The Franklinville-Ellicottville Titans sunk the Wilson Lakemen, 41-20, under the new lights at Ray Grey Memorial Field at Ellicottville Central School Friday, Sept. 22. The game marked the first time the varsity squad played under the new lights, which were funded in large-part by the Frank Pitillo Memorial Fund, in memory of #35 Frank Pitillo. Little brother and Villaggio owner Nick Pitillo, his family, friends and many athletes and community members were in attendance of Friday's Homecoming game, not only to share in the excitement of varsity football, but to take part in the lighting ceremony. In honor of #35, thirty-five balloons were released following the flip of the switch, and emotions were felt across the field and in the stands.

Senior running back Hunter Smith's four touchdown performance fueled the Titans' blowout win and kept the combined Franklinville-Ellicottville squad perfect on the season, running their record to 4-0 as they look to this Friday's showdown with the Class D defending champion, Randolph Cardinals, in Franklinville. #### REPLACING TOWN HALL'S HISTORIC FRONT DOOR

During the September 20th meeting of the Ellicottville Town Board, Nancy Redeye of Flynn Battaglia Architects discussed in detail efforts to replace the front door of the Town Hall. This is a project she has been working on with the Town to preserve the integrity of the building's history and likeliness. Seeing as the building dates back to 1829, it is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and would need to be approved by SHPO (State Historic Preservation Office) for any changes. Two options were presented to Board members.

The September meeting also covered the proposed Crosby Mart at Routes 219 and 242, which is now under Environmental review. This will take into consideration if the project meets the federal, state, and local environmental standards and impacts.

#### PUBLIC PROFILE: TINA ZERBIAN

CEO of Connecting Communities in Action Honored as Woman of Distinction

Forty-three years ago, Tina Zerbian began working at Connecting Communities in Action as the first coordinator of the non-profit organization's very first domestic violence service in Cattaraugus County. "Back then, we had a grant for \$10,500, which included my salary!" said Zerbian. With a total budget of less than \$2 million and around 30 employees, CCA's programs were limited to just Cattaraugus County in the early 1980s. Today, the organization has grown significantly, as new programs, services and sites reach individuals and families throughout five counties in western New York. However, one thing remains constant, and that is the leadership of Zerbian, who has served as CEO since 1984 and is this year's recipient of the New York State Senate "Woman of Distinction" award for the 57th Senate District.

"Every day Tina contributes to the well-being of our community. Her care and concern for others is amazing. She is the embodiment of 'service before self';" Sen. George M. Borrello stated in his press release announcing the award. "Because of her compassion-driven leadership, CCA is recognized across New York and the country for innovation and results in the human service world."

The award was established in 1998 and pays tribute to women who have demonstrated remarkable character, initiative and commitment in serving their neighbors, strengthening communities and acting as role models. Zerbian, who lives in Ellicottville with her husband, Tom, was thrilled when she learned she'd been selected.

"CCA has always had a good working relationship with Sen. Borrello's office," she said. "I was quite surprised when he called my cell phone one weekend in April and told me he was going to give me this award!" As Zerbian was unable to attend the May awards ceremony in Albany, Sen. Borrello is hosting a reception in her honor on Thursday, September 28th at 6:00pm at Cornell Cooperative Extension in Ellicottville.

Those who know Zerbian and the incredible impact of her work at CCA say that few people are more deserving of this honor. CCA Board President Donald A. Jones, who has worked with her since 2008, said in a recent press release, "I can tell you her leadership, vision and passion is second to none. I know that the vulnerable people in our communities are provided much needed services from all Tina has done professionally over all these years."

While domestic violence services are still a core program of CCA, as they were when Zerbian first began in the early 1980s, several more programs have been formed. These include a nutrition program, energy and housing services, and a fatherhood program, which is designed to help local fathers, including those who are in jail, become better parents through one-onone and group work. School-based programs to assist at-risk students and address truancy are provided in the Olean and Portville school districts.

"Domestic violence is one of our largest single programs, and we provide services to victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, or any crime throughout a two-county area," said Zerbian. "We added a high-risk team, which is relatively new. We also have new housing opportunities for victims of domestic violence. We have 14 new units of permanent housing coming in Olean. We also have a 24-hour victim services hotline."

Under Zerbian's leadership, CCA continued to provide services during the pandemic and never shut down at any point. "We were able to pivot and offer services virtually where possible," she explained. "Our programs that are school-based were able to take place in homes or outdoors. During Covid, new funding was available; for example, we've had a soup kitchen and a food pantry network for a number of years. During Covid, we couldn't hold congregate dining, so we provided to-go meals. For people who were quarantined, we had a project where we could deliver to homes."

While CCA offers many programs, Zerbian emphasizes the importance of partnering with other local organizations to meet as many needs as possible. "As many services as we provide, we certainly don't provide all the services needed," she pointed out. "We partner with local mental health organizations, substance abuse treatment programs, social services and other groups that provide homeless services. We rely heavily on our partners."

One of those partners is Sen. Borrello's office. "We would not be able to do the work that we do as smoothly and efficiently without his office," said Zerbian. "I hope this relationship continues long after I retire." Speaking of retirement, Zerbian is eyeing next year and is in the process of preparing the other leaders in the organization. "If you talk to people who know me, you'll hear I don't sit still very well," she laughed. "I do hope there will be other opportunities for me to contribute to the community."

#### LEGENDS, LORE & GHOSTS

A Lecture on Local Hot Spots for Paranormal Activity Coming to Ellicottville

Fall is officially here! The air is crisp, pumpkins and apples are ready for picking and things are getting a little spooky around Ellicottville... (which is how I would like it all year round, if we're being honest.) There is a wide variety of autumn adventure to be found around every corner, and the Ellicottville Historical Society is ready to get the ball rolling with their "Legends, Lore & Ghosts of Ellicottville" Lecture with author Amanda Woomer, on October 4th from 7:00-8:30pm.

Did you know that Ellicottville has a number of haunted places? (I would have bet that the 1887 Building was when I was younger.) This is the perfect opportunity to hear about some of these legends, learn historical facts and enjoy the spooky vibe of the season.

"This lecture is part of a larger series I do all throughout Western New York," explained Amanda. "I take five haunted locations that are relatively close to the location of the presentation. I then share the history - both haunted and mundane - and then share the legends, lore, and ghost stories surrounding these places, while also trying to debunk and fraudulent claims. These stories all come from my book, A Haunted Atlas of Western New York, which I released in 2019. It features over 130 haunted locations in the Western New York area and includes coordinates to find the locations, contact info, walking tours, driving tours, and even a spooky bucket list to keep track of your travels."

Her goal is simple: to inspire people to have their own paranormal adventures. "Instead of just watching paranormal television shows and believing everything you see and hear there, why not get up off the couch, head out the door, and explore your local history and find answers to the unknown for yourself?" Amanda said. "As for some of the locations we'll be discussing, I'll be talking about the Ashford Hollow Witch, Wildwood Sanitarium, and Ellicottville's own Hencoop Schoolhouse and Cemetery."

She didn't want to give too much away about the lecture, but we did ask if she could share some spooky tidbits with us. "I'll say that the presentation will be filled with local legends and lore, including stories of witches, curses and the ghosts of children playing along Hencoop Hollow Road. We'll be discussing the history behind one of my favorite pieces of local history - Sophia Disch, also known as the Ashford Hollow Witch - and learn how gossip and folklore turned her into something she was not, which happens so often with haunted history."

Believe it or not, this event is very family friendly. While some of the subject matter may be disturbing to some, it's certainly not too scary for younger children as long as they're interested in this sort of event. Amanda stated, "I've done lectures in the past where some of the best questions have come from kids!"

How does one become involved in the paranormal and a project like this? "I had my first paranormal encounter when I was only seven years old and since then I've been fascinated with trying to figure out what it was that I saw in my childhood home," Amanda explained. "Fast forward to 2015 and I lost my younger brother Jed to pediatric cancer. After that, my innocent curiosity became a desperate need to know what comes next after we die - if anything at all - so I began actively investigating the paranormal and visiting haunted locations. I quickly learned that many locations gate-keep or have a hefty price tag which made me want to find ways to make the paranormal accessible to everyone, which is how the *Haunted Atlas* came to be. Since then, I've visited schools, libraries and historical societies, sharing our local spooky history in the hopes that others who are wondering what might be next after we die can start to go on their own paranormal journeys to find the answers they're seeking."

Besides this collaboration with the Ellicottville Historical Society, Amanda is gearing up for her busy season. "October is a wild and crazy month for me! I'll be traveling throughout Western New York - and even into Massachusetts - giving lectures on haunted history. I'm also the curator of The Traveling Museum of Memento Mori which features artifacts from the Victorian mourning period which I'm also taking around the region to various locales."

If you want to come out for an evening of legends, lore and local ghost stories, be at 2 Washington Street at 7:00pm on October 4th. Copies of Amanda's *A Haunted Atlas of Western New York* and her other books will be available for purchase.

#### ELLICOTTVILLE VILLAGE BOARD

Members Discuss Timeline for Elizabeth Street Project/Dig Once Project and Mill Street Parking Plaza; Listen to Local Concern Re: Short-term Rentals

Construction of the Mill Street parking lot began two weeks ago and is taking shape.

An update to the project was discussed at the Village Board's recent meeting.

STATE OF THE STATE

Mayor John Burrell called to order the Village of Ellicottville Board Meeting on Tuesday, September 19th at 6:00pm. Following the Pledge to the Flag, members started off by addressing some good news.

It was announced that the NYS AIM Funding was granted to the Village of Ellicottville for this year at the amount of \$5,658.00. This state allocation is based on population and is openly available to be used where needed.

Business from the Floor was addressed involving the Elizabeth Street Project. This project is intertwined with the Town of Ellicottville Dig Once Project. The Village Board and Town of Ellicottville have been cooperatively working together to address the water main work that is to be done on Elizabeth Street, as well as the construction to follow. There has been a large effort to coordinate these plans, ultimately to save the Town and Village money, labor, and convenience. The projects are addressed in one fluid plan, opposed to two separate ones involving more street closures and construction. The timeline for this project is being fine-tuned to the requests of current events and weather-related issues.

Northrup Construction has proposed that the project begin after Ellicottville's largest anticipated event, Fall Festival.

Fall Festival is a major calendar marker for the area and to disrupt that for the project would not make sense. A pause can be made to focus on a more suitable time. The immediate plan is to pave the street to better the driving conditions for winter, and then resume the project when the weather will allow for a dryer period. The goal ultimately is to have it finished before next year's 2024 Fall Festival but with hopes that it will be completed by July 2024. With this option in place, it allows for the waterline work to be done as well. With lots to discuss and preliminary numbers being calculated, 95% of the plan is in development.

Ken Kenusen from Barton and Laguidice had met with Mayor John Burrell, Doug Bush, and Ben Slotman. During this time, they discussed the plans that are set to go, and a change order can be priced to begin. Having the change order added, they expect to be able to save some additional money in the end. Barton & Laguidice will be providing 95% of the plans to generate a quote. It is expected that 30 days after the drawings are made, details will be provided.

The Village Board discussed again, during this evening's meeting, the topic of short-term rentals. Village homeowner Chuck Parenti had noted that he does not want to see the Village allow these types of rental properties. It has been made apparent that short-term rental properties can likely lead to unnecessary problems for year-round residents. Often enough, property owners cannot control whether or not guests will abide by Village ordinances, and that should not become a problem to the community.

The absence of the District Attorney, Lori Reiman, meant that no change would be taken this evening on the topic of short-term rentals and discussion is sure to follow.

There was an update in Engineering on the Mill Street Parking Plaza, with a change order for electrical services to be separated out of the contract. This would be reflective of around \$75,000. The original commitment of the Village was \$130,000 so there should be an expected amount of reimbursement to be made. The fencing for the project was decided on an almond color, and the change order, as well as contract, were accepted for the Mayor to sign.

If you have not yet noticed, the Gazebo in front of the VIllage/Town Hall has been decorated for the fall season. A beautiful addition to the four corners, it is already becoming a picture worthy point for visitors and locals. Wedding parties have already started gathering around to capture the perfect moment! The Alley Katz of Ellicottville put in a tremendous amount of effort to perfectly pull off the seamless fall décor.

#### ELLICOTTVILLE TOWN BOARD

Options to Replace Front Door of Historic Town Hall Presented to Board Members; Proposed Crosby Mart Under Environmental Review

On Wednesday, September 20th at 6:00pm, the Ellicottville Town Board meeting was called to order by Town Supervisor Matthew McAndrew.

To start the evening, Privilege of the Floor was opened to Nancy Redeye of Flynn Battaglia Architects. She began by going into detail on the efforts to replace the front door of the Town Hall. This is a project she has been working on with the Town of Ellicottville to preserve the integrity of the building's history and likeliness. Seeing as the building dates back to 1829, it is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and would need to be approved by SHPO (State Historic Preservation Office) for any changes.

Nancy Redeye presented two options to consider, both offering their own authentic characteristics and detail. Ultimately, members of the Board were most impressed with a design choice they felt matched the look of an 1890 Town Hall picture. There was a request made to consider adding windows to the door; to make this possible, a custom-built wooden door is being suggested with the cost of \$20,000. The price should be noted, and it is in consideration of the Town's budget. With a \$250,000 grant for doors and windows, \$70,000 is budgeted for this year. The discussion continued and another suggestion was made to change the Town Hall signage. It was proposed to be taken down and add a standalone sign. No set decision was made.

Moving forward on Privilege of the Floor, a NY Citizens Audit was presented by Randy Barber. He provided information with the claim that there were duplicate registrations and votes that were used in the elections of 2020 and 2022. He continued to go into detail on multiple cases and then requested that the Board investigate an audit for the NYS general election, however, no set plan was immediately made to further this request.

To continue with the agenda, the Board went ahead to accept the minutes of three meetings that took place in the month of August 2023 - the standard monthly meeting and two special meetings. Taking place August 16th, 22nd and 28th. All three were motioned in with no objection. These will be made available on the Town and Village of Ellicottville, NY website at ellicottvillegov.com.

The Short Term Rental Committee is currently working on ways to find the best fit course of action to better any future regulations that may be put into effect. They have put out a survey that was passed along to municipal buildings with the hope of positive suggestions and feedback. While short term rentals are seen in both positive and negative light, welcomed tourist vs. rowdy guest, the Committee is continuously looking for ways to achieve the best possible outcome for the community. If you are looking to brush up on the Town's current regulations or are considering applying for your own permit, you can find information at ellicottvillegov.com.

Crosby Mart announced a proposed location at the corner of Routes 242 and 219 east of the village. The location is currently under environmental review.



been a newly delivered loader and grader; this is a welcome addition for the work that is currently going on throughout the town. Croft has been very involved in coordinating these efforts. She has discussed multiple opportunities the Village would be able to move forward with if granted funding. There could be potential plans for a splash pad, the second phase of the skatepark, as well as starting additional projects to better the community. This is an ongoing effort, and it is hopeful that positive updates are to come.

For Special Events lead by Doug Bush, Ellicottville's Fall Festival was on the table to be discussed. This event is the largest for the area, with attractions available throughout the village and town. The village itself transforms the main street of Washington and its surrounding blocks into a shoppable haven for tourists and locals alike. The event draws in tens of thousands of travelers throughout the weekend to embrace the fall foliage and festivities. The plan is to keep with the same detours that have previously been set in years past. There will be the usual road closures in the area and high traffic is expected. An additional police presence is also to be added for precautions on safety.

The Board wanted to address an ongoing issue pertaining to the festival and the months to follow, illegal parking. During high volume events and the winter season, it continues to be a problem, which usually results in high ticketing. The Board accepted the motion to contract a towing company to enforce this action.

The weekend-long event has plenty to offer as the Village and Town of Ellicottville work together to showcase an extensive number of activities. He goes on to explain that the windows, stairs and roof are all in need of repair and a motion was set and accepted to resolve these needs. A committee involving Supervisor McAndrew, Engineer Slotman, and Superintendent Brumagin will select consultants from the County list of Engineering Firms for two projects: BridgeNY and CulvertNY. This ensures a hands-on approach in leading the direction for the future developments.

Looking back on some of the Old Business that the Town Board wanted to address. Congratulations is in order for Ellen Frank, who was accepted on the motion to fill the position of Town Historian. This position begins October 1, 2023.

Another positive reflection was of the EVGV Trail. They had recently held a hot dog fundraiser (pictured above) which allowed for some major donations and was an all-around success. The EVGV Committee is committed to building up the walking, biking and cross-country trails in the Ellicottville area.


