At ellicottvilleNOW, we like to take field trips, and last Friday's adventure was not just fun but also informative. Sam Sheehy, owner of the Winery of Ellicottville guided our team on a tour of the Marquette Vineyard.

Vineyard owner Bob Maranto was excited to share his story with us after we told him we weren't even aware there was such a place here. He said, "Growing up, my family - and in particular my Uncle Dino who was born in Italy - made wine. I started making my own wine about 20 years ago with my father. I've always had an interest in, and a love for, red wine in particular. My love of red wine was further developed by my Uncle Ron Maranto, who is a sommelier. My wife and I purchased approximately 85 acres of land in Ellicottville so that we could build a home there and have a destination for our children and hopefully future grandchildren. In June of 2019 after speaking to a friend of mine, John Comerford who also grows grapes in the Ellicottville area, I decided to plant approximately 500 vines. During Covid I spent most of my time in Ellicottville, was isolated and bored, and decided to clear enough land to plant an additional 1,850 vines.



RAISE OF HOPE

Two Women with the Same Vision Team Up to Help Others in Need

Ahhh, life! It is always so interesting and filled with surprises you never see coming. Think back to how many times in your own life things may have changed, often for the better, because of a gentle nudge, an intuition, a sudden thought out of the blue that sent you off into an unexpected direction. Some people of faith might call that a 'God Tap'.

Debbie Ellis and Nancy Hurst from Cattaraugus were both together on the upper floor of the building at 12 Washington Street that recently housed Pascarella's Restaurant when they experienced such a 'God Tap'. Let me tell you what they were doing there so you'll understand the nudge - or 'Tap' - better.

Debbie was having coffee in Ray's restaurant one day when he mentioned selling it. She went home that evening and began thinking of the possibilities for that building. A flood of ideas came. She shared them with her husband, prayed over them with her pastor and decided that she needed to look into buying the building. One Sunday, she and fellow Sunday School teacher Nancy Hurst were alone in the room (very unusual) and Deb shared her thoughts about the building. Nancy's response: "I hope it's not the building I'm looking at."

It was, and it turns out they shared the same vision for the building. So they did the logical thing and joined forces. Fast forward to the two of them in the upstairs room, looking out of the windows. Suddenly a beautiful ray of light came through the glass and they both somehow knew that the name of their effort had to include a reference to the hope that such a sunbeam brings. They went to their bibles, found an appropriate verse - Romans 15:13 TPT - and came up with the name: Raise of Hope.

And so it begins. The building was purchased, the roof replaced, and clean-out is now in process. When completed, it will be the home of a nonprofit organization offering much needed, more easily accessible services and resources to the people in the Village of Cattaraugus and surrounding communities. Artists and entrepreneurs will find help or perhaps a home there; schools and churches and social services will have access to rooms for programs, projects or gathering; the elderly will be invited to gather to chat in a private room or in the restaurant/community kitchen they will be including in the building plans. In essence, they want this to function as a community center. Plans are for two offices for counselors to meet with kids or folks in need, either privately or in groups. Remember those upstairs windows? Raise of Hope will provide a 3-bedroom apartment in that space for transitional individuals as short-term housing for adults in need.

This building in an historic part of town has well-served the people of Cattaraugus for many years. Its age requires major renovations which are needed in order to comply with 2023 health and safety codes. Everything needs to be updated including electrical, plumbing, accessibility, floors, bathrooms and kitchen.





Daily City Train and LOUD Underground to Host Grand Opening This Saturday

Earlier this summer, Ellicottville celebrated the completion of its outdoor concrete skatepark, a project 4.5 years in the making. Spearheaded by a group of local citizens, their passion to bring more recreational opportunities to our area has been praised by skaters and non-skaters alike. Just take a quick trip to the New Car Dealers of WNY Ellicottville Skatepark and see for yourself. Located in Ellicottville's Village Park, you'll find that the sport is thriving. All ages, all abilities, all coming together. This is where friendships are made. And with this new activity now a fun option in our community, comes the need for skate equipment, apparel and service.

Enter Daily City Train. Setting up shop at 2 Bristol Lane (the former bowling alley next to Tim & Bonnie's), DCT offers a store full of decks, trucks and wheels, protective gear, branded t-shirts and accessories. Owned and operated by longtime skater and Ellicottville native Chris Perks, DCT's focus is on growing the scene and bringing the sport back to its roots.

"Growing up in a small town is very different today," says Chris. "Having all these concrete parks going in, as well as some indoor parks has really opened up small town living, allowing more opportunities for skaters to have a place nearby and not have to travel so far just to skate. The ease of getting out of work or getting out of school and heading to your local skatepark is now the norm."

SKATE RETAIL

Inside the shop, you'll find skate brands including Anti-Hero, Baker, Birdhouse, Deathwish, Girl, GX1000, Krooked, Meow, Powell Peralta, Thrasher, Thunder, Spitfire and more. Plus a full line of 187 Killer Pads protective gear (knee, elbow, wrist guards and helmets), as well as hats, socks, belts, jewelry, wallets and stickers.

Chris was quick to note that the shop is committed to working with as many local vendors and small businesses as possible. For example: The first run of shop branded t-shirts were made at Studio 4 East in Allegany, shop branded stickers are being produced by Hot Wing Designs of Springville, custom handcrafted leather wallets by Grigs Leather Co. of Olean, and the shop is anxious to receive their first stock of DCT branded skate decks, manufactured by longtime friend Pete Scheira, owner of Jamestown Skate Products.

"My wife's niece is in the jewelry business, and we've commissioned her to create skate-inspired necklaces made out of recycled bearings," Chris said. "We're excited to expand our offerings through local artisans and small businesses, and we invite those who think their products would be a good fit in our shop to contact us."

The service area inside the shop is staffed with a knowledgeable skateboard technician who can assemble your new complete (deck, trucks and wheels purchased separately that need to be put together) or for simpler needs such as tightening or loosening of trucks, hardware replacement, grip tape, etc. DCT shop manager Jake Bellamy can help you choose the right setup based on your skate style and skill level.

"Jake's in the know when it comes to skateboarding," said Chris. "He's a longtime skater with experience. He can help you with just about everything!"

INDOOR PARK

The retail space housed in the front section is only a piece of the puzzle. Walk beyond the racks of clothing and wall of skate decks until you come to a sliding barn-style door (outfitted with skate trucks and wheels for a handle) and you'll find yourself surrounded by quarterpipes, pyramids and rails. DCT's indoor skatepark invites all ages and skill levels to skate, learn and come together. The beginner friendly features are also fun and challenging for experienced skaters, as expressed by many who have already come through the DCT door.

"I'm lucky to have been able to recruit some of the guys that helped build Ellicottville's outdoor park to come and build the indoor here," said Chris. "Ferrari, Melon and Jared busted hump to get the park up and running in record time. They put in a lot of late nights (and screws!) and a lot of custom details including the DCT letter plaque made of pool tiles to tie into the bank-to-wallride with pool coping... and keep a lookout for the puzzle piece as you enter the park."



I've always had an interest in, and a love for, red wine in particular. My love of red wine was further developed by my Uncle Ron Maranto, who is a sommelier. My wife and I purchased approximately 85 acres of land in Ellicottville so that we could build a home there and have a destination for our children and hopefully future grandchildren. (I have one on the way now!) In June of 2019 after speaking to a friend of mine, John Comerford who also grows grapes in the Ellicottville area, I decided to plant approximately 500 vines. During Covid I spent most of my time in Ellicottville, was isolated and bored, and decided to clear enough land to plant an additional 1,850 vines."

All that effort has definitely been fruitful. (See what I did there?) Bob's Marquette strain of grapes are used to create wine (which also goes by the same name) for the Winery of Ellicottville. According to Sam, this will be the third batch of wine he creates from the vineyard's yield since its beginning.

Bob told us, "The initial vineyard was planted on June 23, 2019. John Rosier, the owner of Forevergreens in Springville, was instrumental in getting this project going. We planted the vineyard while my wife was away on a spiritual pilgrimage in Italy. She unfortunately and unexpectedly passed away the next day (June 24, 2019), so she never saw the vineyard. What I call the "old vineyard" is very special to me for that reason. The "new vineyard" was planted in 2020 during Covid. The land was cleared and prepared for planting by Asa Moss, from Moss Construction in Ellicottville. Friends and family helped plant all 1,850 vines while social distancing during a really uncertain time. It is also special to me – just for different reasons. At the present time, all of the grapes that are made into wine, and sold, are done so through the Winery of Ellicottville."

That's a lot of grape vines, but it isn't just the one variety. Bob grows five different grapes. The primary is of course the Marquette, which was first introduced to colder climate vine-yards in 2006. It was produced by the University of Minnesota and is the grandchild of Pinot Noir. It was created to withstand up to -30 degrees. He also grows Somerset, Frontenac, Frontenac Gris, and Leon Millot grapes. (The Somerset are very tasty table grapes, meant for eating and not for wine making.)

While Sam walked us through the vineyard to show us each section - from the lowest part (which was the original) all the way to the top of the hill, we soaked in all the information he threw at us and learned what working a vineyard entails.

A typical day at the vineyard starts with a visual inspection to determine if tying or pruning of the vines is necessary. Visual inspection is also performed to determine if there is any type of insect or disease concerns. Grassy areas between the vines are cared for. Insect, weed and/or disease maintenance is performed as necessary. (Bob does much of this work himself with the assistance of Joe Nosbich, who lives full-time here in Ellicottville.)

Since there are multiple varieties of grapes, there are 3 different harvests which are dependent on weather conditions. The first harvest can be as early as late August, and the last harvest as late as mid-October. Harvest time is a party at the house with friends and family. During the winter, winter pruning is performed in order to prepare the vines for the following season. (Bob hires a great team of professional trimmers to trim and balance the vines for the next season.)

The vineyard is beautiful and though it currently is not open to the public, Bob has a lot of plans in mind for its future. He says, "Although not completely solidified as of yet, my hope is to turn the property into a winery. A destination of sorts for people traveling to the Ellicottville area. The winery would have a tasting room, some production on site, outdoor areas to enjoy the beautiful Enchanted Mountains and scenery, and access to the walking trails and wooded areas on the property. Some time ago, I had a wonderful meeting with the Executive Director of the CCIDA, Corey Wiktor, and discussed this plan. I will be submitting some thoughts to the IDA in the next couple of weeks. We will see!"

Bob went on to explain, "When the original vineyard was planted, it was for fun. A hobby. After Covid and the quadrupling of its size, this whole endeavor took an entirely different path. I had no plan and no idea what I would do with all of the grapes. The leap of faith was the hope that something - or someone - would come along at some point to guide me. That happened. I can't stress enough how a chance introduction to Sam Sheehy from the Winery of Ellicottville changed everything for me. Sam's experience working in vineyards, and the advice that he provides, has been invaluable to me. Sam is also an extremely gifted vintner whose expertise in making wine seems to be expanding daily. I am so grateful to have met him and his beautiful family. This relationship has changed everything for me and the vineyard, and I am excited to see what the future will bring."

Sam is most certainly a talented individual. He explained the process of harvesting, pressing and winemaking said vineyard grapes. (Did you know that the sanitization in their winemaking process is achieved using alcohol? Or that most of the wines offered at the Winery are crafted for balance and drinkability, often resulting in wines with a lower alcohol content? Perfect for an afternoon glass... or two.)

As a matter of fact, we ended our day downtown at the Winery of Ellicottville with a sampling of 2021's Marquette Vintage, and it was a delightfully dry, fruit forward wine. It was amazing to learn the story of grape to glass. Sam is full of information on all the processes of winemaking, variety of wine, and what best to pair certain wines with. Fun fact: The color of wine is achieved from the grape skins!

So keep your eye out for news on the Marquette Vineyard; we're sure you'll be hearing more about it soon! In the meantime, stop into the Winery of Ellicottville and enjoy yourself a glass of your preferred flavor. Order up a charcuterie board, sit out on their upstairs patio and have a delightful afternoon!

PROFILE

MARY ELIZABETH DUNBAR

Town Historian, Now a Georgia Peach of a Gal

Ellicottville has a way of attracting people of all walks of life. Back in our formative years we were host to many individuals who went on to make their mark in the larger world. Curious, I Googled to find information about our community ancestors and came across this bit from a website of a chalet rental site in Ellicottville: "Have you heard about Chat GPT? If not, it's an AI (artificial intelligence) app. It writes content. We thought we'd give it a try. We asked it who are the most famous people from Ellicottville..." Take it from me, Chat GPT is not worth its salt. It mentions 4 people - 3 of whom are not even remotely connected, and John Elliot who surveyed the area and for whom the town is named. Mary Elizabeth Dunbar would have felt supremely vindicated since she was famously known for her resistance to computers and all things

Not a native Ellicottvillian, Mary Elizabeth grew up in Little Valley on 8th Street, then 4th, the oldest of four sisters, Susan and Sally (both deceased), and Betsy who lives with her husband, Carl on Jekyll Island, Georgia. She often spoke about memories of the now Gramco Mill in Little Valley. In her era, it was the James H. Gray Milling Company where both her grandfather, Emmons Burdette Dunbar and father, William Henry Dunbar were employed as managers. In high school and one summer on college break, Mary worked at the mill. That mill was partially burned, then rebuilt and eventually became Gramco, where her father worked until his retirement. Her mom was a schoolteacher, which likely imbedded in Mary her unique inquisitiveness about people and places from years gone by. That, and her great-grandfather, William Dunbar, fought in the Shenandoah Campaign of the Civil War and mustered out in 1865, living out his years in Cattaraugus County until his passing in 1914.

Mary got her education at the University of Maryland at College Park (Bachelor's Degree) and North Carolina State in Raleigh (Master's). She never married; she lived at home for a while after getting her Ellicottville job, then moved first to an apartment on Elizabeth Street then finally bought her home on Donlen Drive, where she resided ever since until her recent move to Georgia. Her work at the Cooperative Extension in the 4-H department gave her great satisfaction and touched many lives. She served as Training

Leader for Youth Development and influenced the development of many young people in our community. In 1994, Mary was honored with the 4-H distinguished service award in recognition of outstanding contributions to 4-H. In fact, if you visited the Cattaraugus County Fair this year and browsed through the poultry building, you were actually in the building named for Mary Elizabeth Dunbar.

Mary has a love for all things history. She was a member of several historical associations in the area and was on the board of the Ellicottville Historical Society and the Cattaraugus County Museum in Machias. She served as both Town and Village Historian for Ellicottville for decades. Along with those affiliations, she worked with the Seneca Nation on resettlement issues, and she also served on the Arboretum Committee. Another of her lasting contributions was her work with several other county historians on the Advisory Council for the County Bicentennial History book. Her departure to a well-earned life of retirement leaves many empty spaces. And likely many families who thought they might still count on the generosity of her time when asked to help research their own family genealogies, which she did willingly, for many.

In her spare time, Mary liked to travel across America and the world. She has visited places like Alaska, China, Russia, and Egypt. On her last big trip to Peru, she unfortunately fell and had to fly a circuitous route home to receive needed medical care and to rehabilitate. Fortunately, she was able to enjoy Peru vicariously through Judy Brown who shared her photos of her own trip to Peru.

Now at 85, Mary is one tough lady. She has battled several times with cancer and always had the lifelong struggle with osteoporosis that somehow never kept her down or held her



back. Her vitality, her love of Ellicottville and the rich history of our county and surrounding communities, her love of sharing all she knew with everyone, particularly children, was a gift to this community for as long as she was able to share it with us. Mary, if you are reading this, you are truly missed.





Admission to DCT's indoor park is \$10 all day, and a lounge area complete with couches and TV streaming skate videos welcomes park users when they need a break.

Chris expressed his excitement to introduce annual and seasonal membership options, skate lessons, and after-school programming in the near future. "We're finalizing our membership and program details this week, and we're looking forward to offering one-on-one coaching and group lessons soon. We're also planning to offer skateboard rent-als, as we've had a handful of requests already from visitors who, for example, traveled up here from out-of-state but didn't want to pack their skateboard on a plane. Or for the kid that's interested in trying skateboarding for the first time but mom or dad doesn't want to invest in a complete right away."

MOUNTAIN BIKES, TOO?

Yes, Daily City Train is a skateshop. But customers entering the 2 Bristol Lane location will also notice a line of mountain bikes, snowboards and bike/board apparel in the shop as well. That's because the space also houses another business, Loud Underground. Previously located in the basement of Adventure Bound on Ellicottville's main drag, Loud Underground owner Dee Dippel jumped at the opportunity to move 'above ground' when Chris was looking for a way to help fill the space.

"As the Parks manager at HoliMont, I've worked alongside Dee over the past couple summers at HoliMont's Bike Park, where his team sets up their bike service trailer each weekend for mountain bikers," said Chris. "DCT's location is a really big space, and he was looking to move, so everything just lined up. Plus, it makes sense to team up. We both have a similar vision when it comes to pushing for action sports in our area. It just works!"

Loud Underground carries full suspension mountain bikes, gravel grinders, BMX and E-bikes for sale plus parts and accessories, and their service department can handle any bike repair or tune-up. Known as the area's Kona, Specialized and Rocky Mountain dealer, Loud recently announced the addition of Santa Cruz, Juliana and Reserve to their fleet.
