

Annual Holiday Open House

For many, it wouldn't feel like the start of the holiday season without a visit to Hog-Shed Studio Pottery or Brookside Studio Watercolors for their annual holiday open house! For over 30 years, both businesses have participated in this annual tradition, which was once just a two-day event during the first weekend of November. Now, the event takes place over three days to accommodate even more visitors who look forward to an annual sojourn to one of the most beautiful areas of Cattaraugus County. Both studios will be open to welcome visitors Friday, November 4 through Sunday, November 6 from 10:00am-5:00pm.

East Otto Country is a group of area artisans founded in 1986 by Michael and Elliott Hutten of Hog-Shed Studio Pottery, located at 8420 Otto-Maples Road in Little Valley. "We wanted to form a group so people could know about and visit the many home-based artisans in our area," Elliott Hutten explained of the organization, which had consisted of many different artisans over the years including woodworkers, painters, potters, and more. Robin Zefers Clark of Brookside Studio joined the group in 1990 and has participated in the annual holiday open house ever since. Now, Hog-Shed Studio and Brookside Studio are the only remaining members left of the group, and both are excited to see familiar and new faces this year.


For the Huttens, this year's event is bittersweet. "This will be our final open house," said Hutten. "After 40 years in business, we are retiring." In 1982, Hutten opened her pottery studio as a way to supplement her husband's income and stay home with their two children. Though not a potter, Michael, a registered nurse, is an instrumental part of the business, as he fires the kilns and keeps everything in good working order.

Originally from Buffalo, the Huttens moved to the East Otto area in the early 1980s in pursuit of a more self-sustaining lifestyle. The couple bought a jersey cow, some pigs, a few beef cattle, and planted a large garden to be as self-sufficient as possible. When Elliott decided to pursue pottery, the family downsized their small farm and put their efforts into building a studio. Despite what many believe, the studio is not located in the former hog shed! "This building was a machinery shed," said Hutten of her studio. "But the building right across the road from us was the original hog shed on this farm. When I was trying to think of a name for my business, I was looking out my window at that hog shed across the road."

Most of what Elliott makes is high-fired stoneware pottery. "We fire to a high temperature of 2,400 degrees," she explained. "What we make is safe for microwave, oven, and dishwasher. We have many functional pieces like mugs, bowls, casseroles, and vases. I also make highfired decorative pieces for the holiday season, such as snowmen, Christmas trees, vases, and holiday designs." Elliott mixes all of her own glazes and works with moist clay, which comes in 50-pound boxes ordered by the ton. "We're in our seventies now, so it's not as easy at it once was," she explained. "While I'll be retiring from the business, I'll always be doing something with clay. I can't stop being creative!"

While many of Hog-Shed's customers have been coming in frequently to buy pieces to complete their collection before the Huttens retire, Elliott said she will have a full inventory this weekend. Cash, checks, and credit cards are accepted. Masks will be optional, and prepackaged refreshments will be served. After the open house, hours are by appointment or chance; the Huttens encourage people to call ahead at 716-244-2967. After a pair of stunning Class D Championship game victories in the past few days, the Ellicottville Eagles and Lady Eagles high school soccer programs reign supreme in all of Western New York - and both teams have punched their tickets to the Far West Regional Championships this coming weekend.

Coach Tammy Eddy's Lady Eagles brought home their second Class D Championship in as many seasons, when Layla Kerns broke a 0-0 tie with North Collins to give Ellicottville a 1-0 lead with only 41 seconds remaining in regulation time last Saturday, Oct. 29 at Dunkirk High School. By the time the North Collins squad realized they'd need to mount a comeback, the final horn had sounded and Ellicottville was on its way back to the regional championships for the second year in a row.

The girls will travel to Niagara Wheatfield High School Friday, Nov. 4 for a 5:00pm matchup against the Section V champion.

Not to be outdone by their female counterparts on the "Sports Drama Meter," Coach Matt Finn's squad trailed the No. 1 seed Maple Grove Red Dragons, 3-2, with less than five minutes remaining in regulation time, but Eagles leading-scorer Sam Edwards beat the Red Dragons goalie to a loose ball and tied the game - forcing overtime to determine the champion.

In the first 15-minute overtime period, the three-time defending Section VI Class C champion, Red Dragons attacked the Eagles end relentlessly, however, senior goalie Evan Bauer threw up an impenetrable wall between the goalposts and the game went into a second overtime stanza before Ellicottville's sophomore forward Maddox Johnson shocked the assembled crowd at West Seneca East High School with the game-winner after a scramble directly in front of the Maple Grove goal.

With the victory, the boys also become back-to-back Class D champions of Section VI and will head to Rochester-area Spencerport High School Saturday, Nov. 5 at 1:30pm to take on the Section V champion.

INTERVIEW

A BOY BAND CHRISTMAS

This holiday season is going to be "music magical" when the tour, "A Boy Band Christmas" makes its way to WNY for two shows. Playing Friday, December 9 at Seneca Niagara Resort & Casino and moving on to Seneca Allegany Resort & Casino for a show Saturday, December 10, fans will be treated to multiple boy band members from All-4-ONE, 98 Degrees, O Town and more playing the hits you remember, along with holiday music to get you into the spirit of the season.

I was lucky enough to catch up with three of the headliners and will be featuring each of them in upcoming issues of ellicottvilleNOW.

Jamie Jones of All-4-One and I spoke recently about his career, what he's been doing, and had some fun with Christmas questions. All-4-One's biggest hit, "I Swear" won the group a Grammy Award in 1995 and the hit, "So Much In Love" garnered them an American Music Award the same year. With worldwide success, the band is still going strong, according to Jones, and will be celebrating their 30th Anniversary next year.

The singer/songwriter has kept himself very busy with his solo career, and continues to make music with All-4-One, as well as projects for major companies like Disney Channel, Netflix, ESPN, Viacom, and BET through his own production company, The Heavyweights.

Talking about the pandemic, Jones told me he made use of the time in quarantine by making a Christmas EP, "Christmas at Home with Jamie Jones". The EP features two original songs, "All I Want" and "Christmas Kiss", along with some of Jones' favorite holiday classics: "Someday at Christmas," "This Christmas," and "Give Love on Christmas Day". "I think I might do a couple more Christmas songs to update my Christmas EP," he added.

The quarantine produced one of his greatest emotional projects when the singer did a remake of the song, "Sunny". "So many people were talking about how depressed and lonely they were, which created a lot of negativity. The thing about this song is you can't not smile when you hear it," he stated. "We went to Venice Beach and filmed the video of the song in such a way that it would bring a little sunshine to people's lives and a smile to their faces. That was the whole goal of doing that, and I hope it helped to get people through that scary and uncertain time that the whole world went through together. The power of music can turn anything around, and I'm glad to be able to give that to the world."

A Conversation with Jamie Jones

HULICK: Next year will be All-4-One's 30th Anniversary! Any special plans to celebrate, like a tour?

JONES: Yes it is! We're still going strong! I've been working on some new music for us for a little while and we're hoping to release it next year... and who knows what else we may do.

HULICK: Do you have a Buffalo connection?

JONES: I actually do. My father has family there and I've only met them over the phone.

HULICK: You'll be doing a show at Seneca Niagara Casino Dec. 9th and another show at Seneca Allegany Casino Dec. 10th. Have you been to the Falls before? **JONES:** Yes. We were there in the winter and it was snowing and we wanted to go see the Falls, but being an LA boy I thought I brought warm enough clothes and as soon as I stepped outside there I was like... yeah, alright we got to go back in!

HULICK: (laughs) We'll look at it through the window. **JONES:** (laughs) Yeah, exactly!

HULICK: Your production company, The Heavyweights, has so much going on. I don't know how you find the time to do it all. **JONES:** I'm always grinding and always hustling because there's a lot of stuff I

JONES: I'm always grinding and always hustling because there's a lot of stuff I want to accomplish, and that goes with my goals onstage and offstage. It's been a huge blessing for me to be able to work with a lot of different artists and help them accomplish their goals as well.

HULICK: Your hit song, "I Swear", spent 11 weeks at #1 on the charts. Did you know it was going to be as big as it was?

JONES: It was actually a country song before we received it. I was really skeptical... I was the only one in the group that was skeptical. The President of the record company called us into his office in LA and said he wanted us to hear something. So he plays us the country version and we listened and he asks us what do we think and I told him... it's a country song... it's alright but it's a country song. He tells us he wants us to record it and I'm like... um, what? He says if we record this it's gonna be #1 for you. He told us it's #1 right now on the country charts and it did something that songs rarely do (at the time)... it crossed over and it's on the pop charts right now as we speak. So the rest of the group was cool with it and I said we're an R&B group and our album is completely finished. He said to let him worry about the album. He told us to just show up at the recording studio and record the song. So I said alright... I trust you... and the rest was history.

HULICK: Wow! I guess that would be the answer to my next question which was going to be what is the best advice you took from someone. **JONES:** Oh definitely! It was a game changer.

HULICK: (laughs) Yeah it was. You are big on K-Pop and J-Pop, which has blown up the past few years.

JONES: I've been very fortunate working with Korean artists since the early 2000's. One of the things I love about working with K-Pop artists is I get to be very musical because a lot of the artists from today, and some of the more current stuff aren't trying to be as musical... meaning the songs don't have a lot of chord changes, they don't usually have bridges... it's one kind of loop for three minutes and they just sing over that one loop, where as over there we can actually build quality songs like old school, like we used to do in the 1990's. That's one of the reasons I started doing a lot of work over there, and to see how far the artists from over there have come, and how they're now known worldwide and having the success they're having is amazing. I went to a BTS concert here in LA with 100,000 fans, and my middle son was so excited because he's a real big BTS fan... and as the concert was going on I'm looking at my son who knows every single word, I was like OK, you are right now singing in Korean... what?

HULICK: (laughs) Oh my gosh!

JONES: (laughs) It's the same thing that would trip me out when All-4-One would do shows in like Southeast Asia, which was one of our bigger markets, and the audience would sing along with us, word for word, and then we'd have a meet & greet after the show and they couldn't hold a conversation because the only English they knew was our songs.

HULICK: (laughs) Oh my gosh! That would be just... well, really weird. **JONES:** (laughs) It is. It's so surprising and now to see BTS it's a lot of the same thing with American audiences who don't speak Korean.

HULICK: With your show being "A Boy Band Christmas", would you mind if I asked

The store expanded to carry Christmas ornaments, Fenton lamps, and a variety of Christmas themed merchandise; it flourished until 2006. In 2006, the owners were forced to close this charming landmark.

Now, in 2022, a new Smethport entrepreneur has decided his hometown was missing one of his all-time favorite shops - America's First Christmas Store. So he searched and found wonderful, original hand-painted yard decorations from the 1932 store. This includes the jolly elf himself, Santa in his sleigh, with his full team of reindeer including Rudolph with his nose so bright. These original, nostalgic yard decorations are now featured as part of the shop's décor.

America's First Christmas Store is once again a destination shopping experience. The shop features a massive Christmas tree decorated entirely with Old World Christmas or naments. One of these hand-painted ornaments is a wonderful way to mark a special occasion like baby's first Christmas or a couple's new house. Another Christmas tree is completely decorated in white and red ornaments, with a red feathered cardinal tree topper.

Christopher Radko ornaments from Poland are another beautiful way to decorate your tree for the season. Pick a traditional Santa, a saintly angel, or a joyous snowman. Fontanini Nativities crafted in Italy are breathtaking in detail and workmanship.

In addition to tree ornaments, the shop is brimming with seasonal home decorations. Along with the traditional snow globes you shake, there are a new series of snow globes in non-traditional shapes like a train, which shake the snow automatically when you plug them in.

Core Performance: Daylight Saving Time

Daylight Saving Time (DST) ends in the US and Canada on Sunday, November 6, 2022. It's a time period that I - like countless others - dread. We may gain more daylight in the early morning hours, but the nights start to creep in as soon as 4:30pm. Growing up I believed that we did this time change for the farmers in the spring and then the kids waiting for the bus in the fall. But as it turns out, I was wrong about both of those assumptions.

Although modern DST has only been used for about 100 years, ancient civilizations are known to have engaged in comparable practices thousands of years ago. For example, the Roman water clocks used different scales for different months of the year to adjust the daily schedules to the solar time.

Many sources also credit Benjamin Franklin for being the first to suggest seasonal time change. However, the idea voiced by the American inventor and politician in 1784 can hardly be described as fundamental for the development of modern DST. After all, it did not even involve turning the clocks. In a letter to the editor of the Journal of Paris entitled, "An Economical Project for Diminishing the Cost of Light," Franklin simply suggested that Parisians could economize candle usage by getting people out of bed earlier in the morning. What's more: Franklin meant it as a joke.

DST was first implemented in the US with the Standard Time Act of 1918, a wartime measure for seven months during World War I in the interest of adding more daylight hours to conserve energy resources. Year-round DST, or "War Time", was implemented again during World War II.

So what does DST have to do with fitness, health and nutrition? A LOT!

With the sunshine depleted and colder temperature abundant, you have a recipe for hibernation. Many people actually struggle with a form of depression referred to as SAD or Seasonal affective disorder. SAD symptoms start in the fall and continue into the winter months, sapping your energy and making you feel moody. Treatments for SAD include getting as much natural sunlight as possible, exercising regularly and managing your stress levels. There is also light therapy - where a special lamp called a light box is used to stimulate exposure to sunlight.

This seasonal change can also cause weight gain. How many of us comment on putting our winter weight on? Here again, this is mainly due to boredom and a change in our dietary



choices. During these months we tend to enjoy more comfort foods. Plus, let's throw a bunch of holidays into the mix that are all about eating and drinking.

So, what to do about all of this? Be aware. Know what is coming and do your best to stay in a routine that includes daily exercise, hydration and a healthy diet. This can be very difficult for so many people. Understand that you are not alone in this struggle. There are apps and gadgets that can remind you to get up and move. There are fitness centers that are full of light and friendly like-minded folks that are still open after dark. And there are plenty of healthy food options to enjoy during these next five months. Before you know it, March will be here, and we will once again "spring forward".
