The Ellicottville that visitors and locals know today is a shadow of Ellicottville past. The industrial/farm town has morphed over time to the amazing tourist town visited by hundreds of thousands of people annually, thereby becoming the number one sales tax revenue source in the county. All because of dreams - Holiday Valley, HoliMont, our exceptional restaurants, services and shops, and our Chamber of Commerce. Ellicottville is obviously doing many things right, but the common denominator of all the endeavors here is simply, "It takes a village". And it takes people who aren't intimidated by the dream and are willing to pursue it at all

For instance, Pastor Dan at St. Paul's Lutheran Church would love to see an inclusive playground on the church grounds. Is it possible to have both? Time will tell. The Ellicottville Playground Board did connect with Pastor Dan. "He and the church members are very supportive of this plan, and we are looking forward to collaborating in the future for fundraising and overall awareness."



Board member and treasurer, Tiffany Frentz, knows first-hand the challenges placed on a family and a child who has special needs. She is keenly aware of the limitations to our (frankly inadequate) playground equipment when it comes to trying to take her children for a day in the park. The board is clear that they wish for "this playground to be a place where every single child - no matter their abilities - can play and learn.

Dreams take a village, they take collaboration, and they take dollars... lots of them. "The committee's goal is to raise \$500,000. We have had some donations trickle in that we are immensely thankful for. We are hoping to organize fundraising events for the fall/winter to help us reach our goal as we continue to apply for grants that are appropriate and align with our core values. We are in the process of applying for grants. It's quite a rigorous application process. We want to make sure we are putting every effort towards this. This requires us to be extremely thorough on what we feel will give us the best opportunity to succeed."

"Since this is a community endeavor, we'd be thrilled to have local support throughout our fundraising events. This can include a variety of different things such as sharing our social media posts or volunteering as needs arise. We recognize this project is going to require a significant financial investment and raising funds won't be an easy task. After our initial social launch, we were overwhelmed and humbled at how much positive reaction we received from both local and out-of-town families. Those positive reactions help in creating the momentum to see ideas such as the playground achieve success. There will be countless ways for the community to get involved, and that community involvement is critical for this project to be a success.

Frank Pitillo Memorial Fund Reaches Goal; Installs New Stadium Lights at ECS

If you drove by Ellicottville Central School Sunday night, you may have noticed a luminous show of lights coming from the football field out back. That's because the new stadium lights provided by the Frank Pitillo Memorial Fund have been installed and turned on! The Ellicottville Varsity Boys Soccer team gave the new lights their first official test run during the team's start-of-the-season midnight scrimmage. (That's showing a lot of love for their sport right there!)

ellicottvilleNOW took the opportunity to speak with Nick Pitillo, organizer of the Frank Pitillo Memorial Fund, about the new lights, the recent golf tournament fundraiser, and what this endeavor means to him and his family.

The tournament was a sold out success. "The event was HUGE!" Nick said. "We were able to make \$65,000+ in funds for the lights. Our sponsors were amazing and we had a full field of players. By all accounts it was a fantastic day and enjoyed by all.'

A special thank you was expressed for the event's Champion Sponsors - The Weir Family Foundation, Holiday Valley and Cattaraugus County Bank, and to all the other sponsors that hopped onboard as well. "And we can't forget the AMAZING



community we live in, as they made this possible!" said Nick. "The golf tournament was exactly what we needed to push this campaign over the top! We are hopeful that there will be very little additional expenses to be covered. However, due to popular demand, we have already locked in a date for next year's golf tournament; we plan to make this an annual event!

The lights they strived so hard to fundraise for are up. That's a huge milestone! We talked about that process with Nick a bit. "This entire thing started a few years ago when I went to see a football game at the field for the first time in many years. It was clear that the lights were not up to proper lighting standards. After meeting with school officials last year, we decided to start a campaign to replace the lights. We had a kick-off party on Nov. 23rd, and were off and running. In nine months we were able to raise virtually all the money needed."

They received three bids for the project and selected Ferguson Electric for the job, which local Mike Brennan (who has two kiddos that will be playing on the field) handled beautifully. They enlisted SEI to take care of the final design and submission, and they were quickly able to get state approval for the project. In the span of nine months. this went from a conversation to NEW LIGHTS that generations to come will benefit



So where does the fund go from here? What are their plans moving forward? "We have some additional work to do with final financials and want to make sure all of our vendors are paid in full," Explained Nick. "After that is complete, we will be using any remaining funds and additional efforts to continue, and possibly expand, the Frank Pitillo Memorial Scholarship Program, which currently gives 3 x \$1,000 college scholarships to ECS seniors who exemplify Frank's traits as a Scholar Athlete, a Leader, and an Entrepreneur."

Nick added that, "The Varsity Boys Soccer team had their first practice under the lights last Sunday night, the Little League team will be playing their first game this Saturday, and the first high school football

game is scheduled for Sept. 22nd vs. Wilson. We are hoping to host a community event at that point."

GREAT VALLEY FOOD PANTRY

Help Needed to Purchase New Supplies as Food Pantry Expands



The new space for the Great Valley Food Pantry is expected to open by October. Pantry Coordinator is asking for the community's help.

At some point in all our lives, we've been down and out and we've needed a little help. There's no shame in seeking assistance in a time of need. Our local food banks provide plenty of people with much needed sustenance and now, the Great Valley Food Pantry needs our help. Since its opening in 2019, it has outgrown its current space at the Great Valley Town Hall.

"The Great Valley Food Pantry was set up to assist folks residing in Great Valley, Humphrey and Kill Buck," said Jan Benson, Pantry Coordinator. "Although no one is turned away, we do encourage those not living in our community to use the pantry set up in their own area. It is our intention to offer food assistance to many in our area who fall into the low and limited income category. The pantry has grown from 20 to the present of approximately 150-170 persons visiting the pantry each month.'

As such, the Town is in the process of building an addition to their town hall which when finished, will provide a 37' x 42' area exclusively for the pantry. The contents and fixtures will be the responsibility of the pantry to supply, through donations. (Note: The building itself comes with no tax increase to the residents, as funds are coming from the Federal Build Back Better Act and the Town's sales tax receipts.)

Jan advised, "The expansion is progressing very nicely with Rich Horton as the general contractor and Great Valley Supervisor Dan Brown overseeing the entire project on a daily basis. The food pantry space should be ready to move into by the beginning of October. The walls are ready to be painted which will be our responsibility, and several volunteers from the Ellicottville Rotary Club have offered to help us with that. The expansion will allow us to keep a larger inventory of items and display the items in a much better manner than present. Currently, the town hall event room is used for many things so the food pantry has to remove all items each time the pantry closes for the day.'

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

With your help, the pantry will be able to continue its mission of providing healthy food to those in need as well as expand its services in the future. The list of items that they need include:

- · Stainless Steel sink with surrounding work area (1 piece) \$750
- 4 Drawers or bins for under-the-sink storage \$30 each
- 2 Two-tier carts for volunteer use \$90 each
- 4 Shopping carts for client use \$250 each
- 4 Six-foot tables \$100 each
- 10 gallons of primer \$100
- 5 gallons of ceiling paint \$100 • 5 gallons of wall paint \$150
- Painting supplies \$150
- Misc. supplies TBD
- Monetary reserve \$10,000
- · Non-perishable food items, toiletries,

and household items



Jan expressed that they've already received a few great donations, including a 3-door cooler, large freezer, folding chairs, a stainless metal table and metal shelves. Of course, they aren't expecting someone to go out and buy a brand new shopping cart. Any monetary contributions are always welcome and gratefully accepted, which the food pantry group will use to purchase needed items. Checks may be payable to: Saving Grace Outreach/Great Valley Food Pantry, PO Box 427, Great Valley, NY 14741. A tax receipt for your donation will be supplied.

Lastly, Jan wanted to say, "Many individuals have stepped up to help in our transition which has been wonderful. Continued support of the food pantry will always be appreciated, as we operate on donations. It is our hope to continue to grow and offer the much needed assistance in our immediate area.'







ELLICOTTVILLE VILLAGE BOARD

Public Hearing to Impose Moratorium on Applications for Cannabis Use/Distribution Facilities Held; Adopted, Effective Immediately

The Village of Ellicottville Board meeting was called to order on Tuesday evening, August 15th, by Mayor John Burrell. Starting off on a high note, the second quarter sales tax from Cattaraugus County came in with a 9.43% increase from the prior year's account. The last four quarters have continuously seen a positive increase leading to more revenue than initially expected for budgeting.

Jumping right into business, a motion was made to open the public hearing for Local Law No. 6 of the year 2023, a local law on the imposing of a 4-month moratorium on the processing of any applications for, approvals, or permits for the siting of any facilities for Use or Distribution of Cannabis. It was accepted with no opposition from the board. This local law will allow the Village of Ellicottville the necessary time and resources to properly assess proper conditions and sites, as well as prevent unfavorable circumstances onto existing Village activities. Local Law No. 6 will take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State. A motion was made to close the hearing for Local Law No. 6 with motion to adopt the law as approved by the Village board.

Moving on, Mayor John Burrell attended the Planning Board Workshop on August 1st along with the Planning Board Meeting on August 8th. A large point of discussion revolved around the subsidization of existing lots. It had been noted that past zoning laws allowed for buyers to purchase properties and then turn a garage into another separate residence, almost always upsetting local and long-term residents. Regulations were made and laws were changed in order to prevent the abuse of local housing and land.

Simply put, the current zoning law in place specifies that you cannot subdivide an existing lot in a residential area. There continues to be, however, certain property holders that look for creative ways to go around local law and press forward with their request. The Board has discussed ways to become more direct with what the current zoning law states to avoid the unnecessary repetition in same case filings.

A new development around the Village's telephone infrastructure system was addressed. The system itself is 100 years old. Historically the Town and Village worked as one operating entity, however the Town adopted an internet phone system, and the Village did not. Currently the Village has an underground network that is going to be updated to a better, integrated setup, ultimately saving the village \$50 a month. They will be able to program employee lines and keep the ability to transfer calls to the Town.

An update on the Elizabeth Street Restoration Proposal was made. The Village Board was able to review and approve the preliminary layout for all areas mapped in the proposal - Jefferson Street, Hughey Alley, and the intersection at Elk Street and Elizabeth Street. Included in the plan would be the west side of Jefferson to now include an estimated 9 diagonal parking spaces, 5 additional from the current 4 spaces available. In addition, the plan also includes new curbing and striping to be installed at the intersection of Elizabeth Street and Elk Street, as well as Jefferson Street and Hughey Alley. This will allow for safer crossing conditions and deeper parking spaces.

An update on the Park Systems by Sean Lowes explained there was a request made for the

Youth Soccer Clubs for more space by approving striping on the lower field. This would allow for two fields. The increase in enrollment this year called for the first fall youth travel soccer league for Ellicottville, NY. Additionally, this field striping would not interfere with any other activities or sports. Permission was granted by the Village Board.

A Special Event was brought to the Board's attention with a presentation made by Board Trustee Caitlin Croft, for fellow member and organizer Doug Bush regarding The EVL Halloween Half & 5K. This event is celebrating its 10th year running. Set up will begin October 21st at 6:00am and end at 5:00pm that evening. The attendance is estimated at around 1,700 drawing the attention of runners and families alike. There will be point of contacts available at the event to ease the influx of travelers. Road closures will be the north side of Monroe Street between Elizabeth Street and Washington Street, the south side of Monroe Street between Maybee Alley and Martha Street, and Elizabeth Street between Route 219 and Jefferson Street. The route follows the same course as the previous year. Doug Bush has also reached out to Google to be sure updates are made the day of the event to reflect the street closures to better assist any expected traffic. The motion was passed to approve the event with Mayor John Burrell saying it is "the best run event we have!" Registration is now open at evlhalf.com.

Edgemere Development has reached out with their encouragement and support for the Village of Ellicottville to reapply to the next round of Restore NY, offering financial aid for the application process as well as grant writing assistance. A motion was requested to look more into this opportunity. Mayor John Burrell took this chance to bring attention to Ellicottville's current standing with recent state grant applications and is pushing to get answers on why the village has been overlooked in these available programs.

Other meeting highlights include:

- Village Planner Greg Keyser announced that there is now an official complaint form that will be available in the Town Hall for residents to access upon need. Once they are signed and filed they will be processed and considered.
- Village Engineer Ben Slotman reminded those present that there is an open position for an Engineering Technician and encourages those interested to check out the Town & Village of Ellicottville website or stop by the Town Hall for more information or to submit a resume.
- The Mill Street Parking Lot Project has been awarded to Lake Shore Paving.
- The Mayor and Village Board were made aware that the State Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Permit was passed and upon inspection showed to be well maintained and operating.
- A matter of old business discussed was the request for the review of the current open container law. The Village Board closed the matter by lack of support for any change.
- The Washington Street light poles were discussed, and a further decision will be made regarding the height and style. The Board is looking into the best option that meets the needs of area safety and village authenticity.

The Ellicottville Village Board will next meet in usual fashion on Tuesday, September 19th at 6:00pm in the Town/Village Hall, 1 Washington Street. The public is welcome to attend.

CEREAL BOX CHALLENGE RECAP

Local Businesses Donate Over 5,000 Boxes to Food Pantry

Diving into the Fine Art of Sport Fishing

Now, before you start thinking about the James Bond movie, For Your Eyes Only, this is not a story about intrigue, mayhem, fast cars, and sexy people. It is a story about the art and joy of sport fishing and a local company named For Your Eyes Only. The company owner, Dennis Young, informs us that the eyes in the name of the company refer to the short name for Walleyes, which in fishing circles are called "eyes." Although, legally, one can catch walleyes from May 15th through March 15th in New York State, Young wraps up his charter boat fishing season in late September/October, weather dependent. And we all know how unpredictable the weather is in Dunkirk or Buffalo, on Lake Erie.

There is still time to charter the boat for a couple of hours of fishing with a guy who has been fishing the area since he was a kid. Now retired, he has a lot of experience under his belt. Although seasoned fishers will most often just book him and the boat for a leisurely day of fishing, Young is also willing to take novice anglers out and teach them the art of fishing. Oh, and if he looks familiar to you, Young has also served as the East Otto Town Justice for the past 24 years.

Fishing can be a solo sport, or one shared with others, while still being solo, in a way. That is one of the joys of fishing - solitude or shared solitude. In a boat with five or six people, chances are less for that part of the sport, but the fun is shared. Imagine the thrill of catching a 11 to 12-pound Walleye (also known as yellow pike) and taking it home that night for some of the best eating from the lake. Who knows, you might even catch one to break the state record of 18 pounds!

Speaking of large fish, please cancel any thoughts you might have of going out to the lake with thoughts of catching a sturgeon. They are a historic, threatened species and if accidentally caught (very unlikely) cannot even be brought into the boat. They must be cut loose to continue living their very long lives (up to 150 years). Yes, it is exciting to think about catching a ten-foot long, 250-pound fish... but it's a no-no.





Camaraderie is part of the fun on these boat trips. Young says his guests can bring coolers with snacks or cold refreshments. BUT NO SMOKING! Most trips head out by 7:15am for the best fishing for the predator Walleye that has great night vision. Dusk works well, too, as do cloudy fall days. There's a lot of great fishing time left this season. Go to foryoureyesonlysportfishing.com for more information.

This story reminds me of the last time I went fishing with my husband on the Allegany (or Allegheny) River between Portville and Eldred. The day was perfect - not too warm, not too chill, the sun was moving lower in the sky. It was close to 7:00pm, a good time for fishing. We had our lawn chairs and a cooler full of Labatts and ginger ale. His preteen daughter was with us. It was so still that we could hear every chirp and peep from the critters in the brush. As we cast our lines, we realized, after a while, that we were being watched. Looking down the river about 100 yards to our left, we spotted an eagle in a tree. Then it flew up the river directly across from us. Yikes! The stare-down began. My husband whispered, "Fish, don't bite now." He didn't want to get into a battle with an eagle over a carp. We gently eased our bait in. After the eagle left, we went back to fishing, but it wasn't quite as exciting.

Gooseneck Hill Waterfowl Sanctuary Invites All Bird Lovers to Annual Event

Gooseneck Hill Waterfowl Sanctuary is the destination for bird lovers, and on Sunday, it will be open to the public for the last time this year! The largest covered free-flying aviary in the United States, Gooseneck Hill welcomes everyone to their annual Wild Wing Festival on Sunday, August 27th from noon-4:00pm. Explore the aviary, support the incredible work of Gooseneck Hill and enjoy great food and live music at this bird-lover's paradise at 5067 Townline Road in Delevan.

For Milton and Rosemary Miner, birds are their life, and they've devoted the past 40 years to providing a safe haven for over 750 ducks, geese, and swans, some of which are on the endangered species list. "I've been doing this since 1983," said Rosemary Miner. "We were in Holland [NY] but we didn't have enough room. We only had four birds when we started and now we have over 700!"

The sanctuary, which contains seven acres under net including four ponds, is home to many different species of birds, some of which can't be found anywhere else in the country. While some birds come from breeders and zoos, others arrive via Miner's travels. "We went to Alaska four times and collected eggs on the tundra," she explained. "We had to have special permits from Alaska and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service." Miner brought home Pacific Eiders from Alaska, the largest ducks in the world. Other species include scaups and long-tailed ducks, just a few of the 78 different species at Gooseneck Hill.

On Sunday, visitors will be able to go inside the aviary and feed the ducks by hand, if they like. "All the birds are hand-raised, so they're familiar with people," said Miner. "They'll come right up to you and eat our of your hand. We also have over a thousand koi fish to feed. Some of them are around three feet long!" Visitors will also enjoy some of the newest members of the Gooseneck Hill family, too. "We have lots of babies - some are almost full grown but we just had some babies born this week," Miner added. "We have some little white mandarins that are only two inches high running around with their parents!"

Visitors can expect to see birds from every continent, like the bar-headed goose from India, the highest flying bird in the world, and the African Pygmy Goose,



the smallest in the world. While Gooseneck Hill gives some birds to zoos, many go to breeders who are better equipped to care for the birds. "They need a lot more than a little cage," Miner pointed out. "Here, they have lots of land. They're free - they can pick their own partner, and they don't have to be put in a cage. If they don't want to lay an egg, that's fine with me; I don't care!"

In addition to tours of the aviary, Sunday's festival includes live music by the Rustic Ramblers with Gene Hilts on the steel guitar. Lil's Deli of Machias will be serving a variety of food, including pizza, pizza logs, fries, taco logs, and specialty cookies. Admission is just \$10 for adults, \$5 for children 12 and younger, and free for children younger than five.

The festival, which was started about 10 years ago, supports the facility and associated costs of maintaining the property. A treacherous storm in 2012 created wind and waves about eight feet high, which destroyed the fence of the entire lower aviary and created six to eight feet of muck in the ponds. All birds had to be moved to the top aviary, and if not for the help of the Local 17 Union of Hamburg, Gooseneck Hill would have likely closed for good. Union members volunteered for three weeks to replace the fence and netting, and local mills donated stone to help rebuild the sanctuary.

Each year, festival funds are used to maintain the property, which has weathered other storms since. For those looking to get involved after the festival is over, Miner said that Gooseneck Hill is always looking for help. "My husband is 83 and I'm 76," she said. "When you get older, it's a lot harder to replace netting and fencing. We're always looking for volunteers. If there is anyone looking for a job and is a good worker, we'd be more than happy to hire them," said Miner, who noted that the work - while physically demanding - is incredibly rewarding.

For those planning to attend the festival, Miner recommends bringing a lawn chair and appropriate footwear, as the festival will be held rain or shine. For more information about the sanctuary and bird adoption, visit gooseneckhillwaterfowlfarm.com or email Miner at rosebird@frontier.net.





2023 BUFFALO BILLS PRESEASON FINALE PREVIEW

Taking a Look into the Bills' Roster as to What We Can Expect for the Final Preseason Match-up and Moving Forward with the Regular Season

When it comes to preseason football, the attitude of most fans tends to start out as pure excitement that football is back at the start of the first game, and then quickly devolves into some feeling of "please just get through these games without anyone getting hurt".

While wins and losses don't matter in the preseason, and the biggest goal (at least for fans) is to get through the games injury free, there is still plenty of competition for roster spots that are worth keeping an eye on between prayers to whatever deity you might believe in for the team to stay healthy.

Here are three key roster battles still playing out on the Buffalo Bills that still need resolving as the Bills head into their final preseason game to take on the Bears in Chicago, on Saturday August 29th at 1:00pm.

BACKUP QUARTERBACK

Both Kyle Allen and Matt Barkley have had up and down outings throughout the first two preseason games. Barkley was the clear standout from the Bills' first contest against the Indianapolis Colts, completing 14 of 15 passes for 172 yards and 2 touchdowns, while Kyle Allen went 8/15 for 122 and an interception.

The script was flipped in the following game against the Pittsburgh Steelers where Allen was the clear better of the two. Barkley threw 3 interceptions, while Allen threw for 112 yards and a touchdown, while not committing any turnovers.

At the time of this writing, it is not yet known if any of the Bills starters will play against the Bears. If Josh Allen does not see in the field in the preseason finale, look for Kyle Allen and Barkley to each play about a half. This could ultimately determine which quar-

terback wins the backup job on the 53-man roster, and which player most likely heads to the practice squad.

MIDDLE LINEBACKER

At the outset of training camp, the battle for the starting middle linebacker position was a three-headed competition between veteran Tyrel Dodson and second year players Terrel Bernard and Baylon Spector. That quickly was pared down to a two-man race between Dodson and Bernard, until Bernard injured his hamstring leading up to the Bills' first preseason game.

Dodson has taken the majority of the starting snaps since, but rotated with 11th year veteran AJ Klein in the game against Pittsburgh. No one has really separated themselves from the pack, so performance in this game could be critical in determining who mans the middle linebacker spot come opening night against the New York Jets on September 11th.

If Bernard can play against Chicago, it will be interesting to see how much playing time he receives, and if he can make up the ground lost in the competition due to his injury.

WIDE RECEIVER

The top of the Bills' wide receiver depth chart is settled. There is no drama to be found in the first four receiver spots, outside of whatever it was that was ultimately going on with Stefon Diggs in the spring. Diggs is a superstar. There is no question who the Bills' number one target is. Behind Diggs is entrenched number two Gabe Davis and free agent signees Deonte Hardy and Trent Sherfield. The real competition is for the 5th and 6th receiver spots. At this point it seems to be a three-man race for two spots between 2022 5th round pick Khalil Shakir, 2023 5th round pick Justin Shorter, and former Arizona Cardinals 2nd round pick Andy Isabella.

Shakir has struggled with drops throughout camp but did flash at times in the limited game action he did see last season. He recorded 2 catches for 25 yards against the Colts, but also had a dropped pass. He did not have a reception in the game against the Steelers.

At 6'4, 223 lbs., Shorter brings an element of size to the Bills' receiving corp. He did not record a reception in the game against Indianapolis but led the Bills in receiving against Pittsburgh with 5 catches for 47 yards and a touchdown.

Isabella has been with the Bills the shortest amount of time, only signing with the team on July 28th. He has however, impressed with his speed and route running, working his way up the depth chart to receive meaningful offensive snaps, while also being given opportunities as a kick returner.

With the NFL now only having three preseason games, it becomes even more important for the players battling for jobs to show out, and for the coaches and front office staffs to focus in on their evaluations to determine the final roster that the team will head into the regular season with. So even though the game is meaningless in the standings, it's far from meaningless overall.

STRENGTH TRAINING SAFETY

The Correct Way to Position Your Wrists

As a certified personal trainer (CPT) it is my job to watch my clients' form and correct it when I see even the smallest error to prevent injuries. Strength training requires a lot of mind-body awareness. Without even knowing it, you could slip into bad form and pay the price. One area I keep a sharp eye on is wrist position. Your wrists are an important but complex joint. When lifting weights, your wrists play a prominent role in providing the necessary stability.



In general, the wrists should be 'neutral' for whatever grip you are using when it comes to holding weights, pull-up bars or TRX bands. There are three types of grips:

- pronated (overhanded like when you do pull-ups)
- supinated (underhanded, like when you're doing a bicep curl)
- neutral (falls in between underhand/overhand grips, like when you're doing a hammer curl).

With each, your wrist position should remain neutral - meaning never cocked forward or pulled back in an extension. When you lose neutrality in the wrist joint, you'll usually feel it due to the strain on the tendons and ligaments.

Typically I see people holding dumbbells like they are holding a restaurant tray so they can 'push' up. In strength training your wrist should be straight, meaning knuckles to the sky.

The one exception is a front-rack barbell squat. Because your shoulders are helping to take the load, it's okay for your wrists to be extended as long as you have the wrists and shoulder mobility to feel okay supporting the bar.

To keep lifting weights for a long time, these tiny tweaks can make a major difference. So for strength's sake, pay attention to your wrist position.




