REO SPEEDWAGON READY TO ROCK SENECA ALLEGANY CASINO







While Kent's cautious mother wouldn't allow him to join the rodeo, she never said he couldn't run his own. Little did Kent know that a stranger on his doorstep would make this dream a reality. Now over 30 years later, the Ellicottville Championship Rodeo is still bringing joy and adventure to thousands of people, and 2023 promises to be another great year! Mark your calendar for Fourth of July weekend (June 29th - July 2nd) when cowboys and cowgirls from all over the world will be heading to Ellicottville to compete in nine different events.

Even though Kent did not join the rodeo as a young man, his life has been no less adventurous! When Kent bought the farm at 6319 Sommerville Valley Road in Ellicottville, he couldn't wait to buy his own horses; three weeks later, he'd already purchased 16! With the support of his family, he decided to open a riding stable, which was met with an enthusiastic response. "Once it caught on, we did 110 to 120 rides a day, six days a week," said Kent.

While the riding stable was a success in and of itself, many were asking Kent to do more, and he thought about rodeo. "The next thing I knew, there was a guy by the name of Mike Swearingen pounding on my door," Kent recalled. "He was down here turkey hunting and went to the Gin Mill for a beer and dinner and overheard someone talking about me and my idea. He said, 'I heard you're thinking about doing rodeos - my brother and I put them on! Let's talk." And so began a thirty-two-year-long relationship with Rawhide Rodeo, who recently sold to All American Rodeo.

"All American is an excellent rodeo company; this is our third year with them," said Kent. While Kent owns the Ellicottville Rodeo facilities, which include an announcer's

LAUREN SMITH VEGAS BOUND

Local Pool Player and Team Heading to World Championships

Experienced in playing several different sports, Lauren Smith of Randolph was initially hesitant to try her hand at pool. "I was nervous to even get involved," she recalled. "If I wasn't good, I didn't want to be judged. But doing this made me realize it's for all skill levels... Anyone can play pool: It's really about showing up, participating, and having a good time!"

Five years and an eighteen-hour pool tournament later, Smith and her team are headed to Las Vegas for the American Pool Players Association World Championship!

Some may recognize Smith from Madigan's in Ellicottville, where she waitresses, but on Wednesday nights, she can be found at the Gowanda American Legion, where she and her team play weekly to prepare for the Las Vegas tournament scheduled for August 8-12th. "My dad, Casey Smith, is my captain, and he's been my captain and coach for the past five years," she explained. "We've been playing on the APA league for the past five years together. We're a team of eight, and Hughes Hotel in Little Valley is our home base - our big trophy is there!"

Smith's team, Smitty's Strokers, has been playing 8-ball and 9-ball, known as double jeopardy, in a weekly league at Hughes Hotel. Team members include Brian Ruth, Rusty Ruth, Barbie Smith (Lauren's aunt), Lorene Martin, Jenna Frederickson, Logan West, and Casey Smith, the team captain. In 8-ball, all 15 balls are used, with the 8-ball in the middle of the rack. "After the break, you're hitting solids or stripes, and you don't have to go in number order," said Smith. "In 9-ball, you play with only nine balls. It's a game where you have to go in number order, one through eight, and then the 9-ball is two points - it's all graded on a point system."

Smith's team advanced to the WNY APA World Pool Qualifiers for 9-ball, and on Mother's Day weekend, their skills were put to the test! Held at the Gowanda American Legion, the WNY APA World Pool Qualifiers included players who compete

weekly in 8-ball, 9-ball, and doubles (8 and 9-ball format), masters and ladies formats. The WNY APA Pool League is owned by league operators Chris and Vernoica Washy, who have owned and operated the franchise since July of 2015. Initially, the franchise included all of Erie County, but in 2018, the territory was split into two leagues: WNY APA (which includes southern Erie County) and Buffalo APA. WNY APA has over 360 local members and is the largest pool league in the southern Erie County area and Cattaraugus County.



REO SPEEDWAGON: The Iconic Band Returns to Seneca Allegany Casino



JUNE 24th • 7:00PM

Saturday, June 24th will be rocking at Seneca Allegany Resort & Casino's Events Center for the much anticipated return of one of the greatest bands of all time when REO Speedwagon plays one show only. Playing at Seneca in 2015, the band is ready to hit the stage again and see all their fans letting go of all the problems going on in the world and just rock out and have fun.

For over 50 years REO Speedwagon has solidified their status as one of the most iconic bands in both the Rock and Adult Contemporary music genres. Think about that for a second... they're still going strong and selling out venues all over the world for more than a half century.

Starting out in the late 1960's at a college in Champaign, Illinois, the band paid their dues by playing endless small gigs until all the hard work and countless shows earned them critical acclaim as a band that started the rock movement in the Midwest. With the release of their 9th album, "Hi Infidelity" in 1980, they were ready to be catapulted into music history with the biggest selling rock album of 1981, which went on to sell well over 10 million copies.

That album garnered the band some of the most recognized songs around the world that are still staples on classic rock or adult contempo-rary radio stations today. Songs like "Keep On Loving You" and "Take It On The Run" are considered rock anthems by music industry standards.

Touring through the past decades, they've teamed up with other power groups like Styx and Chicago, their Midwestern cousins, and have laid claim to some of the biggest concert events that have sold out venues wherever they go.

A Conversation with Bruce Hall

HULICK: The last time you played here it was 2015 at Seneca Allegany and we're thrilled to see you're coming back.

HALL: Yes. We don't get up there every year but we get there when we can.

HULICK: I'm sure some of the places you play must feel almost like home, as many times as you've played certain cities and venues.

HALL: Yeah especially in the states... we plow through it every year and thank goodness the fans keep coming and they're loving the shows. So I think we're going to keep going as long as the fans want us to.

HULICK: I imagine you're having a blast, especially since the whole Covid thing. **HALL:** I think that was probably the toughest thing any of us had been through. Most musicians I know - and actually we can include anyone in the entertainment business really went through some tough times. Everything stopped... just com-pletely stopped. It was tough. We did little things that we could and I ended up with a couple cameos just to have a place to play a little bit and to help raise a little money for the crew. Kevin did a little thing at his house. We were having cabin fever. We didn't know what to do with ourselves We didn't know what to do with ourselves.

HULICK: I know how much artists' families want them to be home more often. Did it get to a point when your family said... Don't you have a tour to go do? (laughs) Kinda like a "be careful what you wish for" scenario? HALL: (laughs) Yeah! I have to say my wife wanted me to go out, not because she

was sick of me, but she just thought it was starting to affect me, not being able to go out and play my music. I did a lot of stuff around the house... boy did I ever. (laughs) That's all I had to do was to fix things. It happened to everybody. It wasn't just us. I'm amazed we all made it through it as well as we did. In the beginning it seemed like anybody that got Covid was handed a death sentence... that would be the end of you... you were a goner... and it was scary. When things started changing around, when everyone was getting their vaccinations, and as time went on the thinking changed to if I get sick I get sick... I got enough vaccine in me to kill a horse (laughs). Finally we could all start getting out of our houses.

HULICK: You're right. I'll tell you something. All the musicians, the bands and solo artists are all full speed ahead, especially this summer. Last summer things started coming together with tours starting back up, but this year is crazy. You can't even keep track of all the concerts coming to your area. It's terrific! **HALL:** That's for sure! You're right.

HULICK: Is there a favorite place you and/or the band like to play? **HALL:** Sure there is. I have a couple. There's the mid-west... I'm from Illinois and that's where I grew up so I like playing in Chicago and St. Louis. Those are two of my favorites. I like playing in Detroit, and I like Colorado at the Red Rocks - that's a really great place to play. There's a lot of great places to play. Those are just the first ones that come to mind. I would say the mid-west because that's where we're from and we get to see family and friends when we go back there. from and we get to see family and friends when we go back there.

HULICK: I met you backstage in 2005 at the Erie County Fair. I interviewed James Young of Styx, who were playing the show with you guys. **HALL:** We tour with Styx a lot. We're all good friends. We even made an album

together, "Live At Riverport". It's a double album. There's a full set of Styx and a full set of us, and then we did three or four songs together. We also did a song together, "Can't Stop Rocking". We all played on it in the studio that particular tour and I thought it turned out great. It really didn't do anything, but it was fun to make it.

HULICK: You guys and Styx are iconic bands of the 80's. I was a senior in the 80's and a group of us would get together every Friday night and we would play the "Hi Infidelity" album and sing the entire album so loud to the point that the neighbors would come over and say... go ahead and sing but can you keep it down a little bit? (laughs) Of course our choir director wished we had that strong of vocals in choir.

(laughs) (laughs) **HALL:** That's great! Rock and Roll is supposed to be loud and if you disturb the neighbors that's even better. (laughs). When we were kids growing up we practiced in the house and my next door neighbors used to hate that and they would call the police and the police would come by and tell us to turn it down. We were like... ugh really? It was part of the whole training on learning how to be a rock and roller, because you had to play with a little bit of volume. I didn't see any problem getting in trouble for that. (laughs)

HULICK: (laughs) Right? There's a lot worse things you could have gotten in trouou say is your favorite decade, persona you have a decade that you seem to go back to in your mind that stands out? HALL: Well... the 80's of course... what I can remember of them. Looking back on it, it seemed like it was fun at the time. We were young with too much money and we were running around the country and being stupid and doing things we shouldn't have been doing. The 60's were interesting because the Beatles came along and the whole British Invasion happened and it changed a lot of people's lives, mine included. There were a lot of kids my age that were starting to let their hair grow, wearing bell bottoms. That doesn't sound like much now but back then it was. I got kicked out of school for wearing bell bottoms... that was terrible. One day they told me to go home and change my clothes and my Phys Ed teacher cut my hair... some of it. (laughs)

band, for their return performance at Seneca Allegany Casino. Our conversation had us looking back at our lives and the connection we had to the "Hi Infidelity" album. We also talked about any new projects they're working on to which Hall said, "We still write a lot of songs, we record some of them but we just keep them and wait to see what happens in the future."

As with most artists, the elation they feel post-Covid is present in their minds, which we got into as the guitarist talked about how tough those couple years were.

Asking what the best thing about being Bruce Hall is, he replied, "I would say my love of many things... I love my family, I love my band and I love music. I love traveling together with my band. Even after all this time we really love each other, like brothers. We don't always get along, we have disagreements, but that's what a normal family does.

Core Performance: Treating Muscle Pain

It's hard to get through life without straining a muscle, spraining a ligament, suffering a headache or wrenching your back. And the longer you're on the planet, the more susceptible you are to arthritis. But when something hurts, what will make it feel better: ice or heat? And when does it make sense to use both? These are such common questions I hear almost daily, so I decided it was time to clear up the confusion.

Arthritis - The inflammation of joints or pain caused by worn-away cartilage in joints can cause pain and stiffness in places like your elbows, knees, shoulders and fingers, just to name a few. For these instances, moist heat, like a soak in a tub or shower of warm-but-not-hot water (92-100°) helps.

Who hasn't experienced a headache of some degree? Some are lighter, easily treated with OTC pain relievers while others require some extra steps for relief. Ice can help soothe throbbing pain in your head. Cold masks or wraps over the forehead, eyes and temples help the throbbing pain of a migraine. While ice is usually preferred for headaches, moist heat or a heat wrap can relax neck spasms that contribute to headaches.

Muscle strains and sprains usually benefit from a combo of both ice and heat when they occur. Whether you've pulled a muscle in your calf or back doing yard work or sprained your ankle playing basketball, it's best to start either off with ice to ease inflammation (including swelling, redness or tenderness of the injury) and numb the pain. Only after the inflammation resolves is it a good idea to switch to heat; this can help relieve any muscle stiffness at the injury site.

Tendinitis is a painful inflammation issue that affects the tendons - the connective tissues between your muscles and bones. A common cause is repetitive activities so tendons in your elbow, knee, shoulder, hip and even your Achilles tendon are common sites.

Besides the usual measures to alleviate the pain - rest, pausing of activities that cause pains, OTC pain relievers - ice is the preferred method here as it can ease the inflamma-

June is National Pollinator Month

Cornell Cooperative Extension Cattaraugus County's Master Gardener Program is celebrating National Pollinator month by sharing information and resources to help create a garden for your favorite pollinators.

Pollinators include more than just butterflies and honeybees. Did you know, there are 450 native bees in NYS? Pollinators also include an assortment of wild native bees, beetles, moths, bats, wasps, birds, specialized flies, and other beneficial insects. They all play an important role in pollinating plants. They have very basic needs – food, source of water, and shelter from wind and heavy rain. You do not need a large plot of land or large garden space to create an inviting refuge for pollinators. In fact, you can start with just a couple of container pots!

tion and help numb the pain.

While similar to tendinitis in that there's tendon pain, tendinosis is distinct because of the cause: a chronic, long-term condition caused by a degenerating tendon. Because this condition involves irritation and stiffness in tendons attached to joints, heat is best for relieving stiffness in the joints, but only after the inflammation resolves.

GUIDELINE FOR APPLYING ICE AND HEAT

You can apply ice and heat in lots of ways. Experts generally recommend up to 20 minutes on and 20 minutes off...

• Ice packs: Frozen peas or corn, ice cubes in a baggie or frozen gel pack. You can ice beyond 48 hours, until swelling, tenderness or inflammation are gone.

• Ice massage: Freeze water in a Dixie cup, peel back the top, and massage the tender area until it's numb. (Best for targeted icing after injury or for areas too awkward for ice packs, like the elbow or heel.)

• Cold masks: Place a cold mask, available at drugstores, over your eyes or lay a towel soaked in cold water over your forehead and temples.

• Moist heat: Enjoy a bath, shower, hot tub or whirlpool using warm, not hot, water (92-100°).

• Heat wraps: Drape a heat wrap, available at drugstores, around your neck like a scarf (great for work or travel).

• Heating pads: To avoid burns, remove heating pads if the area becomes uncomfortably warm.

There are some considerations before you head out to your favorite local nursery. First, you'll want to identify your space. You can start small and always build on later. Take note if the garden site is sunny or shaded and if there is easy access to water nearby. Whenever possible, choose native. Native plants are important because they have co-evolved with native insects, birds, and wildlife. It's important to maintain that ecosystem. Native plants also have a remarkable root system, compared to non-native plants (EPA). These deep roots reduce soil erosion, water runoff and help to store carbon.

Consider your local conditions when choosing the right plant(s). Do you live in a swampy area? Do you have acidic or alkaline soil? Is your soil type sandy, clay or loamy? Do you reside in an urban/rural/suburban environment?

Include plants that serve as food for all stages, such as caterpillars, as well as those that provide nectar and pollen for adults. The best nectar flowers are fragrant, have a long season of bloom, and provide a sequence of bloom throughout the season. Clumped or massed plantings are most effective in attracting butterflies and bees. Flowers that are flat-topped or clustered provide landing platforms and easy access to nectar. Plant flowers with a variety of shapes, like tubular, bowl-shaped & flat-topped, to appeal to a large variety of pollinators. Blue, purple, white, pink, yellow, orange, and red flowers may entice butterflies and other pollinators to your yard. Consider being a part of the monarch butterfly conservation efforts and designate your property as a "Monarch Waystation". For more information, visit www.monarchwatch.org/waystations.

booth, two offices, and a large kitchen, he hires All American to come in with the animals. This year, the rodeo includes the following nine events: bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, team roping, junior bull riding, cowgirls barrel racing, calf roping, cowgirls breakaway roping, and bull riding.

Contestants from all around the world will compete, and Kent anticipates even more contestants this year. "I raised the prize money in the arena to attract more cowboys," he explained. "Usually, we have 450 to 500 cowboys a year, and they come from all over the world. We get Brazilian cowboys, lots of Canadians, and cowboys from all over the country, including a lot from Texas and Florida. Our clown, Hollywood Harris, is also from Florida."

This year, Kent says there will be lots of break-away ropers, barrel racers, and plenty of bronc riders, too. "Our show always last two hours and about 30 or 40 minutes. On Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, we start at 7:00pm, with fireworks right after the show every night [excluding Sunday]." On Sunday, July 2nd, the show begins at 2:00pm.

This annual family-friendly event includes fun for all ages! Families with young children can enjoy the kids' stick horse race, which is open to youth ages 10 and younger. Registration is at the K-M Tack Tent, which is just inside the gate. Camping is allowed on the rodeo grounds (no electricity available), and there are plenty of food vendors along the midway. Gates open two hours prior to the start of each rodeo, so there is plenty of time to have a bite to eat or check out the tack show vendors.

Plenty of tickets will be available at the gate for each day of the rodeo, and parking is free, as always. 


