




There are several other non-profit organizations outside of Ellicottville in Cattaraugus County that are participating in Give 716! The Tri-County Arts Council, located in Olean, has been an advocate for the arts in Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, and Allegany counties for over 30 years and has recently expanded into a 3,300 square-feet facility. With several exhibits per year, classes, and a destination Artisan Market, the TCAC is committed to the creation and appreciation of arts and culture in the region. The Genesis House of Olean provides secure temporary housing and supportive services for homeless adults and families as they transition to more stable housing. In 2022, the Genesis House provided 88 adults and 17 families and their 24 children with housing and services. Case management continues even after residents leave Genesis House; all participants who complete the program obtain safe, affordable housing and assistance with furnishing their new home. You might have heard of the Frank Pitillo "Light Up the Night" Memorial Lighting Fund. If you haven't, you should, so let's get you a little background. The fund was created in June 2022 by Nick Pitillo who explained the purpose of the foundation as this, "This project is to replace the lighting on the Sports Field at Ellicottville Central School. These lights were put up through a community effort in 1977 in honor of Frank Pitillo, a local athlete that was killed in a motorcycle accident. They have fallen on disrepair, and the school has been unable to properly replace the lights. These lights will be in place for years to come, so they can help create new memories for the next generation. Whether it was playing a sport, or attending games, "Friday Night Lights" is a cherished tradition that has created countless memories for generations, not only here, but across the entire country."

How important is the lighting really, you ask? Well, sport field lighting is actually critical for coaches, players and spectators alike. Teams can't practice in the dark. Players can't take the field if they can't see it. And if teams cannot play, spectators do not get to watch. So what seems like a trivial thing is honestly extremely impactful.

The new system promises to enhance the access to athletic fields by upgrading the ECS Stadium lights to a more environmentally efficient system. This new lighting will last up to 25 times longer than the current bulbs and will increase the number of hours that the field can be accessed. Not to mention the new lights can use up to 75% less energy. But above all, the new lights will increase clarity and reduce blind spots on the field which will help our young athletes play safely.

So now you know what the foundation is doing and what the tournament is helping them accomplish. So how do you enter? Well, lightevl.com has a list of costs and sponsorship opportunities in detail, but cost is \$175 a player, \$600 per foursome, and you receive a \$100 discount if you go in a four person team along with a tee sponsorship sign. There are several levels of sponsorships available if putting isn't for you.



Maybe you aren't gifted at the game of golf or you can't commit to a full sponsorship? No worries, you can donate to the cause directly, as it is a registered non-profit with the Cattaraugus Regional Community Foundation (501c3), in Olean, NY. You can visit and donate to the fund directly or you can pay through the lightevl.com website, and they allocate the funds from there to the proper place.





Meet Humphrey Resident and Forestry Technician Lisa Moeke Barlow

The Organic Act of 1897 introduced the National Forest mission: to improve the forest, provide favorable conditions for water flows, and furnish a continuous supply of timber to meet people's needs. This mission depends on dedicated people who love and respect the forest.

One such person is Lisa Barlow: A transplant from Bradford since 2014 when she married Ellicottville's Jonny the Barber, Lisa Barlow loves to talk about the work she does for the United States Forest Service at the Allegheny National Forest (ANF) in Marshburg, PA.

Her love of trees and the outdoors likely came from her dad and grandfather who ran a sawmill in Northern Michigan. If you grew up, as both Lisa and I did, hanging around a wood-working shop or a sawmill, the smell of sawdust gets into your DNA and translates into your brain as a love of trees. We talked a lot about her job, but it was so evident it is a vocation for her rather than a job.

Lisa returned to school at 31, attending University of Pittsburgh in Bradford where she was fortunate to find an Environmental Studies program. Having interned on the Allegheny National Forest in her Junior year, she was fortunate to continue as a seasonal employee after graduating with her bachelor's degree in 2009. She said, "I was grateful for the Environmental Studies degree that Pitt offered, opening my eyes to conservation, stewardship, and land management. Having the seasonal positions on the Allegheny National Forest right there was a wonderful transition for me when I graduated." Fast forward to 2014 when she was hired as a permanent employee marking timber. That grew into a job doing reforestation and timber stand improvement work. Lisa explains that "this work includes gathering forest data in the field to report back to our foresters to help them determine what needs to be done in those areas to ensure forest regeneration and stand improvement."

Another facet of her job as a technician was her training on the ANF as a wildland firefighter in 2009. She has gone out once or twice a year since then on fire assignments. Examples of the work include hand crew assignments digging handline (a line that follows the contours of a fire) and moving brush to prevent wildfire spread in Idaho, California, Montana, and Colorado. She worked on the chainsaw crew in the Green Mountain National Forest to help clear roads and parts of the Appalachian Trail that were devastated by Hurricane Irene. Lisa also joins the ANF fire engine staff to help other National Forests do prescribed burning. In the process, she ended up assisting in fighting three wildfires in the Mark Twain National Forest in Missouri.

In today's environment where we need more people prepared and willing to go where they are sent to fight forest fires at the drop of a hat, Lisa had this to say: "If I would have learned about fighting fire when I was young, I would have gotten into this as a full-time caree It is hard important work that is so fulfilling! It is hard to put into words the feeling you get when you are digging line and working so hard physically, and then mentally, thinking about what the fire is doing and what the weather is doing, the terrain we are working in, the heat, the water we need to be drinking to stay hydrated, your crew mates and how they are doing ... and then walking to your tent or vehicle at the end of the 16 hour shift feeling so tired, but so proud of yourself, and your crew mates...and so much looking forward to doing it all over again the next day. I am thankful to be able to be a part of this hard-working group of people across our nation once or twice a year."

Rebel's Reserve Dessert Wine: The Winery of Ellicottville is introducing a new dessert on the menu. Rebel's Reserve Dessert Wine is a barrel aged fortified wine. Made similarly in style to a Port wine, Rebel's Reserve is made exclusively with Teroldego Grapes, which are slowly fermented and when the must is fermented down to about 10% sugar, grape spirits are added to stop the fermentation. The grapes' own sugar provides the sweetness to the wine. The wine is moved to neutral red wine barrels and aged for 18 months. The resulting product is high alcohol, full bodied, sweet dessert wine meant for sipping.

Bourbon Barrel Cabernet Sauvignon: This is the Winery of Ellicottville Cabernet Sauvignon with a twist. They age the wine for a minimum of 4 months in a freshly emptied Bourbon Barrel. After aging, the wine is a bit more complex, heavy and has light notes of Bourbon on the nose.

2021 Marquette: Their first release from Bob Maranto's Vineyard here in Ellicottville! These grapes were fermented on the skins for dry wine. The resulting wine is fruity but balanced nicely with French oak. Great wine to drink by the glass.

Iconic Country & Gospel Group the Oak Ridge Boys Playing Seneca Allegany Casino

"Elvira". That one word resonates with country music fans, and it brings large smiles to faces as they sing the song out loud or just in their heads. Especially when you get to the part "oom papa oom papa mow mow".

The much celebrated award winning group sings harmonies like no other musical act in the industry today. Grammy, Dove, CMA and AMA awards along with Gold and Platinum records and inductions into the Country Music Hall of Fame and The Gospel Music Hall of Fame, the four friends have decades of sharing their music with the world.

Joe Bonsall, Duane Allen, William Lee Golden and Richard Sterban are making a stop at Seneca Allegany Casino Resort for one show only on July 22nd.

I had the pleasure of talking with Joe Bonsall recently and he had a lot to say about Buffalo, since he was one of us from 1969 to 1973 before he joined the Oak Ridge Boys in October of 1973 when he was 25 years old.

We talked about Covid, their newest album, "Front Porch Singin", what convinced the group they made it, chick flicks and country music.

"Country music's bigger than it's ever been. In our heyday we played arenas... these kids today are playing stadiums and selling them out," said Bonsall.

Describing the show the singer said, "We do the hits... Elvira, Y'alll Come Back Saloon, Bobbie Sue, Thank God for Kids and we add in a little gospel music and a few new songs. We're your All American act that you can bring the kids and grandma to see... it's a great place to be.

here at 75 years old and I've been with the Oak Ridge Boys for 50 years now and here at 75 years old and I've been with the Oak Ridge Boys for 50 years now and we've been at every level in this business that there is... we've worked hard to try and keep a living, we've been the biggest act in country music... we've done everything. We're in the Country Music Hall of Fame, the Gospel Music Hall of Fame and I'm in the Philly Music Hall of Fame. What I'm doing right now I'm excited about, which is making new music, because new music always refreshes you. But what I'm into doing at this point in my life is going out there and singing the best I can and coming home. I don't really have any goals except that hopefully next year we can slow down just a little bit. We've always been such a hard working group, we've always played about 150 shows a year most years, which is doable, but this summer's getting a lot busier and then fall is crazy. summer's getting a lot busier and then fall is crazy.

HULICK: How did Covid effect you guys?

BOSNALL: Everything shut down. They told us to go home because we weren't essential anymore.

HULICK: Did you guys get together and write or anything? **BOSNALL:** We got together and recorded "Front Porch Singin" during the pan-demic in August of 2020. We only had the bare bones of what we usually have for recording. There were no friends, no record label, no radio people... no nothing. So we decided to make "Front Porch Singin" and I remember the singing being quite healing. But you know it wasn't just us going through this... everybody was and we had to figure out how to keep this thing going. Thankfully we were able to do that. It was a tough time for everyone... unless you owned a liquor store (laughs)... you couldn't go to church at that time, but you could go to a liquor store.

HULICK: Concerts this summer are in full swing again. **BOSNALL:** Everybody in the business is out on tour. You can't lease a bus in this **BOSNALL:** Everybody in the business is out on four. You can't lease a bus in this town no matter how much money you got. Those big tour buses are all gone. It's an insane time really, it has been the last several years to be honest. That's why I'm glad for myself, at my age and in my group I live in a bubble, and I'm happy in my bubble. I concentrate on getting on that tour bus and going and singing and getting my legs going the best I can and coming home and being with my wife and family. I'll tell you one thing Covid did for a lot of us... well I guess it didn't do it for everybody... but it strengthened my family. Some families were strengthened by it and then I think some husbands were probably assassinated by it. (laughs)

HULICK: (laughs) How great is it that you are in a profession that you love so much and it brings so much joy to people and everyone was just waiting for Covid to go away so we could come out and see you again and feel the music and the connection again. BOSNALL: That's very well put.

HULICK: What was the moment that you guys realized you made it?

BOSNALL: In 1977 we knew we were on our way to making it when "You All Come Back Saloon" was on every juke box in the country and you'd stop at a truck stop and sit at the counter... in the old days you had juke boxes on the counter... and that song was on there and you'd see four guys feeding the boxes quarters so they could play the song over and over again. It's a wonder we didn't get beat with a tire iron. (laughs) To me that was like... wow, look at that... we're actually making a living at this now. As Duane Allen always says, "We finally had a big hit about a sa-loon that wasn't a gospel song and we were able to pay off some bills"... he always said, "to them it was a gospel song." (laughs)

HULICK: (laughs) That's funny! Can you sum up the Oak Ridge Boys with a title of

one of your songs? BOSNALL: We haven't done it on stage for a lot of years, but we had a song called "Reach Out And Touch A Hand" (as he sings it over the phone to me). I think that's

HULICK: I'm glad I asked that question because I got to hear you sing it. BOSNALL: (laughs) A little bit.

HULICK: I found out something you love as do I and my husband. One of your favorite movies is "We Bought A Zoo"? **BOSNALL:** I love "We Bought A Zoo"!! (laughs) I've probably watched it 10 times!

It isn't your typical guy movie like "Hunt For Red October" or "The Godfather". I just think it's the cutest movie, and the scene in the end when he is showing his kids how he and their mother met at this diner and they show her sitting there... OMG I cry like a girl! (laughs)

HULICK: (laughs) That is such a tearjerker. **BOSNALL:** I cry the way my wife cries over the Cary Grant movie "An Affair To Remember". I like chick flicks too!

HULICK: What's the best thing about being Joe Bonsall?

HULICK: How is your newest album "Front Porch Singin" doing? **BOSNALL:** It's doing really good... chalk one up for the old guys. Producer Dave Cobb, who's the hottest producer in Nashville right now, had the idea for the album... a simple album with the attitude of four Oak Ridge Boys sitting on the front porch singing harmony on old gospel songs, new gospel songs, old country songs and new country songs. In our show we pull up four stools and sit on them to make it seem like we're on the front porch singing some of those songs. It's pretty cool.

HULICK: I'm sure you've accomplished everything you want in your career by now, but is there anything else you would like to do or is there someone you'd like to work with that you haven't? BOSNALL: You know what? I'll be real honest with you... I'm sitting

BOSNALL: I enjoy the singing... I enjoy the friendship with my guys... we've been through so much together. The Oak Ridge Boys and home... that's my bubble. I'm very fortunate. I have a wonderful wife, two great daughters, two great son-in-laws, my grandson is in the Navy and he's a gem of a guy, my granddaughter is wonder-ful, a great grandma and now a great grand kitten and my cats... my Barney. I'll tell you the truth... Joe Bosnall sitting on his couch at night watching the Phillies on TV with my cat in my lap is probably Joe Bonsall more than anything else.

A BUFFALO CONNECTION



Core Performance: How to Avoid Gaining Weight During the Summer

You know how you can't wait for the warmer weather to come after a long, gray and miserable winter that feels like it's actually eight months versus four? You tell yourself that all that extra weight you packed on being a couch potato and binge watching your favorite television shows will automatically fall off once you are able to get outdoors more and exercise. You promise yourself you will eat better because there will be a bounty of fresh fruit and vegetables readily available for you to enjoy. And, now just after the 4th of July you feel fatter than ever? Well, you're not alone. Contrary to what you think, weight gain may be more likely during the summer than in the winter.

In fact, research published in 2016 reported that even young children tend to gain more weight during the summer months versus the months when school is in session. Experts agree that the uptick in sugary summer beverages, summer BBQs, graduation, wedding celebrations and more family gatherings make it easy to be in a celebratory mode and consume more food and calorie-laden beverages than one would on a normal day. And what social gathering does not have a gratuitous amount of unhealthy food choices like chips, pasta salads, pulled pork, hot dogs and burgers, just to name a few. You might find a green salad or a fruit salad, but trust me, those are the last things to get eaten. Also, there is a bounty of alcohol being consumed during these occasions that will pack on the pounds quicker than you can burn them off. Even 'mocktails' are typically filled with sugar. Plus, there's ice cream, which some children and even some adults feel should be eaten daily.

So, what can be done to stave off these dreaded extra pounds and still enjoy the summer? The first important step is to take the focus off "weight loss" and instead get curious about when you eat, what you eat and why you eat. Many of my clients do not feel well after eating foods high in fat/carbs/calories. I advise people to be nice to themselves and try to get a better understanding about why they make the food choices they are making. Is it to fit in with a certain peer group or just because it is presented in a buffet that you can't avoid not taking it? Understanding that is the first step to proactively making healthier choices.

Then I discuss serving sizes. Serving sizes matter when trying to avoid or manage weight gain at anytime of year. That can be hard to gauge for some individuals, so I suggest that you take a small plate/bowl and individualize your serving versus continually digging into the chips and guacamole/salsa. Even fruit - take a serving to enjoy and see if your hunger warrants more. Have a cookie or ice cream on occasion, but don't get the triple scoop with all the toppings just because it's now so readily available. Same with alcohol - know your limits, keep track of how you are feeling. You can go from a light buzz to drunky pretty easily in the summer heat.

night, and I've never lived anywhere where people were actually sweeping snow off their roofs so it didn't cave in. And I learned the word "squall"

HULICK: (laughs) It's so funny to have other people's take on Buffalo and WNY. How about "white out"

BOSNALL: Yeah white out... that lake effect. (laughs) You know I enjoyed my days living on the Niagara Frontier. I really did. I was very poor back then, in fact I lived in my car for one full year. It got to be winter time and an Italian family loved the little group I was singing in and they took me in and I lived with this family for about seven months. Those were fun days though.

HULICK: I know you're an avid sports fan and you love from Philadelphia, but is there any chance you secretly root for the Bills since you lived here for a while? **BOSNALL:** Yes I do, but the Music City Miracle down here turned the Bills against us.

HULICK: (laughs) Yes it did. That one's gonna hurt for a very long time. BOSNALL: I loved the Bills when I was up there. It's kind of funny because OJ Simpson had just signed with the Bills when I lived there and I couldn't afford to go to the games. Richard, our bass singer, and myself used to sing together in the Keystones and we went down to the old War Memorial Stadium and actually snuck into a pre-season game and watched OJ Simpson's first game with the Bills. That was when Joe Ferguson was quarterback. They had good teams back then with OJ as the running back... before all the crap that happened with him. I was into the Buffalo Sabres back then too. The French Connection and Roger Cozier in goal. My funniest Buffalo story may be back when we were touring with Kenny Rogers in the late 70s - early 80s and we played the old Aud and Kenny was really late, I don't remember why, but we did our show and they came to us and said Kenny was still 30 minutes out, so we went out and sang some more songs and then I started talking about Buffalo because I knew all about it right? You say the word Scajaquada and you endear yourself to the heart of the Buffalo people and I swear to God I did 15 minutes of stand up about Buffalo until Kenny got there. We played Melody Fair a lot in Tonawanda. I loved those theaters in the round.

HULICK: That's not there anymore.






