This year, to celebrate their 5th anniversary, Steelbound has promised an epic 2-day party May 5th and 6th. ellicottvilleNOW had a great opportunity to speak with one of the owners, Bill Bursee about the milestone

eNOW: This is Steelbound's 5th Anniversary! How does it feel to have made it this far? BURSEE: It's hard to explain how it feels. It's surreal and quite amazing. I want to keep holding onto these exciting moments. We have been through tough times, but so many continue to support us and have really embraced our brand in a way I never expected. Our product is really good, and once people try it they become a lifetime fan. Why? Because our products are made with passion and they are fun, creative, certainly tasty and spread joy. I own a successful construction company and I wanted to semi-retire and just relax. However, Steelbound was started and here I am, five years in, having fun and living my dream every day. Our first beer was called the "Nutty Blonde" which is a blonde ale, but it's richer and more flavorful. Now we have 44 beer brands and over 30 liquor brands, along with three locations - Ellicottville, Dunkirk and Springville, and more locations to come.

eNOW: The celebration is two days long, for Cinco De Mayo and the Kentucky Derby. What can people expect?

BURSEE: Our 5th Anniversary falls on an epic weekend - Cinco de Mayo and Kentucky Derby - so we are celebrating in a big way! Get those margarita glasses ready and your derby hats on for our event. 

DONATE LIFE DAY AT ECS

Local Organ Donors and Recipients Share Their Stories During Special Assembly

We all have heard about organ donations. I'm sure we've all looked at that little box when we were at the DMV thinking, "Should I donate my organs?" "Doesn't that seem weird?" "I'm not sure how I feel about that." I, myself was hesitant back when I was younger. It seemed like a huge commitment to promise organs to a stranger. But honestly, it's way easier now that I've learned how one little check mark can impact someone else's life. Last Friday, the ellicottvilleNOW team was invited to Ellicottville Central School to attend the Donate Life Day assembly. And it was a humbling, eye-opening experience.

With the gymnasium packed full of middle and high school students and a few special guests, principal Erich Ploetz kicked off the assembly by asking everyone to give their full attention to this important topic.

We learned a lot of detailed information about donation that I wasn't aware of. Such as the fact that New York State has the lowest rate of donation out of any state in the U.S., that there are two ways to be an organ donor - both living and donation upon event of death - and that being a living donor is a more complicated process as there are many tests to undergo to make sure that you are a perfect match to the person you are donating to in order to best avoid organ rejection.

With all of these facts in mind, we heard many stories from teachers and students of ECS that have been effected by organ donation. It takes tremendous courage and passion to share these stories. For them to openly discuss those personal feelings with strangers, to be able to hear them, it was such a moving experience.

The first tribute was to past ECS student Kristen Hintz (cousin of teacher Tammy Peters). Kristen was killed in a car accident when she was a senior. As described by Tammy, she was a loving person who always cared about other people. She was a registered organ donor and her donations granted many people the chance to live. Her heart went to a 10-year old girl in Georgia, her kidneys were given to two people in Buffalo, and her liver went to someone in New York City. Though one precious life was lost, she saved four other people, just by allowing her organs to be used after her passing.

Tammy then shared her own story. Tammy was diagnosed with Primary Sclerosing Cholangitis (PSC), which is a chronic liver disease that eventually narrows/blocks the bile ducts and causes liver damage. This can eventually lead to life-threatening complications such as liver failure. Amazingly, Tammy's friend, Kelly McMahon (a retired ECS teacher) volunteered for the rigorous testing and came out as a perfect match. She donated part of her liver to Tammy on July 6, 2015 and both Tammy and Kelly are doing really well today.

We next heard the story of Anne Curtis and Amanda Kahn. Anne, a former ECS cafeteria worker, was diagnosed with Stage 4 Kidney Disease. Her granddaughter, Amanda, volunteered to be tested to see if she could share one of her kidneys. She was a match. In 2020, the procedure was performed and Anne received one of Amanda's kidneys. Both ladies recovered quickly and are in great health today.

Sometimes life can be very hard, as the Palmatier family came to find when two of their sons, Evan and Camden, were diagnosed with PFIC-3 (Progressive Familial Intrahepatic Cholestasis Type 3) which is a late-onset hereditary liver disease. I can't even imagine how their parents, Todd and Shannon (a teacher at ECS) had to feel, knowing that both of their children would need major surgery to have any quality of life, or how the kids felt dealing with their illness. It had to be so hard for all of them. Fortunately, Evan received his "gift of life" from a deceased donor just 10 days before his 20th birthday and his brother Camden underwent a liver transplant from a living donor when he was just 14. Both boys are in great condition and living their lives as any young adult should.

The next story really showcases the power of social media. ECS student Harley Lafferty was in need of a kidney. She made a Facebook post hoping to find a living donor. Michelle Jacobson saw the post and made the decision to reach out to Harley and see if she could be her donor. They underwent the transplant surgery in 2019. Michelle said, "I didn't feel different after donating and I still don't. I'm so happy that I could help Harley." Harley just expressed how grateful she was for Michelle.

Family played a key note in the next story. Ruth Weber is a second grader at ECS who was diagnosed with leukemia and was in great need of a bone marrow transplant. Her (at the time) 14-year old sister Adelaide stepped up and donated bone marrow and stem cells

ECS VARSITY SOFTBALL

Lady Eagles Battling Injuries & Opponents; Preparing for Tough Second Half

As April turns to May, the Ellicottville Lady Eagles softball team sits in the middle of the pack in the Chautauqua-Cattaraugus Athletic Association East Division 2 standings with a 5-3 overall record (4-2 in league play) and the entire second half of their schedule is set to be played in the next two weeks.

Like the exceptionally warm weather they played in, the Ellicottville offense started this Spring so hot that through their first four contests in the 2023 season, the Lady Eagles were a perfect 4-0 and had outscored their opponents by a 68-24 margin.

"Our defense wasn't playing as well as I had hoped when the year started," explained Ellicottville coach Matt Finn. "But we were hitting the ball really well and our offense was playing fantastic."

Averaging 17 runs per game through those first four contests may have given some of the players the sense that the rest of the season might just be that easy.

"It was so good of a start for us, that a couple of the girls came in before practice one day and told me that they were surprised that we were off to a better start than they had expected," Finn said.

This was a conversation that Coach found equally encouraging and troublesome at the same time, because he knew that his team hadn't performed all that well defensively and they had "given up lots of runs."

It was right about then that the wheels came off the Ellicottville scoring machine. The Lady Eagles dropped a 13-2 decision to league-leading Portville on April 20 at Ellicottville, after the visiting Lady Panthers got off the bus and sprinted out to a 12-0 lead just two innings into the contest. Doing the math, Ellicottville "won" the remainder of that matchup, outscoring the Class C visitors 2-1, over the final five innings of play.

The very next evening, the Lady Eagles ran into a buzz saw in Olean and dropped a 19-1 decision to the Class B Lady Huskies, who were undefeated when they played Ellicott-ville and remain a perfect 9-0 on the season today.

"They were hitting line drives, they were hitting the gaps, they were hitting it where we weren't standing," Finn admitted in praise of Olean.

Thanks to the ten-run rule, the Lady Huskies only batted five times. Olean currently sits atop the CCAA East Div. 2 standings, as well as near the top of all Class B schools in Western New York.

Following the Olean game, the Lady Eagles then split a pair of one-run games with a 4-3 win over Franklinville and 14-13 loss to North Collins, which gets the girls to the season's mid-point with a 5-3 record. Without dropping a "could have, should have, or would have" on you, the Lady Eagles record could easily be one tick better at 6-2, as the girls really came out of the North Collins contest holding the short end of the stick.

Cruising to a commanding 10-3 lead after four innings, the Lady Eagles were plagued by an incredibly unfortunate string of injuries which forced four players to exit at the midpoint of the game and resulted in more than half the team playing unfamiliar defensive positions.

The very next North Collins at-bats yielded a 10-run inning to put the home team up by three, 13-10, and although the Lady Eagles fought back to tie the game with three runs in the top of the seventh, last ups for the home team proved to be the deciding factor in the one-run victory.

Offensively, Finn's squad is led by junior shortstop Jaida Mendell and senior catcher/outfielder Allison Rowland, who have each posted batting averages close to .600 for the season and both girls each have a pair of home runs to their credit. Other offensive standouts for the Lady Eagles include freshman pitcher Ande Northrup and sophomore catcher/1B Courtney Marsh, who each sport a batting average north of .450 and have combined to score 22 runs for the team. In fact, Marsh's two-run homer in the Portville game accounted for all the scoring for Ellicottville on that day.

Defensively, the Lady Eagles are led by freshman pitching phenom, Ande Northrup, who

GRIFFIS SCULPTURE PARK

Art & Entertainment in the Open Air; Organizers Announce 2023 Events Schedule

For many of us that have been in this area for a while, spring tradition calls for a venture up Rohr Hill Road or Mill Valley Road (sometimes both in the same day) to reconnect with the amazing sculptures of Griffis Sculpture Park. One of the largest sculpture parks in America, Griffis Sculpture Park boasts over 250 large scale pieces dispersed over many miles of hiking trails (450 acres to be exact). It's a truly unique attraction that invites you to explore for an hour or a whole day!

The park is open daily from dawn till dusk until October; the gift shop operates on weekends only (Saturday and Sunday). Though the park is free to wander, they do ask that you consider making a \$5 donation for adults and \$3 for seniors and children 5 to 12-years-old. You can pay at the gate or donate online by visiting griffissculpturepark.org.

ellicottvilleNOW recently spoke with Executive Director, Nila Griffis, about this year's season and what guests have to look forward to. Nila cued us in about three new works of art being added to the park by artist Trevor King. Trevor is an artist out of Queens, NYC who works in a variety of mediums including sculptures, ceramics and video. He has many accolades including being awarded the Outstanding Student Achievement Award in 2015 from the International Sculpture Center. Trevor is currently working as an instructor at the Greenwich House Pottery and is the Ceramics Technician at Tom Sachs Studio.

Nila then went on to tell us about a few of the events planned for this season:

- Griffis Sculpture Park's Annual Summer Festival August 20
- Ashford Cup Golf Tournament at Diamond Hawk Golf Course
- Night Lights begins on September 8 and will run through October 14

SUMMER FESTIVAL

"Our Annual Summer Festival is our largest gathering of the year," Nila explained. "Headlining the event for 2023 is Jim Donovan & Sun King Warriors from Pittsburgh. The band is best described as a blend of rhythm heavy roots rock, with a strong dose of big barreling drums. Jim is an original member of Rusted Root and co-author of their mega hit, "Send Me on My Way."

Other bands on the bill: Buffalo's beloved PA Line will be bringing their unique, harmony-packed, funky, folk rock sound that has been described as "Mumford & Sons meets Rusted Root." Griffin Brady and Sly Boots Circus will showcase their world beat drumming. This Buffalo-based touring group outfits uplifting sounds and energy, bringing people to their feet. Olean's Isaac Spaeth & Friends will perform an exploratory musical piece on Larry Griffis Jr.'s sculpture, "The Castle Tower." Solo artists Ruby from Buffalo and Mikee Strongmen from Silver Creek will open the festival with separate performances. That's quite the line-up!

"The event also features a vendor village, a kid's crafts area, food stands, beer & wine service and more," said Nila. "The Annual Summer Festival is a major fundraiser for our beloved sculpture park. Patrons are welcome to bring chairs and coolers, and a shuttle will be available to take guests to the top where the stage is."

NIGHT LIGHTS

Nila also gave us some insight on one of the most anticipated events that takes place each fall. "Night Lights is how we celebrate the Autumn season at Griffis," she said. "We work with Doug Sitler of SitlerHQ to produce a creative blend of lighting, sound, nature and sculpture. Guests are able to venture on an unguided walk of about 0.7 miles and view the park from a totally different perspective beginning at sundown. Some evenings you might even find some creative performers around."

Night Lights begins in September and runs through mid-October. Cost of admission is \$14 for adults, \$9 for children age 7-12 and free for those under 6. Tickets can be purchased on EventBrite.com as we get closer to the fall season.

In closing, Nila wanted to add, "Griffis Sculpture Park is owned and operated by the Ashford Hollow Foundation, which also owns the Essex Arts Center in Buffalo, NY. The mission of the Ashford Hollow Foundation is to promote the visual and performing arts as well as construct a dynamic relationship between the arts and education in Western New York to better its young people and the greater community. We hope that all visitors enjoy all the nooks and crannies of the park this year! Especially the top of the hill near the stage area; they are all a must see, including the tower and maze - Larry Griffis originals!"

AGENTS OF HOPE

ALS: An "Orphan" Disease that Needs Much More Funding & Awareness

In May in the United States, we call attention to ALS Awareness. Our neighbors in Canada do the same in June. The ALS awareness campaign was created to heighten the understanding of ALS (amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease). This campaign is recognized by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). During May, the American ALS Association leads a delegation of people with ALS, along with their caregivers and advocates to Capitol Hill to urge legislators to support measures to find treatments (there are few) and a cure (there is none).

ALS targets and damages the nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord. While there is no cure for this disease, medical marijuana proponents claim that it has helped slow its progression for patients with ALS. (marijuanadoctors.com) It usually strikes people between the ages of 40 and 70. However, Liz Krisanda, Executive Director of the Upstate NYS ALS Chapter, states that the youngest in the Upstate NY area is 18 and the oldest is mid-80's.

Approximately 20,000 people in the U.S. have it at any given time. About 5,000 are diagnosed per year. The average life expectancy is 2 to five years. (Rare are the outliers like Steven Hawking - 55 years, diagnosed at 21 - living to 76, and U.S. Navy veteran Alfred Caffiero, known locally by many as co-founder, with Bill Hahn, of WNY Physical Therapy - 23 years, living to 84.)

Every 90 minutes someone is diagnosed, and someone dies. Only 10% have inherited ALS through a mutated gene, while 90% occur without family history. There is no cure, although there are presently 4 drugs currently approved by the USFDA which help control symptoms but do not increase life expectancy.

Symptoms include progressive loss of muscle control with ALS gradually prohibiting the ability to speak, swallow, walk, grasp objects, move, and breathe. It is difficult to diagnose and is usually done by ruling out all other diseases. Sadly, this can sometimes take precious months or years. Interesting fact: ALS affects military veterans who serve in peacetime or war, regardless of the branch of service or the war they served in. Studies are ongoing to discover the connection, which is also shared with elite athletes. Battles are also waging in Congress to get funding for widows and families of ALS vets through the Justice for Veteran's Act.

We are made aware of ALS every August when ERA Team VP Real Estate offices throughout the area sponsor the "Agents of Hope" Golf Tournament now in its 14th year. Bill Soffel from ERA explains that this started when he personally experienced

HEALTH & FITNESS

Core Performance: Time Under Tension

One of my biggest pet peeves is watching people workout in a rush. Whether you're working out against a timer or completing reps - rushing or doing the exercise quickly is NEV-ER a good idea. Rushing induces bad form, and bad form can lead to injuries and wasted reps. If you're looking to build muscle quickly and safely, doing slower reps is the way to go. Workouts with slower reps cause your muscle to experience more time under tension (TUT). TUT is how much time the muscle is contracting during exercise.

Resistance training like weightlifting or bodyweight exercises incorporate TUT to build muscle, endurance and strength. The idea behind TUT is that you'll make muscles work harder, improving strength, endurance and muscle tone. While the research is mixed on how much TUT matters, it will certainly diversify your workouts and potentially upgrade your results.

One of my favorite reasons for utilizing the TUT technique with both clients and group fitness class participants is because it forces you to slow down and focus on the concentric and eccentric parts to an exercise, thus improving your form and overall results. Let's take a bicep curl as an example of TUT... When you curl the arm (concentric phase) and hold that contraction and then slowly lower or lengthen the arm (eccentric phase), you will see an increase in the muscle hypertrophy. (Hypertrophy is a fancy word for increasing muscle size.)

Other research has found doing eccentric and concentric movements in six seconds each led to metabolic benefits immediately after the exercise, instead of the benefits you'd typically experience a full day after high intensity interval training (HIIT).

Workouts using resistance bands maximize TUT. Unlike weight training, where it's easier to lower your weights between reps, with resistance band workouts your muscles stay engaged during the entire movement. In addition, TUT training can be an excellent way for those who struggle to activate muscles properly, especially when rehabbing after an injury or surgery, etc. Slower movements increase your mind-muscle connection over time so that you know what to contract and which form is correct.

So, how long should your muscles be held under tension? According to the International Sports Science Association (ISSA), here are the ideal time ranges to hold a muscle under tension per set for different fitness outcomes:

- For building strength: 20 seconds or less
- For hypertrophy (building muscle): 20-70 seconds
- For endurance: 70 seconds or longer

to her little sister. Her parents are so proud of what she did.

The last story we heard was about the ECS Speech Teacher, Alice Alessi. Her family has been on both sides of organ donation. As donors, John and Kristi Alessi both donated their organs posthumously and as receivers, David Alessi received a heart transplant in 2018.

Let's go over some important facts that were brought to the assembly's attention about the Donate Life organization and the process of organ donation:

- Donate Life is a non-profit organization.
- Every 9 minutes a person is added to the list of organ needing recipients. That's 140 people every single day!
- 104,000 people are waiting for organs; over 8k in NY alone.
- Without donated organs, people die. 20 people die each day waiting for an organ.
- You can only donate your liver one time but you can donate bone marrow, stem cells, blood/plasma multiple times.
- Donating blood is very important. There is always a huge need for all blood types.
 One kidney is a huge deal! (85% of donors are waiting for one of these.)
- You can donate over 60% of your liver and it grows back.
- You can donate over 60% of your

has pitched every single inning her team has played this season. Let that sink in for awhile. Northrup's a freshman, she dominates, and she hasn't left the mound for any other reason than the end of the game.

"Ande is mentally one of the toughest people I've ever been around," Finn said of his young pitcher. "She pitched for (the varsity team) last year as an eighth grader and in her first game, the second batter she faced hit a homer over the fence."

Finn praised the way his young pitcher handled the pressure that day saying, "She got the next batter out, struck out the batter after that to get out of the inning and settled in to pitch the rest of the game - which is so impressive - especially for someone so young!"

Instead of singling out defensive standouts from his team, Finn went on to say how proud he was of all the girls - especially when so many of them had been playing out of position after the Lady Eagles were beset with injuries.

Looking ahead to the second half of the season, the remainder of the regular-season slate of games will be played this week and next, with the final contest before the playoffs coming at home on Monday, May 15 versus North Collins.

As a very loose guideline, the Class (A,B,C,D) system is the way New York State separates schools by enrollment numbers for purposes of athletic competition. The schools with the largest enrollments play each other in Class A, while the smallest of the small schools play each other in Class D, and everyone else fits in somewhere in the middle - Classes B & C.

As a way of attempting to limit the amount of travel high school athletes have to go through during the regular season, 'leagues' or 'conferences' are set up with the idea that member teams would not have to spend more than 30 minutes traveling to 'away' games. During the regular season, teams are placed in these leagues or conferences, irregardless of the size of their school, and they play each other to determine a league champ, but also to achieve a ranking within their own class for playoff seeding. Once playoffs begin, schools will only compete against teams in their own class.

Currently, Ellicottville competes in Class D for all sports - including the combined Franklinville-Ellicottville Titans (football and track & field) teams.

Even for coaches and parents with lots of experience, the classification system is cumbersome to understand. Suffice it to say, though, that everyone's goal is to be the Section VI champion of their class.
