"A spring tune-up is always recom-mended. The full tune checks all aspects of the bicycle including tire dry rot, cracked frames and broken cables as well as making all of the necessary adjustments to make sure your bicycle is running smooth and safe... Always wear a helmet! We know people roll their eyes when they hear that, but honestly, it's essential for safe riding.'

Publisher's **PICK** SCULPTING FOR SMILES

A Multi-Talented Artist, Eric Jones is Bringing Joy to Children Who Need it Most in the Form of Life-Size Sculptures

Nationally known caricature artist and pumpkin carver, Eric Jones has been in the business of making people smile for over 20 years. Now, he's taking that passion to a new level with his brand new non-profit organization, Sculpting for Smiles, to create one-of-a-kind sculptures for children with serious injuries or life-threatening illnesses.

"My tagline is 'Laughter is the best medicine, and all laughter starts with a smile'," said Jones. "The emotional toll these illnesses take on these kids is huge. To make them something that will bring some joy to their life is what it's all about."


Many know Jones as the winner of the Food Network's third season of "Outrageous Pumpkins" and a Season 10 finalist on Food Network's "Halloween Wars," though he originally got his start as a caricature artist. "I did that for 20 years before I started to dabble in pumpkin carving," he explained. "I established a good social media following and got pretty good at it. When the pumpkins rotted, I started doing snow sculptures. Many of them went viral and were featured on Fox and ESPN during football season. Then I started with sand when the snow melted!"

Jones' non-profit organization grew out of a snow sculpture he was asked to create for congenital heart defect awareness week in February for the Golisano Children's Hospital in Rochester. "I created a sculpture of Mike and Sully from 'Monsters, Inc.' and put it in a spot where kids in longer-term residency could see it," he explained. "It brought so much joy and so many smiles."

Since then, Jones has carved Baby Yoda in the yard of "Sophia the Fierce," who is battling stage IV leukemia, a German shepherd pup for Gabby, who was hit by a car, and Thor for Colt, who is a leukemia survivor undergoing another round of treatment.









Depending on the medium, Jones' sculptures can last anywhere from two days to three weeks. He noted, "They are temporary, and I think it's fitting. It adds value to the sculpture." Like a beautiful bouquet of fresh flowers, "We appreciate the beauty because they're temporary, and that makes them more beautiful," he said.

When it comes to raising awareness for a cause, such as congenital heart defect awareness month, Jones pointed out that the temporary nature of the carvings generates even more attention. "You're able to promote a cause so much easier than something that is permanent," he explained. "There's an urgency to come see it (the sculpture). Everyone wants a picture while it's still standing and looking good."

Jones is thrilled to share the news that Sculpting for Smiles has already raised enough funds for its first sculpture, which will be made for Wyatt, a child in Duke Center, Penn-sylvania. For this project, Jones will be creating a sand sculpture of the dog Marshall from "Paw Patrol." Jones already has a very busy summer booked but is hoping to set up at some local events where people can see his work and donate. 



Burdick's Awarded Farm of the Year in Cattaraugus County

It's delicious, it's versatile, it's a berry... It's a SUPERFOOD! Let me tell you all about blueberries!

We have 8 blueberry bushes at our home on Bryant Hill. This time of year, I dream of them and the luscious blue plump fruits these bushes produce. We feed them, we pamper them, we trim them, and we stand and admire them, waiting for the day I can make our first batch of blueberry muffins with fresh berries from our own yard. There are never enough to squirrel away for the entire year so most summers I head to Burdick's to fill the freezer.

For well over forty years, my kiddoes and I took our canning kettle and an assortment of Tupperware containers to fill to the brim in what seemed like moments with four of us picking. I go alone now, more grateful than ever for the easy ride to the berries. Amazingly, the vintage bushes seem as lush and abundant as I remembered with blue, antioxidant rich goodness. They are almost too pretty to eat! Not! Every bush must have a taste test and then I observe in amazement at how quickly I harvest my fill.

Health benefits of blueberries are abundant. Here is a summary of those benefits found at Healthline.com:

- Blueberries are low in calories, and high in fiber and Vitamins C and K.
- They seem to have the highest antioxidant capacity of all our usual fruits and veggies with flavonoids, giving them the most impact.
- Studies show they reduce the DNA damage that causes quicker aging and cancer.

Studies show that when you eat lots of blueberries you can reduce your blood pressure.
Some evidence indicates that eating fruits rich in anthocyanins – such as blueberries – is associated with reduced risk of heart attack.

Antioxidants aid brain function and delay mental decline, they may have anti-diabetes effects, may help with UTI's, and may aid in muscle recovery after exercise. Bottom line: blueberries are awesome, sweet, colorful and can be enjoyed fresh or frozen. The cool thing about Burdick's Blueberries, a third-generation blueberry farm, is that it's been around forever. Well, maybe NOT forever, but since 1952 when Milton Burdick and his wife, Pauline, bought the 80-acre farm they had been leasing and potato farming on for 15 years prior, and planted some 30,000 blueberry bushes on the property on Thompson Road in Cattaraugus, NY. He learned all about the science of raising the blue orbs at Michigan State and knew the site and soil were perfect.



He started selling them at a roadside stand in 1958, then by 1961 he fulfilled his pick-your-own vision and let his patrons do the picking. In the 60's the second generation pitched in, and then their eldest daughter, artistic and creative Paula Jo Edwards was the first to bring in the pick-your-own flower garden.

Their website informs us that "they made a career u-turn and moved from California in 2015 to keep the family farm and dream alive. While Amy oversees every detail of the farm operation, Beth manages the retail side and the flower production called Bluems. They started hosting guests in The Guest House in 2019."

The great thing about the guest house rented through Airbnb and Vrbo (see their website for full details – burdickblueberries.net) is that visitors have the entire property (now around 40 acres), the flower and vegetable gardens and the pool to themselves all year-round except during blueberry picking season – mid-July to mid-August. This well-kept Cattaraugus County Farm of the Year for 2023 award winner is so worth a visit, a picking, and even a weekend stay-cation!

With their store location secured, Bess and Clark began looking at similar stores in Aspen, Colorado and other western cities for inspiration. The Old West Co. will feature a hat bar that will allow customers to personalize their own cowboy hat with different bands, feathers, dried flowers, and branding irons to imprint their initials or different symbol brands. "In the coming months, we want to add custom shaping to cowboy hats as well," Bess added. Their inventory, geared specifically for the modern-day western look, will also include fashion cowboy boots for women, some men's cowboy boots, and western-style shorts, skirts, dresses and more. "Right now, we're really more aimed at women's fashions and will be getting a little bit of jewelry," Bess explained. "We'll have belts and wallets for men now and more men's clothing and boots soon."

Though not from the western part of the U.S., both Bess and her daughter are proud to call western New York home, as both were born and raised in Great Valley and attended Ellicottville Central School. THE MACKER IS BACK!

3-on-3 Basketball Tournament Will Return to Olean Next Month



OLEAN - The Macker is on the schedule in Olean! Entries are now being accepted for the Gus Macker 3-on-3 basketball tournament, to be played June 2-4 on Delaware Avenue in downtown Olean. The Greater Olean Area Chamber of Commerce and its 46 corporate sponsors are co-sponsoring this year's event.

More than 4,000 registration postcards were mailed out two weeks ago to team captains from tournaments held in Norwich, Hornell, Cicero, Ithaca, Rochester, and Olean last year. An additional 5,000 are being sent this month to schools in Allegany, Chautauqua, McKean and Cattaraugus Counties. Entry deadlines for teams interested in this year's tournament are Friday, May 12 for applications that are submitted by mail, and Monday, May 15 for internet entries. The entry fee for a four player team is \$160.

The three-day festival of basketball begins on Friday, June 2 with a Corporate Cup Basketball Contest and early registration, and continues through the division championships on Sunday, June 4. The tournament is open to players of all ages and experience levels who are computer-matched by age, height and experience so that all participants can be competitive.

"This is our second time hosting in June," said Meme K. Yanetsko, GOACC COO. "We anticipate an increase over the 120 teams that played last year; we are hoping to hit 190 teams! Regents were held locally in 2022 as well as the first round of spring sports play-offs. With the first weekend in June, those problems shouldn't affect us as much this year."

The tournament, based on basketball played in driveways throughout the U.S., will include players who have no experience to those who have played college and semi-professional basketball. Primarily based on age and level of experience, players will be placed in divisions where they will be most evenly matched. Depending on the number of teams placed in a specific division, players and the teams they're on will play for first, second, and third place. Also, teams that finish last in their divisions could receive "Toilet Bowl" trophies.

"For those student athletes that cannot forecast their high school team's regular schedule/rainouts, we want to remind all that there is a substitution policy," explained Yanetsko. After the original entry deadlines, teams are allowed to make a maximum of two (2) player substitutions after the following guidelines:

1. The substitution must be received in the Macker office in Belding, MI no later than 5:00pm (EST) on Wednesday, May 31.

2. The 'new' player(s) added to the roster must be the same age, same height or shorter, and have the same or less playing experience as the replaced player.



BE SAFE, BIKE HAPPY

May is National Bike Safety Month; Tips From Our Local Bicycle Outfitter

We've finally hit a spot of good warm weather and that means that people are out enjoying it in whatever way they can. For a lot of locals, that means it's time to break out the bicycles and hit up the trails. Bicycling is good for your health, an inexpensive means of travel, and if you are competitive, it's an exciting way to get your cardio in.

Bicycling also comes with its own set of risks. Are you well informed and prepared? May is National Bicycle Safety Month and it's never a bad thing to recap basic rules/ regulations. ellicottvilleNOW sat down with Dennis Baldwin, owner of Bikes, Burritos & Brews (Bike & Bean as most of us know it by), to talk about bicycle safety and what his team can offer to promote safe riding.

eNOW: Bike safety is important; what services does Bike & Bean recommend for all cyclists to have done?

DENNIS: A spring tune-up is always recommended. The full tune checks all aspects of the bicycle including tire dry rot, cracked frames and broken cables as well as making all of the necessary adjustments to make sure your bicycle is running smooth and safe.



eNOW: What safety routine do some of your staff members or yourself follow? **DENNIS:** Keeping proper tire pressure is essential for handling and efficiency. We check our tire pressure before each ride.

eNOW: What tips/tricks would you recommend for amateur and experienced riders to follow?

DENNIS: Ride within your abilities, especially at the beginning of the season when you don't have your cycling legs back quite yet. Ride at least a couple times a week to increase your endurance and gain comfort on your bicycle.

eNOW: What products do you have in the shop that promote safe riding?

DENNIS: Always wear a helmet! We know people roll their eyes when they hear that, but honestly, it's essential for safe riding. Gloves, elbow and knee pads are nice to have too. A basic blinking rear and front light helps motorists and other cyclist see you. If you like to ride on the road, remember to stay TIGHT TO THE RIGHT of the road and ride single file, especially when there is not a shoulder.

eNOW: Anything else you can think of to add?

DENNIS: When you head out to ride, remember to bring water, a snack and your cell phone. Bicycle jerseys have pockets in the back, making it easy to carry a few essentials. We also recommend carrying a small pump, tube and flat repair kit because you just never know. A seat-bag or hydration pack is a nice way to carry some of these items and they are always good to have on hand.

Thank you, Dennis, for taking the time to share such great safety info with us. Some other good things to note: Never ride distracted. (Always pay attention) Expect the un-expected. (Just because you're focused on safety doesn't mean everyone around you is as well.) Know the rules of riding on the road. Make sure to stop by the shop for a burrito, trail advice and road routes... We know the local ride scene very well!"





Sale of T-shirts Depicting Local Knife-Making to Raise Funds for Little Valley



LITTLE VALLEY - Long known as the epicenter of early American knife-making, Little Valley is celebrating its history while also raising needed funds for the town library, beautification committee, and other long-term projects. High-quality t-shirts made in Little Valley by Schubert Enterprises are now on sale at the Memorial Library of Little Valley for \$25, with all profits going to needy local groups.

"This is a wonderful local effort to highlight our history while bringing people into our library," said Memorial Library of Little Valley Director Linda McCubbin. "Little Valley's knife-making history is unparalleled, and our library offers rare items from our 200-year history, as well as many programs, top-rate collections, and a safe place for kids to learn."

The fundraising campaign and t-shirts are the brainchild of Little Valley alumnus and author Brad Lockwood, who has documented his hometown's history. "The Village of Knives' was the calling-card for Little Valley a century ago, when more cutlery companies operated here than anywhere in the world. We wanted to compile and list all of those companies, jobbers and masters included, for posterity. On the back of the t-shirt you will find some interesting facts, like W.R. Case & Son appearing without the 's' in Sons, which was only added when the company moved to Bradford, Pennsylvania. Union Cutlery/Ka-Bar are also listed, because they originated by the Brown brothers in a small home on Erie Street, Little Valley."

From W.R. Case & Sons to Cattaraugus Cutlery, Kinfolks and independent masters like Max Krug, Little Valley's history is at last being acknowledged. Historic status and official markers were recently earned and placed for Case Brothers Cutlery, as well as the Cattaraugus County Fairgrounds and Civil War Memorial, by the Pomeroy Foundation. More markers and annual events are also in the works, as knife collectors around the world want to visit the town where their favorite items were handcrafted.

"It's truly an honor to be part of the Case family and such amazing American history," offered John Burrell, who is a fourth-generation Case knife-maker, as well as Ellicottville Village Mayor. John runs "TopFlight Early American Cutlery" which issues limited edition, custom-made knives to honor his family. "We all started in Little Valley, so keeping these famous names alive is everything."

The Village of Knives t-shirts are now on sale at the Memorial Library of Little Valley for \$25 each. Sizes XXL and above cost a little bit more and, due to demand from knife collectors around the world, shipping may be arranged.



INTRODUCTION TO PILATES

Sunshine Pilates Owner Rachele Dove Breaks Down the Fundamentals

PILATES PRINCIPLES

Pilates is a form of exercise that focuses on strengthening the core muscles of the body while improving flexibility and balance. Originally developed by Joseph Pilates in the early 20th century, Pilates has become increasingly popular in recent years for its effectiveness in relieving pain, strengthening the body, and promoting overall health and wellness.

If you're new to Pilates, attending an introductory session can be a great way to get started and learn the fundamentals of the practice. Here is what you can expect from an introductory Pilates session.

The session will focus on breathing, being centered, flow, precision, control, and concentration. It will include an introduction to the 5 basic principles of Pilates: breathing, pelvic placement, rib cage placement, scapular movement & stabilization, and head & cervical placement. The exercises will focus on target muscles, stability, mobility, sequencing, endurance, and balance control.

Pilates can be a great way to improve your overall health and wellness, and an introductory session can be a great way to get started. By learning the basics of proper technique and form, you can begin practicing Pilates safely and effectively, whether in a class setting or on your own.

Pilates is focused on improving muscle tone through proper posture, breathing, control and precision. Over the next few weeks, I will provide tips on how to improve your overall mobility, flexibility, and strength by becoming more aware of your body and space. I will explain fundamental exercises focusing on proper positioning to help increase your skill and control to maximize the full benefits of Pilates.

Here is a simple exercise to become more aware of your body and space:

Standing tall, visualize a string being pulled from the top of your head, your eyes sit above your shoulders and your back straight. Your body should feel light over your hips. Focus on grounding your feet on the floor. Take a few moments to familiarize yourself with this technique. Proper breathing will help you to relax your muscles and relieve tension.
