The proposed multiuse trail, once completed, will run along the Buffalo-Pittsburgh rail corridor and will stretch a total of 27 miles, connecting Orchard Park to Ashford, NY.

Registration to ride in the EA2EVL Fondo is still open, and all cyclists of all skill levels are welcome to sign up. The ride will take off from 42 North Brewery in East Aurora, traveling south down scenic Route 240 and finishing at Holiday Valley, where a post-ride party (open to the public) will feature food, craft beer, a vendor village, and live music by Davey and The Goliaths. 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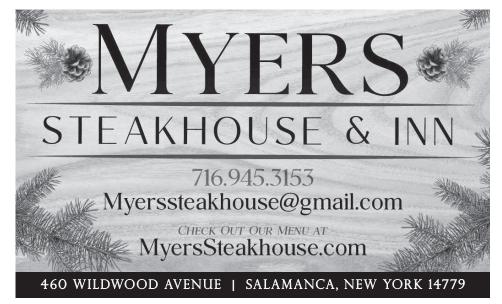

#### POLLINATORS TO PEST CONTROL

Master Gardeners Offering FREE Workshops this Fall

Fall in western New York is an exciting time for gardeners, as harvest season is the culmination of many months of careful planning and hard work. While fall may signal the end of the growing season, it's hardly the end of a gardener's work. Cornell Cooperative Extension at 28 Parkside Drive in Ellicottville is home to the Master Gardener Volunteer Program, which offers a series of fall workshops for new and experienced gardeners to plan next year's garden, learn different ways to preserve the harvest's bounty, and explore new agricultural topics.

Shannon Rinow, coordinator of the Master Gardener Volunteer Program in both Cattaraugus and Chautauqua counties, is excited to announce this new series of free community workshops, all of which are held at the Cornell Cooperative Extension Office in Ellicottville. "These are brand new classes that we haven't done before," Rinow explained. In fact, the Master Gardener Volunteer Program in Cattaraugus County is rather new in that they just celebrated their first group of gardeners who completed their training this past spring. "This is the first time we've had Master Gardeners in about 10 years, and we're really excited to grow the program!"

The Master Gardener Volunteer Program is a nationwide educational program, and in New York State, it consists of a corps of volunteers who are trained by Cornell Cooperative Extension in the science and art of gardening. Individuals in the community complete their training in a variety of gardening and horticultural topics through Cornell University's curriculum during the spring. Rinow explained, "The purpose is to foster trained, knowledgeable consumers who can pass on their knowledge with others."

The next part of their training involves teaching different community workshops or engaging in outreach programs in the local area. "Our Master Gardeners do 50 hours of volunteer work to become a master," Rinow said. "When they're speaking on different topics or leading workshops, they're using research-based methods and experience they've learned." The upcoming classes will be taught by the program's newest members and are based on their interests and areas of expertise.

The first workshop is "Gardening for Pollinators" on Wednesday, Sept. 28th from 5:00-6:00pm. Master Gardener Tamara Bacho will share her knowledge about creating a garden space that is inviting to pollinators, like butterflies. Monarch butterflies are now on the endangered species list, so Bacho will discuss ways to help increase their chances of survival.

For those interested in exploring a new area of agriculture, "Beekeeping 101: the Roles of Bees in Agriculture" is the perfect workshop. On Wednesday, October 12th from 6:00-7:00pm, attendees will learn about bee keeping, the role of bees in our ecosystem, different types of bees, and how they impact our food supply.

Just a few days later on Saturday, October 15th from noon-1:00pm, Emma Boutelle, owner of Miller Valley CSA farm in Kennedy, will be leading "Organic Gardening: Pest and Weed Management." According to Rinow, "Her workshop will focus on home gardeners and how they can implement organic gardening practices, stay on top of weeds, and manage pests. As garden season ends, we have a little more time that we can spend planning for next year! Emma will talk about putting the garden to bed for the winter and prepping it for next year. There are a lot of preparations that you'll want to do in the fall that she'll discuss."

The final workshop of the season is especially helpful for those who had a bountiful harvest

#### NIGHT LIGHTS RETURNS

Come See Griffis Sculpture Park in a Whole New Light - Now through Oct. 15



EAST OTTO - For the 10th consecutive autumn, Griffis Sculpture Park is being illuminated in colorful theatrical lighting for all to enjoy. NIGHT LIGHTS opened up for the season on Friday, September 9 and will run through Saturday, October 15, 2022. A portion of the legendary park's landscape and sculptures are seen in a whole different light and has become a successful fundraiser for the park.

Night Lights blends creative lighting, sculpture, sound, and nature to deliver an unforget-table outdoor adventure. At Night Lights, guests are invited to venture on an unguided walk through a portion of the Mill Valley Road site of the park, where the trails and sculptures interact with creative lighting, creating a truly unique experience. The walk is about 0.7 miles and is on an up-and-back nature trail that goes through forests and fields. Some of Griffis Sculpture Park's favorite sculptures - such at the Praying Mantis, The Bathers, The Mushrooms and more - are bathed in light. Guests are encouraged to dress for outdoor conditions and bring flashlights for a few darker sections of the trail.

Night Lights occurs on 18 evenings, spread out over six weeks. The final evening is Saturday, October 15, 2022. Admission is \$14 adults, \$9 for children ages 7-12, and free for kids 6 and under. Night Lights can be canceled due to heavy rain; updates will be provided on Griffis Sculpture Park's Facebook page. Organizers ask that visitors leave their dogs at home.

Night Lights at Griffis Sculpture Park is produced by SitlerHQ. The lighting and event company also produced the award-winning Night Lights at the Gardens (Buffalo & Erie County Botanical Gardens), Night Lights at The Heron (Sherman, NY), and Night Lights at the Nannen Arboretum in Ellicottville. SitlerHQ created their first Night Lights show in 2009.

Come walk some of the park's trails and experience the interaction between lights, nature and art during this season's Night Lights. Griffis Sculpture Park is located at 6902 Mill Valley Road, East Otto, NY, just minutes from downtown Ellicottville. For additional details including dates and times, head to griffissculpturepark.org.

#### Historical Walking Tours / Ghost Tours

The Ellicottville Historical Society will be offering two more Historical Walking Tours around the village on Saturday, September 24. Come learn about some of the founding fathers of Ellicottville and the houses they lived in. The walk will take approximately one to 1.5 hours to complete and costs \$10 per person, cash or check.

The Ellicottville Historical Society will also start offering Ghost Walks. Four walks are being offered on the following Fridays: September 30, October 14, October 21, and October 28. Please meet at the Village Gazebo at 7:00pm; the walk will begin at 7:30pm. Hear new stories of people and things that have happened in and around Ellicottville, as we venture to the Jefferson Street Cemetery and visit a few more graves than in past years and around town. This is a "walk at your own risk"; you may want to bring a flashlight or use your phone when walking through the cemetery. Cost is \$10.00 per person, cash or check.

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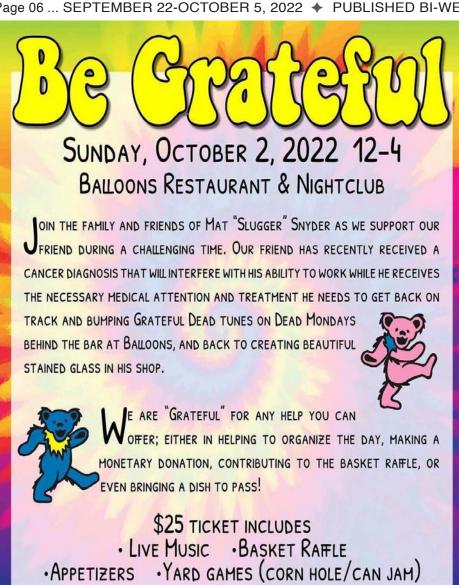

Now, we are bringing it back but reimagining it in the form of a new event at a new location this fall, with many more artists from all three counties in our region."

Indeed, the Tri-County Arts Council is comprised of member artists and craftspeople who reside in Allegany, Cattaraugus, and Chautauqua counties. "There isn't really a venue like this in the local area," he said. #### Next Up on the Menu: SLIDERS

The SLIDER CRAWL is set for Saturday, October 15. What is a slider? Sliders are one of the hallmarks of American cuisine. You probably just think of them as miniature hamburgers (or pulled pork sammies, or whatever food items restaurants put onto a small bun and call it a slider), but in reality they're a unique food product that deserves recognition on their own. The name originated in the 1940s when sailors in the U.S. Navy would refer to mini-burgers as "sliders" because of their extreme greasiness. In just one or two bites, the burger would just slide right down! The slider was first created at White Castle, a popular American fast food chain restaurant.

What is a crawl? The crawl is where you pay one price (\$35) and receive vouchers to travel to six different area locations to test/try/enjoy a slider. You will rate each slider on presentation, flavor, smell, first impression and freshness. Votes will be tallied at the end of the crawl with the BEST SLIDER named. 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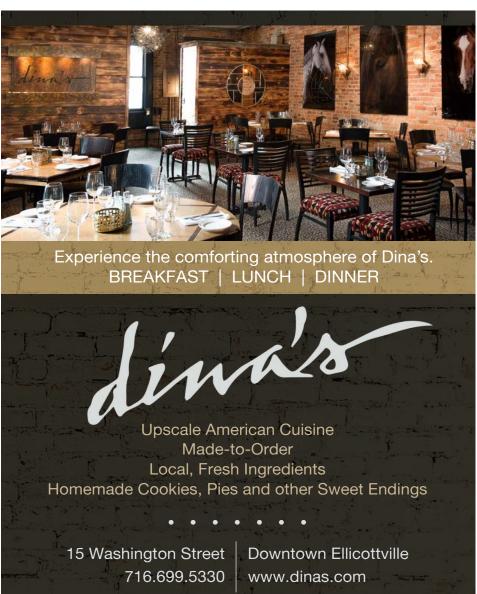

Take in the great view of Lake Erie and the surrounding area atop the tower of the Dunkirk Lighthouse.

For adventure seekers, get a closer look of the vibrant fall foliage while climbing among the treetops on Peek'n Peak Resort's Mountain Adventures. Surround yourself with fall foliage on a peaceful horseback ride by Double D.A.B. Riding Stables through miles of trails along the Lake Erie escarpment. Relax with a glass or two of local wine from Lake Erie Wine Country while admiring the fall foliage on one of the Fall Foliage Walks hosted by Johnson Estate Winery.

#### **FARM FRESH TREATS**

Another beloved fall tradition throughout the State of New York is apple and pumpkin picking. Browse Whitter Apple Farm for fresh apples perfect for pie, applesauce, and as a healthy snack. During your visit, don't miss the chance to try their fresh pressed cider. Pumpkintown is the epitome of fall fun where you and the whole family can partake in traditional fall activities including hayrides, a pumpkin jump pad, corn pit, and apple cannons to name a few. Worked up an appetite after all that fun? Enjoy fall snacks including doughnuts, apple cider slushies, kettle corn and more. Before you head out, pick out some pumpkins grown right on the farm.

#### **FALL CELEBRATIONS**

Fall and Harvest Festivals are offered throughout the Chautauqua-Lake Erie region in September and October Enjoy wine tasting, tours of the winery, craft beer, live music, chicken BBQ and fall desserts. The Festival of Grapes in Silver Creek during September is a unique festival held each year to celebrate the harvesting of concord grapes, which have a long history of importance to the region. Enjoy grape stomping, wine tasting, live music, food, arts and crafts as well as a parade to close out the weekend festivities.

The Busti Apple Festival occurs every year on the last Sunday of September. Tour the newly restored, operating 1839 Grist Mill and browse 130 tents of handmade crafts. And you can't pass up the locally grown apples, freshly made cider and other favorite fall foods.

Finally, during the second and third weekend in October, Peek'n Peak Resort hosts their Fall Fest. Both weekends offer free family entertainment, craft vendors, live performances and much more. In addition, scenic chairlift rides, zip lines, miniature golf, and an aerial adventure course will be available to enjoy.

Core Performance: Everyone Has a Story

I was homeless, penniless, and had 2 young sons to raise. Thankfully, I had the fortitude to gain my credentials to become a CPT in 2006 and had a small business with a few clients. I started my new journey in the 1887 building in a second-floor old classroom. I taught fitness classes in the old gymnasium. My client list grew and so did I. You can't help but learn a lot about yourself and the world when you've lost everything.

Over the years I've changed locations, gaining more square footage and clients. I have had the good fortune to mentor some of the younger generation of trainers who are now their own gym/studio owners. I also have had a voice in our local newspapers writing fitness articles for the past several years. I am a strong advocate for fitness at every age but have always believed that one type of training does not fit all fitness levels. Every person has unique needs and most need very specific modifications for even the most basic exercise like a squat or plank. And as the years have accumulated and I have endured my fair share of age-related issues (arthritis, torn meniscus, and now a synovial cyst in my back), I realize that some of the extreme training methods I promoted were unnecessary.

Staying fit and healthy doesn't mean abusing your body with tuck jumps and endless burpees. What truly matters is consistency and the ability to challenge yourself to get results. It is so important to move each and every day by taking a 30-minute brisk walk, add in some basic body weight or strength training exercises at least 3 times a week and eat a diet that is well balanced with plenty of hydration. Create a lifestyle that is practical and feasible, and your body will thank you for it. A consistent fitness routine will affect your men-

tal and physical health. I know it helped me navigate my life's journey and I have seen how it has helped countless others.

My story could be told in many ways. I could dwell on the past and all the struggles I endured to get to where I am today, or I can celebrate the strength these situations gave me. I know what happened during those tough times influenced me, but it certainly does not define me. My boys are grown and have become wonderful young men, my business survived the pandemic and is still thriving but smaller and more manageable. My story - like your story - will continue to come with its share of ups and downs, like fitness in our everyday lives, stay committed and be up for a challenge.

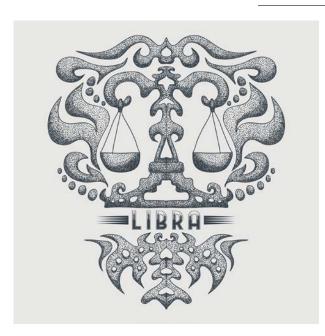

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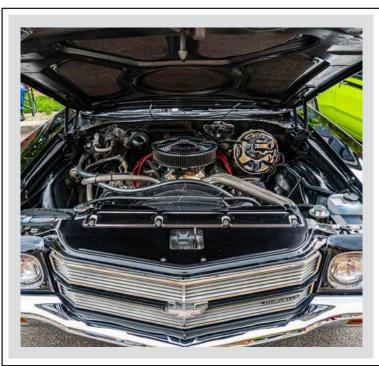
