500+ Miles to End Cancer: Local bike enthusiasts prepare to embark on the Empire State Ride / Ride for Roswell

For many people, learning to ride a bike is a rite of passage. Young children start out on a tricycle and then move on to a two wheeler with training wheels. Eventually, the training wheels come off and the thrill of riding a bike really begins to set in. When you're a child, bikes open doors. You can get places faster than you could if you were walking. They give you a sense of freedom that up until that point you have never experienced before. To put it bluntly, a bike makes you feel alive!

But then something happens to far too many of us. As we age, that love of riding a bike starts to wane. The time that we used to spend peddling uphill and then flying back down while you push the limits as far as your comfort level will allow gets replaced by jobs, social obligations, other hobbies and sadly, excuses.

Others however, are able to keep that passion. You've seen some of them. You're pushing the speed limit, driving along some random country road in the middle of nowhere and then you come up on some spandex-clad person, hunched over their bike in an attempt to be as aerodynamic as possible in their hopes of beating the latest Strava record. You drive by them and perhaps judge them because they inadvertently remind you that it's been 14 weeks since you last used your gym membership. And then just like that, they are just a speck in your rearview mirror and biking is once again just an afterthought to you.

There are plenty of people out there, however, who never lose that love of pushing themselves physically to get from Point A to Point B (while trying to crush that Strava time). And later this month, many of them will come together to participate in the Empire State Ride where they will bike across New York State in an effort to raise money for cancer research.

Western New York has a number of people who will be taking part in the ride July 25th-31st, and EllicottvilleNOW was able to catch up with a few of them to talk about their motivations and how they are preparing for the ride.

Jane Eshbaugh is riding with a team made up of her husband Dennis, nephew Charlie Bailey and friends Bonnie Koschir, Debbie Stein and Sean Crotty. The purpose of the ride is to raise money for Roswell Park Cancer Institute's Clinical Trials program.

"The ride is a great challenge and is super well run," said Eshbaugh. "And with the nightly talks about cancer survivors and those who benefit from the fundraising, it feels like we are making a difference in the battle against cancer."

With an estimated 1.8 million new cancer cases in the United States in 2020 alone, events like the Empire State Ride are more important than ever. That also means that people like Eshbaugh and her team are also more important than ever. The fundraising they do goes beyond just raising money for a cause. They are literally putting blood, sweat and sometimes even tears into the Empire State Ride. People who are willing to ride a bike for a week straight, covering between 55-90+ miles per day, showcase a commitment level that inspires others to help their cause. To date, over \$1.2 million has been raised for this year's ride.

"The Empire State Ride to me is about starting and ending our journey in 2 iconic places, and making monumental strides between," stated Sean Crotty. "I expect this journey to be one with lots of reflection of the past and making memories in the present. It's about being mindful, focused and determined to ride to end cancer."

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

GIVING BACK

FOR THE LOVE OF LITTLE VALLEY

New fund provides financial help for special repairs, activities

OLEAN - When Carol Gloff established the Little Valley Fund, she did so with the dream of giving back to and supporting beautification projects and activities to foster a more vibrant future for the hometown she loved.

Gloff said that dream was a cautiously optimistic one when she led efforts to establish the fund at the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation in 2019. Today, the fund has supported its first projects: the renovation of a gazebo in the village's main park and financing a summer concert. And, the fund will continue to grow and make possible even more projects in Little Valley.

The Little Valley Fund made two grants recently: \$900 to support repairs of the village gazebo and \$500 to pay local musicians for an installment of the village's summer concert series.

Gloff said village officials approached members of the Little Valley Fund committee with the Gazebo project this year in order to replace rotting wood on the gazebo in the center of the village. The \$900 grant from the Little Valley Fund helped offset expenses, with the village investing funds of its own to make work possible. The \$500 grant paid for one of the four summer concerts held in Little Valley this summer.

For Gloff, who now lives in Massachusetts but often visits her hometown, these grants and the many grants to come from the fund are the manifestation of what she once thought was a far-off goal.

"To be honest, I was not sure what to expect when I had the idea for this fund," said Gloff. "I thought we would be able to raise \$5,000 (the minimum for a CRCF endowed fund), but I did not expect the overwhelming support the fund has received in the last couple years."

Today, more than 80 individuals and families have given over \$30,000 to the Little Valley Fund, many of whom according to Gloff, grew up in Little Valley and have since moved away, like herself.

"I think it says volumes about growing up in Little Valley that so many who do not live in the village full-time have given to the fund," Gloff said. "We all just want to see a place so near and dear to our hearts be successful."

The support of the Little Valley Fund comes at a critical time, when many municipalities have had their budgets pinched by the pandemic. What is more, the support of the Little Valley Fund will last in perpetuity as Gloff established the fund as an endowment at CRCF.

"It was very forward thinking of Carol to establish the fund with the long-term vision of an endowment," said CRCF Executive Director Karen Niemic Buchheit. "Endowments at CRCF are invested and managed for long-term income and growth, so the fund will continue to make possible annual grants, while also being managed to last in perpetuity so that support never goes away."

SUPPORT, ONE BEAGLE AT A TIME

Muleskinnerz Beagles & WNY Heroes team up to assist veterans

Few understand the effect a dog can have as much as Don and Jen Kramer. As owners and operators of Muleskinnerz Beagles, the Kramers combine a passion for breeding beagles with helping as many local veterans as they can. Over the past few years, the difference they've made is substantial.

The importance of giving our returning heroes a way to deal with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) cannot be understated. According to a report from the Costs of War Project at Brown University, over 30,000 veterans have died from suicide since September 11th - compared to the 7,057 perishing in combat. It's apparent that as a society, helping our veterans needs to be at the forefront.

The Kramers are answering the call. On Saturday, August 28th, they'll host a "Beagle Bash" — utilizing a silent auction and other fundraisers to continue raising money to help veterans in any way they can.

"We're creating a 15-month calendar of all the dogs we've had and selling them for \$25, where all proceeds will go towards our goals," Jen said. "We're serving veterans one beagle at a time."

Last year, Muleskinnerz hosted a rabbit hunt, teaming up with Buffalo-based Western New York Heroes, a not-for-profit that assists veterans and their families. They were able to take 23 veterans on the hunting excursion, spearheaded by Don - Jen's husband, a veteran himself - to provide a sense of community.

"We were able to raise enough money, with help from WNY Heroes, to invest in an action track chair that we now own," Jen said. "It's a wheelchair with tank treads, which allows disabled vets the opportunity to participate in the hunt. We provide each one with Dry Shods (a knee-high muck boot), hunting equipment, shotguns and all of the necessary tools to provide an unforgettable day. Most of the equipment is theirs to keep after the hunt is over."

Since that day, Don traveled to the local MVO - Military Veterans Outdoors - to lead a hunt, as well as one in Massachusetts. Don has also taken numerous veterans trapping. The Kramers are using first-hand experience to provide an experience other veterans might not necessarily be able to do on their own.

"To date, we've taken out 64 veterans," Jen said. "And this year we're bumping the number from 23 to 30. It's just an outstanding day, one that's been well received."

The Kramers have also donated seven beagles to veterans as emotional support dogs. (Writer's note: the Timkeys are a beagle family - Harley, Shamus, Buster, Chief, Douglas and Lincoln - and there is no breed better at unconditional love.)


"It's beagles, the love of the dog, the unconditional love for everyone and one another that drives us," Jen said. "John 15:13: 'Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends,' and we take that to heart."

This summer, the Kramers and WNY Heroes have also provided food boxes to any veteran - no questions asked. Setting up shop at the Great Valley Methodist Church, they've distributed boxes to vets and will continue to do so throughout the summer.

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

The local spot in Ellicottville is housed where the Groove Health & Fitness used to stand. With the addition of Ellicottville in its line-up, the Fattey Beer Co. now has four different stores in the area - Orchard Park, Hamburg and Buffalo.

Owner Nik Fattey, who resides in Hamburg, spent a lot of his time in Ellicottville prior to the store's opening. The sense of community in the village has always stood out to him, so it became impossible to miss out on the opportunity to expand the business.

"Everyone loves Ellicottville," Nik said. "I went to see the building [of the new location] and loved that it was a quick and easy way in and out of town. People can either come in for a family night or choose to pick out a 12-pack from our beer store and be on their way. It's just a natural fit."

The business's name may create an image of a traditional, old-school beer room. In reality, the Fattey Beer Co. offers a vibrant, open-minded experience for all to enjoy. The recently opened location in Ellicottville welcomed the local crowd of customers to many attractions.

Featured is a newly-added patio with a firepit in its center, a craft beer store accompanied by a tasting room and an open policy for those who want to enjoy a beer alongside their dog. The location's headliner is the wide selection of international and world-recognized beer.

An added perk of visiting Fattey Beer is its 'Mug Club' - a monthly membership created for avid beer enthusiasts. The benefit of the club comes in the form of discounts, promotions and overall fun.

"We've got a good culture and we have the Mug Club too; it kind of drives it," Nik said. "You get a mug with every membership, but you can also use the membership from store to store. If you're coming from Orchard Park for a visit in Ellicottville, members will be able to enjoy discounts in here [Ellicottville] also."

First-time customers of Fattey Beer may experience shock from the amount of beer available on demand.

"You're gonna come into any Fattey Beer location - Ellicottville included - and you're gonna be a little bit overwhelmed because we have lots and lots of beer," Nik said. "We wanted this to be different. You'll be thinking, 'is this a bar or is it a store?' There is something for everyone; we have non-alcoholic beer, we're dog friendly, we have our famous chicken sandwich ... we're a neighborhood place."

Following the opening of Ellicottville's own Fattey Beer Co., Nik is currently working on reaching more neighborhoods in Western New York. In the next month or so, Fattey Beer Co. will open a new location at the Wurlitzer Building in North Tonawanda. The historical venue is known for hosting banquets and live musical events.

EVL ARC CUSTOM WELDING

A passion for welding sparks creativity in Ellicottville artist

"I desired a more satisfying life where I was truly happy." She left to pursue new opportunities along the west coast, calling several states "home" along the way, including Arizona, Colorado, Montana and Oregon. She worked many different odd jobs throughout her travels, but "the only thing that really remained consistent was my love for art and creating things," she explained.

While traveling in Arizona, she decided to try a creative welding class. "I'd never done that before," Goode explained. "It never crossed my mind. I tried it and created a sculpture. After that two-hour class, I was just completely enamored - that feeling people get when they meet 'the one.' My true love!"

From that point on, Goode knew that welding was a skill she wanted to not only learn, but master. She traveled north to Oregon, where she enrolled in Webber & Walpole Nonde-structive Testing Welding School. There, she learned and performed all kinds of welding and earned her certifications. Goode had one female welding instructor, and she was one of only two women enrolled in the school.

Just a couple of weeks after graduation, Goode got her first welding job at Myers Fabrication making hydraulic engines and engine parts. She said, "It was cool because I acquired a lot of knowledge fabricating and repairing. I really blossomed, and my techniques progressed immensely. I really got to know the trade, rather than the art side."

There, Goode was the only female welder. "It was a little intimidating," she recalled. "There were a lot of older guys who had been doing this for years. I was nervous, but I kicked butt there, and I learned a lot from them! They didn't treat me very differently at all."

Goode returned to Ellicottville a year and a half ago, just before the start of the CO-VID-19 pandemic. Speaking of her return, Goode said, "I really, really wanted to expand and I really wanted to focus on doing my art. Instead of just doing one thing or the same thing that a company wants me to do, I want to do it all!"

While far from ideal, the pandemic provided her with time to lay the groundwork for Ellicottville Arc Custom Welding, which is located at 6550 Route 219 Unit J in Ellicottville. "After a lot of blood, sweat, and tears, I finally got to open my welding shop," said Goode. "It's still very new, but the business has been doing well. I'm working on creating a lot of new things that I hope to offer to the public in time."

Having worked for companies making everything from hydraulic engines to mass-produced furniture, Goode has acquired experience in many areas of welding. "I love making artsy things with scrap metal," Goode said of her creative work. "Right now, I make sculptures, ornamental things, bird baths, door bells, fire pits, you name it! I've been really getting into abstract furniture lately, like tables and funky chairs."


Disabilities under the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, ADA, include both mental and physical medical conditions which include deafness, blindness, an intellectual disability, partially or completely missing limbs or mobility impairments requiring the use of a wheelchair, autism, cancer, cerebral palsy, diabetes, epilepsy, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD); Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) infection, multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy, major depressive disorder, bipolar disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), obsessive compulsive disorder, and schizophrenia.

Directions in Independent Living is a non-profit 501 (C) 3 located in Cattaraugus and Allegany counties in the Southern Tier of New York State. The agency was begun in 1987 to provide support for individuals with disabilities and advocate on their behalf for equal civil rights. Directions is a Cattaraugus County United Way Agency. Directions' team collaborates with medical and social work professionals to ensure the multi-faceted needs of our individuals are met with the highest standards of care available. Directions serves close to 2,000 individuals a year and their families, regardless of economic standing and provides Medicaid and non-Medicaid services.

This will be Crotty's first experience riding in the Empire State Ride, but he is by no means a stranger to the concept. "Last summer during the pandemic, I logged miles in various virtual formats, which the miles I rode last summer added up to me riding from Buffalo to NYC and back 3x," Crotty said. "And in the fall I logged miles to ride across Pennsylvania. Those rides benefited various charities which provided humanitarian aid like Food Banks and other Medical Support groups. I have done the Ride for Roswell for as many years as I can remember. My Dad died 18 years ago from cancer, and I have participated in his memory. The last few times I did it, I rode the 65-mile route with the National Ski Patrol-Western Region Team. I plan to ride with them again this year, on August 7th.'

In talking with people about the ride, common themes appear. Physical challenge. Mental fortitude. Unique challenge. But what everyone seems to come back to is the sense of riding for a greater good. The money being raised represents hope for the future. And that hope is for a cancer-free future.

Teamwork is a huge part of completing a ride like this. The Eshbaughs, Stein and Koschir ride together all the time. Most weekends throughout the summer you can find them out on the roads of Cattaraugus and Chautauqua Counties.

"I wanted to jump in with a group that had some veterans of this ride, and hopefully I would know a few people and meet some others ahead of the ride," said Crotty. "Skiing is a big part of my life in the winter. So it only seemed natural ... Dennis and Jane Eshbaugh, Bonnie Koschir from Holiday Valley and Debbie Stein from HoliMont are on that team, so thankfully they welcomed me on their team! I have joined them on a few rides (this summer), and fitting in with them is very easy when you meet a group like they are."

Teamwork will be instrumental in completing the Empire State Ride. Teams will start in Staten Island on July 25th, ride up through the Catskills and then west to Niagara Falls by July 31st, covering 546 miles with 19,249 feet of elevation over the course of seven days.

After the completion of this ride, many of the riders will then shift their focus to the annual Ride for Roswell, which is taking place the following weekend on Sat-urday, August 7th. Crotty, who has ridden in the Ride for Roswell for many years, will be doing the 65-mile route with his family this year.

One Ellicottville local who will be taking part in the Ride for Roswell with a new level of motivation is Mila Clauss. She and her cousin, Conor, were both diagnosed with cancer - Conor with glioblastoma and Mila with Hodgkin lymphoma, within one week of each other. Mila will be riding with her sister Brooke and friends and family this year and plans to do the Ride annually from here on out.

"People have this image of cancer and what treatment looks like," said Clauss. "I have been super fortunate to not have the side effects that we all associate with cancer. Since my first chemo treatment in April, I have continued to feel healthier than I've felt in a long time. Someone who had the same cancer as me told me to focus on the 3 A's - Attitude, Appetite, and Activity. I truly believe staying active and healthy, both physically and mentally, is helping me through my treatments. I have been riding my stationary and road bike regularly to get ready for the ride in August. I am really excited to be participating in the Peloton on Friday, August 6th in addition to the ride on Saturday!"

Events like the Ride for Roswell and the Empire State Ride give survivors and their families the opportunity to find new levels of hope in their ongoing fight against cancer. New friendships are created, lifelong memories are made and optimism is cultivated. So whether or not you take part in rides like this or not, your support helps dictate the success of the rides. Emotional and financial support give the riders the motivation they need to push themselves, one mile at a time, through the challenges these rides present.

Sean Crotty sums his motivation up like this.

I ride:

- In honor of those who survived.
- In memory of those who have not. In hope of those who will.

Gus Macker 3-on-3 Basketball Tournament returning to Olean next month



OLEAN - The Macker is on the schedule in Olean! Entries are now being accepted for the Gus Macker 3-on-3 basketball tournament, to be played August 20th-22nd on Delaware Avenue in downtown Olean. The Greater Olean Area Chamber of Commerce and its 46 corporate sponsors are co-sponsoring this event in Olean.

More than 3,000 registration postcards were mailed out last week to team captains from tournaments held in Norwich, Hornell, Warren, Buffalo, and Olean last year. An additional 7,000 were sent out in late May to schools in Allegany, Chautauqua, McKean and Cattaraugus Counties. Entry deadlines for teams interested in this year's tournament are Friday, July 30th for applications that are submitted by mail, and Monday, August 2nd for internet entries. The entry fee for a four player team is \$140.

The three-day festival of basketball begins on Friday, August 20th with a Corporate Cup Basketball Contest and early registration, and continues through the division championships on Sunday, August 22nd. The tournament is open to players of all ages and experience levels who are computer-matched by age, height and experience so that all participants can be competitive.

Meme K. Yanetsko, GOACC COO reported, "Gus Macker National was not sure how 2021 would play out across the states in regards to tournaments. In a normal year, the Macker would be played in 35-45 cities. Macker staff met with the six NYS city hosts in Jan/Feb. Olean was always planning to host if allowed. When the 2021 Macker calendar hit online, it showed Ithaca and Olean as the only two in New York State. Just recently, we were told that Ithaca was moving to 2022 - leaving Olean as the sole site in NYS."

The tournament, based on basketball played in driveways throughout the U.S., will include players who have no experience to those who have played college and semi-professional basketball. Primarily based on their age and level of experience, players will be placed in divisions where they will be most evenly matched. Depending on the number of teams placed in a specific division, players and the teams they're on will be playing for first, second and third place trophies. Also, teams that finish last in their divisions could receive "Toilet bowl" trophies.

SKATEBOARDING IN THE OLYMPICS

Jamestown skateshop owner talks about the excitement around upcoming Games

The summer of 2020 held the promise of Olympics with brand new events. However, a worldwide pandemic suspended the games for a year and left people wondering if the world event was even a possibility. Fast forward to the summer of 2021, and the games are about to begin, with skateboarding added as a new feature in the summer games.

On Friday, July 23, 2021, the Summer Olympics will open with protective measures in place for athletes. A group of those Olympians will be carrying skateboards to Japan, taking part in opening ceremonies for the United States.

Jamestown native Pete Scheira, owner of Jamestown Skate Products (JSP), tells ellicottvilleNOW that the excitement for the games this year has been great for his business. "It's definitely made us a lot busier," he says. "Skateboarding in general is way more popular over the past couple years. Sales have gone up every year and this just brings a bigger light to it."

Pete Scheira and JSP have been a staple of downtown Jamestown for 11 years now. Scheira fabricates his own skateboards for the shop, offers shop branded apparel, and even houses an indoor skating facility for people to enjoy and try their hand at this fast-moving sport.

"This year's Olympics are definitely going to bring skateboarding to a broader audience," Scheira continued. "People that normally wouldn't watch a skateboarding event or be exposed to skateboarding are going to be able to see it. The Olympic Games will have two different disciplines - park skating (bowls and vert) and then street skating (stairs, handrails, benches)."

Scheira is very familiar with Ellicottville and their efforts to raise money to build a skatepark.

"They are working towards the same goal as we are here in Jamestown, through the same grant program. We're six months ahead of where Ellicottville is," explained Scheira. "It's going to be great for Ellicottville, for us, and for all the other communities that are trying to build skateparks. It will be great for kids to have places to go where they can hang out with their friends, meet new friends, and have something active to do."

Scheira sees the benefits of developing a skateboard park trail between Jamestown, Ellicottville and other communities - safe places that all ages will be able to enjoy for years to come. The Olympics acts as a catalyst, sparking even more curiosity into this already popular sport.

"Skateboarding in the Olympics ... mine blowing! I'm super excited! I wish I could be there. It is amazing that this is happening!"

Village Planning Board Sets Aug. 10th Public Hearing for Cigar Store and Private Smoking Lounge

Plans for a new retail cigar store and private smoking lounge serving beer, wine and spirits will be aired in a public hearing August 10, 2021 at 5:30pm in the second-floor meeting room of Ellicottville Town Hall.

The Village Planning Board, during its monthly meeting this past Tuesday, July 13th, deemed the Cigar Lounge of Ellicottville LLC's special use permit application ready for a public hearing. Applicant Bradley Hurley of Watson Road briefly described his project to be located in Suites A and B at 5 East Washington Street. According to the application he filed, one of the commercial suites will house a members-only private club where liquor will be served. The other suite will be open to the public for sales of cigars and accessories. A humidor will separate the two suites, which total almost 4,000 square feet.

Staff Planner Gary Palumbo told Planning Board members that the cigar store is permitted as a retail use in the Village Commercial 1 zone. But, the private lounge will require a public hearing and a special use permit. Private clubs, fraternal organizations and taverns receive the same treatment in the Zoning Ordinance, he added. The proposal will need an environmental review before it is sent to the Cattaraugus County Planning Board for comments. The Planning Board must make a decision within 62 days of the public hearing.

The Board then voted to table one proposal and drop another at the request of applicants in other matters. In the first, Greg Dekdebrun will take time to explore options for a rear easement before moving ahead with a minor subdivision request at his 18 Washington Street retail location.

OLEAN - Three area graduates recently received scholarship awards being made for the first time under newly established scholarship funds, managed by the Cattaraugus Region Community. Gabriel Snyder of Ellicottville Central School, and West Valley Academy and Central School's Chloe Chai received the Elisa B. Hughey Memorial Scholarship for the Arts for \$1,000 each.

The second applicant, who had pursued an area variance to make improvements at a 9 Elk Street residence, decided to withdraw the project to change the design following last week's Zoning Board of Appeals public hearing.

Michelle and Craig Winters had planned to raise the foundation and improve a small addition, for expansion and upgrade of their 20-foot by 20-foot second home. The dwelling predates current regulations and is considered a nonconforming use because setbacks are shorter than the Zoning Ordinance requires. An area variance was required, but after the ZBA hearing the couple asked to table the plans and later withdrew it altogether to make changes in the design and focus on repairs. Palumbo said the project will come back to the Planning Board in the future for approval of a site plan and architectural review.

In another matter, Palumbo invited the Moratorium Committee to meet Tuesday, July 20th at 4:00pm to hear his update on research into a possible zoning amendment concerning new accessory apartments, which are subject to an ongoing temporary moratorium. The Committee includes representatives of the Village Planning Board and the Village Board of Trustees.

Finally, the Board approved the Ava Grace ground sign permit on condition it will be illuminated from the top down. The sign is six feet in height and will be installed at the same location at 23 Jefferson Street as the previous retailer's sign.

The Village of Ellicottville Planning Board will next meet at 5:30pm on Tuesday, Aug. 10, 2021 in the Town Hall.


Are you spending hours working out every week, and not getting the results you want? Chances are you might have a bad habit or two when it comes to exercising. Never fear, there's a quick fix for even the most ingrained workout no-no's. Check out these five workout habits you should drop. Not only will ditching these help you lose the pounds, they will help you become a more efficient exerciser.


1. Too much cardio. Too little strength training. But cardio burns more calories, right? Not so fast. Sure, an hour on the treadmill gives you that instant satisfaction of burning 400 calories. Or so that little blinking screen says. A quick strength training or cross training session, however, will get your heart rate up, burn calories, and develop your lean muscle mass. Building muscle means that those muscles are able to work throughout the day, burning more calories when you aren't working out.

2. Working out for long periods of time at a moderate pace. When it comes to working out, slow and steady does NOT win the race. Maximize your time, people! Instead of working out for an hour at an easy-to-moderate intensity level, step it up a notch. Challenge yourself to 30 minutes of nonstop, intense exercise. You can take 15- to 30-second breaks, but move quickly from one workout to the next. Give it 100% for 30 minutes, instead of 75% for an hour.

3. Hydrating with sports drinks. Sports drinks may give you a boost, but are full of sugar and calories. During any given daily workout, hydrating with plain old water should do the trick just fine. If you feel tired during your workout, try fueling before. Eating a healthy snack 45 minutes before your workout can give you more energy, and allow you to skip the Gatorade.

4. Doing the same exercises over and over again. When you do the same workout routine over and over, your body gets used to it and it becomes easier. The Stairmaster might have been challenging at one point, but pretty soon your muscles become familiar with that motion. Your body only uses half the energy to complete this task that at one point had you huffing and puffing your way to the locker room. Mix it up. By changing your workouts daily you will trick your body into working harder and burning more calories. It will also





5. Going it alone. Working out alone can be great. It gives you time to clear your mind, listen to music, and feel the burn. However, sometimes it takes a workout buddy to hold you accountable. Working out with a partner not only makes it more likely that you'll work out; it makes most people try harder than they would on their own. Your partner can cheer you on to finish that last half mile or to finish those last four deadlifts.

Inner Peace and Strength: Suicide Prevention in Cattaraugus County

This past year, suicide rates within the United States has dropped by 6%, according to the NY Times. As the data continues to be sifted and research studies move ahead full throttle diving into the reasons behind this percentage shift, let us zoom in on an expert in Cattaraugus County who has thoughts and insight as to the decrease in percentages.

This expert is a professional in our region of the country who has spent years setting an intention of preventing suicide among our community, as well as motivating others to take a different path. Let us hear from this anonymous resource.

LAURA: What do you attribute the reasons are for the decline in suicide rates during the Covid-19 pandemic?

EXPERT: I think a lot of it has to do with the shift around mental health stigma. We are getting much better at not having mental health be such a stigma. While the rates are going down, a lot of ERs across the region are seeing an increase in suicidal ideations among their patients. People are just reaching out and asking for help. The research is still being reviewed, therefore, I think we will have a much more clearer picture in months to come. I also think people really do rally behind each others in times of stress or crisis.

LAURA: What are some risk factors for suicidal thoughts?

EXPERT: In the past, not being fully employed was a risk factor, however, with the government's financial assistance this past year, perhaps this cushion has helped lower the rates. Other

risk factors include drug or alcohol use and accessibility to a lethal means. If you can't get to the lethal method, then you can talk yourself out of it or reason with yourself more. Ten minutes can make a heck of a difference ... if you wait 10 minutes you can reason with yourself and find something else to do.

LAURA: What are some protective factors or prevention methods one can tap into when thoughts of not being here anymore are coming into mind?

EXPERT: The more supports you can have the better. Really reach out to those supports; let them know what is honestly going on inside your brain. It is easier to fight with a crowd than by yourself. The sooner you can reach out for mental and emotional health supports the better. You can have an extra person on your side who can be there for you. These days connecting with a mental health clinician is so much more accessible. There is text messaging, instant messaging, phone calls, telehealth services, etc. There are so many avenues to reach someone who can help.

LAURA: What are some prevention resources in Cattaraugus County?

EXPERT: In Cattaraugus County, the Department of Community Services has offices and therapists scattered all throughout Catt. County. Additionally, they offer a 24-hour crisis hotline phone number: 1-800-339-5209. There is also a bunch of private practitioners opening businesses. Out of the darkness walk (sponsored by the American Foundation for suicide prevention) stands by "you are not alone." Details on this walk, resources, and information can be found at AFSP.org. Cattaraugus County Suicide Prevention Coalition is a wonderful resource. Law enforcement, first responders, local hospitals, mental health practitioners are among a few professionals that can provide support and resources.

Our resource concluded this interview with, "You are not alone. You can talk to just one person. They can help you just as you can help them." Multiple Olympic medalist Michael Phelps states, "I am extremely thankful that I did not take my life." An anonymous source states, "Place your hand on your heart. Feel that? That's called purpose. You are alive for a reason. Don't forget that."
