
P.U.N.T. Coming to Ellicottville

P.U.N.T. provides pediatric cancer support for families across WNY; find them at Ellicottville's Fall Fest

Her voice fluctuated between exhausted and exhilarated, a tonal pendulum portraying a vast array of emotions. Earlier in the week, she spearheaded two events in Nashville, Tennessee, a few of many during a summertime gauntlet requiring a constant smile and laser-focused drive. The work they do - and by they, there are only three full-time on staff - creates an impact rippling across the western New York community and far beyond. As Madison Szpaicher and I spoke on the phone, one simple facet was prevalent: her passion.

Maddie (pictured above left, works for P.U.N.T. Pediatric Cancer Collaborative, a nonprofit 501(c)(3) providing families across western New York facing pediatric cancer with financial and emotional support. She began her role as Assistant Director in July of 2019, helping build the foundation into a regional name stay.

Founded by legendary Buffalo Bills punter Brian Moorman as a public charity, P.U.N.T. has seen annual growth because of its admirable mission and litany of programs.

"Around 10 years ago, Gwen's (P.U.N.T. Directer Gwen Mysiak) 15-year-old nephew was diagnosed with sarcoma," Maddie said. "His name was Andrew. He battled hard for 20 months. Brian (Moorman) had the Buffalo Embassy Suites donate their pool so Andrew could have his last swim. He died two days later. Gwen ended up meeting Brian at the funeral, and six months later he reached out asking if Gwen was interested in helping.

On her 40th birthday, Mysiak quit her career at WNED and took over at P.U.N.T.

The charity provides six key programs: Helping Hands, providing financial assistance to help families make ends meet; Adopt-A-Family, where holiday wish lists are fulfilled; Game Day, giving kids with cancer a private suite at a Buffalo Bills game; Locker, which distributes gas and grocery cards, hospital parking and cafeteria vouchers; Ultimate Compassion, encompassing bereavement programs for families who have lost a child; and Field of Dreams, where children suffering from cancer are presented with a special gift or memorable experience.

The charity relies on the help of volunteers for many of its programs, but at its heart the 3-person team does the heavy lifting.

"My major day-to-day responsibilities include back-end assistance, accounting, running the Twitter and Instagram handles (@puntpediatriccancer) and organizing events," Maddie said. "September was pediatric cancer awareness month so it was all hands on deck."

Maddie, a graduate of Ellicottville Central and Alfred University, took a part-time job with the Buffalo Bills as an event coordinator. When Gwen's longtime assistant quit, people within the organization recommended Maddie. Although it's not an official partnership, the strength of relationships built by Maddie during her time with the Bills allows the two organizations to work together fluidly.

P.U.N.T. has cultivated a relationship with Bills tight end Dawson Knox, a Nashville native and all-around #greatguy. You may have seen Knox repping a P.U.N.T. t-shirt during his post-game interview with Josh Allen.

"Dawson has become a huge part of the organization," Maddie said. "He's really our

FALL FESTIVAL 2021

A Letter from the Special Events Committee, law enforcement, and local officials



As Ellicottville readies itself to host its largest festival of the year, we would like to let you know what we have been working on. The Special Events committee, Ellicottville Police Dept, Catt Co. Sheriff's Dept, NY State Police, EVL Fire Dept., Village and Town Boards, Code enforcement, DPW, Chamber of Commerce, NYS DOT, along with input from local residents, merchants and bar owners have been working diligently since Nov. of 2012 on ways to improve Fall Festival as we know it.

ZERO TOLERANCE is the LAW and will be strictly enforced. This means absolutely no alcohol is allowed on village streets. You will not be allowed to leave an establishment or private property, walk to, from or within the village with open containers. Drink it or leave it. Public intoxication and disorderly conduct will not be tolerated.

NOISE LEVELS have been addressed with the local bars and beer tents. Outdoor live music will end at 11:00pm, quieter, background music until midnight, in accordance with the local sound level ordinance. Private homes are also to be obligated to obey this law.

PARKING: We strongly encourage carpooling, use of shuttles or walk! Space is limited and illegally parked vehicles (including motorcycles) will be ticketed and towed. Fire lanes, hydrants, and sidewalks are not to be blocked. Observe all temporary and regular no parking signs. Remember that flagmen for private lots are not allowed in the streets. Note that illegally parked vehicles on private property are the landowners' responsibility.

BUSES: Hired bus drop and pick-up site will be located at the DPW building on Mill & Martha Street. Parking for buses is on Route 219, beyond Holiday Valley Rd. at the old driving range site. Buses will NOT be allowed to load or unload elsewhere. Bus lines will be notified of open container law, and are expected to adhere.

SHUTTLE SERVICE: Daytime loading site at Jefferson St. & Martha St. Saturday & Sunday 10:00am-7:00pm. Evening site is at the New M&T Bank parking lot 7:00pm-3:00am, 7:00pm-midnight on Sunday. The shuttle destinations are to most of the condos between the Village and Holiday Valley; all other destinations will require taxi service, Uber, etc. Taxi Call: 375-TAXI, (Lyft & Uber) call in advance as they can be very busy. POLICE WILL NOT GIVE YOU A RIDE!

RESTROOMS AND EMERGENCY/FIRST AID LOCATION: There will be plenty of port-o-johns provided throughout the festival area; they are cleaned routinely, use them! Public urination is against the law and violators will be prosecuted. Sheriff and First Aid trailers will be located on Washington St. across from Katy's Cafe and Madigan's.

CELL SERVICE: Have a plan if the towers go down. Know where to meet if you are separated.

VENDORS: Must display vendor and health dept. permits on tents and must park in the designated lots provided to you by the Chamber. Sandwich boards, tables/chairs, and merchandise will not be allowed on sidewalks or tree lawns as to keep open to line of site for emergency personnel. Vendors are responsible for removal of their trash.

Help make Fall Festival safe and enjoyable. If you see something illegal, report it. If you see a mess, clean it up. Play by the rules ... the future of Fall Fest depends on it.

BEER & WINE FESTIVAL IS BACK!

Winter is right around the corner, but there's still plenty to do this fall at Holiday Valley

But just because summer is over and many of us are eagerly awaiting the moment where the slopes in Ellicottville are covered in snow, doesn't mean that there is a shortage of things to do at Holiday Valley right now.

Mark your calendar for Saturday, November 13th because the Holiday Valley Beer and Wine Festival is back! With over 25 breweries, distilleries, wineries and food vendors on-site to showcase their specialties, this is an event that you're going to want to be at. Holiday Valley partners with Southern Tier Brewing Company and Ellicottville Brewing Company for this event - partnerships that have proven to be advantageous when it comes to attracting other fantastic vendors.

This year, as a way to provide guests with more space at the event, there will be two different 3-hour sessions at the Holiday Valley Lodge for attendees to choose from. The first will run from 1:00-4:00pm and the second begins at 6:00pm and culminates at 9:00pm. Each session will have a cap of 1,500 people.

Terry Sherman, Field Marketing Manager for Southern Tier Brewing Company (STBC), oversees all of STBC's large events in the Western New York, Pittsburgh and Ohio regions. He has had a hand in this event for 12 years now and is excited to be featuring a new beer at this festival. "We will have all our Artisanal Brewing Ventures family, consisting of STBC, Victory Brewing, Sixpoint Brewing and Bold Rock Cider, in one area - including Southern Tier Distilling," said Sherman. "Our destination in the festival will be a 'one stop shop' of alcohol."

John Cimperman, the founder of 42 North Brewing Company, is looking forward to Beer and Wine Festival; he and his team have a great history with the event, attending ever since the brewery's inception in 2015. According to Cimperman, not only do events like this allow his brewery to cultivate an important relationship with Holiday Valley but it also helps him expose his brand to a new audience. This year, 42 North Brewing will be bringing its Day Trekker IPA, which is very popular with both skiers and mountain bikers, so if you're in to outdoor activities, this might be one for you. And it wouldn't be fall if they didn't bring the seasonal favorite, Oatmeal Cookie Brown Ale - made up of caramel and toasted bread flavors in order to make a rich and delicious taste while locally-sourced toasted oats from Elm Street Bakery set the stage for the delicious cookie flavors.

Tickets for Beer and Wine Festival are \$55 from October 1-31st, \$60 from November 1st-11th and \$65 when purchased at the door. A designated driver ticket is available for \$10. Tickets include a \$5 voucher to purchase food at the cafeteria or the T-Bar. Lodging packages are available through Holiday Valley for those of you who want to make this an overnight trip.

As a precursor to the event and as a way to ramp up the stoke for the upcoming ski season, Holiday Valley will be collaborating with The City Garage on Friday, November 12th to bring you the premier of *Roots*, a Faction Ski and Red Bull Media House collaboration. Additional details will be available at holidayvalley.com soon.

Beer and Wine Festival isn't the only upcoming festival to get ready for in Ellicottville. Fall Festival is this weekend, October 9-10th. Experience Ellicottville in all of its fall

SKATEPARK DONATION

Rotary Club of Ellicottville presents check to Ellicottville Skatepark project



of the future skatepark to celebrate the generosity of the Rotary Club.

ELLICOTTVILLE - On Wednesday, September 22, 2021, the Rotary Club of Ellicottville presented a check in the amount of \$25,000 to members of the Ellicottville Skatepark Committee (SK8EVL).

Ellicottville is the recipient of a "Built to Play" matching grant program through The Skatepark Project (TSP, formerly the Tony Hawk Foundation). Partnering with the Ralph C. Wilson Jr. Foundation, TSP's Built to Play (BTP) grant offers qualifying western New York and eastern Michigan communities up to \$250,000 in matching funds to apply towards the construction of permanent, outdoor, concrete skateparks. Thanks to this match, the Rotary's generous donation will turn into \$50,000 for Ellicottville's skatepark construction.

"The Rotary Club of Ellicottville is proud to support this local effort to expand outdoor recreation opportunities for our youth," said Doug Anderson, Rotary President. "SK8EVL has done a tremendous job in raising funds and awareness for the skatepark. Our club committed early on to making their vision a reality."

SK8EVL began advocacy efforts in 2018, with the BTP grant awarded in November 2019. Since then, advocates have hosted numerous fundraisers and donation drives, working their way towards their goal.

"As soon as we got word that our BTP grant application was approved, we started fundraising efforts," said Brenda Perks, SK8EVL lead advocate. "About three months into fundraising, Covid hit and the world shutdown. Fundraising during a pandemic is next to impossible, but we came up with creative ways to continue our efforts. Many of the businesses and organizations here, including the Rotary Club, answered the call."

With a commitment of \$25,000, the Rotary Club of Ellicottville has secured the "Greenspace" sponsorship level, and therefore will have naming rights of their choice of a bench or tree that will be designed within the skatepark.

"The Rotary was actually one of the first organizations to express their support when this project began," said Perks. "They see the value of having a skatepark and what it will do for our community and for our youth. Skateboarding provides a lot of benefits both physically and mentally, and it has a way of bringing people together. We are extremely thankful for the Rotary's donation, and for their commitment to our community."

"We understand the importance of getting these kids outside and active, and skateboarding is a great, affordable option," said Anderson. "This project aligns right up with the Rotary's mission to provide these types of opportunities for the youth of our area."

The Ellicottville Skatepark will be located inside Ellicottville's Village Park, and when completed, will be available to the public at no charge. Construction is expected to begin next spring.

eNOW: Tell me about your exclusive product, the Apex Ski Boot.

DEKDEBRUN: Apex ski boots have been on the market since 2008. Dekeberun's Ski Shop and Greg Dekdebrun, always looking for a new innovative product, became the first Apex retail dealer in Western New York. We are now the exclusive Apex dealer for Western New York, Western Pennsylvania, and northern Ohio. There are no dealers in Canada, so until Covid we serviced Central Canada exclusively.

eNOW: What draws a client to this product? **DEKDEBRUN:** The premise behind the boot was to be comfortable, warm, easy to get on and off and perform as a ski boot should. This was accomplished by making a comfortable walking boot (think snowboard boot). Snowboard boots have always featured a soft exterior and comfort that no ski boot could offer. Snowboarders could perform all day on the mountain, and then walk around at the end of the day in the same boots and never worry about loosening them up. The Apex boot is heat moldable and uses a BOA system for closure. You then step into the performance chassis with a two strap closure. The chassis is compatible with all alpine bindings. It has adjustments for forward lean, 3 flex adjustments and the ability to cant (cuff align the chassis). Replacement toes and heels are also available.

eNOW: What's new this year?

DEKDEBRUN: Over the years, Apex has refined the product which has improved the fit, comfort and performance. This year Apex will be offering 2 models - a men's model the XP Antero Topo Edition, and a women's model the Blanco Topo Edition. The Antero is designed for the advanced male skier. The Blanco is for an intermediate to advanced woman skier. Both models have the same features and benefits, including an insulted Thermolite liner to help promote warmth.

eNOW: How do we get our hands on these?

DEKDEBRUN: Dekdebrun's will be selling the boots by appointment starting in November. Typical of what is happening in most industries, shipping has put our delivery of new inventory behind schedule. eNOW: What's new this season at The Boardroom?

TIMKEY: After last season's meteoric rise in participation numbers for both ski and snowboard, we feel like we're on the cusp of something special with snowsports. We're going to continue to get people standing sideways on the industry's best products, whether it be a full retail setup or a seasonal rental. There's a heavy emphasis on Boardroom and Ellicottville branded product, including hoodies, crews, beanies and a really cool Ellicottville topographic map apparel piece. This season, we added Vans boots to our lineup, which complements an already dynamite hardgoods selection. Small business owners – especially those who rely on in-person events to showcase their wares – have been among those most disadvantaged by the near complete shift to online shopping or at-home delivery created by the pandemic. The absence of craft shows, festivals, and fairs made for a quiet 2020 at the Cattaraugus County fairgrounds in Little Valley, but this fall, the return of in-person events has been welcome news to all. Samantha Hayes, tourism assistant for the Cattaraugus County Dept. of Economic Development, Planning & Tourism is pleased to announce the W.I.L.M.A. Woolly Bear Weekend is among those events!

"We are back to a normal W.I.L.M.A. year," said Hayes. "We will be back at the fairgrounds in Little Valley on Saturday and Sunday, October 16-17th."

This is the 9th year of W.I.L.M.A., which stands for We Invite Local Manufacturers and Artisans. Despite the pandemic, the event took place last year, though in a very different format. "In 2020, we did a W.I.L.M.A. Fall Crawl every weekend in October," Hayes explained. "Participating vendors opened their doors or roadside stands for small groups to shop, rather than gathering at the fairgrounds. It was a great year to be able to do some W.I.L.M.A. on the road, but we're back to our normal event where all can gather and buy directly from the vendors at their booths."

Each vendor must be from Cattaraugus County, though the range of items that they sell varies greatly, which means there is something for everyone! Hayes explained, "W.I.L.M.A. was created to recognize the amazing artisans we have in our county and to promote shopping and buying locally. We also like to recognize it as the kick-off for the holiday season!"

While some vendors create items that are specifically holiday-themed, such as painted wooden signs and Christmas ornaments, many have a variety of items that also make great gifts. From soaps, jewelry, candles, and primitive and country décor to Cutco's beautiful cutlery sets, there is something for everyone.

W.I.L.M.A. is more than just a craft show. It's a family-oriented event that also includes special events throughout the weekend. Hayes said that Wilma, the woolly bear caterpillar, will be making an appearance on Saturday to give her winter weather prediction. The wider the brown middle stripe, the milder the winter will be, according to folklore. The weekend will also include cider and donuts, as well as a special giveaway for early visitors. "Two years ago, we introduced W.I.L.M.A. bucks," said Hayes, "and we're excited to bring it back this year! The first 50 people who come on Saturday will get \$5 to spend at any vendor's stand, and on Sunday, the first 25 people will get \$5 in W.I.L.M.A. bucks." There will also be drawings throughout the weekend for door prizes.

Over the course of the past few months, Hayes has been traveling to several vendor shows, and she expects W.I.L.M.A. to be as busy as ever. "It's amazing the number of people coming out to these shows," Hayes noted. "More than ever, people are recognizing the importance of going and supporting our local artisans and manufacturers. So many of our vendors participate in these types of events for the extra money, but a lot of them do it as their primary source of income. We're so happy to be able to have the event and support them!"

W.I.L.M.A. has grown considerably over the past nine years, as space has increased from just one building of vendors during the first year to filling every space in two buildings. W.I.L.M.A. is free to attend and parking is free as well. Because it is an indoor event, W.I.L.M.A. will take place rain or shine from 10:00am-4:00pm on Saturday and from 11:00am-3:00pm on Sunday. OPERATION WARM HEARTS

What started as a coat drive has turned into a full-time organization for those in need

OLEAN - When Ann Marie Sitter Tompkins and other volunteers originally decided to run a coat drive to provide warm winter clothes to children in need in 2020, they thought it would be a one-time effort.

The success of that first winter clothing distribution and the obvious need for it led to the official establishment of a new nonprofit, Operation Warm Hearts, to make the distribution of new clothing to area children a full-time effort.

Recently, the agency decided to establish an agency endowment fund at the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation to make sure their efforts will be sustainable for many years to come.

The organization began when Sitter Tompkins's mother, Mary Basnight, passed away at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. Due to restrictions, Tompkins could not be with her mother or hold a formal funeral at the time, so she decided to lead an effort to provide mittens to area youth, under the name Mary's Mittens, in her mother's honor.

"A couple of my friends had heard about that, and they had been wanting to start a project to provide winter coats called Jackie's Jackets, so we decided to marry the two," Sitter Tompkins, now Operation Warm Hearts president, remembered. "And that is how Operation Warm Hearts began."

The efforts of Operation Warm Hearts, made up originally by Sitter Tompkins, Pamela Shumway and Claudia Attard, culminated in the distribution of some 300 coats to needy area youth last November at a distribution day in Lincoln Park.

Sitter Tompkins remembered that the day was a particularly cold one in Western New York, and yet many kids showed up to the event without a coat on their back.

That day cemented the need for Operation Warm Hearts to become a permanent organization.

"At the end of the event we thought that was it," she said. "And then I got home and the phone calls started coming in."

Sitter Tompkins said she received numerous calls from families and area agencies asking if there were any coats remaining and if there would be another distribution day.

Ever since, Operation Warm Hearts has been operating on a full-time basis.

The agency now buys new winter clothing and boots for children from infancy to 18 years old. Every child also now receives a book at their grade reading level as well as a toothbrush and toothpaste.

Despite the agency's name, Operation Warm Hearts now fills a need during more than the winter months.

They also had an event recently that distributed back-to-school clothing. Operation Warm Hearts also works with other community agencies like Parent Education Program and Intandem to distribute clothing and resources for families in need.

As Operation Warm Hearts began to develop as an organization, Sitter Tompkins said

EXPLORE PA

An adventure into Autumn's stunning beauty of fall foliage's brilliant colors of ruby red, bright orange, and golden yellow await the traveler who ventures into the Allegheny National Forest and the Kinzua Bridge State Park located in nearby northwestern Pennsylvania. Fall color usually begins in early October at the higher elevations of Kinzua Bridge State Park, then along the Longhouse National Scenic Byway in the Allegheny National Forest, with the full color blooming last along the shorelines of the Allegheny Reservoir.



The Kinzua Sky Walk is "One of the Top 10 Most Scenic Skywalks in the World." October adds the beauty of fall foliage colors.



The Longhouse National Scenic Byway, a 27-mile loop, offers a variety of developed overlooks from which to enjoy the colors of fall.





KINZUA BRIDGE STATE PARK & KINZUA SKY WALK

The Kinzua Sky Walk is "One of the Top 10 Most Scenic Skywalks in the World." The skywalk extends 624 feet into the Kinzua Gorge at a height of 225 feet. At the end of the skywalk is a partial glass floor. The skywalk offers amazing views year-round, but in the fall, this amazing vista is made even more spectacular by the colors of the fall foliage. The Park is open from 8:00am-dusk daily. Admission is free.

The Kinzua Sky Walk is constructed on six historic towers of the original Kinzua Viaduct, which when constructed in 1882 was the highest and longest viaduct in the world. In July 2003, an F1 tornado ripped through the park. Only nine of the massive steel towers remained standing; the other 11 towers are now laying where the wind placed them at the bottom of the gorge. During October, the forest-covered hillsides of the gorge are a bouquet of rich Autumn colors. Color does come early at the park, so for prime "leaf peeping" plan on visiting the park in early October.

The Park offers picnic areas, a children's playground, a Visitors Center, Little Sisters-Big Rig food truck, two hiking trails, and one biking/hiking trail. The Kinzua Bridge State Park Visitors Center includes a wide array of interpretive displays and a gift shop. The Park Center is open from 8:00am-6:00pm daily.

The Kinzua Creek Trail winds down the side of the gorge. At the bottom hikers can view the massive steel towers which fell during the tornado; they'll also have a wonderful view looking up at the skywalk.

The Knox & Kane Rail Trail connects the Kinzua Bridge State Park to the village of Mt. Jewett. It is an 8-mile linear trail, with a very easy incline, perfect for families to hike or bike. It includes interpretive panels along the trail, benches and it is another way to immerse yourself in the beauty of the fall colors.

The Kinzua Bridge State Park is located at 296 Viaduct Road, Mt. Jewett, PA. The access road to the park is the Kinzua Bridge Scenic Byway (Lindholm Road) located directly off scenic PA Rt. 6. A great stop along the way to the park is the Bear Hollow Country Store at 599 Lindholm Road. This store specializes in rustic carvings, walking sticks, benches, wooden chests, home décor, and handmade furniture fashioned by local artisans.

For an added adventure, after visiting the park, return to PA Rt. 6 and drive west to Flickerwood Wine Cellars. Located at 309 Flickerwood Road, enjoy a wine tasting of their award-winning wines and lunch or dinner from a menu which includes many Italian specialties. Flickerwood is offering their 1st Halloween Tastings & Trivia on Oct. 23rd. Costumes, prizes, and their new fall and Halloween Cocktails will add to the fun. Visit flickerwood.com.

TAKE THE SCENIC ROUTE

The Allegheny National Forest is Pennsylvania's only National Forest. The Longhouse National Scenic Byway which circles the Allegheny Reservoir offers a variety of scenic overlooks from which to view the vistas of fall color. Favorite viewing points include Rimrock Overlook, Kinzua Point, and Jakes Rocks. Along with scenic drives, the Forest offers a wide variety of hiking trails. Depending on the weather, viewing the fall foliage while kayaking is also a fun and different way to enjoy the colors of fall.



Rimrock Overlook offers a picnic area, and trails through the forest to gigantic rock formations with stunning vistas of the fall foliage. From the overlook you can access Rimrock Trail. This trail features stone steps carved into the rock formations which lead to a hiking trail which ends at the shoreline of the Allegheny Reservoir. The trail is 1.3 miles in length and is considered easy to moderate. The elevation hiking back up to the top of Rimrock does take some extra effort. Be sure to bring water and wear hiking boots if you are planning on hiking the trail. Rimrock Overlook is located along PA Rt. 59, approximately 19 miles from Bradford. Along Rt. 59, there is a very large sign at the Rimrock turnoff; you will drive 2.7 miles into the Forest to access the parking/picnic area.

Kinzua Point is located along PA Rt. 59, west of Rimrock Overlook on the western side of the Allegheny Reservoir. Drive across Morrison Bridge which spans the Allegheny Reservoir, and Kinzua Point is located on the right. This is a developed overlook with plenty of parking. The vista is miles of colorful fall foliage blanketing the shoreline of the reservoir. When the sunlight is just right, the reflection of the fall colors on the waters of the Reservoir are breathtaking.

Jakes Rocks offers scenic overlooks, a short hiking trail and for those who enjoy mountain biking it is the number one mountain biking trail in the Forest. To access Jakes Rocks from Kinzua Point, turn south to continue traveling the Longhouse National Scenic Byway, watch for the signage, and then turn onto Forest Road 492; it is approximately 1 mile to the trailhead parking. The first trailhead is for the mountain bikers, parking for the overlook is beyond the parking for the bike trails. At the overlook, stand on the massive rock outcrop to see the expansive view of Jackson Bay on the Allegheny Reservoir, Kinzua Dam, and the surrounding forest. There is an interesting array of trees growing through and on the boulders in this area. From the parking lot it is about a half-mile hike to the actual overlook.

Jakes Rocks Mountain Biking Trail is a 30+ mile trail designed by Trails Solutions. It is a stacked loop mountain biking trail system which appeals to riders of all skill levels. A trail map may be found at visitanf.com/download maps-guides.

It is well documented that "Leaf Peeping" can make you hungry and thirsty. As you are traveling the Longhouse National Scenic Byway, at the southern tip before making the turn to travel north along the eastern shoreline of the byway, take a turn south along PA Rt. 321 to the village of Kane.

KANE, PENNSYLVANIA

Kane is a host to a wide variety of family-owned restaurants and shops, in addition to Flickerwood Wine Cellars, Logyard Brewing and CJ Spirits - a craft distillery. Bell's Meat & Poultry is a must stop for all foodies. Bells is renowned for their 40 varieties of homemade sausage, their fresh meat, canned goods, specialty sauces and baked goods. Their outside food stand always carries a wide variety of farm fresh produce.

For those looking for household items, visit Homespun Treasures at 305 N. Fraley Street. This little shop is brimming with handmade decorations, cabinets fashioned of wood with punched tin decorations, benches, seasonal decorations, dishes, and handpainted storage containers which are both decorative and useful. Many of their items

are handcrafted in Kane.

Texas Hot Lunch 4-Sons, at 24 Field Street in Kane, has been a family business since 1914. They are known for their delicious Greek food, and of course, for their famous Texas hot - a hot dog with meat sauce. Shoppers will enjoy exploring Field Street Boots, 18 Field Street, for hunting, fishing, and all types of outdoor equipment. In addition, they offer name-brand outerwear, gloves, scarves, mittens, and of course - boots!

Table 105, at 105 Fraley Street, has a unique timber décor, honoring the timber industry of this charming village. They offer farm fresh dishes, homemade desserts and an everchanging array of seasonal drinks served on their outside dining area. For something different, try their hamburger with peanut butter sauce ... it is delicious!

Artworks on the Summit, 54 N. Fraley Street, is an artisan co-op offering carved wooden bowls, jewelry, scarves, prints and original paintings, and an ever-changing variety of handmade gift ideas. Down the street is Keystoned Café and Natural Shoppe located at 39 Fraley Street. Stop in for a caramel macchiato and a homebaked scone, pastry, or muffin. This shop offers a wide variety of natural foods including natural coffees and teas, vegan foods, raw honey, organic pastas, and other healthy food options.

Logyard Brewery Tap Room at 103 N. Fraley, is always offering a seasonal pint of brew and a variety of ever-changing tasty creations such as tangy Carolina pulled pork, smoked cheeseburger sliders, loaded taco nachos, and of course chips or soft pretzels with their very own IPA beer cheese.

Take a little side trip west on PA Rt. 6 to CJ Spirits, 120 Willow Run Drive, to experience tastings of their craft spirits which include Graveyard Sam's White Whiskey, Rocksov Ultra-Premium Vodka, Wild Corn Vodka, Rum 6, and Wilds Fine American Gin. They also offer a creative selection of soups, appetizers, and sandwiches such as Breebird, Hager, Spackler and Uncle Vito, plus their famous Voodoo chili served with cheese, sour cream, and tortilla chips.

After such an adventurous stop in Kane, drive PA Rt. 321 north to return to the Longhouse National Scenic Byway and cruise along the highway to enjoy the views of fall foliage against the backdrop of the waters of the Allegheny Reservoir. Red Bridge Campgrounds is along this section of byway. This campground in the Allegheny National Forest offers cabins, tent, and RV sites. Reservations can be made at recreation.gov or by calling 1-877-444-6777. If you are a hiker, a trailhead for the North Country Trail is also located along the byway.

Continue driving on the byway, past the Bradford Ranger Station to return to PA Rt. 59 where you started your adventure along the Longhouse National Scenic Byway.

Core Performance: Why Weight Loss Is So Much More Than Fitness and Food

When it comes to losing weight, you will find this task is so much more than just adjusting your exercise and diet. This is why there are weight loss programs, apps and 'miracle pills' all over the internet/social media. This constant streaming of what is beautiful and healthy and acceptable has made the task of getting healthy very confusing. This confusion can lead many to just rebel against anything that remotely will challenge us since the change feels to unattainable. But over the last few years, I've learned that most of us just rebel against ourselves. Think about it. How many times have you set out to accomplish a goal or task only to find yourself procrastinating or flat-out sabotaging your own efforts? Started a weight-loss plan on a Monday and are eating directly out of the ice-cream tub by Wednesday? Vowed to go to the gym every morning this week only to find yourself oversleeping?

I see so many people who struggle with this day after day that I wanted to share just a few tips for better understanding - and overcoming - this self-defeating weight-loss barrier.

1. Stop berating yourself. We all beat ourselves up from time to time. So instead of focusing on the deprivation, swap your thinking to all of the fabulous things you can enjoy. Living a healthy life is about eating delicious and fresh foods that fuel your body and moving your body in a way that you love every day. What's not to love about that? Life is good - savor it.

4. Get honest with yourself. If you find yourself emotional eating or self-sabotaging, take a deep breathe and ask, "Whom am I really rebelling against?" Inner Peace and Strength: National Domestic Violence Awareness Month

For over 30 years, October has been recognized as National Domestic Violence Awareness Month. October is the highlighted month to emphasize and bring awareness to the realness of domestic violence, acknowledge survivors' experiences, and embrace survivors having a voice.

In Cattaraugus County, one company in particular aims for and aspires to be a consistent anchor for survivors of past or present DV experiences. This company's name is Cattaraugus County Connecting Communities in Action: Building Resilient Communities, otherwise known as CCA. Within CCA, there is a branch strictly dedicated to assist, advocate, and support survivors. The mission statements of this branch within CCA are: 1) provide advocacy to victims of crimes, 2) create an aura of safety, 3) change public attitudes regarding survivors' culpability, 4) assist in skill building and self-esteem enhancements to ensure recovery. The specific programs include: a domestic violence residential program, several domestic violence non-residential programs, a children's program, a rape crisis program, an ovs compensation claims assistance program, a crime victim program, a violence prevention initiative, an ovw program, a cps/dv collaborative network, prevention education programs, etc. Please browse ccaction.org for a full description of what resources are available.

Now, let us backtrack a bit to get an integrative picture of domestic violence. Two knowledgeable resources - Anna Swanson and Kathlyn Ramey - illuminate the complexities of domestic violence for us.

To start with this question: What is Domestic Violence? Kathlyn and Anna state: Domestic Violence is one person's choice to portray power and control over another individual, whether that be emotionally, financially, sexually, physically, verbally, etc. Intimate partner violence is also a term that coincides with DV. Often times, the public views DV as a partner getting harmed physically. However, it is important to see the big picture of DV abuse. An example being, stalking behavior is classified as domestic violence, regardless of the fact that a partner is not getting physically hurt. There are several complexities to the patterns of control demonstrative of domestic violence. A google search of the power and control wheel will illustrate the multi-tiered patterns of abuse.

Let us lift up the hood with this question: How does the Power and Control Dynamic work in DV relationships? Anna and Kathlyn dive in with: For the power and control pattern to begin, an individual intentionally will use control to dominate someone else. This control includes a series of tactics that are successful to threaten, coerce, intimidate, and perhaps even threaten violence ultimately ... to instill FEAR. The offender chooses power and control tactics to maintain the relationship. The tricky part is that the violence or abuse does not start right off the bat. The offender will consciously initiate a relationship with gift giving, behaving very sweetly/kindly, as well as portray innocence. Over time, small abusive tendencies will occur and the survivor will often brush these off. As time chugs along, a survivor finds themselves in the trap of DV.

Power and Control is so successful because it instills trust first then fear. In a relationship,

survivors stay with their partner out of perceived trust or fear, which are two very opposite things. For example, let's say an individual was raised in a home where DV was ongoing, this is familiar and that person just knows what will happen if they don't "follow the rules or don't listen."

We all have heard that this "could never happen to me," however, the power and control tactics are so successful and work so effectively because they feel like love. At the beginning of a relationship, learning about another person/getting to know them takes place. Then oftentimes survivors do not want to lose the momentum of the relationship, leading to sweeping red flags under the rug. Possessiveness and intensity can often resemble love. Some examples being: we can't get enough of each other, we spend every moment together, friends and family members then start to not see their loved one anymore. At the beginning of the relationship, the wooing, charm, gift giving, kindness is just over the top. The honeymoon or lack of harm period is so successful because survivors are continuously looking and searching for that person they fell in love with. Which oftentimes is a mask or first step in the power and control process.

What can a survivor do? Kathlyn and Anna emphasize the importance of learning about and knowing about the resources available, which isn't something one needs to figure out alone. Survivors are the experts in their own lives and have navigated the cycles of DV. Trust your gut and navigate the cycle. If something is not right - lean into that and trust your instinct. Catch and reflect upon these thought processes: something doesn't feel right, I can change him/her, or my love can make a difference, etc. People might be giving you this or that advice, but the reality is you can navigate your own life, you can trust your intuition, and you can learn to set boundaries with people/resources/providers, you can find safety, you can create a plan to leave if that is best. And certainly you are not alone. There are survivors, resources, advocates, and organizations that can help in any way that is fitting. I leave you with the poem:

"The Voice" by Shel Silverstein There is a voice inside you That whispers all day long, "I feel that this is right for me, I know that this is wrong." No teacher, preacher, parent, friend Or wise man can decide What's right for you----just listen to That voice that speaks inside.

she and the other volunteers decided to look at the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation as a resource for its growth.

"We had heard so many good things about the Foundation and how they could guide us to be better than we were," said Sitter Tompkins. "We were so new that we needed a guiding hand to help us in the right direction to best serve the community."

The Operation Warm Hearts Inc. Fund at CRCF is an agency endowment that will provide sustainable and continued funding for an agency just beginning its journey in meeting the needs of the community.

Sitter Tompkins hopes that the funding and relationship will help the agency meet needs that come up down the road, like the need for a new physical location that will be a permanent home to house the agency and its stock of clothing for distribution.


