





FRESH CONCRETE READY FOR SKATEBOARDS

Village of Ellicottville and SK8EVL Committee Plan Grand Opening Celebration of New Public Skatepark



ELLICOTTVILLE - Following three years of fundraising and a year of construction, the Ellicottville Skatepark Committee (SK8EVL) and the Village of Ellicottville announce the grand opening date of the new concrete skatepark, located inside Ellicottville's Village Park. The celebration is set for Friday, June 30, 2023 at 4:00pm. All are encouraged to attend.

The skatepark, designed and built by Grindline of Seattle, WA, is a culmination of the passion of local skateboarding advocates and a matching grant awarded by The Skatepark Project and Ralph C. Wilson Jr. Foundation. With title sponsorship for the project supported by the New Car Dealers of WNY Charitable Foundation, the skatepark will be named the New Car Dealers of WNY Ellicottville Skatepark.

"On behalf of SK8EVL, we can't thank the New Car Dealers of WNY Charitable Foundation enough for their support in this endeavor," said Brenda Perks, SK8EVL lead advocate. "Their \$100,000 donation turned into \$200k as a result of The Skatepark Project and RCW Jr. Foundation's Built to Play matching grant program. Add to that all the support we've received from businesses and community members right here in Ellicottville, as well as support from the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation (CRCF), and we now have a state-of-the-art facility that welcomes all ages, all skill levels, and most importantly, a safe space where our youth can be active, develop friendships and express themselves through the sport of skateboarding."

Built to Play Skatepark Grants are offered through a partnership between The Skatepark Project and the Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Foundation. The grant initiative offers matching grant funds of up to \$250,000. The Built to Play Skatepark Program supports community groups and municipal entities throughout Western NY and SE Michigan that are seeking to create free, public skateparks that serve low-income communities. Built to Play Skatepark Grants also include an additional \$50,000 to fund processes and design features that lessen the environmental impact of the skatepark. Ellicottville received the full match as well as the environmental impact award.

CRCF Executive Director Karen Niemic Buchheit praised the SK8EVL committee for their efforts to raise funds for the skatepark project. "It is no small feat for a group of volunteers to raise \$250,000," said Buchheit. "It is a testament to the dedication of Brenda, her husband Chris and the SK8EVL committee that they were able to raise such a total for this skatepark. Because of their efforts, there will be an incredible space for skateboarders, roller skaters, BMX riders and more that is unlike anything in Cattaraugus County to date."

They're looking forward to welcoming everyone to the 1st Annual "Nada Regatta" Music Festival, set to take place Friday, June 9th from 3:00-11:00pm and Saturday, June 10th from noon-midnight. The event will celebrate the 75th Anniversary of the Great Valley Volunteer Fire Company. One-day concert tickets will be offered at the gate or you can snag a full weekend concert wristband when you show up on Friday. Wristbands are just \$10 per person and are good for both days.

The line-up of bands for the inaugural weekend is impressive, featuring favorites like Mo Porter, Hazzard County and Red Rain. Concerts are being held behind the Fire Department Clubhouse (directly across from the Fire Department, located at 6035 Depot Street in Great Valley, NY) and for all those who might have been worried, fear not... beer will be served there. There will also be food vendors and breakfast service, too!

Keep in mind there are some rules to abide by. You CANNOT BYOB (bring your own beverages) into the music event area; alcohol will be on sale at the venue. You should bring a comfortable lawn chair but DO NOT BRING tents or canopies. Hard coolers are NOT allowed but soft coolers are. You will be required to present photo ID to access the beer tent.

There will be limited parking near the venue, with overflow parking available by the campgrounds. They will have a shuttle service available for all campers and anyone using the overflow parking on Klawitter Road and will run one hour prior to and after the bands perform.

You can still camp on good ole' Klawitter Road for Nada Regatta. A weekend camping pass is \$75 and it offers access to the campgrounds on June 9th at noon - June 11th. Each campsite measures 20' x 50'. Six people and one vehicle are permitted per campsite.

If you don't pick up the weekend pass, camping spots are on a first come, first served basis. One camper per site. All registered campers with vehicles may not leave until Sunday morning, to keep weekend traffic flowing smoothly. No camping is permitted out-





ECS BUDGET VOTE RESULTS ARE IN

Proposition 1: The basic budget will provide funds for all of the educationally related services and the maintenance of the school building. The budget was at the sum of \$14,906,437 for the 2023/2024 school year. Votes came it at 190 for and 31 against.

Proposition 2: The Ellicottville Board of Education was authorized to levy an additional (not to exceed) \$62,675 to lease one 66 passenger school and one 60+OWC passenger for each of the next five years (five annual payments), commencing with the 2023/2024 school year. The vote was 199 for to 20 against.

Proposition 3: The Ellicottville Board of Education and the Ellicottville Central School District were authorized to levy taxes annually in the amount of \$75,000 and to pay over such monies to the trustees of the Ellicottville Memorial Library. Vote was 181 for to 39 against.

Lastly, the Board of Education Member Elections were held, with the two candidates who received the most votes elected to serve a five-year term beginning July 1, 2023 and expiring on June 30, 2028. The two candidates with the highest vote count were Jenna O'Connell with 171 and Debra Golley with 158.

ALLEGANY NATURE PILGRIMAGE

Allegany State Park Combines Fun with an Outdoor Learning Experience

You may have been one of the lucky ones in the 60s to have first attended an Allegany Nature Pilgrimage at Allegany State Park, aka "the wilderness playground of Western New York." The program has been around long enough for you to now take your grandchildren to this amazing outdoor learning experience for naturalists of all levels and ages. Simply put, from their website, "The Allegany Nature Pilgrimage is an annual outdoor learning experience. It combines fun with a variety of nature-oriented activities." You'll find the Program Schedule for Classes, Walks, and Fieldtrips at www.alleganynaturepilgrimage. com (presently confirmed – could change) which can help you plan your weekend. Please note: no pets are allowed on the pilgrimage.

The Nature Pilgrimage is held at "Camp Allegany" in the Red House area of beautiful Allegany State Park, NYS's largest state park covering a vast 65,000 acres (101.5 square miles). Red House Area is the northeastern half of Allegany State Park. Here you will find Stone Tower, the Summit Fire Tower (built in 1926, the tower is open to the public during times when the park is open), Red House Lake, Bridal Falls, the Art Roscoe Ski Area, and the Administration Building (the original one in 1921 was a converted school-house).

If you've ever read about the good work done by the CCC – especially during the WWII war years, this park is a perfect example of it. Wikipedia informs us that "the park was developed extensively between 1933 and 1942 when the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) took on the project of building roads, bridges, camping areas, trails, picnic areas and a ski resort. The CCC were also responsible for numerous conservation projects from reforestation to stream bank retention and wildlife improvements."

What's the big deal about this program, you ask? Well, it's local, yet you'll get a comprehensive worldview of nature when you are done. You will learn about birding and botany, butterflies and bees, dragonflies and damselflies, nature photography (on your iPhone), and art, mushrooms and edible wild plants, rocks and fossils and orienteering (how not to get lost in the wilds), wildflowers and grasses and sedges, frogs and fauna and the incredible richness and gifts of old growth for-



est. This program also offers classes in yoga, and papermaking, etc. This is not a complete list, so please go online at alleganynaturepilgrimage.com and get all the information about the program. There you will find registration details, leader bios, event details, etc. Lodging and food are your responsibility, but the site will help you through those details as well. There is one deadline – a Saturday evening meal (BBQ chicken) is available but must be pre-ordered no later than May 20th. Learn more about logistics on the Event Details page.

Pro tips: pack bug spray, sunscreen, tick repellant spray (plus wear long and wear light)-https://mountainjourney.com/avoid-ticks-while-hiking/), sturdy footwear (leave the flipflops at home), rain gear, a hat, water bottle and coffee mug (java available at registration building Friday afternoon and Saturday morning), binoculars and camera, blanket and/or lawn chair. Per the program Chairman, Lon Myers, "Last minute walk-ins will be accepted for a single day fee." Unfortunately, you cannot pick only one or several programs – "one fee entitles the registrant to attend any of the over 130 programs. As a volunteer group, it would be very difficult to administer a pay as you go event."



ONOVILLE MARINA PARK

Boaters Take to the Waters for Another Season of Fun

It's always interesting to peek into the history books and learn a bit about the places we frequent and how they came to be. Consider the marina located on the Allegheny Reservoir in Frewsburg, NY, north of the Allegheny National Forest and west of Allegany State Park.

Now, before you think you found a typo in that sentence (Allegheny/Allegany), let me clarify. From Wikipedia, we learn that in the 1700's the Delaware Indians called all the creeks and waters meeting together Alligewinenk or, "land into which they came from distant parts." They called the river itself Allgewi Sipo – which whites then changed to the French, Alleghene, while the Six Nations tribes called the river Ohio (Ohi;'i:o) meaning "river beautiful" in the Seneca language. There is a NYS sign on Interstate 86, on Seneca lands, indicating the name of the river below as Ohi:Yo'. To further educate you, areas around the river have an alternate spelling of Allegany as in the village of Allegany and Allegany State Park. BTW, the river is 325 miles long, and water from the Allegheny River eventually flows into the Gulf of Mexico via the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers.

Onoville Marina sits on land known as South Valley which was settled by the Quakers in 1798. Ironically, although Seneca leaders, Cornplanter and Handsome Lake, had a few problems with a sawmill the Quakers built and then tore down in respect for the Seneca leaders, it was the Quakers who helped the Senecas keep their land which the Ogden Land Company wanted to acquire. Alas, no one, not even President John F. Kennedy whom the Senecas wrote to for intervention, could help when, in 1965, the Kinzua Dam was constructed, and the town was doomed to be evacuated and razed along with many small communities along the river. A hamlet known as Onoville sat where the marina was built.



Now known as one of the Chautauqua-Allegany region's finest, yet most affordable marina and park, Onoville is open for the 2023 season! Seasonal camping sites are already sold out. (You need to jump in at the first of 2024 to have a chance of getting one.) Weekly camping is sparse as well, so get online today if you want to spend more than a few hours in the area, and your schedule is flexible. It's very worth the time online if you can get the dates you want, with 91 miles of shoreline and secluded bays waiting for your visit. The area is "God's country" beautiful for a day trip and your chances of seeing bald eagles and osprey are very good.

And you can make a great day out of visiting. You can rent a boat (seasonally) from the Ono Outfitters and Oasis Boat Rentals when they open at the end of May and take a spin through the beautiful waters. You can stop at the Onoville General Store or the Turtle Pit to grab some snacks to munch on your trip, then when you come back to shore, you can hit up one of the local restaurants around the Marina for a good meal to end the day.

Two great options are the Horseshoe Inn Bar & Grill and The Hide-A-Way. The Horseshoe has been around for a very long time and is located at 1105 W. Perimeter Road in Frewsburg, NY. They operate Thursday through Saturday from noon-9:00pm and on Sundays from noon-8:00pm. They serve traditional American food in a friendly atmosphere. The Hide-A-Way is located at 2597 Route 394 in Steamburg, NY and is open everyday from 11:30am-9:00pm, except Fridays and Saturdays, when they are open until 10:00pm. They specialize in homestyle family meals both formal and casual. Their motto is: "From the moment you walk in, you're family."

Core Performance: Starting a Workout Program? Be Prepared for DOMS: Delayed Onset Muscle Soreness

Starting a workout program can be challenging. Making the time to exercise, creating a balanced routine, and setting goals are hard enough, but add to that the muscle soreness that comes with adapting to that regimen, and it may be difficult to stay on track.

After participating in some kind of strenuous physical activity, particularly something new to your body, it is common to experience muscle soreness, say experts. "Muscles go through quite a bit of physical stress when we exercise," says Rick Sharp, professor of exercise physiology at Iowa State University in Ames. "Mild soreness is just a natural outcome of any kind of physical activity," he says, "and they're most prevalent in beginning stages of a program.

Exercise physiologists refer to the gradually increasing discomfort that occurs between 24 and 48 hours after activity as delayed onset muscle soreness (DOMS), and it is perfectly normal. Delayed onset muscle soreness (DOMS) is a common result of physical activity that stresses the muscle tissue beyond what it is accustomed to. To be more specific, delayed onset muscle soreness occurs when the muscle is performing an eccentric or a lengthening contraction. Examples of this would be running downhill or the lengthening portion of a bicep curl. The mild muscle strain injury creates microscopic damage to the muscle fibers. Scientists believe this damage, coupled with the inflammation that accompanies these tears, causes the pain. "The aches and pains should be minor," says Carol Torgan, an exercise physiologist and fellow of the American College of Sports Medicine, "and are simply indications that muscles are adapting to your fitness regimen."

No one is immune to muscle soreness. Exercise newbies and body builders alike experience delayed onset muscle soreness.

Exercise physiologists and athletic trainers have not yet discovered a remedy for DOMS, however, several remedies such as ice, rest, anti-inflammatory medications, massage, heat, and stretching have been reported as helpful in the process of recovery. Stretching helps break the cycle, which goes from soreness to muscle spasm to contraction and tightness.

Probably the most important thing is to have a cool-down phase after your workout. This can involve finishing with a light jog or walk for 10 minutes or more followed by stretch-

Delayed onset muscle soreness usually affects only the body parts that were worked, so perhaps you can work other muscle groups while letting the fatigued ones recover. It's also a process of muscle conditioning. I usually stress this with my newer clients that the



next time they do the activity, there will be less muscle tissue damage, less soreness, and a faster strength recovery.

Soreness can serve as encouragement in a workout program because people like immediate results. Muscle doesn't visibly [grow] overnight; nor does your time in the mile drop from eight to six minutes, but something like soreness can give people encouragement that they are in fact working the muscle.


The BOCES system has its origins in Section 1950 of state Education Law, which authorized the creation of boards of cooperative educational services. What began with just a few local supply teacher programs has grown into a statewide network serving nearly all of the state's more than 700 school districts.



GUS MACKER DEADLINE EXTENDED

3-on-3 Basketball Tournament Registration Deadline Extended to May 22

OLEAN - Macker officials from the organization's headquarters in Belding, Michigan have extended the deadline for Olean, NY registration. Entries are still being accepted for the Olean Gus Macker Basketball Tournament. The Greater Olean Area Chamber of Commerce is calling for visitors, students and community members to sign up for the June 2-4 Gus Macker three-on-three basketball tournament.

Entry deadline for teams interested in this year's tournament are Monday, May 22 at 11:59 PM for applications that are submitted on-line for internet entries. To register on-line, go to www.macker.com. The entry fee must accompany the team's application and be paid by credit card. The entry fee for four player teams is \$160. Offline applications can be brought to the Chamber no later than 3:00pm on Friday, May 19th to be sent up with the others that the office has collected. The Chamber anticipates having over 160 teams and 6,000 spectators from a 100-mile radius to attend the 3-day event and see this as a great opportunity to showcase Olean.

"My blood pressure hasn't done well this past week – with the slow uptick of the teams entering the tournament," joked Meme K. Yanetsko, GOACC COO. Team counts were at 40 - May 5; 63 - May 9; 72 - May 13; and then May 15th - 94 teams. "The Macker shows updates in real time online for host cities. It's known that a Macker won't be held if 100 teams aren't signed up. Last year, the team count was similar – I believe that the make up of players are now focusing on one sport throughout the year, many also may have other sports commitments (but we knew that, but figured Jamestown held it in early June for many successful years)," she added.

The tournament will take place on Delaware Avenue and North Barry Streets in Olean, NY. The tournament, based on basketball played in driveways throughout the U.S., will include players who have no experience to those who have played college and semi-professional basketball. Primarily based on their age and level of experience, players will be placed in divisions where they will be most evenly matched. Depending on the number of teams placed in a specific division, players and the teams they're on will be playing for first- and second- and third trophies. Also teams that finish last in their divisions could receive "Toilet bowl" trophies.

"If I was a betting person, I would say that we will be close to last year's 125 teams entering the 2023 Olean Macker," she continued. The Macker budget for 2023 is based on 160 teams.

The major sponsors of this year's tournament are the 45 corporate partners of the Chamber. They fronted the \$10,000 franchise fee to bring the tourney to town. Organizers also are looking for volunteers to keep score, serve as referees, assist with water and food distribution, and help set up and tear down.
