The start of ski season was a wet one, but that didn't deter passholders and visitors from gearing up and hitting the slopes. Holiday Valley officially kicked off the season last Friday, Dec. 1st.

"Opening Day was fantastic," said Dash Hegeman, Marketing Director at Holiday Valley. "We had a really good turnout of very passionate guests who were excited about getting back out on the snow and making turns. And we had the grand opening ceremony for the Mardi Gras 6, which was a historic moment for everyone involved."

Although the resort did close the lifts through this week, colder temps in the forecast mean the snowmaking team will fire up the guns again and the mountain crew will get back out on the mountain to push snow and groom the slopes in time for the resort's reopening this Friday, Dec. 8th. Friday is also the first night of night skiing and riding.

With bills on the rise and inflation adding to the situation, some families do not have the ability to provide gifts to their children during the holidays. The program was started long ago by the school nurse at the time, Betty Westfall. She noticed some of the students weren't that excited about the upcoming holidays and realized their families may not be in a position to celebrate. So she came up with the idea that the school could help anonymously. The spirit continued when Mrs. Shirley Morton, the High School Secretary, took over as Chairperson of the Project. Mrs. Morton retired years ago and the Project was then handled through a committee of school workers, with the bulk of the work being handled through the Nurse's office.

Nurse Karin Hager, who is spearheading the Project currently, let us know that the program helps out over 30 local families. How is a family added to the list? "Families are added through confidential staff recommendations. We don't bring attention to the students who will be receiving donations when our ECS elf makes the deliveries. It's our practice to make sure those who are being helped, get to enjoy the holiday both peacefully and privately, like everyone else."

What can those families on the list expect to receive? Well, each student has 2 tags for clothing (a pair of pants/a shirt). Santa's helpers in the past have also been known to give gift cards, coats and toys. It is up to the "helper" as to what extra gifts they may purchase. Who are the helpers? You could be one of them!

Gift tags to purchase clothing or extra gifts for a child are available around the village at Dina's, Villaggio, M&T Bank, Holy Name of Mary Church, St. Paul's Lutheran Church and the Baptist Church in Great Valley. Wrapped gifts with the tag on the outside should be returned to the business where the tag was picked up. The committee will be picking up the gifts mid-December. Monetary donations are also welcomed and can be sent to Project Christmas c/o Karin Hager, RN Ellicottville Central School, 5873 Route 219 Ellicottville, NY 14731.

So if you are in a good place this year and want to help someone who may be in a tough spot right now, consider stopping in at one of the above-mentioned locations and picking up a tag or two and be a family's secret Santa this Christmas.

Project Christmas doesn't end after the holiday is over. It keeps the spirit of the season all year. Nurse Hager said, "Project Christmas also watches over our students and their families during the remainder of the year for when an urgent need arises in their family. This year you can expect a long list of favorites to add to your holiday calendar: basket raffles, pictures with Santa, a small petting zoo, and more! Even Buddy the Elf will be making an appearance, singing his heart out to all the best holiday karaoke songs. You will not want to miss that performance!

Adding to the holiday spirit, you can also find a "Letters to Santa" mailbox at the event where kids can bring their own letters ready to mail out to the North Pole. This has become a very sweet tradition for families to watch their own pieces of mail sent off to Santa in these specialty marked mailboxes.



A day filled with magical memories, the CCA and Salamanca School's Transportation Department kindly asks their guests to bring a donation to Fill the Bus! Talking with Bridget Sanford of the CCA on what is needed, she expressed, "CCA welcomes all food donations, especially canned items. A special 'Holiday Shopping List' is provided at this event for individuals shopping for donations at Save-A-Lot." So, there is an option to shop that day and gift as many items as you would like based

on the needs of the organization. A convenient way to stop into the Save-A-Lot and grab whatever you can to make a difference to those in need. Bridget also mentioned that the "CCA also accepts toys and books for distribution at this event", meaning you can bring or buy something special to really add to a family's holiday wishes.

All proceeds from the event will go directly to support the CCA's Nutrition Department which offers an in-house pantry, a community kitchen, and a community garden. The pantry is open daily to all Monday-Friday from 9:00am-12:00pm, as well as 1:00-3:00pm. The community kitchen offers hot meals to go, Monday-Thursday 3:00-4:00pm. The community garden is a wonderfully thought-out project that begins the process in March by growing vegetable plants in their greenhouse, distributing these plants to the garden or customers to take home, and then they are harvested to benefit the pantry and kitchen services. With events like Fill the Bus, the CCA is then able to use donations to go right back into the giving nature of the organization and directly benefit the area. They also accept donations throughout the year and welcome any volunteers looking to get involved in the organization. Another story he enjoyed telling was how the song, "Silver Bells" was almost called "Tinkle Bells" until his partner Jay went home and told his wife about the new song he and Ray created for Paramount. She was horrified and said to him, "don't you know what 'tinkle' means?" The name was changed.

Bonanza, a 1959 western show set in the 1800s, continues to be syndicated. It has a theme song written by Ray Evans and Jay Livingston that everyone familiar with the show can identify. Another of their theme songs is the theme from Mister Ed. (A horse is a horse, of course, of course, of course ...) Songhall.org says this about Ray Evans and his partner, Jay Livingston: They were often described in the late 1900s as the "last great of the great songwriters of Hollywood,"

Breakaway Classic Adventures: Snowmobiling and Skijoring

The first days of snow are always special; it's like spring cleaning only it's the start of winter! Put away all those warm weather items, shorts and sandals and dust off the ski equipment, snowsuits and mitts. Stack the firewood outside your front door, clean the chimney and start up the snow blower! "Let it snow! Let it snow! Let it snow!"

There once was a time before snowmobiles, which wasn't that long ago, when winter transportation was strictly on a pair of skis attached to your feet. In fact, the very first snowmobile, invented by a Canadian by the name of Bombardier wasn't until 1922, just over 100 years ago!

Skis, on the other hand, date back to ancient times probably before that lovable caveman Gorg, from that famous syndicated B.C. comic strip, invented the wheel - but not the snow tire, that came later! (FYI footnote - B.C. comic strip was created in 1958 by Johnny Hart, an Endicott, NY native!)

The first skis that were documented date back to 8000 B.C. and of course, you guessed it, they were made in China! The first ski featuring a camber and the modern day side cut wasn't invented until 1868 by a Norwegian by the name of Sondre Norheim of Telemark, Norway! These skis were called Telemark skis oddly enough.

Back to the snowmobile! The first driven skier was not by a gasoline burning combustible engine, but rather by one of Santa's trusty reindeer. For hundreds of years, the Sami people of Lapland (which included northern Finland, Sweden and Norway) harnessed their skis to their domesticated reindeer. Reindeer enabled Laplanders to travel quickly across vast open snowy meadows and across frozen lakes.

The Norwegians named this mode of transportation Skijoring. Skijoring even made its Olympic debut in the 1928! In 1912, some European countries began utilizing real horsepower to pull skiers, thus Equine Skijoring was invented. In 1915, Equine Skijoring crossed the ocean finding its way to Lake Placid, NY where it became a popular winter-time recreational activity.

Another adaptation to early Skijoring that's much more practical today is to harness dog power and that's where I come in. No, I didn't come up with the idea, but it somehow seemed obvious to a teenage boy full of clever ideas that occasionally led to mischief!

In the mid sixties, my family did a lot of cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. This was the best way to get around during the long winter months at our northern Ontario lodge. My dad was a very avid ice fisherman. Surrounding our lodge were dozens of secluded lakes teaming with native lake trout and speckled trout. The problem was how to get to them. The snowmobile was around but we didn't own one so he took to his skis. It wasn't long before my brother and I beat him to ice hut using dog power. The family pet, a very large black and tan German Shepherd was recruited to pull us.

Anyone that has ever tried walking a dog without a training collar will know that the natural instinct for a dog on a lead is to pull. Yes, dogs love to pull and run! A combination that works well for the owner that has the ability to follow along without getting an arm yanked off or getting dragged to the ground. Dog power is an ingenious method of transportation; Dog sledding and Skijoring are two similar examples of cost effective means to harness all that energy.

The Skijor harness fits around the dog's body in a way that it doesn't hamper the dog's ability to run freely and pull a load with the least amount of effort. The harness is then attached to a long lead, which in turn is attached to another harness around the mid section of the skier. The equipment is basic; skis, poles and the Skijor harness assembly.

Our early Skijoring skis were nothing like what you see being used today by cross coun-

try skiers; they were more like the ones found hanging over your fireplace for decoration. Those wide old boards with the leather harnesses where excellent for what we needed them for and offered a very stable platform for being quickly driven over un-groomed terrain.

For the ice fisherman that wants to explore some virgin water without a snowmobile, Skijoring is just the ticket. Traveling over flat snow and ice covered terrain will be a snap.

Skijoring harnesses made by Neewa run approximately \$100 plus. Excellent skis for Skijoring are ones without medal edges. Asnes' model Breidablikk BC won't harm your dog if somehow it comes in contact with the ski. The specs for the Breidablikk 200cm ski is 86-62-74 equipped with BC or 75mm telemark bindings. A good alternative ski is the Black Diamond GlideLite 147cm Snow Treker 124-110-122 that came with a universal binding that works with ordinary hiking boots.

Another cool Nordic invention that's becoming increasing popular here in the US is a kicksled made by ESLA of Finland. Although not exactly skijoring and not quite dog sledding, kicksleds are a personalized compromise serving the dog enthusiasts, ice fishers and hikers. The one huge advantage of a kicksled is that it has extra room to carry gear. These sleds can also be folded down to fit inside smaller vehicles or in a ski box. Unlike Skijoring, the kicksled comes with a brake, a major plus if your dog goes squirrel on you!

A dog is a great companion, especially when you are traveling into isolated territory where it is essential to be prepared for the worst. Falling through the ice or getting lost in a blizzard, your dog may be your only chance for survival. Most people wouldn't think that their family pet would be up to the task of pulling you on skis over some frozen tundra but you'd be surprised!
