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### THIS is Halloween ...

Halloween, All Hallows Eve, Samhain ... there are many names throughout history for this time of year and the stories and traditions have ever evolved with humanity. Rooted deeply in Druid folklore, most of our stories come from the Celtic versions of Samhain. One of my favorite traditions is pumpkin carving. There is something about sitting with friends and family, sipping cider as we gut and scrape the pumpkins, slowly bringing them to life with our carvings.

Carving into materials is one of the most primal forms of worship and communication. Countless civilizations spent hundreds of thousands of man hours perfecting their own styles, giving us modern societies a window into their world. (Something I feel we so needlessly take for granted in the tech era ... but that is a tangent for another day.)

The sense of anticipation that accompanies lighting the jack-o-lanterns for the first time makes my skin crawl unlike anything. Waiting to see how they come to life to me is otherworldly; maybe this is why so many cultures believe the veil between realms is thin and breachable during this time of the year. The lore behind carving pumpkins is rooted in one of my favorite Celtic stories ... the story of Stingy Jack, as recalled by my grandmother.

Stingy Jack invited the Devil to have a drink one day, and true to his name, did not want to pay. He then convinced the Devil to turn himself into a coin so they could pay and then once he was gone the Devil could materialize and walk away. Instead of paying for the drink though, Stingy Jack pocketed the coin along with a silver cross, ultimately imprisoning the devil in coin form.

Jack later freed the Devil with the condition that if he (Jack) died in the next year, the Devil would not claim his soul. A year passed by and Jack was walking at night through an apple orchard. (Think Wizard of Oz where Dorothy and her friends are in the haunted forest.) Jack comes toe-to-toe with the Devil again and this time convinces him to climb one of the trees to get an apple. Jack then carves a cross into the tree, again imprisoning the Devil. The devil is so mad he shakes the tree and the fruit falls to the ground. Jack asks the Devil to leave him alone for 10 more years and the Devil agrees, begrudgingly.

Not long after this encounter, Stingy Jack dies, and when it comes time for judgement, God would not allow him into heaven because he did not rebuke the Devil; he manipulated him. Such a dishonest person could not cross into the heavens. Yet, the Devil would not claim him either. Jack was sentenced to an eternity in purgatory with nothing but a flaming coal to light his way. Jack put this piece of coal into a hollowed out turnip and has been roaming the earth since. The Irish immigrants to the United States brought this folklore to North America with them and the tradition of carving pumpkins and cidermaking along with it.

This Sunday, Oct. 24th, come celebrate Stingy Jack and everything Halloween with me at the Nannen Arboretum from 1:00-6:00pm. Despite moonlighting often as a writer, most days are taken up with the wonderful world of real estate. In an effort to give back to past clients, future clients and the community that supports me with no bound, I hope this event can become something Ellicottvillains look forward to. It is free to the public but there will be 50/50 raffles to support the Pink Pumpkin Project, a local non-profit that supports families while their loved ones are battling breast cancer. As a breast cancer survivor myself, I hope this can not only be fun but bring more awareness to the importance of early screening, establishing habits to keep cancer at bay and living a healthy lifestyle in survivorship.

## EA2EVL CHARITY RIDE

Inaugural East Aurora to Ellicottville bike ride raises \$50,000



EAST AURORA - On Saturday, October 2nd, the Erie Cattaraugus Rail Trail (ECRT) hosted its first annual charity bike ride from East Aurora to Ellicottville. The EA2EVL Fondo, presented by West Herr, netted \$50,000 that will be used to continue to build, enhance and maintain the 27-mile rail trail that runs along the former Buffalo & Pittsburgh rail line from Orchard Park to Ashford, NY.

"Thanks to our sponsors, the riders and all our volunteers, the EA2EVL Fondo was a stellar first time event," reported Deb Fenn, ECRT Board Chair. "With 300 riders, not only did we sell out, we had 500+ donors supporting them - and our efforts to build the rail trail."

The ride kicked off at 42-North Brewery in East Aurora under clear blue skies and 70 degree temps. Riders followed a police escort out of town to Route 240, and then headed west on Route 242 into the Village of Ellicottville. With water stops along with way, course signage, and tech support provided by Tom's Pro Bikes, participants enjoyed a safe, social ride, along with the finish line party at Holiday Valley.

"The EA2EVL Fondo exceeded all my expectations, thanks to some hardworking volunteers - and Mother Nature," said the Fondo's top fundraiser Russ Kamis of Orchard Park. "I've lived in Chicago and was so impressed by the trail systems there that offer a safe place to ride and make the city accessible. I believe the ECRT trail can bring those same benefits to Western New York."

In addition to presenting sponsor West Herr, National Fuel, Tom's Pro Bikes, and 42 North Brewery were associate-level sponsors of the event.

About Erie Cattaraugus Rail Trail Inc.: Erie Cattaraugus Rail Trail, Inc. is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that serves as trail manager for a 27-mile recreational trail on the Buffalo Pittsburgh Railroad rail line. In 2018, ECRT, Inc. and BPRR signed a long-term rail banking agreement to allow for trail use and improvements. In Orchard Park a 2-mile section of the trail is cleared and open, but unfinished, from Ellicott Road to Jewett Holmwood Road. Additionally, a 1.7-mile Pop Warner section in Springville is open, along with another 3.5 miles of unimproved trail in East Concord. ECRT, Inc. has over 6,500 friends and community supporters. ELLICOTTVILLE - The Ellicottville Skatepark Committee (SK8EVL) is closing in on their deadline to raise as much funding as possible to apply towards a matching grant that will pave the way to building an outdoor concrete skatepark for the community.

Ellicottville is the recipient of the "Built to Play" matching grant program through The Skatepark Project (TSP, formerly the Tony Hawk Foundation). Partnering with the Ralph C. Wilson Jr. Foundation, TSP's Built to Play (BTP) grant offers qualifying western New York communities up to \$250,000 in matching funds to apply towards the construction of a permanent concrete skatepark that will be open to the public and free to use.

With Ellicottville's November 30th fundraising deadline quickly approaching, one final in-person event will give SK8EVL an opportunity to reach their goal, and it's an event that combines skateboarding and art.

SKATE-of-the-ART, a skate deck art auction, is set to take place Saturday, November 6th from 2:00-5:00pm at Fattey Beer Co. in Ellicottville. Skate-of-the-Art invited 50 artists to create one-of-a-kind works of art on blank skateboard decks, which will be auctioned off to the public in both live and silent auction formats. All money raised will go to the Ellicottville Skatepark Fund at the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation.

"Skateboarding in itself is an art form, and the artwork you find on skate decks is a great platform for creative freedom expressed by the skater culture. Skateboards and art just go hand-in-hand, so we thought what better opportunity to showcase local artists and raise money at the same time," said Brenda Perks, SK8EVL lead advocate. "When we put a call-out for artists to participate, not only did we get interest from the immediate area, but we had artists from across the U.S. hop onboard. We're absolutely amazed at the support - and the art - that's coming out of all of this!"

Artists from western New York, northern PA, Illinois, Florida, and even California have answered the call to show their support for a good cause. Ellicottville's own Barbara Fox, Carey Welch, Lynn Timon, among others, will have boards up for bid on Nov. 6th. Regional artists Sean Huntington, Michelle Capizzi, Chicago's Katie Klimacek, La Mesa's Zack Bryant, and former Buffalo Bills place kicker Steve Christie have all submitted knockout pieces as well.

"Kathleen Shay, an art teacher at Arch Bishop Walsh in Olean, did an amazing piece titled, 'Scarlet Begonias by the Grateful Dead' which is currently on display at Villaggio," said Perks. "The first night it was there, we had someone interested in buying it on the spot. The quality of art that's coming out of these artists is astounding! We're expecting quite a few of them to go high."

Perhaps the most sought after deck making its way into the event is "The Birdman" by Comic-Con artist and Ellicottville resident Shad Nowicki, depicting skateboard legend and The Skatepark Project founder, Tony Hawk. After completing his art deck, Nowicki's "The Birdman" was carefully packaged and shipped out to TSP headquarters in California, where Tony Hawk himself is expected to sign and send it back in time for Skate-of-the-Art.

But skate decks aren't the only art you'll find when you enter the venue on Nov. 6th. The SK8EVL committee has teamed up once again with Ellicottville Central School art instructor Debbie McGowan to include student participation.

Artisans Kari & James Roslund showcase "Filling the Void"



ELLICOTTVILLE - Collaborative Sculpture by Kari Roslund and her husband, James, is currently featured at the Ellicottville Memorial Library through December 2021, with an exhibit entitled, "Filling the Void: How We Kept Our Minds Occupied and Our Hands Busy During the 2020 COVID Pandemic". This is a fascinating display that honors the natural beauty of wood as well as the artisans' creative handling of it to make a work of art. The needle-felted elements emphasize the homage to making something beautiful and unique with one's own hands.

"This series came about from a discussion about the various tactilely engaging practices that many in our communities were learning about or revisiting to fill the void left by canceled social engagement," said Kari. "Practices such as baking, gardening, traditional arts and crafts were all making a resurgence, as society found or reestablished interests in exploring our own creativity. In renewing this interest, the populace discovered the emotional benefits found in meditative arts; an opportunity to relax and be creative without the pressure of performing.

"Using both wood and wool - our preferred mediums - James and I set out to create a small series of sculptures capturing the restorative power that these activities and practices have had on so many during the COVID Pandemic."

Kari Roslund discovered her love for fiber arts while raising a small herd of sheep in rural Pennsylvania. Although she received her BA in Studio Art from Lycoming College, she credits her education in fiber to other wool growers and fiber enthusiasts she has met as she moved throughout Pennsylvania and New York.

In 2020 and 2021, Kari was awarded the Individual Artist Decentralization Grant from the New York State Council of the Arts and the New York Foundation for the Arts for two projects that focused on examining regions and communities through sourcing her materials from a specific area. Over the past few years, she has shown in both New York and Pennsylvania, including The Gold Standard of Textile and Fiber Art at the Westbeth Gallery in New York, New York.


## EVGV Trail Chicken BBQ Fundraiser

Joan Pingitore lives in Allegany and has been an artist most of her life. She was recently awarded an "Artist in the Community" Grant from the Tri County Arts Council.

Her latest show, 'Organic Images Through the Eyes of an Artist', exhibits a colorful, abstract representation of images to demonstrate the beautiful compositions and patterns of nature. Her works are currently on display at the Olean Public Library Art Gallery. With this show she hopes to create a connection to the natural world through art, with a display of these dynamic and organic images.

The parameters to receive the grant included many different aspects including that the artist has to take on new challenges and learn new practices. The artist needs to involve and or benefit the community through such project, and also utilize the funding in a purposeful way to pay for materials and also to support the artist's endeavors.

Here is some of the narrative from Joan's grant description:

"My goal as an artist is to continually challenge myself to develop new skills. It is also to create an experience that is new to the viewer and one which is enlightening and enjoyable to behold.

"My art is more of a freefrom, expounding the boundaries of our usual perceptions. The intent of this project is to bring that enlightenment to the audience through an abstract expression of natural subjects. I believe that God has created the most perfectly designed art in nature and I want to expose that to my viewers.

"I've become aware of the exciting patterns, designs, light, shadows and colors which universally sit upon and between living objects. I have started photographing these many varied characteristics of trees, leaves, stones, flowers, water and even sand ... and would like to present their grace and magnificence to others. I've started capturing portraits of these natural elements to expound on their perfect qualities. These portraits portray a very dynamic picture of the objects, which I believe is quite enchanting ... and rather breathtaking.

"I've manipulated these portraits to reveal a more close-up view of the patterns, colors and compositions and have enlarged them to enhance their beauty. I want to help the viewer perceive this as I have, and awaken their affection for nature through experiencing this art form."

The interactive art show is being presented at the Olean Public Library Art Gallery from October 2nd-30th. A portion of the proceeds from both of Joan's recent shows will go to support non-profit arts education programming.

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# **MEETING NOTES**

### Village Board: Short-term Rental Permit Moratorium Could Run Through February

Ellicottville Village Trustees hope to extend a temporary moratorium on new accessory apartments through February to allow time to finalize zoning amendments.

The moratorium has been in effect for five months, freezing new permits for accessory apartments.

Board members, meeting Tuesday, Oct. 19th, voted in unison to hold a public hearing at 6:00pm on Nov. 16th to air a law extending the moratorium for three months.

"This is our first moratorium in many years," said Mayor John Burrell, adding that the process is necessary to prevent legal problems.

Village Planner Gary Palumbo provided a 10-page set of proposed changes to the Board. The proposal would affect open space and lot size provisions, limit short-term rentals in certain areas and restrict accessory apartments in secondary buildings or guest houses in certain zoning districts, among a list of other changes. The amendments were drafted by a Moratorium Committee formed in June. Committee members are representatives of the Village Board and Planning Board; they last met to review the draft in a meeting on Monday, October 18th.

"We've got the guts done, now we have to go through the review," Palumbo said.

The Village Planning Board, according to Palumbo, will review the amendments in November and the final wording should be completed in December at the latest - to begin the Village Board's review and adoption process.

The Village Board will need to accept the proposal and authorize public hearings before a vote.

In other matters, work continues on planning for several major projects.

**WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT:** Board members agreed to schedule a familiarization tour of the wastewater treatment plant in anticipation of potential budgetary needs in 2022 to address some challenges. Problems were identified in a report from Reliant Water Technologies summarizing results of a recent survey of the facility's two

lagoons. Some issues were identified with aeration equipment, sludge buildup and past maintenance decisions.

"It's an amazing facility," said Burrell, pointing to a major upgrade costing \$5.1 million six or seven years ago, which did not include sludge removal.

He said a recent project that was aimed at removing sludge may need to be revisited, adding that more money has been spent on the plant than any other infrastructure item, and he hopes to be proactive in addressing future problems.

Village Engineer Ben Slotman outlined plans to begin looking into the problem and will perform die tests and air monitoring now that some portions of the plant have been taken off-line for the summer. He also suggested enlisting BOCES students to do some small projects at the plant with the goal of encouraging them to seek training in public works jobs.

**EVGV TRAIL:** Burrell reported he wrote a letter in support of the Town of Ellicottville's application for Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) funding for development of the Ellicottville/Great Valley Trail (EVGV) as part of the Southern Tier Trail, linking other regional trail initiatives.

**SKATEPARK:** Palumbo and Slotman are expected to issue a request for proposals, to begin seeking bidders in a full-service design/build contract for the proposed Skatepark. Groundbreaking is expected in April with construction to be completed by November 2022. Burrell asked Trustees Sean Lowes and Caitlin Croft to serve on a bid selection committee, along with representatives of the Skatepark Committee.

**TENNIS COURTS:** Burrell and Slotman urged a pause on reconstruction plans at the tennis court until a more detailed plan involving the trail project and other recreation facilities is completed. Costs are unknown and funding would be determined during the 2022 budget process.

SPECTRUM CONTRACT: The Board unanimously voted to approve a renewed 15-

### Ellicottville Chamber Expresses Appreciation for Support of a Successful Fall Festival

They had a 9-hole mini golf game, kids' crafts, planko, spin the wheel and more fun interactive activities to offer families who attended.

We chatted with Madison Szpaicher, assistant director of The P.U.N.T. Foundation and Ellicottville native, who said they had a lot of fun even during the rainfall Saturday early afternoon. "The opportunity to bring awareness to the southern tier was something we simply couldn't pass up."

The P.U.N.T. Pediatric Cancer Collaborative is a non-for-profit that provides families in WNY facing pediatric cancer with critical programs that offer assistance in all aspects - from financial assistance to emotional support, and even bereavement. This organization was founded by former NFL Pro Bowl Punter, Brian Moorman. Brian and his wife, Amber both had a hunger to make a difference for kids in WNY who were fighting cancer in addition to giving back to the community.

A few other new attractions to this year's event included a COVID-19 vaccination clinic organized by the Cattaraugus County Health Department, and Turf for Tots came with crafts made from the Buffalo Bills' old turf. Corey Lee, founder of Turf for Tots has been raising money to support cancer research and programs to help children fighting cancer and blood disorders at Roswell Park.

From an organizer's standpoint, there's a fine line that we have to be cautious of when it comes to planning such a large event. Of course, we want to keep the tradition of the event, but more importantly we want to make sure it's enjoyable for everyone, including our local businesses and homeowners. Pulling off an event of this magnitude takes a lot of manpower and time. If we take a step behind the scenes and look at what organizing Fall Festival is like, you would find our office, a total of 2 full-time staff and one parttime, processing hundreds of applications, making up maps, preparing mailings, permit applications, making and hanging no parking signs, measuring and numbering the streets for vendor booths, creating content for social media, organizing flaggers, ordering detour signs, committee meetings ... the list continues to even the little things such as ordering garbage can liners. A lot of what we do is not glamorous, but the return on our efforts, including the small mundane things, makes it all worthwhile, especially when we see our village thriving.

We can't thank our support team enough for helping us bring back Ellicottville's Fall Festival. Various groups of people, businesses and organizations helped us make the 2021 Fall Festival one for the books. There were hundreds of hours put into planning and organizing this event and the hard work certainly doesn't go unnoticed.

Keeping the community clean is one of the things we pride ourselves with and has been for many, many years, a critical part of the event not only to us, but to our community and those who come to enjoy our village. Ellicottville is known for a lot of great attributes - one of the biggest being how beautiful and clean our village is. Although our office staff, Brian and myself look after the cleanup in the business district (as some may recall seeing us out there as early as 4:00am taking care of the streets), there simply isn't enough time for us to look after the residential area of the village, too. After making a call to my husband, Travis Wallace, and Samuel Schwartz, local ECS student, we were able to organize a small group of local ECS students and residents to help us with keeping our village clean. Travis Wallace, Samuel Schwartz, Maddox Bush, Ignacio DeOrbe, and Adrian DeOrbe all dedicated several hours and were a tremendous help to us this past Fall Festival ... thank you!

Overall, it was a great weekend! Hats off to everyone as this is a Fall Festival to be remembered.

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

## NEW SCHOLARSHIP ESTABLISHED

Holcomb Memorial Scholarship to support aspiring agriculturalists, conservationists



OLEAN - For the Holcomb family, life and work on their family farm in Portville was everything.

Donald Holcomb and his wife, Bern (Clayson), operated Butternut Farms, a 600-acre farm that spanned the border of Cattaraugus County and Allegany County. Don and Bern raised three children: Risa Michienzi, Suzanne Pedretti and Ted Holcomb on the farm.

Risa Michienzi remembered that there were always local kids around, helping with the work on the farm and learning more about agriculture. But for Don, farming extended well beyond those 600 acres, as he was heavily involved with helping area kids learn more about agriculture through 4H, by helping to establish the Swine Project and more.

A new scholarship recently established at the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation in memory of Don and Bern Holcomb will support the next generation of aspiring agriculturists and conservationists in Allegany and Cattaraugus Counties.

The Don and Bern Holcomb Memorial Scholarship, which will be first awarded in 2022, will be for high school students from any high school in Cattaraugus or Allegany Counties who attend an accredited post-secondary institution (can be 1-, 2- or 4-year school/ college). The student should be in good academic standing. Financial need will be considered. Preference is for a student majoring in an agricultural- or conservation-related field, a vocational/technical field or a female pursuing an engineering degree.

For the Holcomb's children, Risa, Suzanne and Ted, the scholarship is a way to remember their parents and give them the recognition they always deserved for their service to the community through agriculture, community involvement and volunteerism.

"Dad always wanted to be known for something, and for him farming was everything," said Risa Michienzi. "So for us this is a way to pay it forward to students who are interested in agriculture and conservation."

In the way that Don and his family loved farming – he was a third generation auctioneer, served as previous director of the Cattaraugus County Fair and helped establish the Market Pig Program for the Cattaraugus County 4-H club, just to name a few things – it is fitting that the scholarship can help pass that love on to a new generation.

He also loved to spend time in the woods and was a dedicated conservationist, according to Risa Michienzi.

The scholarship also honors Bern's skillset by giving preference to a female student interested in pursuing a degree in engineering.

"My mother and her family were very mechanically inclined, and she could do more (mechanically minded) things than my father could," said Risa Michienzi. "She always said that had she grown up in a different time she would have been an engineer."

Bern worked at AVX in Olean for 28 years before her retirement. In her spirit, the scholarship will also honor the mechanically inclined students of the area pursuing a career in a vocational/technical field.

"Kids now a days are so often pushed towards academics, but the world needs vocational people like electricians," said Michienzi.

## KIDS AND CANCER FUND

Over \$29,000 distributed in support for pediatric oncology care



OLEAN - Throughout the year, the Kids and Cancer Fund at the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation provides financial support to patients, especially children and their families, facing medical treatment for cancer and other life-threatening illnesses. So far this year, Kids and Cancer has made over \$18,000 in grants to provide financial support to children and families undergoing treatment.

The fund also makes possible annual grants to organizations that treat or provide resources to children and their families as they face treatment and care. Recently, Kids and Cancer supported \$29,300 to 13 organizations that support those impacted by cancer and life-threatening illnesses.

The Bradford Hospital Foundation received \$5,900 to assist with the needs of children and their families as they receive care at the hospital. The Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh, Roswell Park Alliance Foundation, Shriners Hospital for Children (Erie, PA), and St. Jude Children's Research Hospital each received \$3,000. The Olean General Hospital Foundation received \$1,200.

According to William Black, Kids and Cancer president, the Kids and Cancer committee views these grants as essential as many of the child patients and families the committee supports have to travel to receive treatment from these hospitals.

The fund also made a number of grants to organizations that provide support outside of medical treatment, whether it be housing, support groups and more.

The Pink Pumpkin Project, also a fund at CRCF, received \$1,000 to support breast cancer fighters and survivors. The Laurie Anzivine Memorial Scholarship, a scholarship arm of the Pink Pumpkin Project that supports students who have had family members undergo cancer treatment, also received \$1,000.

Ronald McDonald House Charities of Pittsburgh received a grant of \$1,500 to help provide low-cost housing to families while their loved ones undergo treatment. Special Spaces, a nonprofit that provides bedroom makeovers for children undergoing cancer treatment, received \$1,000.

Thon, a student-led philanthropic organization of Penn State that provides emotional and financial support for children facing cancer, received \$2,000. Care for Children, a McK-ean (PA) County-based nonprofit whose mission is to improve quality of life for children of all abilities, received \$700.

"All of these grants are made in honor of the children and families we support during the year," added Black. "We cannot help every organization, but these in particular are important to us.

"These grants come at an important time," Black continued. "Throughout the [COV-ID-19 pandemic] many cancer patients did not get the help they need, and now their cancer is more advanced than it would be under normal circumstances. Cancer does not stop during a pandemic, so neither will we."

### Core Performance: Spinal Alignment

When it comes to our health and fitness routines, finding balance (whether in our workouts or in our diets) is top of mind. But something we pay little attention to: how our bodies can slowly but surely shift out of balance just from reacting to daily events. Whether it's tensing your back when you're stressed, hunching your shoulders at your desk while you work, or even subconsciously adjusting the way you walk because of an injury, these little things can all cause your body to fall out of its natural alignment. Although these dysfunctions may start to feel "normal" to you, they can prevent your muscles from functioning as they're intended to.

It's also a big problem for fitness lovers since working out can make these imbalances even stronger by unintentionally perpetuating bad form or movement patterns. While every part of your body from your head to your feet can be misaligned, your spine can be the most debilitating and can decrease productivity in all aspects of your daily life.

Before trying to correct your spinal alignment on your own, check with your doctor to make sure you don't have a more serious, underlying problem. Some spinal imbalances won't need a chiropractor. If you don't have any serious medical issues, stretching, strengthening and relaxation techniques can help you improve your posture and your spinal alignment. Incorporate exercise into your daily routine in order to increase strength and offset muscle imbalances that could contribute to incorrect spine alignment.

Follow the steps below to properly regain your spinal alignment.

Step 1: Identify things in your daily lifestyle that you may do to hinder proper spinal alignment. For instance, if you spend long hours slouching in an office chair, you regularly wear shoes without support or you sleep on your stomach, you may need to make changes in those areas of your life to improve spine alignment.


Step 2: Rest your back while at work. According to Spine-Health, you place more pressure on your back while sitting than while standing. Make sure you sit up straight, with your legs uncrossed and at a 90-degree angle in order to decrease unnecessary pressure. If you find yourself crossing your legs regularly, this could throw your spine out of alignment.

Step 3: Use a stability ball as an office chair for short periods of time during the day. According to the American Council on Exercise, sitting or performing exercises on a stability

ball will help strengthen your core muscles of the abs, hips and back, which contribute to improved posture. You don't have to ditch your comfy office chair, just use a stability ball for 20 minutes at the beginning of the day, then again for 20 minutes after lunch.

Step 4: Walk around and stretch regularly. Movement enhances the blood flow to the spine and encourages mobility and range of motion, making proper spinal alignment easier to maintain.

### When the spine is misaligned...



Step 5: Exercise daily, including both low-impact cardio and weight training to your workout. Improving strength, particularly in your back and abs, can help you improve your posture and align the spine.

Step 6: Add yoga to your exercise routine. Yoga takes you through a series of exercises that stretch and strengthen both the front and back of your body, helping even out muscle imbalances. Spine-Health notes that yoga can improve posture and spine alignment.

Step 7: Sleep in a way that supports your spine. Your spine should have the opportunity to rest, relax and readjust itself as you sleep; if you wake up stiff, you may want to address potential problems. If you sleep on your side, consider placing a thin pillow behind your knees. If you sleep on your back, place a pillow under your knees and a towel beneath your neck. Avoid sleeping on your stomach if you can.

year cable franchise agreement with Spectrum, a subsidiary of Charter Communications. Burrell said the arrangement consistently brings about \$17,000 in income to the village, an amount that represents 5% of Spectrum's gross annual revenue.

DRI GRANT: The Downtown Revitalization Initiative grant application was submitted in early October and Burrell shared his letter to the New York Regional Economic Development Council, expressing thanks for the opportunity to seek the \$10 million funding package. He told the EDC the effort united part- and full-time residents, elected leaders, prominent organizations, while attracting developers to work on a "transformative" plan for projects to bridge the resorts and business district. The letter was signed by DRI Committee members Burrell, Town Supervisor Matt McAndrew and Chairman Barry Goodin.

FALL FEST: Several Board members commented that the 2021 Fall Festival was visibly scaled down and a success, and there was general discussion about getting more involved in planning portions of the event that cost the village money.

"There is a significant cost. I want us to be good with it so there's an answer if people complain," said Burrell, suggesting the Board get more involved early to be prepared when Village resources are required. "We want to be sure the law and our insurance are okay with the exposure if someone gets hurt," he added.

WEBSITE: Officials reported that the longstanding official Town and Village website, at ellicottvillegov.com, will absorb the Engineering Department's website (evlengineering.com). An official announcement is anticipated when the change occurs.

The parade will begin at Delaware Avenue and North Union Street, will use both sides of the street as it did in 2018, and proceed south on North Union. Santa and Mrs. Claus will have their traditional countdown of the lights coming on at the intersection of State and Union.

"Why the change in start time? GOACC hosted two polls to gauge interest in changing the time to either 6:00pm or 7:00pm. As there was no weight on either time, GOACC has decided to meet in the middle and change it to 6:30pm," reported Meme Yanetsko, GOACC COO.

She added, "Committee members were worried about out of town folks getting out of work and in to town on time. Some felt the earlier time would help people to get back out shopping, hanging with family or out to restaurants at a little earlier time.

The process is simple: it's FREE to participate, and the enjoyment is plentiful, so why not enter? In order to participate in the parade, you'll simply need to print and fill out an application form that can be found on the Chamber's website, www.oleanny.com or by calling the Chamber office. Parade trophies will be presented in eight categories.

The parade rules and guidelines include: floats may be no taller than 13 feet and they MAY NOT contain a Santa or Mrs. Claus as they make their entrance at the end of the parade to light the lights; NO CANDY, small toys, light up wands, etc. should be thrown from the float, and any children on the float should be supervised. Adults must accompany small children if walking; if you would like to hand out candy/coupons, please have volunteers walk along the sidewalk and hand out; and if you have animals in the parade (dogs and horses are allowed), you must provide scoopers to clean up droppings.

To participate in the parade, a float or unit must be decorated in holiday fashion. There is no theme - the holidays and all the celebrations can be the theme if needed. A Safety Committee will review all floats before they enter the parade route. Although there is no official deadline for parade applications, GOACC urges all participants to get the infor-mation into the Chamber by November 25th. All parade participants must have a waiver signed and Chamber officials ask that all waivers be handed in by November 26th to the office at 301 North Union Street. On Saturday, October 23rd a 13.1 and a 3.1 mile running race will take place on the roads through the towns of Ellicottville and Mansfield. Every effort has been made to minimize disruption to the residents of these communities with the help of the Cattaraugus County Sheriff Department and The Town of Ellicottville Police Department. The races will start at 11:00am and 11:15am on Monroe St. in Ellicottville and travel North out of the village on Maples, Kent, Hinman, and Hencoop roads, finishing back on Monroe St. On various sections of the course, the road will briefly be restricted to cars except for local residents:

• Maples Rd. Northbound - Lane restricted from Poverty Hill Rd. to Kent Rd. from 11:20-11:45 am.

• Maples Rd. Southbound - Maples Rd. southbound lane from Hinman Hollow to Ellicottville will be closed from 11:10am-2:15pm. • Mechanic St. 11:00am-2:15pm local residents only from Maples Rd. to Elizabeth St.







