecedented levels of competition despite moving in a simple hinge motion. However simple the motion, the amount of muscles used to perform the hinge itself is actually quite drastic. If these muscles - like the quadriceps and the calves - are underused or have weak function, there will be drastic increase of injury, and therefore decrease in performance. In order to aid the knee in performance, we move these muscles through their normal range of motion and try to increase the degree of range each time. By stretching and progressing the musculature around the knee, we help promote proper movement and elasticity - from the largest movement contributors to the smallest.

By stretching muscles around the knees and hips like the IT band, the adductors, the quads, and hip flexors, that tension can be lessened and prevented. Stretching can also help you recover from inefficient movement patterns either on the hill or off of it.

While the tendency is to focus solely on the lower body, it should be stressed that the upper body should not be overlooked. Your upper body is impacted from the twisting of your torso while changing direction, planting your poles to create momentum, and

bracing when falling. Your shoulder protocol should focus on stretching the shoulder and its many attachments like the triceps, biceps, pectoral muscles, deltoids, and rotator cuffs – moving them through full range of motion.

So whether you are preparing for ski season or recovering from ski season, stretching should be an important part of your daily routine.

### Inner Peace and Strength: How Exactly Do You Ask Someone If They Are OK?

Seeing as the year 2020 is in our rear view window and the stigma around mental health has shifted gears some, how do we exactly ask our loved ones if they are ok emotionally? Say we notice some mood shifts, some behavioral changes, or perhaps some more serious concerns ... what is the ideal way to bring this up? As we embark together on this imperative conversation, let us hear from an expert, Breanne Abbott, LMSW. Breanne is an experienced trauma mental health therapist at Connecting Communities in Action and has recently embarked on a macro-level journey to get trained in "Mental Health 1st Aide." Mental Health 1st Aide is a nationally recognized program that teaches community members how to respond, have conversations, and address early signs of a mental illness.

When posed the question: How do you ask if someone is really ok?, Breanne jumped in with, "Approach them with compassion and kindness to find out where they are at. First you want to open

the conversation up in a light-hearted manner, just expressing what changes you have noticed with your loved one. Then, you want to give the person an opportunity to share, and it is of the most importance to listen non-judgmentally. Find a comfortable location or a place where you both feel at ease and then just bring up exactly what you have noticed in a respectful and matter-of-fact or factual way. You can bring up what exact behavioral changes or general concerns you have seen."

An example of this: "Hey, I have noticed you are not texting me back as often as you usually do, or your work clothes or outfits have changed." Breanne adds, "You have to be prepared for what they are going to say as best you can. It isn't for you to change or negate their feelings, nor is it your role to judge how they initially respond to you. Listen and avoid using dismissive language or voicing anything that might minimize their feelings. Remember, people you care about are entitled to how they feel even if they didn't intend to feel a certain way. There is no common sense scale to what is upsetting someone. Remember that everyone's experience is different, including how their bodies and minds will react. This varies from person to person and there is no comparison or competition to who has it worse. A few words or phrases of affirmation you can use are: 'Wow that sounds so frustrating' and 'Yes that sounds really tough'."

Let us back track for a moment, and hear Breanne's spin on the question: What are some

rear indications that someone is not ok? Breanne states, "Changes in behaviors can be indicators that someone is struggling emotionally. Some of these behavioral changes may be: performance changes at home/school/work, changes in physical appearance, a decline in attendance at school/events/work/co-curricular activities/family functions, etc. Also, a change in language can indicate perhaps some symptoms of depression or anxiety. For

a change in language can indicate perhaps some symptoms of depression or anxiety. For example, if your loved one is typically positive and upbeat either in person or in their social media posts, and that shifts some, that could be an indicator. Also, if your loved one is typically wordy in person or via text messages and is now communicating with a "Fine" or "Ok" or "Nothing", that could be a subtle sign. Lastly, if someone you regularly communicate with is not responding back to you, this could also indicate an emotional shift.

As we move forward to solutions, Breanne adds some profound strategies to support, maintain, and grow into emotional wellness. When these conversations are taking place and support systems are then discussed, Breanne adds, "The first place to help your loved one explore their supports is avenues already present in their lives (people that can support them). Following support systems, you can bring up activities or opportunities, on a scale appropriate to where they are at, that can help (things they might enjoy to do). Also, pets can be amazing supports and spending time with your pet increases your serotonin and endorphin levels when you pet, hug, or squeeze them gently. With the weather breaking, just getting outside in the sunshine can help with vitamin D levels.

Next, you can also explore barriers. One example: If you know your loved one enjoys painting but has run out of supplies, you can talk about what it would look like to get more supplies or any ideas on the next creation once art supplies are replenished ... tapping into motivation and excitement can help them. You can also offer practical help with tasks that seem overwhelming for your loved one such as: would it be helpful to make a plan to tackle the spring cleaning housework together?"

Breanne concludes with a warm heart in saying, "Recovery or wellness is often enriched with the help of a mental health professional and a great way to get connected to one is to start with your general doctor."

In closing, Breanne wanted to add that the single statement of "I will support you on your life journey," can make the entire difference in someone's life, as they begin to see and feel they are not alone.

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
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
