THE FUN WAY TO RUN!

Ellicottville Distillery's Liquor Mile Returns New Year's Eve

Some people like to run and find it enjoyable. I, myself, am not one of those people. If I'm running, it's because I'm being chased by a wild grizzly or something. But if you are one of those individuals who love the feeling of the pavement beneath your feet and a crisp winter wind in your face, the Ellicottville Distillery has a great incentive for you. On December 31st, their "New Year's Eve 5K & Liquor Mile" will be hitting the streets.

What is a Liquor Mile exactly? We asked owner Bryan Scharf to elaborate on the event. He said, "The concept behind the liquor mile is based upon the same premise as a beer mile. So every quarter mile you drink a mini cocktail and keep running for 4 drinks total. Some friends of ours at the distillery have been doing it in their hometown for a few years before approaching us to do one, too. It's more or less a fun run with alcohol." (Now that's a run I could get into.)

If you'd rather just run minus the alcohol, the 5K will actually take place before the Liquor Mile. The course is intended to be a mix of road and cross country by the Distillery. Though Bryan did say, "If it's an absolute mess, then we will probably just be doing laps on Robbins Road, to keep it safe for everyone."

Is there a cost for the run? Yes, and it's for a good cause. The 5K is \$25 per person; the liquor mile alone is \$15 a person, and it's \$35 if you decide to do both. All the proceeds will be going directly to Oishei Children's Hospital. The Distillery opens at 11:00am with registration for runners. The run will start at 12:00pm. But don't worry, this isn't all work and no play. Quite the contrary. After the running is done, the Distillery is hosting some great entertainment. There will be music from 5:00-8:00pm, followed by fireworks. If you get hungry, the Fiamatta Pizza Truck of Cloudersport, PA will be on-site most of the day. Starting at noon, they will be whipping up their delicious wood-fired pies. They've got your basic cheese and pepperoni along with their specialities like the Bee's Knees featuring fresh and shredded mozzarella, fresh garlic and basil, parmigiano reggiano and either regular or hot honey. (They are cash only, so make sure you're ready! Pizzas range from \$11 to \$15.)

For more information about the Distillery's 5K and Liquor Mile, call 716-801-0086. "This event is so fun!" said Bryan. "Runners take off at 12:00pm sharp! It will not be timed and everyone who participates can go at their own pace. You can pre-register at ellicottvilledistillery.com or you can also register day the day of the event!"

Is there more in the works at the Distillery besides the run? "We'll be releasing a 6-yearold bourbon December 16th and we'll have food and music for that as well," said Bryan. "And we'll be open the week between Christmas and New Year's, too. Oh, and don't forget, we'll be doing our annual Christmas Tree Funeral Fire on January 20th. Then we'll slow down for the rest of the winter months."



Black Cherry Tattoo Co. Opens in Jamestown, NY

Owner Dan May and Co-owner Ann Maria share over 22 years of experience between them. They both have different styles, training and preferences, which makes them an ideal business team. EllicottvilleNOW spoke with both artists about why they chose this profession, where they studied and where they plan on going from here.

eNOW: What made each of you want to become a tattoo artist?

ANN: I've wanted to be a tattooer since I was in early high school. My mom was supportive of my drawing, but is super conservative so it was my secret obsession



until I went to college. I've been spending a lot of time in tattoo shops and have had many friends in the industry since I was about 21 or so, and my love for it only grew with time. Finding a worthwhile apprenticeship is not easy to do, and I had my daughter when I was 19, so my goal went to the back burner for awhile. Once I moved to Jamestown four years ago, I was finally able to put in the work and time to make my goal happen and I love it more every day. Tattoos can really change how someone feels about themselves, and I love making people feel comfortable and beautiful in their own skin.

DAN: I got into tattooing by coincidence. I never had intended on pursuing my passion for art as a trade. I was stationed in Okinawa, Japan in the early 2000s and had become a collector of tattoos, and was doing some sketching for friends that wanted to get a design from someone they served with. One day, we all went into a local studio together and the Okinawan artist approached me and asked if I was interested in learning the trade. I told him I had joined the military for experience and to get more funds to go finish my engineering degree, so I wasn't really interested. He insisted I come hang out for a few weeks before I make my decision. Two weeks later, my heart was sold on it and I have been tattooing since.

eNOW: Where did you study and how long have you been in the industry?

ANN: I've been taking art classes since I was a child. I took art classes in high school and college, and spent a little time learning to pierce in college as well. (Although we don't offer piercing currently.) I learned to tattoo here in Jamestown, and have been tattooing for almost two years. **DAN:** I continued to study tattooing in the studio until my tour was done in 2003. I flew home and was back on plane a couple weeks later and continued to work in the studio for a couple more years. In 2005 I started my first studio, Needle Slave Tattoo. From 2005 to the present, I moved the studio a couple times into larger facilities along with a few name changes and finally settled with Black Cherry Tattoo. Along the way, I took on five apprentices to grow the studio and share the experience that I was once gifted. Having that experience led to my continuous self-learning and then all of us sharing to help our advancement in the industry.

Founded in 1912, The Park School of Buffalo is WNY's only co-ed, PreK-Grade 12 and Montessori school, and was also ranked #1 Best Private K-12 School in Buffalo and Erie County by Niche for its second consecutive year. Park was founded by a group of Buffalo parents who had met with the influential philosopher John Dewey. Under Dewey's guidance and with the leadership of his star student, Mary Hammett Lewis, Park began educating children in 1912 implementing Dewey's key insight that deep learning occurs through constant experimentation and problem solving. The curriculum has always been interdisciplinary, as such, the arts are integrated into all academic subjects. Park students are academically and socially prepared problem solvers equipped with confidence, critical thinking skills, and a desire to make the world a better place.

Earlier this year, RALA was approached with the opportunity to collaborate with Park School, and subsequent conversations revealed considerable mission overlap and a shared history in the Arts & Crafts movement, making the decision to hold this year's Winter Festival on the grounds of the school an easy one. This temporary change in venue is an exciting opportunity to connect the Roycroft Renaissance and the modern Roycroft Artisans with a broader segment of Western New York Arts & Crafts collectors who may have been prevented from traveling to East Aurora in previous years, and the Roycroft Artisans are looking forward to sharing East Aurora's proud Arts & Crafts traditions with the larger WNY arts community. This location's proximity to both the Northtowns and the City of Buffalo is in keeping with RALA's mission to promote and further the evolution of Roycroft.

eNOW: What prompted you to open up a shop in Jamestown?

ANN: Dan and I chose to open the studio in Jamestown because we both have our families here. The kids go to Jamestown schools. I love the small town feel of the downtown area. You really feel like a part of a community here. There was a need for a calm, inviting tattoo studio in the area. We are a safe space for everyone. Somewhere that you feel comfortable being yourself, and know you will have a great experience, feel heard and respected, and leave with a beautiful tattoo.

eNOW: What type of art do you each specialize in? What are some of your favorite designs?

ANN: Before I was tattooing, I used mostly charcoal and pencils for my art. I enjoyed dark and creepy and detailed drawings, but now that I tattoo, I love bold vivid colors and

ELLICOTTVILLE VILLAGE BOARD

Board Accepts Resolutions for Replacement Streetlights, Elizabeth Street Repaving, and Downtown Parking Lot

The Village Board of Ellicottville was called to order by Mayor John Burrell on Wednesday, November 22nd. The Village Board usually meets on the third Tuesday of the month but made an exception for the last-minute change in scheduling. Highlights from the meeting are as follows:

Starting off the meeting, the Board welcomed some good news to the floor. The sales tax check came in with an increase of \$13,500.00 from the prior year. Of course, any extra funding provided is a positive addition and will be put to good use for the village.

Accepted by the Board were three major resolutions for the replacement streetlights, Elizabeth Street repaving, and the Downtown parking lot. Each project was given the necessary approved bonds that are not meant to be exceeded. The Elizabeth Street repaving was approved for the largest sum of \$3,800,000 which is the planned cost of the project. The Downtown parking lot came in at an approved cost of \$200,000 which is the share the village will be taking care of in the financial planning. The replacement streetlights was accepted at \$230,000 to be used for all costs occurred in the project. The streetlights have a temporary replacement for the moment while planning allows for the needed materials to arrive. The Board hopes to see these come in mid-December if all goes according to plan.

While the temporary streetlights have been put in place, also added are the village's Christmas lights and decorations. A beautiful complement to the holiday season, they

illuminate the village's charm to be enjoyed by all.

An update from the Engineering Department was the approval of the budgeted RAFA system, which is a water and sewage management system to assist with the needs of the village's operations. Another notable upgrade to be mentioned is that the new village water storage tank is online and working. They also submitted their report which was approved by the Board with no issue.

The Department of Public Works had a few matters that they attended to as the village shifts into the winter season. They implemented the appropriate sweeping and cleaning of streets, installed new signs for the skatepark and new businesses, as well as milled and paved each side of the Martha Street Bridge. The report included some other minor improvements and was accepted by the Village Board members.

In Special Events, Doug Bush and fellow Board members discussed with excitement and approved the Christmas in Ellicottville and Christmas Stroll. Two festive events that bring about plenty of holiday cheer for the community and tourist alike. Christmas in Ellicottville was held Nov. 24-26th and the Christmas Stroll will take place on Dec. 9th.

On Wednesday, November 15th, the Town Board of Ellicottville held their monthly meeting which was called to order by Supervisor Matthew McAndrew. Approved were the minutes of the previous Town Board meetings, which included the October 18th Town Board meeting, two special meetings held November 2nd and November 8th, as well as a special Town/Village joint meeting which was held on November 9th. All meetings were passed and approved without issue. Other meeting highlights are as follows:

In Supervisor Matt McAndrew's Report, an update was made to the short-term rental arrangement with Granicus, a company that focuses on connecting people and local governments. The plan is for Granicus to have a presentable available for the Town of Ellicottville to be made mid-December.

McAndrew also reported (on behalf of Highway Department Mr. Brumagin's absence), that preparations have been made of the approaching winter weather. Sand and salt have been received and town vehicles are being winterized.

In the Engineering Department, there appears to be Change Order #5 in place for JD Northrup Construction. This order would be to add fencing to the North Well Site which will protect the generator and equipment that is exposed on the exterior of the building.



Country Music Star Sara Evans to Bring Sounds of the Season to Seneca Allegany Resort & Casino

Seneca Allegany Resort and Casino will be in the holiday spirit when Sara Evans, a fan favorite Country Music Award winning star, ends her "Go Tell It On The Mountain Christmas Tour" with one show only on Saturday, December 16, 2023 at 7:00pm.

Evans is the fifth most played female country artist on country radio, which gives you an idea why her shows have been sold out year after year with songs like "I Keep Looking", "A Real Nice Place To Start", "A Little Bit Stronger", "Born To Fly" and "Suds In The Bucket".

Starting out singing lead vocals at the age of six in the family formed band, The Evans Family Band with her two older brothers, the singer eventually moved on to a solo career which started with the release of her first album, "Three Chords and the Truth" in 1997. Though not a commercially successful album, Evans was out to prove she had what it took to be a successful artist and released her second album, "No Place That Far" in 1998 and her career started opening up. She has been a musical force since, with a new studio album to be released in 2024.

Her album, "Copy That" is a compilation of other artists' songs sung as "cover songs", done typically during the course of an artist's live shows as a nod to that artist's favorite songs. Taking on a new twist, the singer/songwriter put together an album of these songs along with continuing "the family music theme" she grew up on by having her son Avery play guitar on this unique, fun album as well as her two daughters, Olivia and Audrey, adding their vocals to the critically acclaimed project. "It was so fun... I can't even describe it," said Evans. adding, "Some things are just magical."

Wearing multiple hats in the entertainment industry, she has added songacti Evans has been nominated multiple times for every award you can think of while winning Female Vocalist of the Year in 2005 from the Academy of Country Music. In October of this year, she was asked to join the Grand Ole Opry, which was a dream of hers since she was a child. We talk about that in the following conversation.

A Conversation with Sara Evans

HULICK: You were just inducted into the Grand Ole Opry on October 7th by Crystal Gayle. Congratulations! When you were invited to join, your initial answer was "no", which obviously was a joke. That's funny. What was the whole experience like? **EVANS:** From the moment Bill Anderson surprised me in August onstage at the Ry-man with my Opry invitation, to Crystal Gayle inducting me in that sacred circle, it's been surreal. I had been waiting to be asked to be an Opry member for years, so when it finally happened, it felt like a monumental night in my life and career; it really falt perfect. It was also so special that Bill Anderson who invited me to become a felt perfect. It was also so special that Bill Anderson, who invited me to become a member, was also on the bill the night of my induction.

HULICK: You've had an amazing career. Is music what you always wanted to do? **EVANS:** Yes! I started singing on stage at 5-years-old all over Missouri with my brothers and sisters. I would be singing until 2:00am watching drunk people two step. Of course that wouldn't fly today, but back then it was no big deal! My mom was instrumental in getting us into music. I actually went to college for 11 days to study music, and then realized I just needed to move to Nashville if I was really serious about making it happen. But I've always known that this is my God-given gift and what I was put on earth to do... other than be a mother!

HULICK: Who are your musical idols? **EVANS:** Reba, Dolly, Loretta Lynn, Patsy Cline, Patty Loveless, Fleetwood Mac/Stevie Nicks... so many great artists have influenced me... I could go on for days.

HULICK: When you were asked to be part of The Masked Singer, were you all in right away or did it take some convincing?

EVANS: I mean the second they asked, I was all in! It's such a fun concept for a family-friendly show. We worked so hard that week recording backup versions of the songs, learning choreography, rehearsing, etc. Filming days for TV are always super long. The craziest part was that my manager and I had to be covered from head to toe the entire time we were on set, so that we didn't spoil the surprise. It was such a fun experience, especially getting to see Dick Van Dyke sing "When You're Smiling" by Billie Holiday. I literally cried.

HULICK: You were the Mustang. The costumes are so elaborate. Do the contestants have any input on what they are going to be or the songs they will sing? **EVANS:** Yeah! We had a few meetings before the show to go over costume ideas. They brought the idea of "Mustang" to me and when I saw their sketches for the costume, I thought it was amazing and perfect. For the songs, they told us what the night would be themed, so I came back with a few options that fit the category and we narrowed it down until we picked the one!

HULICK: Your song "Suds In The Bucket" is one of the first songs honored in a new category by CMT for social media only, "Trending Comeback Song of the Year", which is for classic songs that withstood the test of time and are part of recent social trends that still resonate with fans old and new. The song actually was in jeopardy of not making the album, "Restless" because the record company didn't think you should recent the test of the song. How with the song that the the

EVANS: All I need to say is I'm always right! (laughs) I really pushed for "Suds". We brought the demo to the label and as a musician I could really just hear its potential. That song has 9 lives... it had its big week at Country Radio where we were blessed with a 2 week Number One hit. Then every few years it gets discovered again and comes back to life. I love singing it live and watching the whole crowd singing along and it just makes them so happy.

HULICK: In 2020 you released your album, "Copy That" which was an album of cover songs. That's one of the best parts of concerts when you get to hear which song your favorite artist(s) will do at the end of their show. You seemed to really enjoy doing that album. Will there ever be a "Copy That II"? **EVANS:** You never know! I had so much fun making "Copy That" and am SO incred-

ibly proud of it. Right now, we are in the studio cutting my first original studio album since "Words". It's been so fun exploring a new sound. What we are doing now is dif-ferent from anything I have ever done. I'm definitely super into 70s vibes right now, so maybe I should do a decades themed "Copy That II". But not anytime soon. (laughs)

HULICK: Do you have a message for your fans coming out to see you Dec. 16th? **EVANS:** December 16th is the last night of the Christmas Tour, so my message to the fans is that they better bring the energy! I don't get to play New York very often, so I always love getting back there and seeing the fans.

HULICK: Would it be alright if we talk Christmas for a few minutes since your show is

When I caught up with Evans, we discussed her career and had some fun with Christmas questions to set the mood for her fans before they come out to see her December 16 at the Seneca Allegany Event Center.

We also talked about her stint on The Masked Singer and how her song, "Suds In The Bucket" almost didn't make the album and the event that ironically came around full circle by being the first of it's kind... which incidentally is her favorite song to sing live.

Make plans to come out and share the hits and some holiday magic with this star of country music. You're sure to leave with that Christmas spirit in your heart.

HULICK: What was your favorite gift as a child?

EVANS: I got an Easy Bake Oven one year and was in heaven. I would imagine I was a cook and had my own restaurant.

HULICK: What is your favorite Christmas carol or Christmas song? **EVANS:** This is a really tough question for me... I absolutely LOVE "O Holy Night" and the version that we do in the Christmas show. It starts out so quiet and intimate and really swells and gets HUGE in the chorus. HEALTH & FITNESS

Core Performance: Basic Workout Principles For Success

I have been a certified personal trainer since 2006. Over the past 17 years I have had a lot of time to grow, learn and develop sure-fire ways to burn body fat and build muscle. I have also had the pleasure of training some remarkable individuals ranging in age from 9-years-old to 92-years-old. Each individual requires their own plan and exercises to achieve their goals, but this rule of thumb stays the same for all of my clients: Stick to sound basic principles. Here are some of the basics I have used over the years that have worked for me and me clients:

USE FREE WEIGHTS: Although machines can be useful tools to help individuals to start a strength training program, most experts agree that you can achieve more if you spend most of your time using free weights. Free weights will help the participant discover weaknesses and strengths that can go undiscovered with machines. When using free weights, your body has no assistance from mechanical devices. Your muscles not only have to lift the weight, they have to ensure that you stay balanced and stable. This requires considerable effort and muscle coordination. When your routines are based around barbell and dumbbell exercises, you can expect to see muscle growth happen more quickly.

FOCUS ON COMPOUND EXERCISES: If you want to build as much muscle as possible, it makes sense to emphasize exercises that work more than one muscle group. While isolation exercises have their place, of course, remember that if you are working one muscle group, then that is the only muscle group that will grow (i.e. bicep curl).

Compound exercises will multiply the effectiveness and results of your muscles. The following exercise will get you maximum return of the effort invested: Instead of just a squat, add a dumbbell push press or a kettlebell front lateral swing. Follow this up with a hamstring exercise like a deadlift with an upright row. Add exercises that will always compliment each other and use a push/pull movement to build it bigger.

EMPHASIZE THE ECCENTRIC PHASE: The eccentric phase of an exercise is the second part where you are lowering the weights, and the muscle in question is lengthening. This is where I tell my clients that "their range of motion" will make all the difference in their results. Also, slow down during this phase; do not let gravity do all the work. And remember, control is key to doubling the effectiveness of any phase. If you are working the muscles in both halves of the exercise, you will find that makes a real difference.

GET YOUR FORM RIGHT! A pet peeve here at CORE PERFORMANCE. If you allow yourself to exercise with poor form, you will get little or no benefit from your workout. You may even risk an injury. This is the main reason every trainer/instructor is fully certified and mentored before working with clients and teaching classes.

HAVE REALISTIC GOALS: If you employ all of the above strategies, you can achieve amazing results for sure. But, you need to be realistic. You cannot expect to work out hard for a week and see drastic results. It will take time and consistency. But, if you keep showing up and doing what needs to be done, you will get results.

Simple mathematics and biology tell us that if we keep pushing our muscles, they will continue to grow and stay strong. Now it is time to get your head into the equation and make your own magic. 




