

DINING IN THE DARK

Experience Life Without Sight: A Fundraiser for the Little Valley Lions Club



The Little Valley Lions Club is pleased to share its second Dining in the Dark event beginning at 6:00pm on Wednesday, November 1st at Ellicottville Brewing Company's Little Valley location at 202 2nd Street. That's right, diners will experience a meal without sight, and in the words of Lions Club member and event organizer Jordan Hernandez, "Dining in the Dark is both a fundraiser for us and an educational experience for those who are attending!" Enjoy a delicious dinner, interactive learning, live music, drawings, and more during this unforgettable night that supports two important western New York organizations: Little Valley Lions Club and Visually Impaired Advancement (VIA), formerly known as the Olmsted Center for Sight of Buffalo.

The Little Valley Lions Club, which represents Little Valley, Cattaraugus, and Salamanca, held the first Dining in the Dark event in 2019, and Hernandez is thrilled that it is finally back after the Covid-19 hiatus. "We did sell out last time," she noted. "It was highly successful, and our goal for this event was to add to it. We're excited to be able to have a new venue to host this in Little Valley!" New for 2023, Dining in the Dark will feature a cocktail hour with interactive learning stations. Hernandez said, "There are so many things that [sighted] people take for granted, like pouring a glass of water or plugging something into an outlet. They'll be able to try things like this blindfolded!"

So what exactly does "dining in the dark" involve? Hernandez explained that diners "will get to eat salad sighted, but dinner will be served blindfolded - that is the experience. There is a heavy emphasis on eating this way." The blindfold will be removed for dessert, and guests will enjoy live music and remarks from keynote speaker Ray Zielinski of VIA. For those who were wondering, bibs are available! "We're selling raffle tickets as well," she added. More than 10 prizes will be raffled off, including a gift certificate to Thrive IV Lounge, golf passes at Elkdale Country Club, a weekend stay at Highbanks Campground, an EBC basket, wine baskets, and more.



"What I like about it is that it's a lot of fun!" said Hernandez. "Once the blindfold goes on, everybody is laughing! It's so funny how you put the blindfold on and you're unsure of every move you make. It's definitely a good, lighthearted night, with lots of education and lots of opportunities to try different things. Most people know somebody who either has or has a connection to someone with a visual impairment," said Hernandez. "This is a great night to learn about services that are available to them."

Hernandez is very familiar with the challenges individuals with visual impairments face on a day-to-day basis. Speaking of herself and fellow Lions Club member/event organizer, Jodi Scanlon (Hernandez's mother), she said, "This is something that is very near and dear to our hearts because my sister is visually impaired. The Lions Club helped her buy her first equipment at the age of 12." In addition to receiving services from VIA, Hernandez's sister also worked there for a time.

Many know Lions Club International for its humanitarian work, especially services and support for those with visual impairments, and their focus has expanded in recent years to include other environmental and health causes. However, "Our club likes to keep its focus on vision and local causes in general," said Hernandez. "One of our big services is buying glasses for a lot of kids in the area." While the local club also provides this service for adults, Hernandez said they've recognized a greater need among children, who often break or lose their glasses. The club works with school nurses to provide glasses to those in need, which is especially important to families who do not have vision insurance.

Those who are interested in attending Dining in the Dark or donating raffle prizes can contact Hernandez or Scanlon at Schubert Enterprises at 716-938-9034 or any Little Valley-Salamanca Lions Club member. Dinner includes a burrata salad, chicken parmesan, and coffee cake for dessert. Hernandez advised that the event is presale only and includes a cash bar. DO PUMPKINS FLY?

Ellicottville Distillery Announces Annual Punkin' Chunkin' Event Nov. 4th

Halloween will soon be behind us but the decorations will remain. What do we do with all of the jack-o-lantern corpses and extra squash lying around? Sure, some of it can be turned into pies but we probably don't need 500 of those, so what can be done? Don't worry, Ellicottville Distillery has just the event for you. Come on out to 5462 Robbins Road on November 4th from 12:00-6:00pm for the annual Punkin' Chunkin' event.

What exactly is Punkin' Chunkin' you ask? Well, that's where the Distillery takes leftover pumpkins of various sizes, (with some pretty big ones added, just for the fun of it) and sends them soaring with the use of a full size trebuchet. A trebuchet is a catapult with a sling on the end to throw objects even farther, and it's operated with a counterweight that drops and sets the arm in motion.

Distillery owner, Bryan Scharf, let us know that the trebuchet is being supplied by Team Urban Siege out of Concord. They are a group of friends who have been building their own trebuchets since 2006 and they've competed in the World Punkin' Chunkin' Champion-

ship. (Yes, there is a competition for throwing pumpkins and Team Urban Siege were the 2012 World Champions.) They will be competing again in Dayton, OH on October 7th, aiming to beat their personal best, which was throwing a pumpkin over 1/2 a mile - whoo, that's a distance! If you are interested in learning more about the team you can visit teamurbansiege.com.



Besides the fun of watching huge squash fly over the hill, there will be more live entertainment as well. Local favorites The Hick-Ups will be rocking the stage from 3:00-6:00pm, with their mix of country, bluegrass and rock classics. They're always ready to bring the party to whatever venue

Bryan also said that there will be a food truck on site. 2 Buckaroos will be serving up cheeseburgers, chicken or cheese enchiladas with rice and more varieties of comfort food for the colder time of year. But if the cold doesn't bother y

Junction Depot will have their ice cream truck on site as well, with their scoops and milkshakes for your after dinner sweets fix.

The event is FREE and family friendly. It could also be considered educational, as all ages can learn about the trebuchet and how it was created. Also, Bryan said he'll be dressed up in his field Marshall attire and if anyone else wants to dress up for the occasion, they are more than welcome to.

It's going to be a great event, which the Distillery excels at hosting. They've got more plans in the works after this happy hurling event. Bryan stated, "We'll be releasing a 6 year old bourbon December 16th, then do our liquor mile (where you receive a drink at each rest point), and hope to have a 5K organized for December 31st. Then January 22nd will be the annual Christmas tree funeral fire, where everyone can bring their Christmas trees and we can safely dispose of them while having a good time."

The Ellicottville Memorial Library invites guests to register to "Escape the Haunted Library" this Friday and Saturday, October 27-28th from 6:30-8:30pm. (Registration is required to guarantee a start time; call 716-699-2842 asap!)

"The escape room idea came about last fall when we were looking for a fun event to host here at the library," said Ellicottville Memorial Library Assistant Samantha Hurst. "Several other libraries in the Chautauqua-Cattaraugus Library System have done escape rooms with great success. The library system even loans out kits to help in creating your own unique escape room. It was something we decided to try and we were overwhelmed with how popular it was!"

If you participated in last year's escape room at the library, you know how much fun it was, and library staff encourages you to do it again! "This year we've changed the escape room up and created a whole new experience," explained Samantha. "A new haunting narrative will have participants following never-before-seen clues to solve unique puzzles and escape before time runs out. So guests from last year will have a brand new challenge, along with the people participating for the first time!"

Not only is this event family-friendly, it's also FREE! There is no age limit (although children younger than 12 do need to be accompanied by an adult), and while the atmosphere of the escape room is spooky, it's not scary so it will be fun for all ages. Groups of no more than 5 are recommended, and everyone is encouraged to dress up.

For those unfamiliar with how an escape room works, Samantha breaks it down for us: "Escape room participants are locked inside the library and have 20 minutes to escape before the ghosts get them. They have to follow clues and solve puzzles to find the key to the door. Each team that escapes the haunted library within the time will receive a prize and their team name will be added to our winner's board. Last year the prize for winners was each member received a full size candy bar and for those who didn't win, they still received mini bars. So honestly, everyone's a winner here, whether you escape or not. It's all in good fun!"

WEEKLY ACTIVITIES


The Ellicottville Memorial Library offers a number of other ways to enjoy their space, many of them on a weekly basis. Some of these activities and resources include:



ELLICOTTVILLE VILLAGE BOARD

Departments Provide Updates on Sidewalk Lighting, Mill Street Parking Lot, Water Project

On Tuesday, October 17th, Mayor John Burrell called to order the Village of Ellicottville's monthly board meeting. The evening began with the Pledge to the flag and then proceeded to the planned agenda.

The Board had a well-constructed and swift meeting running for approximately one hour, with little to no issues at hand. The first topic that was addressed was the approval of the previous Board minutes. The motion was set with no concerns and approved for the Board meeting held September 19, 2023, as well as a special meeting held by the village on September 27, 2023.

The special meeting held by the Village Board of Ellicottville was held to touch base on some subject matter that required some additional information. Tim Tallman, who was present for the meeting, had discussed the village sidewalk lighting updates with a potential lead time of around 6-8 weeks for the first option available and presented. The plan is to go with a heavy-duty steel for the poles as well as utilize the eight existing heads if

possible. There would also be a plan to add additional sidewalk lighting to the structures for optimal safety and smart lighting. The Board agreed to the motion and is expecting to move forward with the decided plan and option in place.

Also discussed at the special meeting, approved in the minutes of the regular meeting, was an update to the Elizabeth Street Public Information. In agreement among the members, a public hearing was put in place for Tuesday, October 24, 2023 for an open house forum in discussion with residents regarding the design and information pertaining to the project.

Moving on from the Approved Minutes, the Board also had no issue accepting the Financial Reports and Audits of Claims presented in the evening's schedule. The reports that were received and reviewed were of the General, Sewer, Parking Plaza, and Skatepark funds of the Village of Ellicottville.

Next up in the order of business, the Planning and Zoning Department prepared a detailed report on the active village permits that are in the works as well as the status of approvals. There was also mention of two current zoning violations in the village that were observed and handled without issue. The full Planning and Zoning Report was accepted by the Board with no opposition.

The Engineering Department had followed with their monthly report to update the Board Members on the current developments and progress in place. The Washington Street Lighting Project was mentioned at the regular meeting and discussed, being sure that all details and plans were set following the discussion at the special meeting. Also reviewed was the Mill Street Parking Lot Project, which is currently ahead of schedule, with wall and fence colors having been selected. The September DPW Report was also reviewed, and it was noted that some maintenance was performed in the removal and pouring of new concrete in front of Five Star Bank, along with some paved sidewalks from Elizabeth Street to the Tops Market.

The Water Division, which is within the Engineering Department, also had an update on the current Water Project. JD Northrup Construction has installed the water main along Route 219 and connected the services. They will continue to work on the restoration of driveways, roads, sidewalks, and lawn areas. The Board took in the information from the Engineering Department's Report and without any concerns, approved the provided material

The Members of the Board wrapped up the evening as Mayor John Burrell called the meeting to a close. The Village of Ellicottville Board meets on the third Tuesday of eace month, unless stated otherwise. For additional information, visit ellicottvillegov.com.

Regulations on Short-Term Rentals to be Drafted & Presented at November Committee Hearing; New Plans for Crosby Mart Submitted

Town of Ellicottville Supervisor Matthew McAndrew called to order the monthly Board Meeting on Wednesday, October 18th. Privilege to the Floor opened with local resident Lynda Neuwirth, urging the Board to consider offering full-time police officers health insurance after retirement as a way to encourage members of the force to keep their service to the area and not outside areas that currently offer this benefit. The Board recognized this issue and noted that it is actively in discussion with the current contract negotiations that they are not able to further discuss.

On another note, Ellen Frank, the newly appointed Town Historian was present and took the opportunity to thank the Board for her acquired position. She went on to inform the Board that the Historical Society has 18 volunteers and that during the months of June through September they welcomed 1,226 visitors to the museum. The museum is currently closed during the winter and spring, but for those interested in the Historical Society and becoming a member, you can find further information on the Town & Village of Ellicottville website at ellicottvillegov.com.

Moving on to the last matter that was addressed during the Privilege of the Floor, Vicky Connors of the NY Citizens Audit asked the Board to pass a decision on whether to pursue an audit on the NYS general election. While it had been noted during her time on the floor that other towns have allowed for similar situations, the Board themselves asked to see copies of the discussed information before coming to a decision.

The Supervisor's Report included the topic of the short-term rental committee. The committee had met on October 11th to further discuss a survey that was provided to the municipal officials. The major point that was noted among these surveys was the quality of life for the Town of Ellicottville. It was recorded that garbage and noise issues in correlation to short-term rentals was a strongly felt concern. The communications company, Granicus, that connects the town government to the residents in respects to these short-term rentals will take these concerns into consideration as they draft the regulations to be presented in the mid-November committee hearing.

Also included in the Supervisor's Report was the Town of Ellicottville's 2024 Public Preliminary Budget Hearing. This is to be made available for the public on November 8, 2023 at 4:00pm at the Town Hall, 1 W. Washington Street, Ellicottville NY.

There were multiple department heads present to update the Board on the happenings in the Town of Ellicottville. Scot Brumagin of the Highway Department informed the Board that Holiday Valley Road has been paved for the winter and that Niles and Leslie Roads are almost completed. Sand and salt has been ordered for the anticipated winter season and the department has been readying the snowplows to ensure all is in order.

Town Planner Greg Keyser gave an update on the proposed Crosby Mart. New plans have been submitted and are under review including the possibility of a turning lane. Ben Slotman, head of the Engineering Department, had discussed to the Board the Cotter Road

Revisions to the Memorandum of Understanding clarifying the responsible parties for the Arboretum's grounds maintenance was also discussed at October's meeting.

Precast Concrete Culvert Project. A bid was proposed by Binghamton Precast & Supply Corp. Included in this bid was a design at 4-½ feet which the County calls to be at least 5 feet for safety concerns. The bid was rejected but a corrected bid is to be expected.


The Police Department's Don Auge spoke to the Board about the Fall Festival and the police presence and response. This year, parking was not as much of an issue as it has been in previous years.

In New Business, the Board went over the Memorandum of Understanding between the Town of Ellicottville and the Nannen Arboretum. Attorney Seth Pullen was present for an update on the revision. He went on to explain that this revision will clarify who is responsible for maintenance of mowing, shrubs, trees, buildings, and the hiring of contractors. It will be forwarded to the Nannen Arboretum Board for review and understanding.

In Old Business, Attorney Seth Pullen discussed the Noise and Alarm Laws that will converse with the Village of Ellicottville to coordinate the local laws.

Then there's the Pizza Flatbread with either a cheddar or garlic base, tons of mozzarella, sweet pizza sauce, pepperoni, more mozz and a sprinkle of Italian seasoning. Last but not least is the All-American Burger Flatbread, a cheddar base covered in ground sirloin, bacon, cheddar cheese, pickles and a drizzle of Thousand Island dressing... that's a burger at another level! Chris and Tara Perkins grew up in Cattaraugus, were both in the last class to graduate from Cattaraugus before it merged with Little Valley ('99), and are locals who are on the cusp of helping the sleeping giant, Cattaraugus, re-awaken. In case you haven't noticed, the village of Cattaraugus is THE place for new start-ups.

After Chris mustered out of the U.S. Navy where he served for seven years (thank you for your service, Chris!), Chris and Tara renewed their friendship and next thing they knew, they fell in love, had a family, various jobs (Tara managed Brooks Market for years and now works full time in the Investments and Audit Department of the Seneca Nation of Indians in Salamanca) and decided to give their own business a try. Chris and his employees (they have between 10-15 on payroll) are the daily face of the market, with Tara pulling her weight off hours before and after her "day job" in Salamanca, along with duties required of a mom of an eight-year-old son and an 18-year-old daughter.



With the closing of well-established Brooks Market, it was clear to them that another market in town was a logical choice for an enterprise, particularly with Tara's business background. They even had a ready-made start-up team, with several of Brooks Market's previous employees ready to work for them. Dreams take time, but after a year or more of chasing grants and securing other funding, they were poised to open, and did so this past June.

A store at 16 Washington Street was available, so the couple took a deep breath and dove in. Parking is a bit limited, but there is plenty of parking on the main street and they are just a few storefronts down. We all need exercise, so in a way they are fulfilling the purpose of the gym that had been in that building back in the days when they were still in school. Like a lot of our small villages in Cattaraugus County, nothing is very far once you are on the main drag.

This latest addition is a much-needed business in the village. After all, what village doesn't need a market? My granddaughter, a student at Catt-LV told me about the store because it has a bar for ice cream along with a couple of tables to eat at, if you prefer not to grab and go - which they are all set up for - from morning coffee, breakfast foods, hot foods, salads, subs, and veggie trays. Their meats are freshly cut on-site, and their full kitchen serves quesadillas, fries, pizza, wings, loaded fries, hot and cold subs, fresh homemade cookies, dessert breads and muffins. They have a baker/salad maker who makes their bakery items and many of their deli salads. Phone 716-229-2040 for orders.





Many of their supplies come from local vendors: fresh homemade breads from Stoll's Family Farm in New Albion, North Otto Maple syrups and maple crumb topping, honey, and maple syrup from 353 Maple, Colleen's Pizzas in Otto supplies them with premade pizzas in the freezer section AND their pizza crusts for their kitchen, locally made Freeze Dried Kreeze Candies, Buffalo's famous GANCI's BBQ Sauce and seasonal fresh produce from Randolph's Peaches & Cream. They are open to carrying products from other local suppliers so stop in and see them if you are interested.

Instead of just driving through Cattaraugus on your way to Dayton, Gowanda or Little Valley and Ellicottville, you are invited to park and just do a walkabout on Main Street, then turn down Washington for a short walk and say hello to Chris and Tara and the Perky's crew. Oh yes, and check out the message on their t-shirts!






